### Town and County News.

**THE Guelph Daily Advertiser is dead.**

**BASE BALL.**—The Preston club play their return match with the Guelph Union in town to-morrow afternoon.

SEVEN fine sheep were killed, it is supposed by wolves, on the farm of Mr. McGill, in the township of Peel, a mile south of Arthur village, on Monday night last.

Mr. John Blain had eleven sheep stolen from him on Tuesday morning of last week, from his premises, Lot 15, Gore of Puslinch. The bars of the fence had been taken down, and the sheep easily driven away.

**SALES.**—Mr. Alex. Stewart, Eramosa, last week sold his splendid heavy draught team for \$400. Mr. Robert Reed, of Brant, bought from Gideon Awey, of Erin, a Durham bull calf for \$90, and Mr. Francis Flood, of Elderslie, bought from Mr. Thos. Easton, of Nassagaweya, a Durham bull calf for \$60.

**DURING** a recent thunder storm Mr. Samuel Williams' barn, in West Garafraxa, was struck by lightning. The electric fluid hit the ridge of the building making a hole about a foot square, and ran down a rafter, splintering it to pieces, but fortunately nothing was set on fire. On the same night a neighbor, Mr. James Walker, had 7 valuable sheep killed by lightning.

**DEER** have entirely forsaken their old haunts in Luther. A number of hunting parties have not out with dogs this season, but one of them got a run, much less a shot. The bush fires destroyed the old runs, and probably the railway trains helped to frighten away the game. Bears are unusually plenty, however, numbers having been seen, and several farmers have had pigs carried away.

**TYPHOID FEVER.**—Typhoid fever is very prevalent in several parts of the Province at present. For weeks past there have been quite a number of cases in Clifford, some of which have proved fatal. We hear also of several cases in this Town and Township, and not a few have been attacked by it in Fergus. In Goderich it is raging to an alarming extent, having assumed the character of an epidemic. It is said that there are about 200 cases of it in that town.

**MAC EVOY'S HIBERNICAN.**—As will be seen by the advertisement Mac Evey's celebrated Hibernian will be exhibited to-night in the Town Hall. It is a grand scenic, musical and character entertainment, illustrating the scenery, music and antiquities of Ireland. This celebrated Exhibition has been constantly before the public for over twelve years, sanctioned by the Clergy, endorsed by the Press and admired by the people throughout the American continent. Since it has been exhibited in Canada, it has attracted an immense number of spectators, who have been delighted with the performance. Don't fail to see it to-night.

**ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.**—On Saturday afternoon an accident happened to Mr. Wm. Scriven, which might have been attended by serious results. He and some others had been up the river in boats on a shooting excursion. When coming down the parties in the first boat spied a bird of some kind flying overhead, and one of them took hold of his gun to fire at it. The trigger by some means caught the gunwale of the boat, and it went off, a part of the discharge, (duck shot), lodging in the arm, shoulder and back of Mr. Scriven. Dr. Clarke extracted as many of the shot as he could. Had they lodged in a more vital part of the body the consequences might have been serious.

**ROCKWOOD LITERARY INSTITUTION.**—We forgot last week to mention that the regular quarterly meeting of this society took place on the 27th ult., when the following officers were elected for the ensuing quarter:—President, Dr. McCullough; vice-presidents, J. Trefry and P. Lee; Secretary, Joseph Harris; Treasurer, Wm. Torrance. We are glad to learn that this society is in a flourishing condition, and exercising a very salutary effect in directing the minds of the young men in the place to the study of a pure and healthy literature, and the acquisition of useful knowledge. The society give an entertainment on Wednesday night, the 9th, when there will be recitations, readings, music, addresses, and illustrations from the magic lantern. A full house is expected.

**POLICE COURT.** Before T. W. Saunders, Esq., P. M. October 7th. Thos Stoddard, who knocked down and robbed Chas. Willoughby and Thomas Hudson, one of the nights of the Exhibition, last week, (the particulars of which we gave at the time), was to-day brought up for examination, and committed to stand his trial for robbery.

The last official returns for the Ontario and Quebec Banks show that during August they held in New York and other places out of the Dominion funds to the amount of \$10,725,813. Nearly eleven million dollars out of the country that should be in it, will help to account for the scarcity of money that has made it worth over ten per cent.

**A Meeting of the Cabinet Called**

Washington, Oct. 7.

With a view of easing the money market, Acting Secretary Richardson has directed the Assistant Treasurer at New York to buy five millions bonds and sell five millions of gold on Monday, 7th inst. subject to the usual conditions of monthly purchases of bonds and sale of gold.

San Francisco, Oct. 6.

The steamer *Idaho* has arrived from Honolulu, and brings news up to 25th ult.

The great crater of Mauna Loa in the Island of Hawaii is again in eruption. At a distance of 75 miles the sight is magnificent. There is no flow of lava yet.

A large number of miners have returned here from the Arizona diamond fields. They denounce the diamond excitement as a humbug.

Chicago, Oct. 6.

In a number of churches to-day the discourse was based upon the terrible calamity which befel the community a year ago, and the progress made in the restoration of the burned city.

The workmen are busy day and night upon the Chamber of Commerce, a number of banks and similar buildings, in order to have them ready for occupation and formal opening of the 9th inst., the anniversary of the fire.

London, Oct. 5.

One Collins, absconding with \$20,000 stolen money, took passage on the steamer which left Southampton for Baltimore on Monday last. The police authorities have been notified to arrest the culprit on his arrival at Baltimore.

Gladstone has called a meeting of the cabinet for Wednesday next to transact important business, the nature of which is not reported.

#### Have we a Board of Health.

We have a dim recollection that last spring a Board of Health was appointed by the Town Council, which was supposed to devise and enforce sanitary regulations as they might deem necessary for the preservation of health. This Board seems to have gone out of existence altogether, for it has showed no sign of vitality for months past. There are several places in this town in a most disgraceful state, and have been allowed to remain that way all summer. As long as the health of the Town was good no remark was made, but now that typhoid fever is so prevalent, we think that something ought to be done in getting these back lanes, cess pools and other places of impurity thoroughly cleaned. The back lane that runs from Quebec to Macdonnell street in rear of Wyndham Street is in a very filthy state, and the combination of smells that emanates from some of the cellars and back yards about Day's block would lead one to suppose that everything possible was being done to encourage typhoid and all other kinds of fevers. We trust that the Board of Health will at once wake up to its duty, and see to the immediate purification of all such places of uncleanness.

The Waterloo Chronicle is urging on the people of that county the desirability of constructing gravel roads, pointing by way of encouragement to the ratepayers the benefits such roads have conferred on the County of Wellington.

The first bit of real comfort for the Greeleyites comes from Georgia. The Democratic Liberal ticket there has not only won, which was expected, but it has been won by an immense majority, which was not expected. Greeley would have been satisfied with a majority of 5,000 but the returns indicate that it will amount to not less than 50,000.

The Port Dover and Stratford Railway project has had new life infused into it lately. The Stratford Beacon says that \$15,000 of stock has been taken up in that town, and believes that within thirty days the whole \$100,000 required would be available, the charter go into operation, and the road be virtually a fact accomplished.

Notes on the Guelph Central Exhibition.

Amongst the many advantages resulting from the establishment of such an Exhibition as has just been held, not the least prominent to farmers and others is the great facilities it affords for the purchase and disposal of stock. An immense business was done in this respect during last week. Purchasers were present from nearly all portions of the Dominion, and in considerable numbers from the States. Indeed, we heard it asserted that the transactions were much more numerous at the Guelph Central than at the Provincial at Hamilton. Many of our noted sheep-breeders were cleaned out of everything disposable in that class of stock, and breeders of stock from a distance did not hesitate to say that their trip to Guelph had been, in a pecuniary sense, most profitable. We were only able to gather but a comparatively small list of the sales made, which we subjoin:

Mr. John Miller, Pickering, sold one imported shearing ram, to Messrs. Heil & Clarke, Ohio, a shearing ram to Mr. Thos. McCrae, and one do, to Mr. Daniel McAllister. Mr. Jas. Cowan, Guelph, sold a Durham bull calf to M. Perdue, Chingacousy. Mr. Geo. Hood sold his famous Hereford fat steer to Satchell Brook, Ottawa, for delivery at Christmas. Mr. W. Whitelaw, Guelph, sold one aged imported Leicester ram, ten ram lambs, several ewe lambs, also a Durham two year old heifer to go to the County of Bruce, a Durham cow to Mr. Thos. Henderson, Guelph, and two bull calves, Mr. Whitelaw's sales this fall already amount up to about \$1,000. Mr. James Anderson sold 4 shearing Southdown ewes to Mr. Rivers, of Riverston, and has been offered \$150 for the Durham bull, "Darling Duke," which has been refused. Mr. Evan McDonald, Guelph, sold 2 Cotswold ewe lambs for \$47 the pair, and a Cotswold ram lamb for \$45 to Mr. James Wright. Mr. John Thomson, Brook Road, sold 9 shearing Cotswold ewes to Mr. James Wright, at \$11 per head. Messrs. J. & R. McQueen, Pilkington, sold their 2nd prize Durham bull calf for \$250. James Main, Trafalgar, the extensive pig breeder, sold a large number of his exhibited animals. Mr. Jos. Parkinson, Eramosa sold a Leicester ram lamb for \$40, 1 do \$30 one do, \$20, 1 do, \$16, 1 do, \$14, and a shearing ram for \$20. Mr. Charles Symon, Acton, sold one Leicester ram to Mr. John Mason, Princeton, and one shearing do to Mr. John McMahon, Drayton. Mr. Thos. McCrae, Guelph, sold 2 Cotswold shearing ewes, two do, ewe lambs and two do, shearing ewes. Mr. A. Simpson sold a Berkshire boar and do, sow to Messrs. R. Watt & Sons, Palmerston. Robt. Ford, Limehouse, a Berkshire sow to Mr. Alex. Gov, Guelph. We also heard that Mr. J. Gerrie, sold a matched span of team horses for \$700 to a lumberer in the States, and that Mr. Hector McCaig, Beverley, has sold his team, 2nd prize agricultural class, to a lumberer in the Ottawa district for \$400.

As considerable curiosity has been evinced to learn the attendance at the past exhibition, would state that 22,107 tickets were taken at the gates; this, of course, includes members tickets, which will foot up somewhere in the vicinity of one thousand.

We have no doubt that the hostile procedure of the Grand Trunk Company acted injuriously on the attendance at the Exhibition, as in spite of the promises made by certain of its officials, and on the faith of which the Directors of the Exhibition made a public announcement that return tickets, at a single fair, would be available on the G. T. R. as far east as Kingston, at least for exhibitors, and westward from Toronto for both visitors and exhibitors, full fare was charged at many of its stations. Such facilities conduct cannot be too widely disseminated, or too vigorously commended, and reflects the utmost disgrace on the management of a line, towards the construction and maintenance of which Canadians have been required to sacrifice so much.
