

REFORM DEMONSTRATION.—On Monday afternoon a grand political demonstration of the Liberals of Eastern Ontario was held in Prescott. Upwards of two thousand people were present, among them the leading men of the district. The proceedings were most enthusiastic. Hon Messrs. Mackenzie and McKellar delivered excellent and stirring speeches.

EAST TORONTO ELECTION TRIAL.—The Controverted Election Court, to try the East Toronto case, opened on Tuesday, before Chief Justice Richards, Rusk Harris acting as Registrar, James Beatty, Q.C., and Mr. Tilt for petitioner, and Mr. Bethune for respondent, John O'Donohue. On application of petitioner's counsel, the trial was adjourned till the 26th of November, in order that J. J. Vance, Assistant Clerk of the Ontario Legislature, and Clerk of the Private Bills Committee, alleged to be a material witness now absent in Europe, might be present to testify.

SOUTH REFORM CONVENTION.—The Reform Convention of the South Riding of Perth met at St. Mary's on Monday to nominate a candidate for the Local Legislature. Every municipality in the riding, with one exception, was represented. Several names were voted upon, but the choice fell upon Mr. Thomas Matheson, Mayor of Mitchell, who is a worthy gentleman and very popular, especially in the northern part of the riding. Mr. Jacob Brunner, Reeve of Downie, and a German by birth, is spoken of as his opponent.

Principles, Perhaps.

(From the Brockville Recorder.)
The Editor of the Guelph Herald has been airing his eloquence at the Conservative Convention at Toronto and giving his views upon the political situation. His remarks in reference to the Hon. C. F. Fraser cannot be considered complimentary. We trust the Hon. member for South Grenville will not resign his position in the Cabinet in consequence of the strictures that have been flung at the young orator from Guelph. He must talk; it is chronic or constitutional, we are at a loss to decide which. He varies his views to suit the company in which he may be found. At one time a rampant Grit—the next month a duplex Tory of the first magnitude. At the Auster picnic, at which Mr. Somerville was presented with a valuable testimonial for his services to the Reform party, ye editor of the Herald was present, and in the course of his remarks declared that he would suffer the loss of his right arm before he would prove untrue to the cause. We beg to enquire, mildly, very mildly, *Where have you buried that arm?* We would not for a moment mention the word "renegade" in connection with this subject, and we spare the Guelph Herald the trouble of convincing us that the change has been superinduced by broader views and better lights, shed by increased age, upon the political questions of the day. We are willing to acknowledge all this and even more, and we would scorn to entertain for a moment the idea that a nomination for the Local would for a moment influence in the slightest degree, or disturb the firm foundations upon which the political principles of the editor of the Herald are based.

THE WESTERN FAIR.

The London Western Fair opened on Tuesday under very favourable auspices. The grounds are in excellent order, the buildings are in good trim, and everything is favorable for a large and successful Exhibition. The statements about the entries are somewhat contradictory. The Globe's correspondent says they are considerably less than last year. The Advertiser again makes them more—7000 in all on Monday—and on Tuesday evening states that 2000 more had come in. The Free Press gives them in detail on Monday, and makes the total 6185. To these must be added those made since Monday morning. The attendance on Tuesday was very small, though the weather was highly favorable. A large portion of the articles exhibited were shown in the late Provincial and Central Fairs.

NEW CHURCH AT PORT ELGIN.—The new brick Presbyterian Church in Port Elgin was opened for Divine service on Sabbath last. The services were conducted in the morning and evening by the Rev. Dr. Topp, of Toronto, and in the afternoon by the Rev. J. Martin, of Fergus. On Monday evening following a social was held in the same church when addresses were delivered by Rev. Dr. Topp and other clergymen present. The collection on Sabbath amounted to \$360, and the proceeds of the social, together with private subscriptions, to \$560. The edifice is a fine structure, costing nearly \$5,000, on which there is now only \$800 of debt.

On the same evening a fire broke out in the village of Newboro, and before its ravages could be checked, twelve or fifteen buildings were destroyed.
