

HE WINKED THE OTHER EYE.

MAYOR FLEMING AND HIS JOKE RESPECTING HIS SALARY.

His Worship Makes an Explanation to the Council Why He Said What Was Not Correct—A Proposal to Saddle the Extravagance of the Incoming Administration on Future Councils.

Proceedings were opened yesterday afternoon at the special meeting of the City Council by Ald. Orr, chairman of the Parks and Gardens Committee, raising a question of privilege.

He declined to refute the statements made by the Chairman of the Executive Committee to the effect that the chairman of the other committees were responsible for the high rate of taxation, and that there was a combination in the council to discredit the Mayor by keeping up the rate.

So far as he was concerned the statement of Ald. Saunders was utterly false. He defied the latter to point out one single item in the Parks and Gardens estimate which had been increased for the purpose of "keeping up the taxation to the discredit of the Mayor."

The Mayor's Campaign Speeches. Ald. Shaw asked His Worship if he didn't remember saying in his campaign speeches that if he was elected Mayor he would be a triumph for those residents who wanted to see extravagance checked, salaries cut down and taxation reduced.

No doubt His Worship's "dusky complexion" had been a great trouble to formulate these speeches and what had been the result? Taxation had not been reduced, but on the contrary had been greatly increased. Extravagance had not been checked, salaries had not been lowered. The chief adviser of the administration (Ald. Saunders), feeling that he was somewhat responsible for the increase, likely every other week man, tries to shift the burden on the shoulders of others.

It would have been far more manly if Ald. Saunders told the public that the high rate of taxation was the result of a certain policy formulated by His Worship last year which had occasioned the creation of a deficit of \$107,000 which had to be met by this year's taxes.

The Chairman on their Defense. Ald. Crawford, chairman of the Property Committee, said that if his estimates were reduced \$4000 the Property Committee could do no more work this year and, in fact, it might as well disband.

If Ald. Saunders was an economist why did he champion the increase in salary of the City Hall officials so strongly last month?

Ald. Bell, chairman of the Fire and Light Committee, argued along the same line. Ald. Bell also gave a general denial to the imputation.

Ald. Saunders upheld his action in voting for advancing the salaries by stating that the officials could not be replaced with efficiency at the same figures.

The Engineer was asking that a supplementary water main from Simcoe to Sherbourne-street, along Front-street, costing about \$40,000, would be needed and asking that this amount be placed in the estimate.

On the invitation of the Mayor, the council then repaired to Webb's Restaurant for dinner. The host took occasion to again remark, during a brief address, that this was his last year "as an alderman" in the council.

The Mayor Makes an Explanation. When council again reassembled the Mayor took occasion to explain that when he made the statement that he had drawn his salary up to the first of June, it was not the fact that he had at the same time winked at Ald. Jolliffe, who had winked at the Mayor for the benefit of his remark. Ald. Shaw's aside to the effect that the Mayor had better resign the salary to him in order to secure it caused a good deal of laughter.

Secretary Hospitals to Receive Grants. Ald. Lynd moved that the hospitals be once more placed on the same footing regarding the payment of fees for indigent patients by the city.

On motion of Ald. Maloney \$700 was struck off the Board of Works estimate for macadam roadways.

Ald. Hill was successful in having \$5000 for the West End stable block removed and also in having the estimate of \$50,000 for sewers reduced to \$25,000. The Arthur-street bridge from \$25,000 to \$15,000 and it was decided that the Engineer would have to reduce his staff on an extent which would save \$110.

The Mayor proposed to pay \$15,000 off the Parks and Gardens Committee's estimates in a lump sum, although Ald. Orr, the chairman, pleaded that in this case the parks would have to remain unknown and uncares for as the caretaker would have to be dismissed.

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Ald. Lamb was finally persuaded to take his seat again when the estimates were passed without further reduction.

Ald. Carlin moved that the amount which raised the rate above 15 mills be embodied in a debenture in order to relieve the ratepayers this year. The resolution was referred to the Executive Committee and the council adjourned, having looked \$63,840 off the estimates, reducing the rate to about 17 1/2 mills on the dollar.

CALAMITOUS RUNAWAY. Horse Takes Flight—Buggy Smashed—Men Injured—The Animal Shot.

Last evening a horse belonging to Messrs. McIntosh & Sons and driven by City Traveler George D. Waddell was standing in front of 590 Queen-street west, when it took flight and ran away.

The horse tore down Queen-street to Yonge, and turning south ran to Adelaide, where it collided with a horse and buggy driven by Mr. J. A. Davidson of Dufferin-street. Mr. Davidson was thrown out and his buggy badly smashed, but neither he nor his horse was injured.

The runaway animal, however, had its front leg broken and its forehead smashed in and was mercifully despatched with a bullet by F. C. Bell.

Y.M.C.A. Board Meeting. The monthly meeting of the Board of Directors was held yesterday afternoon, Dr. Maclean presiding. Short addresses were delivered: Rev. S. B. Blain of Don-street Congregational Church spoke earnestly and profitably to the assembled workers.

The United Workmen. The Supreme Lodge, A.O.U.W., yesterday accepted the committee's report on the application of retail liquor men from the order. It was left optional with grant lodges to admit wholesale liquor men.

Called to Toronto. Rev. Henry W. Wende of Newburgh, N.Y., has accepted the call to the pastorate of the Unitarian Church of this city and will enter upon his duties July 1.
