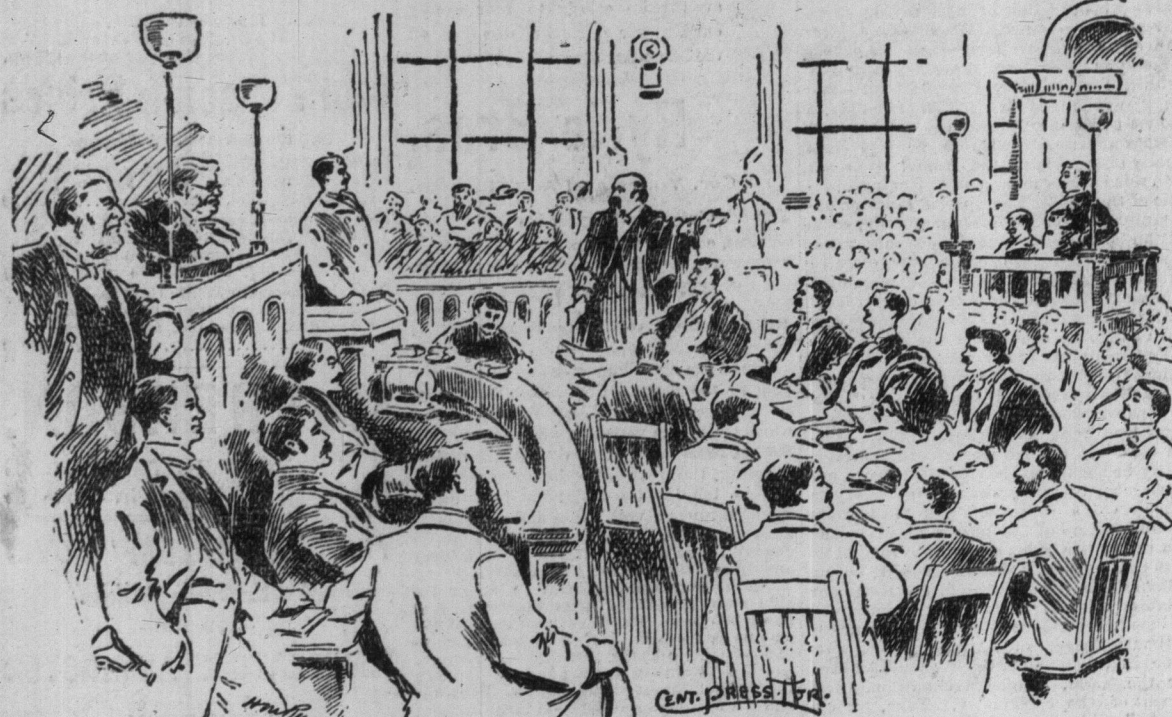


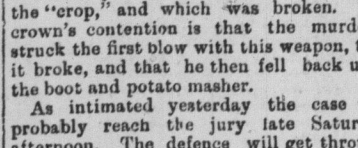

DOWN TO BUSINESS AT OTTAWA

OTTAWA, March 15.—Never before, with the single exception of the session of 1879, when Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise was present, has Ottawa witnessed so brilliant an opening of Parliament as the weather was unpropitious, the sky overcast and threatening rain and the wind keen and chilly, Parliament Hill was almost entirely covered with the vast crowd which thronged to the show and pressed in so much on the guard of honor from the Governor-General's Force-Grande that it was almost hidden from view.

ARR STILL AFTER BLOCK "C" A WOMAN'S BURDEN. The Cobban Company MAKE ANOTHER OFFER FOR THIS SIZE. Inspector Aude is considered the Right Man in the Right Place, and Caretaker Elliott's Head is Safe—The Lease of a Portion of Hamilton's Island to the New Ferry Company.

At the meeting of the Property Committee yesterday afternoon, a communication was read from the Cobban Manufacturing Company asking the committee to consider their application for the lease of block C in the Esplanade, comprising two acres of ground on the water front between Bay and York-streets, which they wish to rent for a nominal sum for the purpose of erecting a factory there.

Ald. J. E. Thompson supported the application very strongly, pointing out that the city is in a position to lease the land to the company which would probably lease Toronto and locate their factory elsewhere. He said that the city had also lost the chance of getting several large factories here by their short-sightedness in this way, and if they lose the Cobban Company it will throw 200 men out of employment.

Chiefman Crawford pointed out that the property is not in the possession of the city, as there is at present a lawsuit going on over it, and that furthermore the subject is before the Board of Works. No action was taken. The question of leasing the water-covered land, the rear of the hotel at Hamilton's Point to the Toronto Ferry Company, for the purpose of extending their capacity for amusement, was taken up. The form of the lease drawn up leaves the property, which consists of 65 acres of land, mostly under water, to the company for \$500 per year, the city to retain the right to tunnel through it at any time without compensation. The company agreed to build, however, any buildings put up by the company are damaged the city will either compensate the company or have the buildings destroyed.

The report of Ald. Sheppard's sub-committee, consisting of himself and Ald. Hewitt and Frank Taylor, on the subject of investigating the charges made against Carleton Place, the Police Court, the County of York, was received, and was considered to be efficient and economical.
