Eggs Kept in Water Glass.

Many Canadian farmers' wives have been adopting of recent years the water-glass method of preserving their eggs. And it has proved a very satisfactory and cheap method. Eggs in this solution will keep well for short periods. It has been demonstrated that longer periods make little difference to the quantities of the eggs.

Professor James Hendrick, B. Sc. of Aberdeen University, has been carrying out investigations as to the preservation of eggs by waterglass, and the composition of the preserved eggs, says The Ayrshire Post. He gives the result of his labors in an article in The Journal of Agricultural Science." In ordinary practice it is only necessary to preserve eggs for short periods, but Mr. Hendrick has proved that they can be preserved for two, three or four years, with very little change in their consumption. Eggs preserved in waterglass have a nice appearance as the shells are very clean and fresh looking after the waterglass is wiped off. Even those which had been several years in the fluid had a fine fresh appearance. The contents of the eggs do not shrink owing to evaporation. Eggs kept in the waterglass for a few months could hardly be distinguished in appearance, flavor, and smell either raw or cooked, from eggs three or four days old. Of course, as the eggs got older a distinct change was found, but it took place very gradually and at one year cld was scarely noticeable Eggs

years old, they have no unpleasant taste or smell, and the white coagulates in the usual manner in cooking. Though there was a slight characteristic odor when the eggs were cooked, it was not a stale or bad odor, and did not suggest sulphuretted hydrogen.

#### Falmon Fed to Dogs.

When I was in Alaska, says a writer in The Travel Magazine, salmon were just beginning to run, and at Bliff the first drying establishment was seen. Nets are used and are placed in the eddies of the stream and the curing is done in rude shacks in which a slow fire called "smudge" is burning. The smoke greatly assists in the process.

It was a matter for surprise to me that a fish so highly prized for food should be put to so common a use as feeding dogs. There is not a cannery on the Yukon, the entire catch being prepared by drying for the above purpose. But when it is remembered that dog-teams are to be fed during the long, weary months of winter, the value of salmon may in no wise be lessened, but the respect one may have for the dog generally increased. #### End or Mend.

The approaching session of the Imperial Parliament is likely to be one of the most important ever held by that august body, it is stated that the government has prepared a program that will bring the question of supremacy between the House of Lords and the Commons to a direct issue. Should the Lords persist in defating or emasculating measures passed by large majorities in the Com-mons there will be a dissolution The government will go to the country with an appeal for the supremacy of the people in all matters of legis-Whether it will include the entire abolition of the House of Lords in its policy, or the restriction of its powers that will make it a mere registering body for the will of the Com mons, remains to be seen. It would be a good thing for the cause of representative government through-out the world if the government adopted the former policy. Outside of Great Britain, especially in the British colonies and the United States, the example of the mother country has been slavishly followed in the organization of their legislative bodies. The province of Ontario was the first, or among the first, to break away from the old dual chamber plan. The single chamber form was so successful that it has been extensively copied by other provinces, and it is now doubtful whether the dual system would be adopted by any of the territories on entering upon the sisterhood of self governing colonies. There is no logical reason that can be advanced for creating two sets of legislators to represent and carry out the will and wishes of one set of constituents in countries where the people rule through an elective parliament.

Mr. Johnston was born at Skipness Argylshire, Scotland, Nov. 26th 1829, and while yet a lad came to Bosanquet with his father's family. A few years later he went to Indiana, where he worked four years for John McPherson, a former Bosanquet settler, who then owned the lake shore farm, only seven acres of which was John McPherson, a former Bosanquet settler, who then owned the lake shore farm, only seven acres of which was cleared. On his return to Bosanquet he purchased the place from Mr. McPherson, and has since resided there. Fifty years of patient toil, and intelligent methods have converted the bush farm into one of the finest homesteads in Lambton and where stood the forest there are now in full bearing hundreds of fruit trees, "Fair as a garden of the Lord," and forming probabbly the best orchard in Lambton, the products of which are marketed at home, in the North-west and in Great Britain. Besides the homestead of 100 acres Mr. Mr. Johnston has purchased at different times 300 acres in Bosanquet, 100 in Brooke and 100 in Sombra. Mr. Johnson served four years in the Bosanquet council and was for many years a Justice of the Peace but some time ago retired from these public offices, to give his whole time to personal affairs. On March, 1861, Mr. Johnston was married, in Warwick township, to Miss Jane Campbell, who was born in Scotland in March, 1827, daughter of the late John Campbell, of Warwick, and was a school teacher in her younger days. Mrs. Johnston son was trained to pioneer life, and has



Papyres.

The papyrus used by the ancient Egyptians was made from the stems of a peculiar water resol growing in all parts of Egypt. The outside layer of the plant was removed; and beneath this there were found a number of layers of a delicate, pithy membrane. These, being separated, were placed in layers. A second layer was laid at layers. A second layer was laid at right angles to and above the first and sometimes a third over the second. Heavy pressure was then applied, and the layers were firmly cemented into a fair article of paper. No gum other than what was contained in the plant itself was used in the process. The papyrus was very much stronger than the average paper made by the mod-ern machines. The sheets were commonly made from six to twelve inches

Two Monster Beetles.

The largest bug known to the old world entomologists is the gigantic Goliath beetle, which is found along the Kongo river in Africa. Goliath is upward of six inches in length from the tip of his nose to the nether end of his hard shelled body and has a pair of gauzy wings folded up under his arms, either of which is as large as a lady's face veil. But Goliath is a pygmy when compared with the ele-phant beetle of Venezuela, an entomological giant which weighs nearly a pound and which has a wing spread equal to that of a mallard duck. Both of these bugs are rare.
