double the size. It is estimated that an ordinary lady's thimble would hold 100,000 of these tiny little screws. About 1,000,000 of them are made a mouth, but no attempt is ever made to count them. It is determined by the number, 100 of them are placed on a very delicate balance, and the number of the whole amount is determined by the weight of these. All of the small parts for the watch are counted in this way, probably fifty out of the 120. After being cut, the screws are hardened and put in frames, about one hundred to the frame, heads up. This is done very rapidly, but entirely by sense of touch instead of sight, so that a blind man could do just as well as the owner of the sharpest eyes. The heads are then polished in an automatic machine, 10,000 at a time. The plate on which they are polished is covered with off and a grinding compound, and on this the machine moves them rapidly by reversion motion, until they are fully polished.—Analyst.
