C. who was a very familiar figure. Frank Hoyt Tupper who was an old school mate and David Hicks, who used to run the cooperage at my grandfather's mill.

I wish to express through your valuable paper my deepest sympathy with the relatives of the deceased.

My mother frequently sends me copies of the Monitor and through it I am able to keep in touch with the old home and save old memories from being relegated to the limbo of forgotten things.

I notice with considerable concern that the people of Canada are proposing to acquire in the near future a part of our birthright in granting concessions to supply pulpwood to American mills. Surely there is sufficient capital and enterprise in Canada to have erected these mills on Canadian soil. A Port Wade writer remarks that they are making money out of the Yanks but he must not fool himself for every dollar you make out of the Yanks in this manner they will make four out of you. 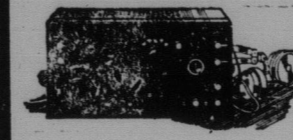

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DR. C. E. McLAUGHLIN APPOINTED CHIEF DENTAL OFFICER AT CAMP HILL HOSPITAL.

Dr. Charles E. McLaughlin, well-known Halifax dentist, has been appointed Chief Dental Officer at Camp Hill Hospital by the Department of Soldiers Civil Re-establishment. The appointment has just been made.

Dr. McLaughlin has had a distinguished dental career both in this City and overseas. He proceeded to the front shortly after the outbreak of war with the Canadian Field Artillery and at Ypres was rendered deaf in one ear by a German shell explosion. Subsequently to this experience he served with four different Field Ambulance Brigades before terminating his war engagement.

Later he took a course in Major Valhieser's famous Oral and Plastic Surgery of Face and Jaw at Paris and was made Chief Oral Surgeon Letre Port. As a mark of appreciation for his services he was made a Fellow of the Royal Society of Public Health, England.

Upon his return to Halifax he was made A. D. D. S. M. D. E. He had settled in his regular practice but a short time when the Military Dental Surgeons Association of the United States applied to Ottawa for a competent Oral Surgeon of war experience to demonstrate in the United States. Dr. McLaughlin was selected by the Director of Dental Service at Ottawa.—(Echo.)
