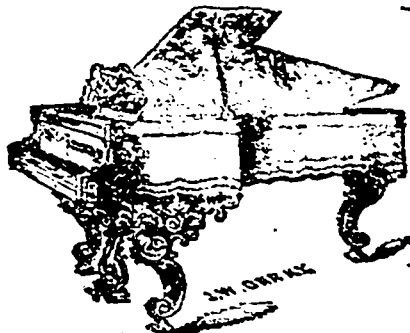

Both lapsed into silence after that.

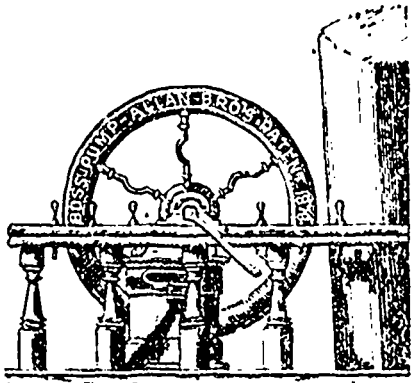
