- A hbhipuman electric light has been invented for the benefle of newspaper reporters. It is fastened to the end of a pencil so that the reporter may carry his own light with him, and be able to make his notes even in the darkness.
-Wirr the exception of some orders which have of late come in from South American markets, the Itavant cigar factories have very little to do. Orders from the United States are very scarce, and when they do come, they call for cheap cigars, and in small quantilies. Many factories are closed, and others will soon follow.
-A new form of the old map peddling swindle is boing worked throughont Ontario. When the person importmed does not subscribe promptly for the map, the cunvasser requests him to sign a certificato that the agent has visited his place, taken the statistics of the production, ote. This certificate turns out to be an order for the map att a price for in excess of the vilue.
-Goon pencil cedar is getting so searce that the great firm of Fiaber \& Co. have begun to cultivate forests of cedar in Germany. At Schloss Stein there is a cedar forest which covers thirteen acres, and the head of the firm has for many years maintained nurseries and platations of cedars on his land in Bavaria, grown from seed which he expotted from Florda.
-Ar the mecting of the Canada Land Co., in London, a dividend of 16 shillings per share for the half year was declared. The most noticeable fature of the report was the reference to the disposal of inferior lands in Eastern Ontario for dairying purposes.

-Thes warden or Woodstock gat reports that the cost of maintenanco of each prisoner for the month of June was $03 \%$ cents per dity. 'Mis is about one-thitd of the cost in this city.
-lue sonthem quail put out in Kont County, Ont., have prospered exceelingly and the conniy is now woll-stocked with this favorite game-bird.
-I'me Gall Coal Company have decided to reduce the retail price of their coal in Wimmipeg for the coming winter to the old digures of $\$ 7.50$ per ton.
-Soma weoks ago 30 per cent. premimu was offered and refused for insurauce on the missing ship "Laomene," from Calcutta to San Grancisco. This week sho duly arrived, after a voynge of six months dumation.
-l'us woul siles now in progress in London will cover 205,000 bales, distributed as follows:-Sydney, 00,000 ; Quecostand, 18,000 ; Port Phillip, 56,000; Adelade, 18,500; 'lismania, 0,500 ; Swan River, 6,500; Now Zeatam, 100,000; Cape, 23,500.
-Crob reports from all parts of Ontario are most encouraging, except in a fow low-lying latuds, where the rain did a good deal of damare last month. The fruit crop is also expected to above the average.
-Womd has been received at Selkirk of the loss of a ralt of 100,000 fect of logs on Lake Winnipeg. A strong north wind was blowing on the lake when the boom broke.
-On Friday last the freight rate on grain from Chicago to Kingston dropped to a point never before touched in the history of shipments from that port to Lake Ontario. The steamers "Monteagle" and " Hurlbut" were chartered for wheat at 21/4c.
-A Mrdonemonougir firm has contracted for the whole output of iron ofe in the islaud of Elba for three years. The price is believed to be equal to 8s. 6d. to 9s. per ton delivered at the shipping place; making it costly when it is put into furnace, even for such rich ore.
-L. A. C., Ludenbung, N.S.-So much the worse for the "theory taught down by the sea." The price of the Canadinn article is usually kept a little bolow that of the U.S. plus the duty and other cost of importation. We do not see how we can add to the answer alrea dy given.
-Thue government of Costa Rica has reduced the export duty on coffee to 4 shillings, for each 40 kilograms, When the coffeo is exported in its inner husk the duty will be reduced by making an allowance of 18 per cent. on the gross weight. This decree will be in force on and after Octover 15 th.

Imigration to the United States during the same period declined 43 per cent. Emigration to Carada for the past six months declined 62 per cent.
-The Caledouian Insurance Co., will pay the Niagara $\$ 40$, 000 spread over three years for the cancellation of the contract be tweon the two companies. The Caledonian will carry out to maturity the reinsurances of Niagara policies but, as before stated, takes back its own business reinsured in the Niagara, and reinsures the Southern business of the latter.
-C. Drzien, Three Rivers, Que, has been conducting a shoe business successfully for some years, but becoming involved with his son who failed in the jewelry business, his resources were crippled and he has had to assign.-Langlois \& Lalonde, plumbers, city, already referred to, have settled their debts by paying 15 cents on the dollar.
-Ameer a period of 12 years in business, D. A Macdonald \& Co., general dealers' Port Hawkesbury, N.S., find themselves embarrassed and are seeking a settlement at 25 cents in the dollar. It is said the firm's business methods have not been distinguished of late by the same shrowdness which seomed to characterize them heretofore.
-Tine reports on the crops from points on the Northerin Pacific are summarized as follows: General outlook very good. Wheat hending out but rather short in straw, and where there is a light soil somewhat thin. The latter is owing to drought in the early part of the summer. Plenty of rain has fallen all over the province within the past two weeks to satisfy all requirements.
-A woman post-office thief is a rarity in Canada and yet one has been discovered in the daughter of a Muskoka postmaster. 'Ihms wilhin ten years after their establishment, these foudx are furnishing means of decent existonce to over 500,000 persons- 1 per cent of the pophlation-when incupacitated from work eilher by injury or oll ige. Were these lunds not in existonce, "many of those enmmonated wond get support from the eommunal poor funds, but it would be griven as chatrity. The communes have sained by the new dispensation; the burden once borne by them being now borne by the manfacturers.

- A Burbabo exchange points out how fully every alert business man is aware of the interest his best customers take in the advertising columas ol a good tade patper. Ite knows that, beyoud unostion, there is no other udvertising agency so effective and so valuable in communicating with the wo rld of buyers and consumers. Llow best to atilize advertising spate in communionting with the public is a question the consideration of which hats made notewothy development of the art of advertising in recent years-in ary which will bo much further doveloped in the near fulure and will mote and more become an essential clement, in the life of trate and commeree.
- The Controller of Luband Revenue rejorts that the returns for the inspection of weights and moasures were $\$ 39,411$ ats agrihst $\$ 38,549$ collected during yeur ended 30 th i June, 1802 . The exprenditure was $\$ 71,760$, as against 570,002 during 1802. The total revenue collected for the inspection of gas and gas meters wats 813,200 , an increase of $\$ 1,512$ over previous yoar. The ex-

-One of the oficials in that well known fraternal order, the Royal Arcanum, makes the statement that it has suffered seriously so far this year from an apparent epidemic of suicides among the membership. The Royal Arcaumen has a following of about 150,000 , and the olficial alluded to says there lave been a sumfient number of suicides since last New Year day to require one fill assessment on the entire membership for the payment of these self-destroyers' losses to the bencitiaries of the same. Three suicide cases were covered in by the May assessment. The small policies carried by the fraternal system seem to act as no deterrent against self-destruction.
-As incandescent electric lamp is now on exhibition in Toronto, in which, by an ingenions system of regulating the current, tho light maty be turned full on or hatf on, or may be turned so low as to give only a constant dull glow, suitable for a night light. There are in the lamp two films, by which means it is chamed that a stronger light can be obtained from the same force of current than under the present system. By a turn of the knob one film is turned oftr, reclucing the light by half and the expenditure of force in proportion. On turaing the light still lower, both dims tako a solt, dull glow, which admimbly answers the purpose of a light for burning throughout the night.
-One encomerging foature in the commercial situation is the fact that, thecording to R. G. Dun \& Co., the number of failures in the United States and Canalda for the quarter ending June 30, 1894, has been only 2,731, with aggregate liabilities of $3712 \mathrm{mil}-$ lion collars. In the first quater of the year the number of disasters was 4,207 and the amount of the liabilities almost 04 million dollars. In the April to Jme quarter last year the limilures numbered 3,199 and the aggregate of liabilitics was $121 \% / 3$ million dollars. Considering how trying the conditions have been during recont months and how great the strain to which merchants and traders have as a consequence been subjected, the fact that comparatively so few concerns have succumbed is a very encouraging one.
-Raphiss have been received at Chicago from 3,580 trust Worthy grain dealers and milleis upon the subject of the crops. They eover almost every important wheat county in the six principal winter wheat states, which geaerally produce about twothirds of the winter wheat crop and nearly half of the total wheat crop of the United States. Of these reports 2,450 cover 272 of

Reports from Kamsas we irregular and the crop there will probably be below an average. One thousind four hundred and eighty-four farmers say thoy will sell freely, 400 say they are compelled to sell, 718 say that about half will sell, while 880 say that they will not sell at present prices.

-Tre will of the late Mr. Duncur McIntyre has been made public. It leaves his entire cortune, over two millions, to his widow for life. At her death it is to be divided among tho children in addition to the sum of $\$ 100,000$ given eath of the sons some time ago. .

## THE NRW LTFE COMPANY.

'The Canada Provident Association organi\%ed a little over a year ago, was unfortunate in the choice of a name. It appears that thirteon year's ago, a company of that name was chartered to do a life business. But this old "Canada lrovident" never organized under its charter, and its existence was entirely forgotten. In February last, however, the old association was revived, and appeared to be entitiled to the name. This however did not damp the ardor or defeat; the enterprise of the promoter, Mr. J. F. Mathieson. A new company was quickly formed, and a petition was sent to the Dominion Parliment (upon which were such names as Hon. T. G. Marchand, Fon. P. Garneau, Col. 'Iumbull, P. P. Buck. Esc., R. A. E. Greenshields Esq., Wm. Fruwoll, general managor of the Eastern 'lownships Bank, and others), to incorporate under the name of The Colonial Life Association. The Act has been passed, and they have now a vory viluable charter. The guaranteo enpital iuthorized is $\$ 100,000.00$. Mr. Math ieson, who is an experienced and energetic insurance man, becomes general manager, and Mr. Л. A. Baynes, secretary. Active steps are being taken to carry out the objects of the Association, for which we bespeak success. The new company takes oroi the old business.

Save up your old shoes now, says the Dry Goods: Bulletin for they are going to be used in the making of door and floon mats. A man has been experimenting with a process of re ducing waste lenther of all kinds to pulp, and has so far sue ceeded that a sample mat or two has been produced. Th process consists in dissolving old leathor of any kind, worn-ou shoos, scraps from shoe factories, ete., by means of chemicals Then the dissolved material is put into the tank of a machin which reduces thesame to a thread. As about ton per cent cow-hair has been putinto the pulp a fibre is procured fo holding the strand together, The strands of leathor yarn ar then woven on a common loom and fulled into the shape of mat. The fulling closes up the meshes and a smooth surfac is procured. Then the mat is pressed and upon the hard sur face a design is printed or painted. Then a fringe is pu around it and it is done.

The oxceeding cheapness of these mats is what will mako market for thiem: Old shoes and scrap leather are practicall of no value, while the spinning and finishing processes i making the mats are simple. 'lhe fringe around the mat about the only thing costly; but as this can be had for a fe cents, it follows that the ontire mat can bo laid boforo tl customer for a ridiculously small price. The sample ma shown looked well enough to be laid upon the floor of ar parlow The boatiful designs which can be painted in a traetive colors on the mats make thom acceptable.

## DOMINION NOIE TSSUES.

Ihe avowed intention of the Dominion Government to increase the limit of their note issue by twenty-five per cent, or from 20 millions to 25 millions, has naturally led to considerable comment by the baiks upon whose eirculation such an addition to the Government corrency cannot fail to have an untoward effect.

Under' the existing: laiw the Govenmènt issuès leğal tenders of two classes-the small notes; below the des nomination of five dollars; which the banks are for: bidden to issue, and notes of large denomination-intended to form part of their reserves and which circiilate but little among commercial inen. These notes are secured by a reserve of 15 per cent. in gold, of 10 per cent. in guaranteed sterling debentures, and of 75 per cent. in an unguaranteed Canadian securities. From this it can be seen that their position is tinquestionable. In fact on the first of June last there were only $\$ 19,510,197$ in government legal tenders in circulation, while to secure them the Treasury held $\$ 7,740,-$ 902 in gold, $\$ 1,946,500$ in sterling débentuies and $\$ 15,000,000$ in Canadian securities: The Gövernment held, in other words, securities to the extent of neeitly five millions more than the face value of the total issue, while the experience of bankers tells is that in case of any possible panic the specie reserve alone would be quite sufficient to keep their value at par. No loss of security then could possibly arise by an expansion in the government issue, even if it amounted to far more than the five millions asked for.

But there is another side to the question. The interests of the chartered banks; who are compelled by law to maintain 40 per cent. of their reserves in these very legal tenders, require to be considered. These banks in May carried $\$ 13 ; 982,924$ in Dominion notes (besides $\$ 7,539,763$ in specie) or more than two-thirds of the whole issue, and it must be remembered that these banks depend in-many instances veiy laigely upon the volume af their circulation for their profits. Is it fair, then, for the Govermment to enter the market against them? This is a question, it must be remembered, entirely outside of politics. It is simply a question of business. It is to the bauks that the Goverinment must look for the emission of its increased currency to tne public; for very few merchants draw their supplies direct from official sources. Is it fair, then, to ask these banks to substitute government currency for their own and thus cut down one of their onvers of profit?

It must be borne in mind that just now the earning porers of the banks are diminished to a considerable extent. The spirit of caution and economy which has curtailed the volume of trade within the most conservative limits lias naturally reacted: somewhat unfarorably upon them. The rates at which moniey is quioted in the great financial centres are abmormally low ; while the rate of interest allowed to Camadian'depositors remains at the same figures as in far more prosperois days. The dividend earning powers of the banks are taxed to the uttermost: Never were skill, business acumen, and tact more necessary to a baiker thani' they are to-day. It may therefore be questioned whether it is wise upon the part of the Governient to decrease their chaiices of profit earning by endeavoring to stibstitite legal tenders for even a portion of their circilation? Would it not be better to wait for more prosperous times before increasing the issue of legal tenders?

At the beginning of last montli the banks had in' ciiculation $\$ 28,467,718$ of their own notes. This was a smaller amount than had been out for wine years previously; and emphasized very distinctly the contraction in the volume of business. The issue of the

smaller Dominion notes reflected the same situation; for they liad declined to $\$ 6,201,000$, or a reduction of ovei a million from the figures of last October. But during that time the circulation of the banks had fallen nearly eight and half millions, showing that they felt the severity of the contraction fir more than the Governuient did. No doubt the Minister of Pinarice feels the need of resources. The stream of money into the Goveriment savings banks has been replaced by an' outflow that camot fail to increase if any depression in business, or lack of commercial confidence should continue. But should he replenish his exchequer at the expense of the banks? Could not other means be adopted; equally efficacious, that would not in any way interfere with their limited sources of profit?

## CODE OF CIVIL PROCEDURE RIVVISTON.

For some time past a commission composed of the Attorney General Hon. T. Chase-Casgrain and Judges Larue and Davidson, has been and is yet engaged in the revision and amendment of the Code of Civil Procedure. Their first report and a Bill founded thercon, was placed before the Legislature of Quebee at its last session. At the same time the Attorney General introduced. a Bill for the reorganization of the law courts of the province. Both Bills will probably come up for action at the next session of the Legislature.

Copies of these Bills and of the first report of this commission have reached us. We have not the time nor the space to enter: into a fall discussion of all the details of these mensures, but there are some points of import:ance to the commercial interests of the province and moreover to the merchants of Montreal, which call for attention.

In order to understand and appreciate the effects of the proposed changes respecting the reorganization of our courts, it is necessary very briefly to examine the system now in force. For judicial purposes the province is divided into 20 districts. In each of these courts of civil jurisdiction are held, viz.; the Circuit and Superior Courts. The province is again divided for purposes of appeal into the two divisions of Montreal and Quebec. 'The courts having appellate jurisdiction are the Court of Review (3 judges of the Superior Court), the Court of Appeals (Queen's Bench appeal side) both provincial Courts, the. Supreme Court at Ottawa and the Privy Council in England.

The Circuit Court sits at the "chicf licu" of each district and also at such other places as may be fixed by proclamation. This Court has exclusive jurisdiction in all matters where the amount in issue does not exceed $\$ 100$. There is an appeal from judgments in these
cases. With the exception of the court sitting at the chief lien of the district the Cirenit Court has also exclusive origimal juriscliction in all matters between $\$ 100$ and SOOO, but subject to appeal.
Whe Superior Court sits at the chiof lien of each district and it has exclusive origianal jurisdiction in all matters over so00. It has also jurisdiction exeept where jurishlistion is exclusively given to the Cireuit Conrt in matiters between $\$ 100$ and $\$ 200$. All final julgments of the Superior Court, are subject to appeal. Appeals from final judgments of the Superior Court or from the Circuit Court in cases over $\$ 100$ are taken to the Court of Review or to the Court of Appeals at the option of the appellants. In all cases where the amount at issue is between $\$ 100$ and $\$ 200$ only one appeal is allowed, and if the case is carried to review the judgment there is fimal. If the amount exceeds $\$ 200$ and the appeal is taken to the Court of Review and the first judrgment confirmed, the case eamot; go to Court of Appeals. Appeal may be taken to the Privy Council, Guglatid, when the amountiat issue exceeds $£ 500$ stg., or to the Supreme Court, Ottawa, if the amomet exceeds $\$ 2000$.

With the exception of the Cireuit Court at Montrent, the Circuit Courts of the province are held by the judges of the Superior Court. In Montreal there are two judges specially appointed for the Circuit"Court.

There are 30 judges ini the Superior Court. Wen are located at, Montreal, 4 at Quebee and the others in the different sections of the province. As will be seen these 30 juiges have the entire judicial work of the Superior and Circuit Conrt of the province, excepting the Circuit Cometh at Montreal, besides sitting in the Court of Review at Montrenl and Quebec.
As to the position at Montreal, we find that during the past, ten years 52,831 writs were issued in all the Superior Conrts of the Province of Quebee, of which 20,260 were issued in the Stuperior Court of Montreal alone. Juiggents in the Superior Courts in contested matbers totalled up to 10,220 during the same time; of which 7 , 708 were reulered in Montreal. It can readily be seen that the burden of the work of the Superior Court has been on the Montreal judges, and, as a fact, the julges here have been so overcrowled with work that they have been obliged to ask for assistance from the conntry judges. Even withrthis help the business of the district is liur behind, and monthes must pass before cases now ready for trial can be heard,

Will the proposed measme for the reorganization of our courts be ally improvement? By the proposed scheme the judicial districts will remain as they are. The Cireuit Court will be abolished and replaced by the District Court, having largely extended jurisdi ction and powers. The jurisdiction of the Superior Court will be greatly modilied ; the right of appeal will be very mueh entailed, and the composition of the judiciary materially altered and inereased.
'The sittings of the District and Superior Courts will. be held in the different distriets at such times as may. be fixed by proelamation and the cases for each district heard in the courts of the district as they are todily.

The Distriet Court will have an exclusive original jurisdiction in all matters not exceeding $\$ 100$, subject however to appeal in matiters between $\$ 100$ and $\$ 400$. Appaal cim be taken to the Court of Review only, and the decision there will be final.

The District Court however will have a limited jurisdiction in certain matters over $\$ 400$, and judgments in theséspecial cases' a re subject to appeal to the same extent as judgments of the Superior Court. For the District Court, 20 judges will be appointed; of which 7 will be located at Montreal and 3 at Quebec.
By the proposed Bill the jurisdiction of the Superior Court will be limited to matters exceeding $\$ 400$. In other respects the changes as to this Court, except as to the judges thereof, are not very material. Appenls from the judginents of this court remain practically unchanged.
The Superior Court will consist of 10 judges. Ten will be located at Montreal, 5 at Quebec and 1 at Sherbrooke. I'o the judges at Moutreal 9 judicial districts will be assigned; 10 districts will be assigned to the judges at Quebee, aud the judge at Sherbrooke will have charge of the district of St. Francis.
The sessions of the Superior Courts for the different districts will be presided over by judges from the cities of Montreal and Quebec, as the case may be, who will go out to preside therein.

It is estimated that only about one-fifth of the cases in our courts are for amounts over $\$ 400$, and that the greater proportion of such cases are from the district of Montreal. But few such cases comparatively speaking, arise in the different districts connected with the Montreal division of the Province, and for that reason the judges of the Superior Court in this city under the proposed scheme would be able to give the greater portion of their time to the business of this district. We would thus have in Montreal 7 judges confining themselves exclusively to cases under, and 19 judges devoting the greater part of their time to cases over $\$ 400$. It seems to us that, as a necessary consequence of these changes, the business of this district would be greatly facilitated, and that speedy trials and judgments would not only be possible but probable. We also believe that the changes limiting the power suitors $j$ pow have of carrying their cases trom court to court, until the costs of the numerous appeals ruin all parties concerned, would be verg beneficial.

In connection with the proposed reorganization of our courts we find the proposed revision of the Code of Civil Procedure is making material changes in the procedure of the courts which cannot fail to have a most beneficial influence on our judicial business.

We cannot in this article notice the improvements in procedure suggested; but they tend to shorten delays, simplify pleadings, remove purely technical objections, \&e, We may refer to these in a later article, but we believe the two mensures, if adopted, will prove of practical advantage to the merchants of not only Montreal but of the whole Province.

## ANOTHER BANK DEFAULITER.

Emile Castonguay, paying teller of the Notre Dame Street Branch of the Banque du Peuple, has disappeared, and $\$ 3,800$ of the bank's funds have disappeared with him. It. appears, that during the past month he has been engaged in rasing cherguos and falsifying his accounts until his peculations reached the figuros given. The bauk loses nothing, as Caitonguay's honesty was insured in the London Guarantoo \& Acciáciit Trisurance Co. for \$4,000. That comprayy is following out its proper policy by vigorous efforts to ascertain the irhereibonts of the defaulter; for the purposo of bringing him to justico; and tlieve is butititlo doubt that they will be successful:

## THR CHICAGO STRIKE.

There is no more striking feature about the grent railway strike which has practieally caused the cessation of freight traffic from Chiengo to the Pacific, aud also checked it enstward, than the evidence it affords of the spread of amarchical doctrines through the so-called laboring classes of the United States; for the source of manchism is hostility to every restriction upon the liberty of individuals to do just what suits their own ends without regard to the rights or feelings of others.
This spirit leads them to make savage attacks upon every agency seeking to protect the rights of the majority by force or punuishment. It was markedly present in the great coal strike, when the striking miuers, in order to assist themselves in carrying their point, murtered railway entployes, smashed machinery, blew up bridges, and destroyed other property. Carnot, a most exemplary man, was assassinated because such murderers as Vaillant, Ravachol and Henry suffered for their crimes while he was chief magistrate. It was prominent at Chicago, when the mob wantonly set fire to loaded cars, riilway structures and other property. Their object was misrule, ruin. They showed that the American bete liumaine is just as prompt to resort to crime and bloodsled if anything obstructs the accomplishment of his efforts to extract more money for his services thin they are worth as the most murderous adherents of the old Parisian commune. Of the 200,000 miners who recently remained idle for two months, more than one-half would have gladly returned to work, had they not been terrorized by the violent faction. Death, or frightful assaults, awaited those who ventured to oppose the wishes of the mob, both in the coal and railway strikes, and as, at first, the law seemed powerless to protect the peaceable hard-working man, is it any wonder that he submitted to the domination of his iflee but more ferocious brothers?
What was the origin of the strike? The Pullman Company called its employes together last fall and told then that, owing to continued steady losses, they must either submit to a reduction or the shops must close. It volunteered to allow the men to inspect its books if they so desired. The men sullenly submitted. A few weeks ago, thanks to the efforts of one Ragene Debs, a man with an insane craving for notoriety forced like scum to the top, the men demanded a return to the old rate of wages. " There was nothing to warrant it. The rush for Pallman curs to accommodate visitors to the World's Fair was over." There was no , probability of new demand forsome time. The competition of the Wagner Co., and the initiation of a new palace-car company under the name of the Williams had reduced prices below the profitable point. The Pullman Coo, was taking contracts at a- loss of from $\$ 90$ to $\$ 300$ per car in order to keep its works open. The railroads were increasing their own construction of sleepers, and buying fewer and fewer from the company. The men demanded practically an increase of wages. 'the company refused. They paid the men what they owed them and closed the shops until thie outlook should become more promising. But it aeted strictly within its business rights. The enployes de. manded that the shops should be reopened, and that they should pay such wages as a board of arbitration composed half of municipal poiticicins and half of their own body might fix. The company declined.

There was nothing to arbitrate. They simply could not go on. Then the employes resorted to the A.R.U. (American Railway Union), and organized a gigantic strike or boycott to prevent the mailroads from using Pullman cars under the penalty of having all their business stopped: The illegality of such a step is obvious. There is presumably no reason to resort to intimidation, foree and violence in a country possessing so excellent a code of laws as the Uuited States. If the strikers were acting within their rights they had the conrts to appeal to. The mere faet that they decined to take any legal measures, and resorted, or others for them, to intimidation and arson, proves that they felt their position was outside the law and hence could only be maintained by an appeal to violence.
That the laviess spirit was prevailing across the border may extend into Cauada is fortunately improbable. There would be no ground for any such extension. Both the G.IT.R.and C.P.R. companies construct their own sleeping cars. These cars cost from $\$ 22,500$ for an ordinary sleeper up to $\$ \$ 5,000$ for such a luxurious palace as the one exhibited by the G.I.R. in Chicago. It is simply a guestion of the cost of the material used. When it is considered that an ordinary day conch costs from $\$ 5,000$ to $\$ 6,000$, the superiority of the palace car can be easily recognized. It is made throughout for strength aud durability. Its framework is far stronger than that of any ordinary ear, and its fittings: down to the simplest screw are of the very best material. The men who make them are not ordinary carbuilders. They receive wages far above the ordinary worker. Such men in Canada are not likely to strike: They are too intelligent and farsighted. In the United States the body of trained intelligent workmen is swamped in the mass of crude illiterate laborers. These think they have but little to lose and everything to gain by a strike. Yet, it is on their votes that the power of such men as Delbs rests.
In order to estimate the value of the interests thus wantonly attacked in the name of the Pullman employes, and the amount of injary and inconvenience inflicted upou the imnocent public it is only necessary to refer to the statistics of rail way travel furnished by the Inter-State Commerce Commisssion. Whese show that, in the year 1803, the aggregate of property classified as railway copital was $\$ 10,506,235,4140$, or equal to $\$ 63,421$ per mile of line. Of this immense amount 61.24, per cent. paid no dividends whatsocver. Of the stock paying dividends 5.25 per cent. paid from 4 to 5 per cent., 11.62 per cent. paid from 5 to 6 per cent., 5.24 per cent. paid from 0 to 7 per cent., and 5.32 per cent. paid up to eight per cent. 'The amount of mortgage bonds paying' no interest was $\$ 452,275,999$, or 10.93 per cent. of the whole, and $\$ 204,804,200$, or 82.56 per cent. of the total of income bonds gave no return whatsoever to theirholders. Yet the labor agitators, who inaugurated the strike boldy assert thatemployes of the roads are being ground into the earth in order to pay the dividends to foreign capitalists!

As to the injury and inconvenience to the public at large it is only requisite to point out that during the year 1893 the railroads carried $393,500,012$ passengers and transported 745,119,482 tons of freight. This en-* ormous traftic went on over 230,237 miles of: track, employed 34,788 locomotives and $1,273,046$ cars, of which $31,38 \pm$ were passenger cars and $1,047,577$ carried freight. The remainder are represented by cabooses; wrecking
and construction cars; etc. At least hall of this traffic hits been congested by the strike, and, as a result, the loss to the general pablic by the obstruction of its ordinary daily business transactions mast mount into the millions, without taking into consideration the untold inconvemience and amoyance involved upon which no money estimate can be placed.
Are the employes of the railronds any better off for the strike? Of the total force of 873,602 men and women in the cmploy of the roats, only 397,815 are men engraged in the actual business of transportation. These men's wares have naturally suftered more or less curtailment. The 35,38t assigned to administration, the
 175, 414 engaged in the mantenance of equipment have, of course, suffered less, but still all will be more or less injured by the strike-more especially if its result be, as is inticipated, a general elfort on the part of the ronds to bring wages down to a more egual ratio with the roturns from bransportation. Tnterests so greatias these cannot be permitted to remain at the mercy of anarchists.

That Mr. Cleveland will do his daty there can be no doubt. He is a min of the resolnte chamater necessary to cope with such an emergeney and it is largely dne to this estimate of his chameter that the strike has had so littie effect upon the stock market.

The position of American securities in the open market is a peculiar one. The ascendancy of the populist olementi in Congress, no loss than the lawless demonstrations of labor in the west, have resulted in a steady liquilation by botla domestic and foreign holders of all securities except those absolutely above suspicion. Prices are relatively low, and the amome carried apon margia probably never smaller than to day. Any existing speculative movement, is confined practically to bets that the common sense of: the people of the United States mast eventmally trimmph over the mouthings of the labor agitators. Otherwise the market is at a standstill. Heryone is awaiting developments. Bueryone knows what the result must be; but basiness will make little movementi until order has again been restored and organized labor has receded from its present attitude of delituce.

Sinee the above was written, the situation in Chicago has become much more hopeful, at thongh the danger of new complications is not altogether past.

## 'IHE FOOL, AND HIS MONEY.

The "crooks" following Cook and Whilby's cirens through Ontario have ahready lleeced firmers at Barrie, Collingwood, Brampion, and Berlin ont of nearly $\$ 2,000$. The often' oxposed "shell" gane was the medinu used. The farmers: were asked to guess under which sholl the pen was, "just for fun," and when "just for fim" were always correct. Tlien. the slarper would toll the imocent that if he guessed correctly again he would pay him $\$ 1$ for every dollar ho had on hisp person. ITho guossur, oxcited and oncouraged by his for:mer luek, wagered in many cases all his pocket, contanied, and of consse lost. So ercited over the prospoct of making a large stake were some citizons of Brampton that thoy weint to the bank to draw out their money, but were porsuinded by tho managor not to do so. It is ostimated that more thatii. $\$ \$ 5,000$ was taken out of that town by this pea trick alone.

THHEAT PREIGHT RATISS.
The amouncement of Sir John Thompson that ain investigation will shortly be made into the question of freight rates on wheat, under the auspices of the Department of Railways and Canals, will give satisfaction not only to the farmers of the North-West, but to the officials of the Canadian Pacific who, hitherto, have been unable to lay their side of the gnestion before the public through the intermediary of an impartial public tribunal.

No doubt there is much to be said on both sides. The question of rail freights is one of vital importance to the Cunadian farmer and grain buyer compelled to market his wheat in competition with that grown in' Europe in comparative proximity to the consuming centres. To him a cent on the bushel may mean the difference between profit and loss; and as the one great rond controls practically the route fiom the NorthWest Ilerritories to the terminus of water transportation, there is always the suspicion that it may take advantage of its opportunities to maintain rates at a higher figure than would be the case were it compelled to encounter the opposition of energetic rivals. But on the other hand the railway is able to make a very fair statement of its side of the case. It asserts that the rates charged by it upon grain seeking the eastern market are lower than those charged for similar traffic anywhere else in the world, and that, considering the cost of fuel, and the fact that four-fifths of the cars have to be hauled back empty, it is doubtful whether the rates complained of really cover the actunl cost of transportation, The rates from the principal intermediate pöints to Fort William certainly do not look excessive. They are as follows:-

The rate from Fleming, the nearest point, is thits only 126 6-10 cents per bushel, or $50-100$ ths por ton per mile, and that from Jdmonton, the most distant; is $1.98-10$ tis cents per bushel, or $45-100$ ths of a cent per ton per mile. These rates certainlỳ camot be regarded as morè than barely remunerative under the circumstances.

Tort William is the hend of lake navigntion; and consequently no grain is moved from that point eastward by rail; save in the wiñter montlis when natigation is closed. Consequently what giain travels easturaid by rail does so in the winter monthis, when the lake routes are closed and when transport is most expensive. Not only has the railroad all the drawbacks of winter traffic to contend with, bat, so small a proportiou of the cars can be loaded back at that season, that the averiage rate of about half a cent per ton per mile from Fort Wil-" liam to Montreal can hardly be called remunerative. The amount of whent thius liatuled; too, is very small in̈ comparisoi witl that seeking the lake route. It consists usually only of shipmerits to fill special orders for eastern mills, or for export, and, hence; in colsidering
the guestion of rail fretight ratest; onliy those' fromi in=

As we have shown these certainily conipare favorably' with those charged by other railwiỳ companies operiating under similar climatic and commercial conditions. The distance by the Canadian Pacific from Wiunipeg to Fort William is 420 miles. For this distance 17 cents per 100 lbs . is charged: For a similar distance the Great Northern cliarges 22 cents; and the Northern Pacific, 23 cents. In the case of Edmontoni- $-\mathfrak{a}$ distance of 1,458 miles-the Canadian rate 'is. 33 cerits' 'while for the same' distance the American roads clinge 50 ' cenits': It is the sanie with the other interimediate points. Iin every instance the Canadian rate is lowere thian that charged by American roads for a similar haul, and the Canadian farmer is consequently beiefitted to that extent.
Under these circumstances the principal advantage' to be derived from an investigation by the Governmenit into the wheat freight rates charged in Canaddr will be the establishment of the fact thiat the Cainidian' färiijer pays considerably lower prices for transpoit thär lifs competitor across the line. But this advantagee is a great one; for the authoritative asserition of this fact will not only allay any feeling of discontent that may exist, but will prove a powerful factor in inducing emigration to the North-West. It has been the fashion of politicians and others seeking popular support to denounce rail freights as excessive without troubling: themselves in any way to find out whether such was the' case or not. To such irresponsible speakers the publication, under government authority, of the true state of the case will prove a timely rebuke. Thie truth is that freight rates in Clanada are à cleani, if not cheaper, than those paid in any other countrỳ in the world where similar conditions exist, and the sooner this fact is thoroughly understood and the sooner our great North-Wंest will resound to the music of the harvester. It is not the fault of the railroad that the distance fromi the producer to the consumer is so great. The most they can do is to bridge it as cheaply and as swififtly as possible:

In country stores where alinost every known commodity is kept for salc, the sliowcase is found at its best. Scarcely a customer enters but goes over and has a look at its contents while waiting to bè seived or have a parcel tied up or a bill mado outt, and the muiltitude of articlos it contains would serve a pack peddler' for almost an entire season. Cintlery of all shinipes and sizes, fromin the carving and butcher knife to the six-bladed poeket, anid tiny wateli-guaidd knife an inch in length; brushies, from thè lateast dosign in horso-brushes to the 25 cent brush for the teetti ; all kinds of chewing-gum ; seissors, from the snäpping spiring sleep shears to the tiny pair which accompanies the seiving basket ; ali kinds of toilet soap ; lead and slate pencils ; pens, razors, ribbonis, olastie, buttons, hookis aña eyes, fishing tackle, prayer-books, marbles; in slipyt anīthing and everything smaller and easier handled than a? vacaint lot or an ox-yole.
Añid juist so long as the show-case serves so faithfully and well the wholesale traveller, the retail merchant and the waiting customer, will it bo looked up to and into by eaçi succeeding generation.

His sudden death; from an appare. ently tirivial acecident; has citused deep and sincere regret. among hite bousiness associates, and much sympathy is ex: pressedd for his berëaved family:

A company which has passed its 01 st year, which has a paip-up capital of $\$ 1,500,000$, and reserves of over five millions of dollars, can have little causo for sorrow on ascertaining that its reserves lave been lessened during the past year to the extont of $\$: 14,500$, a sum that appears to be a mere drop in the bucket of its gigantic accumulations. It will be seen from the Chairman's speech, reproduced in the report elsowhere, there are sanguino expectations entertained, that the mimportunt losses of the last few years may soon be repared. The propnsed alteration in the hoard is said to be due to a desire for small economios, but it is doubtful whether the value of the mangement or direction will suffer because of Whis rednction. It wonld be difficult, perhaps, to draw the line at the exilet point whore the number of directors ceases twe ?ave any valualle influence upon any Board. It is commonly the caso that two or three directors voice the opinions of thoir condjutors and practieally direct its operations. The constant arrival tund doparture of strange Chinese and the fact thati Sang Kece's Chinese boarding houso was always crowded to the ronf, lell to suspicion. This became certainty when it was leamed thati it was there that the sclools of instruction for the ovasion of the Goary law were hold ; for nowadays, if a Chinamen is going to Now York, he is tanght a fow words of Buglish, shown pichures of tho post oflice, eity hall, Brooklyn bribge, the elevatod railway and the Grand Central dopot, told what is across the street from his pretended place of lousinoss, what sort of a store is next to him, the namo of the next sireel to whore he is supposed to be in business, whether or not horso-cars pass the door ; shown some Americin money so he can idontify it if any is shown him by the customs ollicers, and told where tho Joss house is in Motit stroet. If bound to Boston or Philadolphia he is equally woll posted on the special points of those cities before he is allowed to stautcover to the United States. All this went on right under dhe yoses of the U.S. special treasury agents, who were too buisilif ongagod in watehing our leading tailors and furriors, to keep an eye on tho astute Mongolian, and who, in :consoquoneo, now fool very uncomfortable.

## A FATHURE AND A MORAT.

The sago of litichfiold in demolishing Boswell's axiom, "Who rules o'or freemen should himself be free," by the absurd parallol "Who drives fationon should himsolf bo fat," gave no opportumity for a rojuinder or he might have boen told by his dressy interlocutor that the man "who drosses ollhers sliould dress woll himsolf." Moses Greenberg, a loingtime clothior of this city, formerly reputed well-to-do; has
of late years fallen into habits of misdirected coonomy-or it may be negligence-which seem to have more or less affected his business. He should have moved about and taken a lesson from some of our careful city tailors, or even from the argents of large subiurban real estate tracts, who tell us in plain terms, "Do as we do," instead of from the proverbial shoomaker's wifo. Now were Mr. Greenberg's customers to do as he does, their purchases in the way of clothing would be few and far between. It is balieved also that he lost something in outside ventures, in which he had plenty of oxamples during the last twelve months. At a meeting of his creditors held on the 96 inst., an offer of 50 cents in the dollar was submitted. The liabilities are aloout $\$ 12,000$, twcthirds of which aro secured to a leading city firm; the assets are nominally about $\$ 10,000$. The offer is not likely to be accepted, and the business will probably bo wound up.

## 'THE DOMLNION'S PINANCES.

The statemont of the revenue and expenditure of the Dominion for the past month, and the fiscal year of 1893-4, shows that for June the revenue was $82,471,385$, and the exponditure $\$ 1,915,112$, a decreaso of $\$ 479,093$ in the former and of $\$ 48,025$ in the latter. For the twelve months the reveune has been $\$ 35,382$, s10 and tho expenditure $\$ 30,755,-$ 359, showing a decrease as compared with same period last year of $\$ 2,800,446$ in revenue and an increase of $\$ 102,697$ in expenditure. Tho apparent surplus on account of consolidated fund for the twelve monthis was $\$ 4,667,469$, but this will probably be wiped out by the interest on savings banks accounts and other expenditures to be charged to the last fiscal year. The net public deht on 30 th June was $\$ 240,528$,005, crease of $\$ 315,691$ during the month.

## THE CANADA ACCIDENT TICKEIL.

The delay and inconvenionce attached to the issuing of accident tickets, especially at railway stations where everyone is always in a hurry, have for years exercised the ingenuity of managers and agents. Just the thing needed has at length been devised by Mr. I. T. Leet, manging-secretary of the Canada Accident Assurance Co. The writing on this ticket, besides the namo and residence of the purchaser, is limited to two numbers only. The first figure denotes the year, the month and the day; the second indicates the sum insured for, the weekly indemnity, the premium, the hour of issue, forenoon or afternoon, and the number of days (the time) for which the policy is written. As the tickets are printed on loaflets, ranged. between carbonized paper, the name and figures become wholly ineruseable. The new ticket is, in its way, as comprohensive as the pocket-knives made for show in Sheflield, in which a complete set of tools is combined in one, except that the ticket is far more practicable and immeasurably less cumbersome. Thet us hope that Mr. Teet and his company may find this novelty ticket anspicious of a new era in accident insurance.

## MONDAYS ERUTI SALE.

The anction sale of California fruiti in this city last Monday was conducted by Thos. J. Potter for the Montreal Fruit Exchange. As the strike in Chicago inreatened slipments overlind, the sale was largely attended, and Mr. Potter was in his element. The trouble with the crowd was rather to catch the oyo of the clever auctioneor who aronsed a degree of good natured and enthusiastic competition soldom witnossed at such gatherings. The prices were rapidly rattled of his tongue as the buyers, with neeks craned, leaned forward and eagerly pressed their bids upon Mr. Potter's notice. The whole catalogue of about 80 lots took 22 minutes to reel off, and the fruit was distributed within an hour all over the city. The following were the pricos, which were thie lighest witnessed since 1892. Pears, $\$ 5$ per box; plums $\$ 3.75$; peaches $\$ 2.75$; apricots $\$ 2.50$.

McCritdy ©. Sons' tannery was visited; this firm manulactures raw hide surgical splints and other appliances for broken limbs. A. Latimer is thoir Montreal agent. The Rathbun Co., who are dotting the north shore banks of our great water ways with their mills and factories, are doing a prosperous business in lumber, coal, etc. Mr. W. J. Comstock of the Comstock Co., patent medicines, etc., also interested in many other enterprises in the town, speaks quite encouragingly of the state of trade in Brockville. Messrs. Abbott, Grant \& Buell, wholesale confectioners; J. W. Mann Mfg. Co., seed mitchines; and ML. Bourke, mfr. soda water, etc., all speak in satisfactory terms of their respective lines.

## at gananoque

The secretary of the Ontario Wheel Co., reports their firm as having had a very busy time prior to Pebruary last, since which time the Americans have been flooding the markets with wheels at about the cost of the raw material, intent on getting money out of the stock at any cost. This, of course, is but temporary, as the foreign article is said to lack in dumbility. Mr. Wm. Byers, of the Gamanoque Spring \& Axle Co., says their business is quite favorable for the times. Mr. E. Cook, blanket manufacturer, complains of the American competition he encounters in the form of an inferior make of blankets (probably considered by them good enongh for Cunadians) and which are sold at rates he cannot match. Geo. Gillis, manufacturer of fifth wheels and carriage hardware, speaks of trade as being brisk. McLenuan, Reid © Shaneman, millers, do a good local trade. Messis. Parmenter \& Bullock, mfrs. of rivets, buckles, etc., speak of business in their various branches as very satisfactory. Messrs. Cowan \& 3 ritton, -the latter now in full control-mfrs. nails, hinges, etc., are "rumiug stcady" and report a good business. Mr. O. D. Cowan, mir. of wringers, farm implements, marble and granite moniments, etc., speaks of business in the former lines as subject to sovere competition, but that the dullness is merely of a tempolary character. Messus. Skinner \& Co., hames factory, and D. F. Jones, Mrg. Co., igricultural implement manufacturers, both appear to be doing a prosperous business in their respective premises.

## CAUSES OF TEXTMLE DMPERTECTIONS.

By twisting a thread between the fingers it ean be seen that tho thread gets smaller in diameter with each turn, Then it is rensonable to suppose that the less the twist the larger in diameter the thread will be. The spinuing machine upon which the yarus are spun is supplied with an automatic device by which the desired amount of twist is spun into all the threads. The twist is thus the same all around. Hat it sometimes happens that somiething occurs to a spindle, resulting in loss of twist, aud a thread is made with less turns in it than the others. The thread receiving less twist is not only larger i.t
diameter, but lacks strength, and the fibres are left open and loose. Such threads show in the finished goods. The bobbin in spinning is frictionally held ou the steel spindle aud when the spindle turns the bobbin must go with it and the yarn is twisted. But the spinner becomes cayeless and permits waste to collect about the spindle. The waste causes the head of the bobbin to rise, and so the frictional bearing on the packing of the spindle is lost, and the spindie revolvesivithout tirning the bobbin every time; and so much less twist is put into thic thread. This produces a "solt" end. The remiedy consists in keeping the packing free. from waste. "Coarse" ends are caused by two strunds of roving running together during the spinning, thins making tho thread twice the size it ought to be.

These being carried nem. cone the reelection of the 10 liring directa ors, Mr. G. It. Fieh, Mr. John S. Gilliat, M.P., Mr. Johu Mi: Enle, Mr. James D. Alexander, aud Mir. Chas. T. Murdoch, wis inanimously agreed to.
The retining anditops, Mr. H. W. Prescott, and Mr. Robt. L. Newinan, wero duly proposed and re-alectod by the proz prietors; and the Hon. L. A. Brodrick and Mr. W. Westeoth, C. A., being in like manner proposed, were eleeted to fill the vacancies caused by the resignations of Mr. James M. Brand, and Mr. Thos Cor.
The resolution to veet the company's property in the company's unme having been also adopted, the meeting torminated with the usual rote of thanks to the chnirman, directors, and staff of the com: pany, which was duly acknowledged.
