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

CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS. ONTARIO.

Influenced by the favorable conditions existing across the border, Canadian white pine is exhibiting a marked degree of strength. When it is considered that the building season will soon draw to a close, that the British demand has been less active than usual, and that there is some uncertainty as to the volume, of export trade next year, it is very significant that prices hold so firm. It has been well illustrated this season that our pine is wanted in the United States, as shipments have been made to the Chicago market, Michigan and the Eastern States. The buying for Michigan yards has been a feature of the year. Small lots are still being picked up, and the yards will carry very light stocks at the close of navigation. The Parry Sound mills are shipping heavily by vessel. In the Ottawa district trade is quite brisk and prices unchanged. General complaint is made by operators of the difficulty in securing men for the woods, even though the wages offered are higher than last year. There will likely be a reduced cut of both white and red pine, but particularly of the latter, which was taken out too heavily last season. Furniture and implement factories are buying some hardwoods. From Western Ontario comes the report of an increased number of enquiries. While trade is not brisk, the movement is sufficient to keep prices firm.

QUEBEC AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

Whenever an opinion is expressed regarding the spruce trade, it is that the conditions are favorable to a large volume of business and higher prices next year. Although no figures are available, it is believed that the stock now awaiting shipment is very small, and that the winter ing stock at Quebec will be comparatively light. Enquiries received from Great Britain prove that buyers there are anxious to arrange for their supply for next year. While New Brunswick and Nova Scotia spruce does not exhibit the

same degree of strength as the Quebec product, recent shipments have greatly curtailed the quantity of stock in the hands of manufactures, and a feeling of confidence is exhibited by the trade. Large shipments are being made to Boston and other eastern points, where 10 and 12-inch dimensions are quoted at s_{20} , and 2×3 and 2×4 , to feet and up, at \$16. Higher prices are named for cedar shingles. Some small manufacturers are offering extras at \$3 on Boston rate of freight, but it is known that sales have been made as high as \$3.20. Clears are quoted at \$2.75 to \$2.85, second clears at \$2.35 to \$2.40; saps at \$2.10 to \$2.20; and extra No. 1 at \$175 to \$1.Sc.

UNITED STATES.

The reports of the United States lumiber market for some weeks past have been largely a repetition, and again this week it must be said that there is a very strong undertone and a liberal distribution of lamber. Freight rates have advanced and are now quoted at \$3 from Lake Superior to Buffalo and other eastern points. It is thought that they will go still higher and it seems very probable that a large quantity of lumber purchased by eastern dealers will remain on the docks at the head of the lakes through the winter. There is some doubt whether eastern dealers will have sufficient stock to carry them through until the spring, particularly as the east is expected to buy quite heavily during the next few months. In door and mill work an enormous business is being done, and there is a pronounced scarcity in several items of stock goods. Chicago is one of the strong points, the condition of the white pine market there being similar to that during 1899. If anything, the demand at present is stronger and the scarcity more pronounced. No. 1 12 inch boards are in short supply. At a recent meeting of Chicago dealers short piece stuff was advanced 50 cents, and long piece stuff from \$1 to \$1.50, while one or two other items were advanced \$2. The better grades of white pine continue to be in urgent demand and still higher prices are predicted. Eastern spruce prices are stiffening. Drives that it wasfeared would behung up haue now reached the mills, making con ditions more satisfactory for the manufacturer. Reports regarding the) hardwood trade are somewhat conflicting. Some dealers report an improvement, while others are equally certain that the volume of trade is no greater. Furniture

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manufacturers appear to be buying more liberally. Laths are in greater supply, while shingles are scarce and below the demand.

GREAT BRITAIN.

The steady falling off in the volume of imports is imparting a strong tone to the British timber market. The Board of Trade returns show that the import of hewn and sawn timber into the United Kingdom for the first nine months of this year was 7,038,369 loads, against 7,136,769 loads for corresponding months of last year. While the shipping season will not close for a couple of months, the amount of chartering shows that very little slock is likely to be imported into Great Britain during the balance of the season. There is some fear lest the shippers of Norway and Sweden should overstock the market, in which case Canadian timber would be sympathetically affected. The opinion is gaining ground, however, that by next spring the market will again be on a sound footing. The reported improvement in spruce deals has been maintained, although buying is by no means active. Business has been done at $\pounds 8$ per standard for 3 x 9 third quality c. i. f. London, although most agents are asking $\pounds 8$ tos c. i. f., or $\pounds 9$ 25 6d landed. Spruce deals are weaker at Glasgow than at other ports. The Timber Trades Journal says that the position of Quebec spruce in the London market is a strong one, and stocks are light, some sizes being very scarce. It is learned that a merchant accepted compensation for cancelling a transaction for 3 x 11 second spruce, simply because the shippers could not obtain the goods to fill the contract. Canadian pine is likewise stronger. Although the stock of pine deals is heavier than it was at this time last year, it is pointed out that twelve months ago shipments were made much later, whereas this year practically the whole season's import has arrived. First and second qualities are very scarce in first hands.

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

THE OTTAWA VALLEY.

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[Correspondence of the CANADA LUMBERMAN Business in local lumber circles has been brisk during the past six weeks. Quota-tions show no change. In the better grades the maximum figures are quoted oftener than those ranging towards the minimum. The stock available for first buyers is small. In fact the supply of one line, white pine shingles, has been practi-cally exhausted. Lath prices continue firm. Whelesale quotations given by a leading local firm are as follows : No. 1, \$2.00 to \$2.25; No. 2, \$1.40 to \$1.75. From present indications a further advance may be expected.

During the past six weeks shipments have been brisk by rail to Albany, where

the lumber was transferred to barges for New York. As the date of the close of navigation approaches, local shippers show an increasing desire to rush stock before the higher winter rates come in force. A scarcity of cars is complained of by several dealers. The rush of North-West grain has created a demand on the rolling stock that has left the local supply short. One shipper stated to-day that he has been waiting on cars over two weeks, and expects to hear daily of the cancellation of the orders owing to delay in delivery.

The local labor market has been de-pleted to satisfy the demand for men for the limits. Wages have advanced to an unprecedented figure. Road cutters com-

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mand \$24 a month, with free board. Experienced square timber hewers are se-curing the top-notch fig res, \$45 a month and board. Fully 3,500 men have been sent out of Ottawa in the last ten weeks. When the mills close next month a large contingent will be forwarded. Skilled labor is scarce. Men have been sent from Ottawa to work in the Adriondacks, as well as on Canadian limits. The lumber kings are up in accus

The lumber kings are up in arms against the recent increase in assessment, by which the lumber stock is rated as per-sonal property for the first time. The Export Lumber Company's figures have been raised from \$20,000 to \$100,000, the W. C. Edwards Co.'s from \$10,000 to \$75,000, and the John R. Booth's from \$40,000 to \$250,000. An appeal will be made. As much of this lumber has been sold to other parties and is merely piled here during the seasoning process, awaitOctober 23, 1901

The action of Mr. W. C. Edwards, M.P., in securing the services of a doctor in his lumber camps to guard against smallpox is looked on in high favor here. Other lumbermen are considering the advisability of following suit.

The largest lumber deal recorded in Ottawa in several years was that involving the transfer of the Klock limits in the Kippewa district. The limits, which are 228 miles in extent, were sold by R. H. Klock & Co, to Robert Hurdman, of Ottawa, for \$385,000. The timber is re-ported to be plentiful and of a high grade. Klock & Co. still hold a considerable area of timber lands, including some 300 miles on the Temiscamingue and Quinze rivers.
