Free Binder Twine Is Making Trouble for the Government.

Delegation Representing the Brantford Factory, and Composed of Good Lib-From Ruin-A Cut in the Estimates for Next Year-Mr, Tarte Hhs Been Economical and Has a Million on Hand-

Ottawa, Jan. 13 .- (Special.) - The Liberal chickens are coming home to-roost: One of the main planks in the Liberal platform at the last general election was free binder twine. The Government took the clap-trap utterances of some of its followers as gospel and proceeded to give effect to them, binder ceeded to give effect to them, binder twine going on the free list on the 1st inst., and now what is the result? Last week an influential deputation, headed by prominent Liberals, interviewed the Government to point out that ruination stared the twine manufacturers in the face, unless some protection was afforded them. To-day the Government had a similar dose, and once more from its friends. But there is this difference between the Consumers' Cordage Co. and the Brantford comeern, which was represented to-day. The Consumers' Co. makes all classes of twine and cordage, on some lines of which there is moderate protection. But the Brantford establishment makes binder twine solely, having been formed to break the combine. This it has done successfully up to the present. There is \$80,000 of capital invested in the concern, this capital having been subscribed by people of moderate means. To-day's deputation was headed by two of the most influential Liberals in Western Ontario, C. B. Heyd, M.P., and Mr. Thomas Ballantyne, ex-Speaker of the Legislature, and President of the company. There were also with them J. Strafford, manager, and S. Hariod. In brief, the deputation contended that unless the industry got a protection of at least 12 1-2 per cent', their business would be ruined. As it is, they will have to close down until the Government's intentions are known.



A special sitting for the registration of manhood suffrage voters shall be held in the united townships of Hagarty, Sherwood, Burns, Jones and Richards, in the electoral district of North Renfrew, with in 15 days after the passing of this act; and the members of the Board of Manhood Suffrage Registrars for the said townships shall be Thomas Deacon, Junior Judge of the County of Renfrew, and John G. Forgie and John J. O'Meara, barristers-at-law, of the Town of Pembroke, and such other registrars as they may appoint.



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

quietude. Drygoods travelers are all out, and most leading houses report quite satisfactory orders, with the volume of ordinary current remittances better than at this time last year. The little run of city failures in this line noted last week seems to have come to an end, and has no special significance. In groceries there is more doing than a week ago, but retailers have hardly yet had time to go over stock and make up their sorting wants. Sugar refluers report a very slack demand from jobbers at the moment. Both local factories are shut down just now, and, owing to the somewhat errathe character of outside markets for raws, quotations for refined are off an eighth of a cent. On the other hand, molasses is very firm and ad-

spot for the season. Cannel goods continue high; fea jobbers seem still pretty well stocked up, and the movement from first hands is light. It is yet early for much activity in general hardware; and prices of pig iron show some tendency to weakness, but orders for glass, paints, oils, etc., are being booked in fair number for spring shipment. The annual meeting of the Wilte Lead Association was held this week, but no change was made in price list. Turpentine is advanced 2c, and prices for Paris green have been fixed on a rather higher basis than last year. The boot and shoe factories are, all again at work and fully employed on the good spring orders previously noted. Hides are fring at the last advance, and stiffness marks prices in all lines of leather.

Business in wholesale circles at Toronto has improved slightly in some lines this week. Dry goods dealers generally report good orders for heavy materials, and stocks in country stores are said to be comparatively small. A satisfactory sorting-up trade is in progress, and the trend in prices is owards firmness. Manufactur. Is in many small lines are very busy, and they will have all they want to do to fill orders for spring delivery. Trade is good in bardware, there being a fair demand for all seasonable lines. The grocery trade continues fairly active. There is a decline of ½ in refined sugars, with standard granulated now jobbing at 4½c per pound. Dried fruits and canned vegetables in good demand and firmer. In leathers and boots and shoes trade is fairly active. Remittances are satisfactory, and, although failures were somewhat more numerous, they are less than the corresponding period of last year. In the grain trade, the movement shows a falling-off in wheat and flour, while peas are in active demand and firmer, Dealers are bidding 50e to 5te north and west.
