CANADA'S MINERAL WEALTH

How it is Yearly Being Handed Over to the Americans By the Two Governments.

SOME STARTLING STATEMENTS

Made by Mr. Napier Robinson to the Toronto Conservative Club Last Night.

Protracted was the meeting of the Conservative Club last evening and unabated the interest manifested in the startling revelations made by Mr. Napier Robinson as to the condition of Ontario's nickel industry and the unreliability of all the official returns. President E. M. Dumas was in the chair and the attendance was unusually large.

Nothing But Official Figures.

Mr. Napier Robinson spoke of the difficulties he has encountered in arriving at the present position of the nickel question. The statistics of the Ontario Mining Bureau, the returns from the Ontario Nickel Bureau, were not only conflicting, but seemed purposely misleading. He presented a great mass of figures for the years 1912-22, inclusive, as for these years only can all the official returns be shown in print. The figures showed from official sources nearly 14,000,000 pounds of nickel produced, and an absolute total for other previous years, thus showing how the nickel industry is increasing.

Should be Reformed Here.

Mr. Robinson strongly argued that the government should insist that the ores should be reduced in situ at the United States. Analyzing the figures as to exports from Canada and imports into the United States, he said there was lying on the one side or the other. No fault could be placed in these official figures. The nickel is the only mineral in Canada which is being mined and exported from Canada, and which is being mined and exported from Canada...

A Few Samples.

According to Mr. Thompson, manager of the New Jersey Refinery, for every \$28,000 spent in Canada for mining nickel, only \$100,000 is returned to the United States in the form of nickel. The balance of the nickel is exported to the United States in the form of nickel ore...

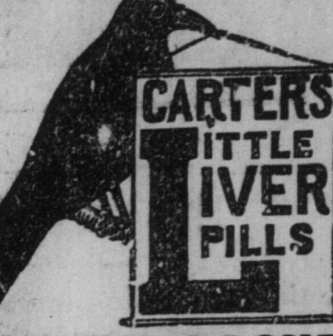

How Baseball Players in the Big League Are to be Held in Check.

Washington, April 10.—President Young of the National Baseball League has issued the following:

To League Umpires. Please note carefully instructions for 1909: First—Wear a neat blue flannel uniform.

Second—Absolute honesty and sobriety are demanded of every umpire.

Third—Enforce the rules to the letter, just as they are written. Study to be master of yourself, and you can better control others.

Fourth—Keep in close communication with your hotel, so as to receive a telegram at the earliest possible moment, and in case of accident, to be able to jump to some other city by first train.

Fifth—As soon as you reach any city let me know by first mail where you are stopping.

Sixth—Keep in close communication with your hotel, so as to receive a telegram at the earliest possible moment, and in case of accident, to be able to jump to some other city by first train.

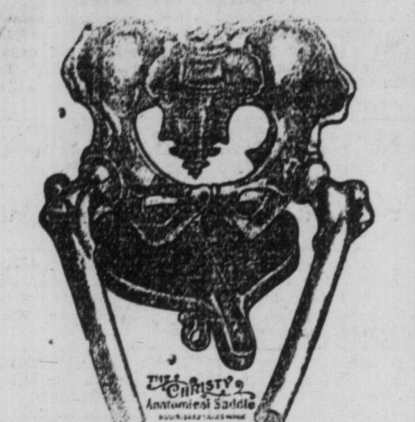
Seventh—You and your associates should study the rules closely together, and anticipate plays and help each other as much as you possibly can, so as to reduce the chances for error to the minimum.

The hammer is governed by a removable spring, and the strength of the blow varies with the strength of the spring.

The strength of the blow can be varied, and is stated to be from 500 to 550 pounds, so a uniform rate of speed can be maintained.

It is mentioned that the weight of an ordinary man's blow is estimated at 30 pounds. The power is developed by a very clever system of levers.

The machine is worked on a stretchbar, placed in the tunnel or shaft, as the case may be, and is operated by an ad-

juster on the side. It is so constructed that a hole can be driven in any direction.

When put up ready for shipment, the whole concern weighs 200 pounds, and can be readily packed on a horse. It has already been tried at the Cariboo mine.

C. Hepburn and A. D. Sykes, who are agents for British Columbia, have secured a contract at Athabasca, and if it is a success there, several mines in the Stocan have promised to give it a trial.

The great advantage claimed for it is that while it does not supersede labor, it greatly lessens the cost of mining.

OUR TRADE WITH BRITAIN.

Exports to Canada—Cotton piece goods, increased £23,500; linen, increased £13,000; woollen goods, £12,500; wearing apparel, £15,000.

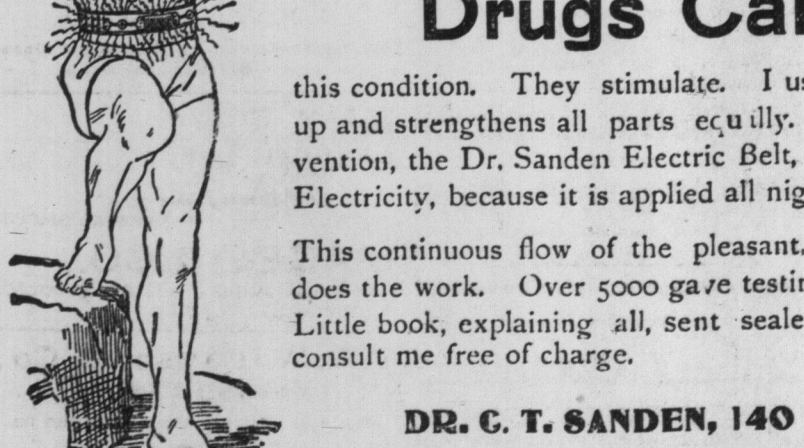

Defendant pleaded non-liability, having resigned his trust in favor of Robert Wilson. The judgment was by Chancellor Boyd and Justice Robertson, reversing a decision of Justice Rose.
