BUFFALO'S NEW POSTOFFICE. Fine Public Building Opened Yesterday-Built for Less Than \$2,000,000.

Buffalo, March 20 .- The new postoffice was dedicated this afternoon with appropriate ceremonies. Hon, Charles Emery Smith, the Postmaster-General, was the guest of honor, and delivered an address. The bill authorizing the purchase of the site of the new building was approved by President Cleveland, April 5, 1888, but it was not until September, 1894, that work was begun. The structure is of Gothic architecture, 220 feet front by 260 in depth. It was completed within the amount appropriated (\$2,000,000).

Besides the postoffice, the occupants of the building will be the customs, the internal revenue, the judicial, the engineering and the pension officials.




