LONDON, eb. 27.-Chancellor of the Exchequer Asquith introduced the Lithis afternoon. This is the principal government measure for the present ression of parliament. The capital invested in licensed property in this country is about \$1,200,000,000, while over

In cities it is proposed to allow one saloon for every 750 persons and in the country districts one saloon for every 400 persons. This regulation, it is estimated, will wipe out in the neighborhood of 30,000 licenses, about

The bill proposes that this reduction be effected within 20 years. Local option is to govern the issuance of new licenses and a majority of the parochial electors is sufficient to prohibit the granting of a license.





Our prices have been compared with those of firms who are not even recognized by the nursery trade; in one case, a firm that isn't even to be found rated in any commercial book of rating such as Bradstreet's or Dun's, while the other is a florist, not a nursery concern.

At the investigation not the slightest evidence was given to show that there evidence was given to show that there is a very material difference in the cost of trees according to the age of the stock, the height, the special variety and the number of times the stock has been transplanted. Stock that has been several times transplanted and specially grown is worth a great deal more than younger untransplanted stock, and we can show trade lists of reliable nursery concerns who are even quoting higher rates than we have for the same grade of steek. IS UNITED STATES NAVY **WORTHLESS, OR IS IT O.K.?**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.-Rear Admiral Washington Lee Capps, chief constructor of the navy department, before the senate commission on naval affairs, replied to the magazine article written by Henry Reuterdahl in criticism of the construction of the American warships. The admiral asserted that the American warships are the equal of any in the world. The most serious charges made, he said, were of insufficent freeboard, meaning the height from waterline to deck; insufficent gun height, and improper location of main line armor belts, and all these he explained have been the subject of the closest study and expirement for many years by naval designers of every country.

Admiral Capps characterized as "exploded" the theory, that if a sheling penetrated the armorplate at a slight incline it would be deflected upwards by the armor of the protected deck. "All efforts,"he added, "should be divi-






