STATUS OF LACROSSE PLAYERS. O.H.A. Vice-President Says C.C.A. Seniors Cannot Qualify in Hockey.

Vice-President Francis Nelson of the Ontario Hockey Association was asked yesterday: "What is the position of senior lacrosse players in regard to hockey this winter?"

"The same that it has always been," he said. "If you refer to the Ontario Hockey Association, it is for amateurs, whether they are lacrosse players or not. If they are not amateurs they cannot play in the C.C.A. as you depend on that. That association not only has rules, but is able and willing to enforce them. I don't know of any senior lacrosse players who could qualify under O.H.A. rules. They don't even qualify under C.C.A. rules, but that is a fact understood in that association that, so far as the seniors are concerned, the amateur definition does not apply. No such laxity, however, exists in the governing body of the winter game, and senior lacrosse players would not be eligible. Nor would they be eligible to the convention. You wouldn't expect professionals to be just the right person to formulate legislation for an amateur body."



MILITARISM IS NOT AN ISSUE. Toronto has recently been visited by two ex-cabinet ministers who are also distinguished members of the English Radical party. Both assured Canadians that the Liberal Coalition were quite as much their friends as the Tory. Both also professed an ardent desire to see the union of the empire

maintained and enlarged with much eloquence on the greater value of the benefit. This declaration was avowedly made for the purpose of refuting the prevalent idea that the opposition party in Britain are, to say the least of it, not greatly enamored of the movement apparent in all parts of the empire towards closer union.

Mr. Morley's advice was eagerly seized upon by the government organs, who saw in it a declaration in favor of their cry of "militarism" in Canada, a cry not unknown in Britain, and with which he is in entire sympathy.

His remarks were probably an oblique allusion to the outcry against Lord Dundonald, which, had he only known, was a piece of the most unbusinesslike tactics possible, even in Canada.

Lord Dundonald was not objected to on account of "militarism," but as the name was a bug-bear to a section of the community the cry was greedily raised that it might prejudice their judgment and inflame their sentiment.

Had Lord Dundonald acquiesced in Mr. Fisher's delings while acting minister of militia he would have remained the high official gentleman whose only ambition was to do his duty and serve Canada to the best of his ability.

There is no party in Canada that favors "militarism." But there are many Canadians who want to see the public services kept free from improper interference. And if Canada is to have an integral part of the British Empire she has duties as well as rights.

Part of these duties is to be able to defend herself, and whatever establishment is necessary for that purpose is known as the "Quarantine Investment Plan." By this policy the insured has a positive guarantee of advance on his policy should he die before the close of the dividend period.

DEER IN CIVILIZATION.





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READY TO SPEND A MILLION TO PURCHASE GAS STOCK

Debentures Will be Issued to That Amount—To Enforce Yonge St. Bridge Order.

The board of control received another substantial evidence of the property of the National Exhibition when President W. S. McNaught trustee, over to the mayor a marked cheque for \$30,000 on account of the profits earned by this year's show. The president, with Secretary Orr, R. J. Scott, W. K. George and S. E. Bridge, appeared to endorse the report of the parks and exhibition committee, asking that a bylaw be submitted to provide \$30,000 for the erection of new buildings. Mr. McNaught said that the results had shown the wisdom of the city in investing money in buildings. During the past three years the exhibition had earned a profit of \$125,000, of which \$70,000 had been handed over to the city. He expected the city would receive this year \$30,000. The mayor said council would consider the various expenditures to be made by the board decided to report the bylaw.

In regard to the Yonge-street bridge, Corporation Counsel Fullerton reported that copies of the order of the railway committee should be served on the railway companies, as they could not be in default until they had notice. The commission should also be asked to serve official copies of the order. According to the railway committee, the companies are liable to a penalty of from \$500 to \$1,000 for each day that they fail to constitute a new office. In suing for a penalty over \$100, the permission of the railway commission must be obtained. The draft order for the expropriation of the lands and property was also presented, and the commission asked the board to make any suggestion it might see fit to make against the bill. The order states that the new depot must be 25 feet back from the railway line of Front-street. The board will consider on Monday how far along the street the depot should run.

Million for Gas Stock.
City Solicitor Carvell presented a draft bylaw to provide for the issuance of debentures to pay for the gas stock to be purchased by the city. The mayor, vice-chairman of the board of control, and the city treasurer are constituted a board to purchase stock or shares of the company, as they may deem expedient.
