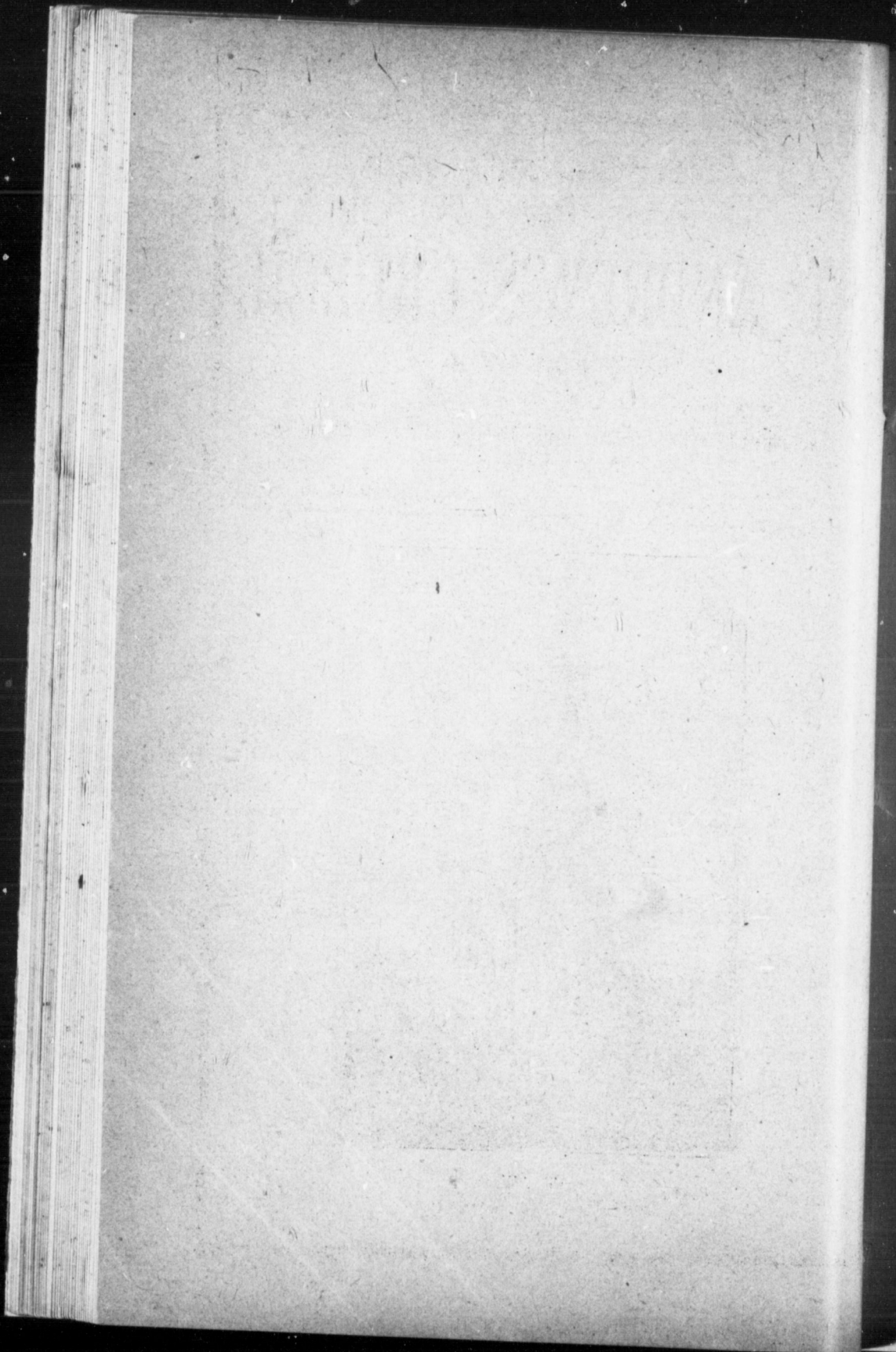

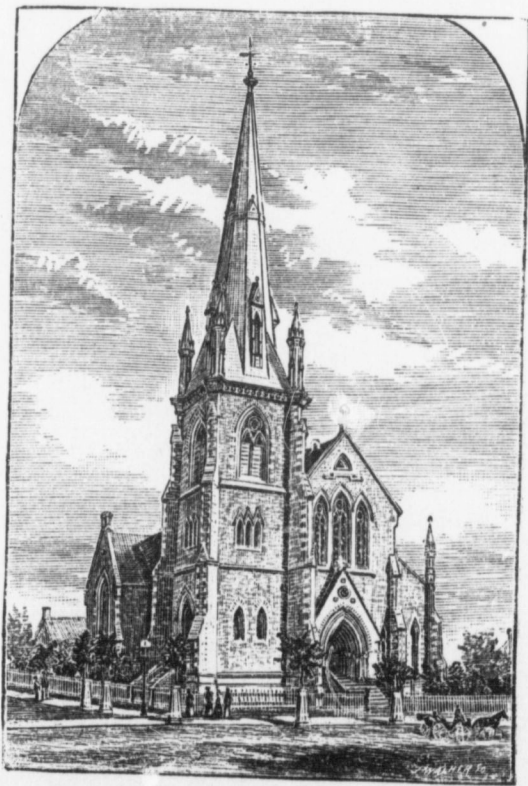

DISTRICT No. 6.—Mr. Gibson: From Maria Street northward to Sparks Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

DISTRICT No. 7.—Mr. Hamilton: From Maria Street southward to Lewis Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

DISTRICT No. 8.—Mr. F. H. Chrysler: From Lewis Street southward, and Bank Street eastward to the Rideau River and Billings' Bridge.

DISTRICT No. 9.—Mr. A. Drummond: From Sparks Street northward to the Ottawa River.

DISTRICT No. 10.—Mr. Larmonth: Sandy Hill from Rideau Street southward, and from the Canal eastward to Rideau River.

DISTRICT No. 11.—Lieut.-Colonel Macpherson: From Mackenzie Avenue eastward to the Rideau River, and from Rideau Street northward, and New Edinburgh.

DISTRICT No. 12.—Mr. Borthwick: Gloucester and country sections beyond Rideau River.

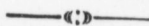
Members changing their residence are requested to notify the Elder of the District or directly to the Minister.

PASTORAL LETTER.



MY DEAR FRIENDS,—I am sure you will read with pleasure the various items of information contained in this Report. It does not deal recklessly in adjectives, which might only serve to foster congregational egotism, but attempts rather to place our affairs before you in such a way that you will desire to leave the things which are behind, and reach forth unto those things which are before. We need pretty strong reminders nowadays that success is not to be determined merely by adding up figures or counting numbers. The best proof of effectual Christian service is in renewed and gladdened lives, and the final tribunal of judgment is with God and not with man.

It has been my privilege to minister to you without serious interruption throughout the past year, and I have been greatly encouraged by the diligent attendance of most of you at the public worship of the church. I am especially gratified by the constant presence of a large number who, as yet, have been unable to obtain sittings, or who, perhaps, are not immediately connected with the church at all. I desire heartily to welcome all strangers, whether they are able to agree with me or not, if they are really desirous of studying the Word of God in its relations to human life. To the young men who in such numbers attend the Sabbath services, I extend the hand of brotherly love. I shall always be pleased to have them call upon me, and give me the pleasure of knowing them better.

During the past year there has been an unusual amount of sickness, and we have to mourn the absence of many loved and familiar faces, now radiant with the light of heaven. I am so glad to have been able, through those months of severe trial, continually to go in and out among the sick and troubled ones, cheering and comforting them with the sweet messages of God. I believe that, as a congregation, we shall long feel the good effects of that discipline of sorrow, and that each bereaved heart will yet fully learn that the Father doeth all things well.

I cannot tell you how much my hands have been strengthened by the kindness and intelligent aid of those who love their pastor, and are not afraid to show it. In the appreciation of genuine sympathy, I confess myself to be of like passions with yourselves,

and I thank God that such sympathy has not been wholly denied me.

I observe with growing pleasure the activity of many members of the congregation in various departments of Christian work, and the signs of still more general interest for the future. A Sunday morning prayer-meeting for young men has recently been begun by the Institute, and I look for blessed results from it. The Women's Home Missionary Society, though still in the first year of its existence, is vigorously prosecuting its work, and will gladly welcome those who have not yet joined it.

For many thoughtful acts which have ministered to my personal comfort, and in that way made my work more easy, I am sincerely grateful. I appreciate the prompt measures taken by the Temporal Committee to secure a more suitable residence. The members of the Ladies' Society have made me their debtor by the much-needed transformation of the minister's vestry. I thank every member of the congregation who in any way has striven to further our common purpose of spreading, by life and teaching, the knowledge of the truth as it is in Jesus.

I hope that no one will feel any diffidence in informing me of any circumstances in the home where my assistance and sympathy may be desired. Those with whom I have been brought into contact in times of sorrow and trial, will not need the assurance, I think, that it is my joy, as far as I can, to be helpful to them.

It is my earnest prayer that this year may witness the growth of true Christianity in our whole congregation. We have reason to be thankful for the harmony which prevails amongst us; but there is still plenty of room to illustrate more fully those principles of charity and truth which mark the religion we profess, and so to vindicate our right to the sacred name of Christians by showing a closer resemblance to the Lord Jesus Christ.

REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION.

The Kirk Session gladly recognize the opportunity afforded by the presentation of their Annual Report, for devout acknowledgement of the goodness of God to the people who are under their care. A spirit of peace and harmony prevails throughout the congregation, and never, perhaps, was there greater or more wide-spread zeal manifested in the various departments of Christian work.

Large and attentive audiences have assembled week after week at the Sabbath services, and much blessed fruit has resulted from them, as well to the members of the church as to the many strangers who are constantly in the habit of worshipping with us.

The attendance at the Wednesday evening services has been, on the whole, good. The Session are persuaded, however, that there are still those who needlessly deprive themselves of this opportunity for instruction and prayer which many find so precious, and they desire to express the hope that all the congregation, and especially the young—whether members of the Church or not—will make some effort, if need be, to keep this single hour in the week for the public worship of God.

The Session view with great pleasure the results of the special religious services recently held in the city, evidencing as they do the faithful efforts of the Evangelists, and the steady, patient training of years which has prepared the way for them. Not only now, but always, they affectionately commend those who from time to time unite with the church to the sympathy and care of its members.

The work of the Sabbath Schools has been maintained with much efficiency. The Session most reluctantly accepted the resignation of Mr. Larmonth, who felt obliged to retire from his

work as Superintendent of Lower Town Sabbath School, and suitably acknowledged his unwearied and successful labors. Mr. Geo. S. May was duly appointed in his stead, and with the assistance of a staff of excellent teachers, is amply justifying the choice made. The other two Sabbath Schools under Mr. Chrysler and Mr. Gibson are in a prosperous condition, and the hearts of many of the teachers have been cheered by the visible results of their faithful ministry among the children.

Mr. Falconer has conducted the Congregational Bible Class again this year, and as a result of his diligent efforts there has been a marked increase in the attendance.

The Reports of the various Societies of the Church are of a gratifying character. There has been an increase in the membership of the Ladies' Aid Society, though it is to be regretted that some yet fail to seize this opportunity of uniting in practical and much-needed Christian work.

The hopes entertained in regard to the Institute have been fully realized. Its meetings, though from various causes somewhat interrupted, have been full of interest and profit. It has served to develop the social life of the Congregation, and has quickened the intellectual and spiritual impulses of many of the young people. The Session are glad to hear that a Young Men's Prayer Meeting has been recently begun under the auspices of the Institute.

The Session are much pleased to know that the Women's Home Missionary Society, inaugurated by the Pastor last December, is already so large and influential, and that it shows itself fully alive to the crying needs of our own country.

During the year forty-three names have been added to the Communion Roll. The present number of communicants is (393) three hundred and ninety-three. We mourn the loss of some who were faithful unto death, and who have now received a crown of life. They rest from their labors and their works follow them.

The Session again record with pleasure the addition of new names to the list of those contributing to the benevolent and

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church was held in the Lecture Room, on Monday evening, the 5th March, 1888, Mr. James Cunningham, President of the Temporal Committee, in the chair.

The Minutes of last Annual Meeting, and Special Meeting of 6th April last, were read and confirmed.

The reports and accounts of the Kirk Session, Temporal Committee, Ladies' Aid Society, Sabbath Schools, Schedule Fund Account, and St. Andrew's Church Institute, were read to the meeting.

The Chairman read the report and submitted plans of T. S. Scott, Esq., architect, regarding proposed alterations to the Church.

It was moved by J. W. McRae, and seconded by E. H. Bronson, that the report of the Temporal Committee just read be received and adopted, and that the report and plans of the proposed alterations to the Church, submitted by the Temporal Committee, be referred to the Kirk Session and Temporal Committee with instructions to deal with the matter as they may deem advisable, subject to the following conditions, viz:—That no alterations be made that will, in the judgment of a competent architect, mar the symmetry of the present building, and that no liabilities be incurred without ample provisions being made for their liquidation, without increasing the present debt of the Church. Before taking action the result of the deliberations of the joint committees to be submitted and approved of by the Congregation duly convened for this purpose.—Carried.

It was here stated by Mr. G. L. Orme, that a gentleman present had offered \$60,000.00 for the Glebe property east and west of the Rideau Canal.

Gibson, that this meeting recommend that the offer of \$60,000.00 now made for the Glebe property be favourably considered by the incoming Temporal Committee, and that a meeting of the Congregation be called to consider the same.—Carried.

It was moved by E. H. Bronson, seconded by James Gibson, that James Cunningham, J. McNicol, P. Larmonth, J. W. McRae, C. C. Ray, G. L. Orme, and J. S. Durie be the Temporal Committee for the ensuing year.

It was moved in amendment by J. B. Halkett, seconded by A. H. Taylor, that the election of a Temporal Committee be proceeded with same as last year, that is, by ballot.

The amendment having been put to the meeting, it was declared lost, and the main motion carried.

It was moved by James Cunningham, seconded by P. Larmonth, that the various reports and statements presented to-night be printed and distributed to the Congregation, under a Committee composed of Rev. W. T. Heridge, W. Hamilton, E. H. Bronson, James Gibson, and the mover and seconder.—Carried.

It was moved by F. P. Bronson, seconded by A. G. Forgie, that the thanks of this meeting are due, and are hereby tendered to the Ladies' Aid Society, District Visitors, and Church Choir, for their very great assistance in the work of the Church during the past year.—Carried.

REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.

To the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church in General Meeting Assembled :

The Temporal Committee beg leave to submit a synopsis of the business under their charge for the past year.

The financial account which will be presented and has been audited, shows the

being a slight increase. The arrears still due on pew rents are about equal to the liabilities at this date, which are about \$1,000, and for which a note has been discounted to enable the Committee to remit interest on Scotch Loan and pay other claims.

The expenditure has been larger than usual, owing to the necessity of providing more perfect drainage for the Church, the Manse and caretaker's house, but as this is now expected to be as near perfect as possible, a similar outlay will not be required for some time. The repairs of an outside coping wall which had been carried away by the ice, the renovation of the basement and fitting of the same with double windows, also cost considerable, but the great improvement made is, your Committee believe, appreciated by those who use the basement most, and it will not require much expenditure for some time to come.

Having learned that the Manse was becoming surrounded with manufactories, livery stables, etc., and increased street traffic, in fact the locality has become a noisy one, and not well adapted for a quiet, studious residence, it was decided to rent a more suitable house on Albert Street, and which cost \$500 per year. This new residence has been conducive of much comfort to the Minister, from the fact of his being able to pursue his studies with more pleasure. The old Manse has been rented to Dr. Wright for two years at \$400 per annum. This change will involve an expenditure of about \$100 per annum, but it could not well be avoided.

During the year eight building lots in Spenceville have been sold at \$200 each, and \$250 of the purchase money has been

received. This makes the whole number of lots sold 17. On many of those sold last year substantial improvements have been made, and your Committee have no doubt but the terms of purchase will be completed in due time by the purchasers.

The sale of the Glebe property west of the Canal was pushed as much as possible during the past summer, but no offer was obtained, neither is there a prospect in the near future of being able to effect a sale at a fair price. The leases which had expired have been continued from year to year, or until the property is sold, until 1891 when all leases expire.

Agreeable to instructions received at the last Annual Meeting, the Insurance on the various Church properties have been increased, and the amount for which they are now covered is as follows, namely :

Your Committee respectfully ask the careful and considerate attention of the Meeting to the letter of the Pastor which will be read, *re* increased sitting accommodation in the Church, and also to the plan and letter of Mr. T. S. Scott, architect, who has prepared the same. Your Committee, while willing to aid in this laudable undertaking, have not committed the Congregation to anything except the engaging of Mr. Scott for the purpose of making the plans.

Your Committee desire to return their best thanks to Mr. James Mather, architect, for his professional services during the past year, and for which he refused to accept the slightest remuneration.

The early part of the twelfth year of the Ladies' Aid Society will long be remembered as a time of unusual sadness and depression. Not only had the Society to mourn the loss of dear and valued members, but many were through sickness, either of themselves or of someone of their household, unable to attend the meetings. Notwithstanding their many trials, the office-bearers of the Society feel they have accomplished some good work, and that they have no need to be discouraged at the year's results.

The average attendance has been 18, as against 17 of last year; the largest number present at any one meeting having been 36, the smallest 14. The meetings have been held as formerly in the Bible Class room.

Three entertainments were given during the year. The first, "An evening with Auld Scotia," held on the 8th of March, realizing the sum of \$116.54 (one hundred and sixteen dollars and fifty-four cents). The second, in aid of the Ottawa Ladies' College, on the evening of the 31st March, realizing the sum of \$146.00 (one hundred and forty-six dollars). The ladies took this money, assumed all the liabilities, and handed over the sum of \$200.00 (two hundred dollars), from the funds of the Society, as

a donation to the Ottawa Ladies' College. The third, the Anniversary Social, was held on Tuesday evening, the 7th of February, realizing the sum of \$78.75 (seventy-eight dollars and seventy-five cents). Owing to there being a great deal of sickness in the congregation the annual Christmas Entertainment did not take place, but instead a sale of fancy and useful articles was held on the afternoon of Thursday, the 22nd of December, realizing the sum of \$61.08 (sixty-one dollars and eight cents). The whole amount raised during the year from all sources has been \$399.77 (three hundred and ninety-nine dollars and seventy-seven cents).

At the first meeting of the Society for the season 1887-88 it was decided to increase the number of Vice-Presidents from three to five, and to appoint an Assistant Secretary. Accordingly Mrs. E. H. Bronson and Mrs. McLeod Stewart were unanimously elected to the office of Vice-Presidents, and Miss Minnie Grant to that of Assistant Secretary.

The Society have to mourn the loss by death of three of their most valued members—Mrs. Elliott, Mrs. Hugh Ross and Miss Clara Russell. It is also a source of deep regret that Miss Hopkirk, who, since the first organization of the Society, so efficiently discharged the duties of Secretary, removed to Stratford, thus causing a loss not easily replaced.

During the year the following donations have been given:—
To the Rev. Mr. Ami \$50.00 (fifty dollars), to assist in defraying the debt on St. Mark's Church; to the Home for the Aged, \$25.00 (twenty-five dollars) and six pairs of sheets; and to the Protestant Hospital, three dozen pairs of slippers, one dozen nightshirts, one-half dozen boys' nightshirts, one dozen under-garments, six pairs of sheets, and a carpet for the Matron's room.

The Society would again record their sincere thanks to the many friends who have so willingly and generously assisted them by donations, lending decorations, and in various other ways, and also to those members of other congregations, as well as St. Andrew's, who have so kindly aided them in getting up their programmes.

REPORT OF ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH INSTITUTE.

To the Members of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa.

It is with much pleasure that we have to report on the continued prosperity of this now well established organization.

While the meetings this season, thus far have not been so many as the preceding, owing to the fever epidemic in Ottawa during the latter part of 1887, and subsequently, on account of the evangelistic services recently held in the city, and which had such glorious results; yet the sessions of the Institute have proved most successful, entirely due, we believe, to the care exercised in arranging programmes suited to a society having for its objects "the religious and intellectual improvement of its members." For the excellent programmes presented, the Ladies' Committee deserve much credit, the members of which readily and willingly provided music and otherwise rendered valuable aid. We also desire to state that the Institute is greatly indebted to our esteemed Pastor for the interest shown by him in its welfare, likewise to the ladies and gentlemen who have so efficiently contributed to the entertainments.

The present membership is 131, the financial condition being very satisfactory. In this connection we may mention that, the expenses being trifling, the Institute has been enabled to vote sufficient money to provide 100 well bound copies of "The Presbyterian Hymnal" for use at the Wednesday evening services.

During the recess, Mr. Woods, who had ably filled the office of president, was offered and accepted an important position in London, Ontario, and the Institute thereby deprived of the services of one who had materially helped to give the society that high standard of excellence which it has fortunately gained.

REPORT.

The number of scholars on the roll is 275—2 less than reported last year. The average attendance is 172, a decided improvement upon last year. The teachers and officers number 34, and the school is composed of 27 classes—14 classes of girls, 12 of boys, and the primary class of girls and boys together. Several changes have taken place in the staff during the year. The school sustained a severe loss by the resignation of the Asst. Superintendent, Mr. F. P. Bronson, on account of impaired health. We earnestly hope that at no very distant date Mr. Bronson may again be able to give his valuable services to the school. It is with great regret that we remove from the roll of teachers the names of Miss Drummond and Miss K. Drummond, who have so long been identified with the school and served it so faithfully. Other losses during the year have been Mr. Campbell, resigned; Miss L. Hopkirk and Miss Mitchell, left the city; and Miss Russell, who was on our reserve list, removed by the hand of death. The places of these have been filled by 9 new teachers—6 ladies and 3 gentlemen. Mrs. Herridge and Mrs. Mayo kindly undertook the infant class during the months it was without a regular teacher. The work of the school was interrupted during the months of July and August by repairs being made in the basement of the church.

The Sabbath collections in the school are wholly devoted to Missions, and amount to \$143.82, which sum has been allocated as follows:—

The Session has made its annual grant of \$100 for the ordinary expenses of the school.

The festival usually held in January has been postponed till 16th March on account of the special Evangelistic Services hereafter referred to.

The teachers as heretofore have met weekly for the study of the lessons in conjunction with the teachers of the other Presbyterian schools of the city.

In the month of September Mr. Van Meter, Superintendent of Italian Bible and Sunday School Mission, addressed the school, which contributed the sum of \$53 towards the carrying on of his work in Italy.

A number of our teachers and scholars suffered from the fever which prevailed so widely in our city during the fall and early winter. We are thankful that all have been, in the good providence of God, restored to health.

The Union Special Services arranged for by the Ottawa Presbytery and conducted by Rev. Mr. Meikle, have been greatly blessed to our school. We rejoice in the fact that a large number of our scholars have come to decision, and have accepted Christ as their Saviour. A considerable number have announced their intention of applying for membership in the church at the approaching communion season, and we are looking forward with great joy to sitting down together with many of our scholars, at the table of our Lord. We rejoice in the fulfilment of the promise, "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

REPORT.

It is with much regret that we report the non-continuance of Mr. Larmonth as superintendent of the school, who felt obliged to retire from that office at present.

The number of scholars on the roll is 72, an increase of 10 over last year; this increase is owing largely to our having added to our school a class of French Protestant children, under the instruction of Mr. Henry Ami.

The average attendance is 45, being a gain of 2 over last year's report. Our average would have been much larger but for the irregular attendance of the infant class, which numbers 27; and then a number of our scholars have been afflicted with the fever which visited our city. We are thankful to our Heavenly Father for his blessings to us in raising them from beds of sickness and restoring them to health and strength.

The teachers and officers number 8, being a gain of one. Professor Macoun has joined our ranks and has started a Bible Class, which has been a long felt want, as our older scholars in the past have discontinued attending because our classes were not far enough advanced for them.

The Sabbath collections have been devoted to purchasing lesson and illustrated papers for the school.

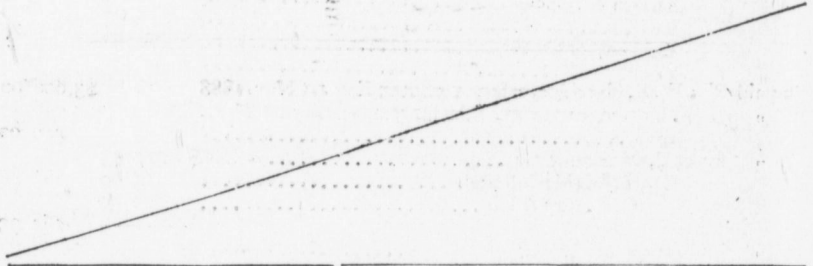

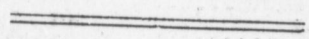
