Supreme Council was called off, and a Lodge of Perfection, 14°, opened, and members of the Rite admitted.

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The Sovereign Grand Commander then delivered his Annual Address, as follows :

DEAR BRETHREN :

It is with unfeigned pleasure I greet you all in Supreme Council at our Grand East where, through the loving kindness of our Heavenly Father, we are permitted to meet again in Annual Session as the Representatives of the Rite, to labor in its behalf and take such steps as we may consider will tend to promote its best interests. These annual gatherings, particularly in this hospitable City, are always a source of great joy to myself and, I assume, to all of you, my brethren, but on this occasion our joy is shadowed over with much sadness on account of the absence of loved ones who were wont to be with us every year but whose familiar faces we shall never more behold.

Early in the year a loved and valued brother—one who gave great promise of future usefulness and who was a tower of strength to this Rite in this Valley—passed away: I speak of Ill. Bro. JAMES F. WALKER, our Grand Master of Ceremonies. Bro. WALKER had not only held the highest office in the gift of the Grand Lodge of Quebec—having been its M. W. Grand Master—but was, at the time of his death, Commander-in-Chief of Montreal Consistory. He was one in whom we all had great expectations. An exceedingly able administrator, excellent Ritualist and one fitted to command, besides being a genial brother with great personal magnetism, his departure has left a blank which it will be hard to fill.

Again, and at a more recent date, the remorseless hand of the enemy swept off another of our active members in the person of the venerable Brother WM. REID, P. G. M. of C. who had so acceptably filled that office for twelve years prior to the election of Bro. WALKER. Our aged Brother, although an unassuming man, was one of the best informed Masons of this country, and a genial, whole-souled fellow, the loved of every one of his brethren who knew him. He had, through hard work for the Craft and the Rite, earned his way to and gained the high rank of this degree. He seldom or never failed to attend a session of this Council although fortune had not favored him as she had done others; and though it was with much difficulty and at considerable sacrifice, he performed well his duty as an Active Member. By many of us, particularly by myself, who had known our brother intimately for over thirty years and who knew his intrinsic worth as a man and Mason, his loss will be severely felt, and his venerable presence greatly missed. In Brother REID's death a genuine Mason has gone to his eternal rest: may it be in holy peace.

Bro. REID had been but three days laid in his narrow bed when

the sad, but not unexpected, news was flashed to me announcing the departure of one who had been, until lately, the leading spirit of the Rite in this Valley, the central figure among the members here, and specially prominent at the sessions of this Council, our deeply lamented and much loved Brother, COL.: WM. H. HURTON, Past Grand Commander. I can hardly imagine a session of this Council in Montreal without his genial presence and the controlling influence he always exerted, as from almost the first assembly of this Council after its formation to the last session, with scarcely an exception, our ever active and courteous Brother was one of the first to greet the members on their arrival in this City and often the last to shake their hand and say good-bye, and while we rejoice in the privilege of having other loving and dear brethren still to extend the hearty welcome, and who have done so to-day most courteously, I know these will not feel that I am invidious when I express my own, and, I am sure, your sorrow at the absence of him whom we so much loved. Our Brother's illness began in April last, and he grew gradually worse, first becoming blind and unable to move, and then finally unconscious, in which sad condition he remained till the summons came on the 9th inst. He was devoted to his country, his family and the Order, and was particularly fond of this Rite in which he attained the highest rank of Grand Commander. We shall never again be privileged to greet him, never again see his smiling face in our Council. May our Father who is in Heaven have him in His holy keeping. To his widow and family, as well as to the families of our other deceased brethren, we extend our most sincere sympathy. May these beloved Brethren be among those who will enjoy the rewards of their labor, and be welcomed by the Master with "Well done, good and faithful servant, enter into the joy of your Lord."

Thus three more links have been broken in our small chain of Council members. May this consideration be to each one of us a reminder to make our election sure, and to leave no uncanceled obligations, that our memory may deserve the honors we thus bestow upon them, and may we who remain draw closer together in the bonds of our beloved Order, making it one of the dearest relations of life.

"Life is a count of losses every year."

In many other jurisdictions the hand of death has been busy. The Southern Jurisdiction of the United States, so recently deprived of its illustrious Commander, GENERAL PIKE, has now again to mourn the death of his successor, Ill.: Bro.: DR. BATCHELLOR. This eminent Brother had been ill almost continuously since he assumed command of that Council, and for the eight months prior to his death was confined to his bed. He was eminently qualified for the high position to which he was elected, having been an active Mason for half a century, and having filled very many important ruling positions in the different branches of the Craft. He was a

member of the 33^d since 1857, constantly in command of some of the Bodies of this Rite, and was, therefore, from experience and ability, as well as from being the next in rank, in every way fitted to succeed the Immortal Bro.: PIKE. We extend our sincere sympathy to this Ill.: Council for the great loss it has been called upon to sustain.

IRELAND.

Information came to us shortly after our last session and before our Proceedings were printed of the death of the Ill.: and Venerable Grand Commander of the Supreme Council of Ireland, THE RIGHT HONORABLE JUDGE TOWNSHEND; and our Secretary-General very properly inserted in his appendix a notice of this sad event. In the decease of Bro.: TOWNSHEND a "*Master of Israel is fallen.*" After mature years and a lifetime spent in the interests of Masonry, specially in this Rite, one of the ablest rulers has gone. He was looked up to as the Father of Scottish Rite Masonry in Ireland. The loss of such a man becomes a universal one. He was an Honorary Member of our Council, and we unite with our brethren of Ireland in their sorrow.

The Supreme Council of the Northern Jurisdiction, U. S., have out of their large membership lost a correspondingly large number of their brethren.

Ill.: HOMER STANLEY GOODWIN, of Pennsylvania, one of their oldest Active 33rds.

Ill.: ROBERT HARRIS FOSS, of Illinois, an Active 33rd, and

Ill.: AUGUSTUS RATTANX HALL, of Pennsylvania, also an Active 33rd, (this latter died since the recent session) as well as also eighteen Honorary 33rds (a list of whom is attached hereto) have crossed the River. Eloquent eulogies were passed upon several of these brethren by Sov.: Grand Commander PALMER in his address at the meeting recently held. The rupture of so many ties must cause our brethren of the Sister Jurisdiction much sorrow, and in which we unite and extend our sympathy to them

The Supreme Council for England and Wales, etc., announces the deaths of Ill.: Bros.: ANDREW HAY, of India, RAPHAEL COSTA, SIR FRANCES BURDETT, BART., and LIEUTENANT-COLONEL GEORGE HENRY HALDANE.

The Supreme Council of Switzerland, in the early part of the year, that of the Ill.: Bro.: DUTOIT, Grand Chancellor, and just now notice was received by us of the unexpected death on the 14th of last month of the Ill.: Bro.: RUCHONNET, Sov.: Grand Commander of that Council.

To our brethren of these Jurisdictions we offer our most sincere sympathy. The usual memorial pages will be inserted in our Proceedings.

FOREIGN MATTERS.

Our relations with all other Supreme Councils remain undisturbed.

As intimated at its last session, and referred to by my predecessor in his address last October, the Supreme Council of the Northern Jurisdiction U. S., taking advantage of the Great International gathering of the "World's Columbian Fair," decided to hold its annual session this year in Chicago, and after sending invitations to all other Councils to be represented, so that its session might partake of the character of an international gathering, held its meeting last month. In response to the courteous invitation of the special committee of that Council, a delegation of our members, consisting of Ill. Bros. ELLIS, MASON and myself, availed ourselves of the privilege and were present

The Supreme Council was opened with the full ceremonial, which was principally under the directing hand of that Prince of Masters of Ceremonies—Ill. C. T. McCLENACHAN. The delegates from other Jurisdictions were presented in the most dignified manner, and were welcomed most eloquently by the Sov. Grand Commander, Ill. Bro. PALMER. Perfect freedom was extended to all the Foreign Representatives to speak on matters of the Rite, if they so desired, but as far as I heard, no one availed himself of that privilege other than to express thanks for and appreciation of the manner of his reception, and to congratulate this great Council on its wonderful progress and grand attainments. Out of an active membership of fifty, thirty-eight were present, which, with Honorary Members, made a total of one hundred and eighty-six in attendance, exclusive of foreign visitors. The business of the session was principally devoted to matters of home interest. The Honorary Degree was conferred in an inimitable manner on fifty-two Princes of the Royal Secret.

SUPREME COUNCIL OF ENGLAND AND WALES, ETC.

The annual circular of this Council which it issues, and which, to some extent, takes the place of regular proceedings such as we, in this country, are accustomed to print, was received by me. It contains many items of information, principally of domestic matters, which are of special interest to its own members, one of which, however, was the periodical exchange of visitations begun between the three British Councils, which will, no doubt, tend to harmonize the work of the three jurisdictions, and promote fraternal feeling and the best interests of the Rite in the three divisions of the old land. The circular shows that *seven* new Chapters of Rose Croix, covering the Subordinate Bodies, have been established the past year in England and the Colonial Dependencies, a proof of the substantial progress of this influential Council.

SCOTLAND.

The annual reporter of this Supreme Council has come to our hand,

which is simply a volume containing a synopsis of all of its meetings from the 1st May, 1892, to the 1st May, 1893. It will be seen, by a perusal of this, that the Council holds its sessions about every month, transacting its business from time to time like a Subordinate Body, and like the English Council, passes judgment upon all applications for the 31° and 32°, administering these degrees in its own bosom, the 30th being entrusted to bodies of that degree, of which they have one in Edinburgh for Scotland, and five others in the Dependencies. The number of 31° and 32° members is very limited, there being only twenty-two Thirty-Seconds, and twenty-four Thirty-Firsts in all Scotland; and only two Thirty-Seconds, and five Thirty-Firsts in all of its Colonial Dependencies, a very different state of things from what obtains in this country and the United States. No doubt it is in accord with the original intention of the Rite, and this conservatism is calculated to make these Consistory degrees as rare, and valued as highly, as the 33rd is in this country. This Council is composed of nine dignitaries or officers, with four Past Actives, who seem to have retired permanently leaving the sole attendants only nine. In accordance with an agreement between the three British Councils already spoken of, this Supreme Council arranged with the English Body to visit together the Supreme Council of Ireland on the 21st June last. SIR MICHAEL R. SHAW STEWART resigned the office of Sov.'. Grand Commander, and the Council elected the EARL OF KINTORE as his successor.

SAN DOMINGO.

The difficulty which existed in the Rite in this Country, and referred to last year, still remains unsettled, nevertheless, having examined into the case as thoroughly as it were possible, and going to the bottom of the dispute, I feel convinced that our course is to continue to recognize the old Council as presided over by our own Honorary Member, JACINTO DE CASTRO, and this course is that pursued by the Supreme Councils for the Southern Jurisdiction United States and for England. I therefore recommend the Council to appoint a Representative there in the place of the late lamented Bro.'. LUCAS GIBBES, who formerly acted for us in that capacity, and I suggest the name of EUGENIA DE MARCHENA, the Secretary-General of that Council.

REPRESENTATIVES.

It appears to be a question now exercising the minds of many Masons as to whether the office of Grand Representative is of any real service, and whether it is not one more of honor than of usefulness, and I notice that some of the Grand Lodges of the United States have abolished the office and cancelled their appointments. MACKEY says, that "While the system does not appear to have been effectually carried out in all its details, it has at least been successful as a means of more closely cementing the bonds of union between the bodies mutually

"represented." If even such be the result, it certainly must have effected, and will continue to effect a good purpose, and I consider if the duties of the office are faithfully performed, it can be made a medium of much usefulness by Representatives keeping up a regular correspondence with the Grand Body they represent. Some years since one or more of the Representatives near this Council did this, and much interesting information was obtained of Masonic doings and happenings in other countries which would not otherwise have come to our knowledge. I therefore suggest to and request the Representatives of Foreign Supreme Councils near us to open up a correspondence with *our* Representatives near these Supreme Councils and impart the information they obtain from time to time to this Council. Having, therefore, a desire to see all vacant appointments to this office duly filled, I reviewed, with the Secretary-General the whole list, and found the following Councils unrepresented near us, and instructed the Grand Chancellor to communicate with them and to recommend various brethren of this Council for appointment, viz. :

These Bodies have all been addressed, and doubtless some of our Illustrious Brethren have received their appointments and, if so, we shall be glad now to welcome them. In the matter of our Representatives near other Councils, I noticed that no appointment had been made near the Supreme Council of England since the death of Ill. Bro. COL. SHADWELL H. CLERKE, and I instructed the Chancellor to offer the office to Ill. Bro. HUGH D. SANDEMAN, the Secretary-General of that Supreme Council, a brother who has always been most kind and courteous to this Council. As requested by the Council at the last session, I communicated with Ill. Bro. D. B. TRACY, who, for so many years had acceptably represented us near the Supreme Council, Northern Jurisdiction, U. S., and informed him that this Council had conferred upon him Honorary Membership, and at the same time had relieved him of the duties of the office of Representative. I also requested the Chancellor to write Ill. Bro. ENOCH T. CARSON, of Cincinnati, offering him the appointment, and Bro. CARSON having accepted it, the Secretary-General prepared and sent our Exequatur to him, as Representative near the Supreme Council Northern Jurisdiction, United States.

The following are the Councils, in addition to the above, near which we have no Representative, viz. :

Colon for the West Indies,
 Argentine Republic,
 Egypt,
 New Granada.
 Portugal,
 San Domingo.

In the matter of Colon, we have offered the appointment to Ill. Bro. MANUEL N. OCEGO, the Secretary-General, who so often has been applied to by this Council to extend courtesies to members of the Rite travelling in Cuba, and who has invariably manifested the true characteristics of a Scottish Rite Mason by his hospitality and kind attention to all those who were fortunate enough to present our letters of introduction, and I will, with your approval, during the coming year, endeavor to have the other vacancies filled by appointment of brethren recommended by the respective Councils.

During the past year the Secretary-General received a letter from the late Ill. Bro. HUTTON, who was the Representative of the Supreme Council of England, enclosing a letter from that Council complaining of the action of Nova Scotia Consistory in conferring the higher degrees upon English-made members of the Rose Croix. From the conversation of Bro. HUTTON at the last session, we were led to believe that complaint might be made at some time in this direction, and now that it was made in this grave manner, I at once replied to Bro. HUTTON that we were aware that our Consistory at Halifax had been conferring degrees upon English-made 18° members, properly affiliated with our Chapter of Rose Croix in that City, and that there was no law of ours, or international understanding against it, and our Consistory was justified in doing as it had done, it being a rule of the Supreme Council of England (not of our Council) which forbids *its* members receiving any further degrees *outside* of *its* Jurisdiction without *its* sanction, and therefore it was a dispute between it and its members. Nevertheless, I would issue a circular forbidding our Bodies from conferring degrees henceforth upon English made members of the Rite unless they have the consent of that Council. A copy of the circular issued, as also copies of the correspondence are attached hereto, by which it will be seen that my action was entirely satisfactory to our friends on the other side of the water, and I trust will be also to this Council.

HOME MATTERS.

The Illustrious Deputy for Nova Scotia wrote, calling my attention to his report of last session, wherein he announced that Keith Chapter Rose Croix had been making innovations in the Ritual of the Annual Easter Ceremonies, which, by the way, the Committee on the Doings

of Inspectors-General and Special Deputies failed to take notice of, and intimated that the subject had been referred to me. His letter, which is attached hereto, goes at length into a description of certain novelties which the good brethren of Halifax had been adding to, or rather substituting for, the regular and prescribed Ritual, and he ended by expressing the hope that the brethren there would not be interdicted in the use of these *new ceremonies*, as it would tend to lessen the enthusiasm which their adoption had generated, and would, in his opinion, injure the Rite, particularly the Rose Croix branch of it. I wrote him that it was late in the day to ask for permission to do what they had been already practising, and going somewhat fully into the matter I gave my views on the irregularity of the movement, stating, however, that as this Council would meet before they would require to observe this Festival again, that they should send me a full and complete programme, so that I could lay it before the Council at this session. This they did, and I now submit it and the full correspondence on the subject, and will refer it at once to a special committee to go fully into the matter and report at this session.

NEW FOUNDLAND.

Ever since this Province came under the regime of this Supreme Council we have been desirous of establishing, at least, one Body of the Rite in this Territory, and we had hoped to have accomplished this through the late Bro. SMITHERS, who had a special patent from us empowering him to do so. This he failed in doing, and so far the Province is without the Rite. Sometime since a brother residing in St. John's, who formerly lived in the Southern Jurisdiction, United States, and who was enthusiastic for this Rite, having been an active worker in it in the south, wrote the Secretary-General of the Southern Jurisdiction asking what steps he could take to establish a Body in this town, and he was kindly referred to our Secretary-General, and between these two brethren a correspondence has been going on which may, in time, eventuate in our introducing the Rite into that locality. We think, from knowledge we have gained of the ground, that there are enough Masonic Bodies there at present.

Reports now in the hands of the Secretary-General, I am told, will show the progress which the Rite is making throughout our Jurisdiction. This is especially evidenced by the great advance made in the halls and appointments of many Bodies. It is most gratifying to learn that in nearly all the larger places new and beautiful rooms have been secured and fitted up specially for the use of this Rite with complete outfits in the way of paraphernalia, showing that the Rite here has got over the days of its infancy, and this progress in the way of increased facilities is a guarantee that the work is being properly carried out, as it will be always apparent to the active worker that the beautiful

and impressive ceremonies of this Rite cannot be exemplified properly without the necessary and fully-described halls and appointments. All this, however, will be more fully shown in the Reports of the Illustrious Deputies. *Apropos* to the question of the progress we are making, I think the fact that in so many localities successful Reunions are being held is a true indication that the work is going grandly on, as a careful observer of the progress of the Rite in the United States will not fail to see, that as soon as the Rite begins to prosper in any City, the brethren commence to have these annual gatherings which so much tend to spread the cement of brotherly love and to stir up a wholesome emulation as to who can best work, and in this connection I acknowledge with thanks invitations to attend Reunions at Toronto, Ottawa and Winnipeg. I was privileged to be present at the former City, and witnessed work in Toronto Lodge of Perfection which could not be excelled anywhere. I was accompanied by Ill.^s Bros. MURRAY, MASON, BALLARD and others from Hamilton, and we were royally entertained. I was prevented from being at Ottawa or Winnipeg, but from those who were there I learned of their complete success. I was, of course, at home with my brethren of Hamilton at their Thirteenth Re-union in January last, which was, as usual, well attended by brethren from the United States and from many places in our own Jurisdiction.

VISITATIONS.

I have not during the year visited the Bodies of our Obedience, nor do I intend to do so, systematically, in the future, as this is the duty of the Illustrious Deputies whom we have elected over the Provinces, and as these brethren are so well versed in all that pertains to the Rite, it becomes unnecessary for the Grand Commander to add this duty to those which already devolve upon him.

OFFICIAL ACTS.

I have not been called upon to perform any official act other than those already mentioned, excepting the confirmation of the By-laws of Toronto and Winnipeg Lodges of Perfection.

RITUAL.

With the distribution of the revised text of the 32^d the work of the Committee on Ritual is nearly completed, but there remains yet the perfecting of the ceremonies of Installation for each of the Bodies and the ceremonies of the 33^d. Let me urge the Committee to complete these at the earliest possible moment.

I learn from our painstaking Secretary-General that the progress of the Rite is shown, not only in the advances already spoken of, but by the revenue of the Supreme Council, which, for the past year, exceeds that of any former year. I congratulate you, my brethren, on this happy

condition of affairs, which I attribute, not as the result of any special effort the past year, but as the natural result of the well ordered and good management of former years. May we go on prospering. Consecrated as we are to the service of the A. . and A. . S. . Rite let us all work together in harmony, having our eye single and but one purpose in view—the attainment of the ideal which this Rite holds forth viz., The Glory of God and the Interests of Humanity.

ONTARIO.

To the Supreme Council 33°, A. & A. S. Rite for the Dominion of Canada :

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN :

In reporting the condition of the Rite during the year, I have to express my regrets that it has not been possible for me to discharge the duties of Deputy in such manner as I could have wished.

I have been able only to visit the Bodies at Hamilton and Toronto, all of which, as will be seen from the returns made, are in a good healthy condition, and from all information received those in Ottawa, London, Kingston, Guelph and Barrie have been able to maintain their former efficiency.

The Rite in Windsor has not, however, made any progress, and, after consultation with members of the Supreme Council, the Brethren decided to surrender their warrants.

The various returns made to the Secretary-General showed healthy progress having been made in this Province, which must be gratifying to the Supreme Council.

During the past year I have issued dispensations to Barrie Lodge of Perfection on 1st April to enable Barrie Lodge of Perfection to elect their officers on 9th April, the regular day for such election having passed without their having done so ; and to Murray Chapter to confer 18° at their reunion on such brethren as were then applicants for that degree, and only received the degrees of the Lodge of Perfection on the first day of their reunion. For the last named dispensation I received a fee of \$1, which is herewith transmitted to you.

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It is with much regret that I find myself unable to attend the approaching meeting of the Supreme Council, and have to ask that my absence be excused. When I accepted the office of Deputy for Ontario I expressed my fears that I might not be able to discharge the duties of that office so thoroughly as they should be discharged, and if the Supreme Council can, by appointing some one in my stead, secure the efficient discharge of the duties of that office, they will accept this as my resignation. I am quite aware that this is my loss in many ways, but the first duty which I owe your Body is to help and not hinder the proper supervision of the various Bodies owing allegiance to the Rite.

The brethren of Toronto, by resolution passed some time ago, deputed me to invite the Supreme Council to hold their next Session in Toronto, and at that time I expected to be present with you and move such resolution in person. I hope, however, that in my absence the brethren will, when considering the motions for the next place of meeting, decide to honor the Toronto brethren by selecting this city as the place of meeting for 1894, and I can assure you that the compliment will be thoroughly appreciated and a warm welcome given. I do think that the zeal and efficiency of those brethren who have now in charge the conduct of the Rite in Toronto is deserving of your best consideration, and that while the principle obtains of the Supreme Council meeting at other places than in Montreal, the Toronto brethren may fairly look forward to the pleasure and honor asked.

It gives me sincere pleasure to report that the Scottish Rite, as may be seen by the returns which have been duly forwarded to the Secretary-General, is making a steady and marked progress in this Province, and that the utmost harmony and fraternal feeling prevails among the several Bodies both in Montreal and Quebec.

In Montreal a large increase has been made in our membership, and I am most happy in being able to announce that the debt which has been hanging over our heads since the institution of the Rite here, has at last been liquidated, and the brethren who so generously came forward to our aid in the early days have all been reimbursed : and it is all the more gratifying since no effort has been made to unduly increase our membership for the mere sake of the fees, but on the contrary no

one has been honored by admittance to the Rite save those who have in Craft Masonry proved themselves to be active, energetic and liberal-minded brethren.

NOVA SCOTIA.

*To the Supreme Council A.: & A.: S.: Rite for the Dominion of
Canada :*

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN :

During the past year I have not been called upon to exercise my authority as Deputy except to grant dispensations to three brethren to receive the 31° and 32° within the constitutional time, as they were leaving the Province.

The three bodies in Halifax have done very well indeed, considering that they have adopted the very questionable plan of closing down during the summer months. This summer there was, perhaps, a decent excuse for it, as nearly every Mason was interested in a Masonic Fair held in the interest of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, and which resulted, I understand, in a net profit of about \$5,000. The chief promoter of the Fair was Ill. Bro. BOILEAU, 32°. The A. & A. S. Rite had a very handsome booth in the form of a chapel, the credit of which is entirely due to Ill. Bro. W. C. SMITH and Mrs. SMITH. The ladies representing the Rite in the march and booth looked very attractive in their military uniforms of scarlet and white.

Victoria Lodge of Perfection 14° has made some 14 new members. The number withdrawn (13) looks somewhat out of proportion, but they are the names of brethren connected with either the army or navy who have left this station, or of brethren who have made their homes in the United States. The Lodge is free of debt, has about \$100 in the treasury and about 25 accepted petitions. So I think I can say that the future looks bright.

Keith Chapter, Rose Croix, I regret to say is not in the same flourishing state, as it is in debt to the extent of about \$130, but there is plenty of work ahead so that by the end of the year I hope to see it with a much better rating. The Chapter has already half a dozen accepted petitions and many more to follow. The Sov. Gr. Commander will draw your attention to the *Easter Ceremonies* as practiced by the Chapter. It is the earnest desire of the brethren that they may be allowed to continue this service. It has become an event eagerly looked forward to by every member of the Rite and their friends, and has certainly been productive of good to the Rite and I think has given a higher tone to Masonry in Halifax.

Nova Scotia Consistory has made four new members, is free of debt and rejoices in a surplus of \$130. It is the feeling among the members that the 31° and 32° shall in future be more difficult of attainment, and should be reserved for brethren who have rendered distinguished services to Masonry.

Cumberland Lodge of Perfection, in Amherst. I regret that I have not been able to visit, but from what I hear it has not been successful, not having met since last March. I trust, however, that I may yet liven it up, though I cannot say that I have any great hopes of its ultimate success. We have had some very good material coming in from Yarmouth, N. S., and may in the future establish a body in that pushing and lively town.

In conclusion I may say that in spite of one or two drawbacks, I do not think that the prospects of the A.: & A.: S.: Rite in Nova Scotia ever looked brighter than at the present. Great interest is being taken in every branch of Masonry and a fine class of material is coming forward. As for our own material, it is, and always will be, the best. The Halifax bodies have very comfortable apartments and have paid off all outside indebtedness, so their furniture, &c., is now their own property, and there is every indication of a prosperous year before them. I trust that the next annual report will not deal so much with a roseate future, but with solid, established facts.

session, he considered it his duty to tender his resignation of the office of Deputy for the Province of Manitoba, and his Active Membership in the Supreme Council.

On motion of Ill.: Bro.: EDWARD LUSHER FOSTER, it was unanimously resolved not to accept Bro.: BELL'S resignation from either of those positions.

Ill.: Bro.: ANGUS WILLIAM HOOPER gave notice that at the next Annual Session he would move that Article 5 of the Statutes and Regulations be amended by inserting the words "and Past Active" after the word "Honorary," so that the Article, when amended, shall read, "Active Members of the Supreme Council shall be elected from the rank of Honorary "and Past Active Members at the Annual Session by *viva voce* "vote."

Petitions from brethren residing in Vancouver, B. C., for warrants for a Lodge of Perfection and a Chapter of Rose Croix were presented, and on motion were referred to the Grand Commander and to Ill.: Bro.: JOHN V. ELLIS, Deputy for that Province.

The Supreme Council was called off for luncheon at 1:15 o'clock p. m.

SECOND EXECUTIVE SESSION.

The Supreme Council resumed labor in Executive Session at 2:15 o'clock p. m.

On motion of Ill.: Bro.: HUGH ALEXANDER MACKAY, Ill.: Bro.: BRENTON DANIEL BABCOCK, 33°, an Active Member of the Supreme Council of the Northern Jurisdiction of the United States of America was elected an Honorary Member of this Supreme Council.

Ill.: Bro.: BABCOCK was then introduced and welcomed, and in happy language tendered his thanks for the great honor conferred upon him.

The Illustrious Deputy for the Province of Ontario by letter nominated Ill.: Bro.: _____, 32°, of _____; Ill.: Bro.: _____, 32°, of _____; and Ill.: Bro.: _____, 32°, of _____

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Sublime Princes of the Royal Secret, to be Honorary Inspectors-General, 33°.

Ill. Bro. HUGH ALEXANDER MACKAY gave notice that at the next Annual Meeting of the Supreme Council he would move, the motion of which he had given notice at the Session of 1892, and which he was not prepared to take up at this Session, viz., that the following words be added to Article 5 of the Statutes and Regulations, "After proposition by the Deputy of the Province in which the brother resides, at the previous Annual Session, and good notice has been given to each Active Member by the Secretary-General."

The Supreme Council resumed labor in General Session at 3 o'clock p. m.

On motion of Illustrious Brother ANGUS WILLIAM HOOPER, the Chairman of the Committee appointed at the last annual session to prepare and present an address to Ill. Bro. JOHN V. ELLIS, 33°, Past Grand Commander, on his retiring from office, was instructed to proceed to St. John, New Brunswick, to make the presentation, and in the event of the other members of the Committee being unable to go, to select other members to accompany him.

The Special Committee on the Easter Sunday Observances, as practised in Keith Chapter, Halifax, reported as follows:

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN.

The committee to whom was referred the question of innovations introduced into the ceremonies of Easter Sunday by Keith Chapter, Rose Croix, at Halifax, Nova Scotia, beg leave to report,

1st.—They fully endorse the action taken by the Sovereign Grand Commander in his ruling that it is not permissible for any Subordinate Body of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite to introduce any change of Ritual or any alteration of ceremonial observances, the Supreme Council alone being competent to take the initiative in any such matters.

2nd.—They recommend that the observance of the Easter Ceremonies as at present carried out by Keith Chapter be sanctioned for one year,

in order that the Supreme Council may have further time for the due consideration of so important a matter.

3rd.—They recommend that the whole subject be referred to the Ritual Committee to be fully reported upon at the next meeting of the Supreme Council.

The Committee on the Doings of Inspectors-General and Special Deputies reported as follows :

To the Supreme Council A. & A. S. Rite for the Dominion of Canada.

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN—

The Committee on the Doings of Inspectors-General beg leave to state that they have examined the Reports from the different Provinces, and that although, to a slight extent, the progress of the Rite has not been all that we would desire, yet still, on the whole, a general advancement has been made.

The Deputy for Ontario expresses his regret that he has been able to attend the meetings of the Bodies at Hamilton and Toronto only, but has been in communication with the other Bodies under his jurisdiction, and with one exception they have again sustained the high reputation that they have earned in the past.

The Committee regret that it has been considered advisable by the brethren at Windsor to surrender their Lodge and Chapter warrants, but under the circumstances no other course appeared to be open to them.

The Committee regret that the Deputy for Ontario was unable to attend the meeting of the Supreme Council, but assure him that his absence has not lessened in any degree the esteem in which he is held by the brethren of the Rite.

The Committee are glad to report that in Quebec, against many disadvantages, good work has been accomplished, and that the good fellowship that for so many years has existed amongst the brethren in that Province is still manifest to those who have the pleasure of attending the meetings of our Supreme Council in Montreal.

This Province has been particularly unfortunate owing to the loss by death of two of the most loved and most honored members of the Rite, Ill. Brethren HUTTON and WALKER, both of whom have done invaluable work for our Rite in the Valley of Quebec.

The report from the Deputy for New Brunswick is brief, but it is gratifying to find that he is in a position to say that the Rite is making steady progress in his jurisdiction. This to a great extent may be attributed to the visit of the Supreme Council to the City of St. John, but it is possible also that another circumstance, which may not be mentioned here, may possibly still further advance the interests of the Rite in this Province.

The most noticeable event during the past year in Nova Scotia appears to have been the holding of a Masonic Fair in the interest of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, at which our Rite took a prominent part. The Fair was eminently successful, and it is a matter of gratification that a part of the success can be attributed to Scottish Rite members. With but little exception the report of the Deputy is very favorable, and we have pleasure in congratulating the members of the Bodies in Halifax in possessing apartments perfectly free from debt.

The Committee are glad to learn that notwithstanding one or two drawbacks the Deputy reports that the prospects of the Rite in Nova Scotia never looked brighter than at the present time, and that every care has been exercised in selecting candidates worthy of the honors granted them.

The Deputy for Manitoba again reports that the Rite in his jurisdiction is active and progressive. The Committee very much regret that for reasons stated by the Deputy his presence at our meetings is practically prohibited. The well-known zeal of our Deputy for Manitoba manifested through so many years, and at times under most difficult circumstances has made his visits all the more pleasing, and his absence all the more regretted.

Taking the reports as a whole the Committee feel that much progress has been made, and that the Rite has been more firmly established. As is the case in all institutions there has been a little falling off here, and a little lukewarmness there, but the result on the whole cannot but be satisfactory to every lover of the Rite.

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN:

The able and concise manner in which the Sov.: Gr.: Commander has presented his First Annual Address renders the duty of the committee to whom it has been referred a pleasing one.

With him we mourn the loss which our Council has sustained by the deaths of our dearly-loved brethren, Ill.: Bros.: HUTTON, REID and WALKER, and sympathize with our sister jurisdictions who have likewise been deprived, through the same melancholy cause, of many of their most active members.

The presence of members of our Supreme Council in Chicago, and the fraternal reception accorded them cannot fail to draw even closer the bonds of fraternal union which have ever existed between the Councils of the Northern Jurisdiction and ourselves.

Your committee note with pleasure the remarks of the Sov.: Gr.: Commander as to the conservatism displayed in Scotland in restricting the conferring of the Consistory degrees in that country, and feel the subject is one well worthy the consideration of our own Supreme Council, as they are clearly of opinion that the grading by Consistories of the 31° and 32° would greatly enhance their value.

We concur in the recommendation that Ill. Bro. EUGENIA DE MARCHINO be appointed as our Representative near the Supreme Council of San Domingo.

We recognise the advisability of continuing the office of Representative at sister Supreme Councils, as, in the words of the Illustrious MACKAY, the system has been the means of more closely cementing the bonds of union between the bodies they represent; and we are glad to find that so worthy a successor to the late Ill. Bro. SHADWELL H. CLERKE, has been found in the person of Ill. Bro. HUGH D. SANDEMAN, and that and so eminent a brother as Illustrious Brother E. T. CARSON has been appointed as our Representative near the Supreme Council of the Northern Jurisdiction of the United States.

It is a matter for congratulation that the action of the Sup. Gr. Commander in issuing the circular forbidding the conferring of the Consistory degrees upon Rose Croix brethren belonging to English Chapters without the consent of their own Supreme Council has given entire satisfaction to that body.

As a special committee has been appointed to investigate the innovations made in the ritual by the Keith Chapter of Rose Croix, the remarks made thereon by the Sovereign Grand Commander call for no comment on our part.

We coincide with the ideas of the Sup. Gr. Commander as to the inadvisability of introducing the Rite into Newfoundland without very good assurances that its establishment there would prove a success.

We note with satisfaction the progress the Rite is making throughout the Dominion as evidenced by the improvement in the halls and appointments of the various Bodies, but consider that the Annual Reunions, which tend so much to bring the brethren closer together, should, as much as possible, be devoted to the conferring of degrees upon brethren from a distance, so as not to diminish the work and interest of the regular meetings.

In conclusion we congratulate the Supreme Council upon the continued and increased prosperity of the Rite as shown by the various returns, and upon the disinterestedness and zeal evinced by the officers of the various bodies.

Ill.: Bro.: ISAAC HENRY STEARNS, in accordance with his notice of motion given last year, moved that Article 19, Section 2 of the Statutes and Regulations be amended by striking out the word "four" following the words "from Chapter of Rose Croix covering a Council of Princes of Jerusalem," and inserting in lieu thereof the word "two."

That the words "From Chapter of Rose Croix covering a Lodge of Perfection, and a Council of Princes of Jerusalem, seven dollars" be erased.

That the word "ten" following the words "from Consistory" be altered to "five."—Carried.

Ill.: Bro.: JOHN JAMES MASON expressed a wish for further information before moving the motion of which he gave notice at the Annual Session of 1892, and renewed the notice of motion for next year as follows, viz.:

Ill. Bro. ELLIS made the following reply :

ILLUSTRIOUS BROTHERS MACKAY, HOOPER AND NELSON :

The Supreme Council have, in their kindness of heart, and in their affection for me, greatly over-estimated my merits. Such labors as I have given the Rite in any capacity have been to me but the performance of pleasurable duty, and I am sure they do not deserve the magnificent testimonial which is now before me. Nineteen years have elapsed since we first came together in Supreme Council, and in all that time my association with my fellow members has been to me a constant pleasure. Not only have I been able to enter into fraternal relationship with devoted members of our Rite in different parts of this continent, but I have the strongest evidence of the strength of friendships formed in the fact that you, Illustrious Brother MACKAY have come nearly a thousand miles, and you, Brothers HOOPER and NELSON, nearly five-hundred miles from your homes, to make this presentation to me among my brethren and companions, and to convey to me the sentiments of affectionate regard which are so heartily and so happily expressed in this address. I could have no better proof of your good feeling. Convey to the other members of the Supreme Council expression of the pleasure which this occasion has given me. Tell them for me how heartily my wife will receive this token of their good-will, and say that she will be glad as the years come round to go with me to the place of our Annual Sessions. I accept with delight the handsome and costly piece of silver which you present me, and with even greater delight do I receive from you this beautifully-engrossed and artistically-finished address, in which you have embodied your sentiments. I shall retain both through life, and deliver them to my children as precious heirlooms

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indicating the fraternal esteem with which my too lenient brethren of the Supreme Council regard me."

The piece of plate accompanying the address is a solid silver epergne of beautiful design, bearing upon the shield at its base the arms of the Supreme Council and other Masonic designs, and also this inscription: "Presented to Ill. Bro. JOHN VALENTINE ELLIS, 33°, by the Supreme Council of the A. and A. Scottish Rite for the Dominion of Canada, as a mark of regard and esteem on his retirement from the office of Sovereign Grand Commander."

The meeting was well attended, upwards of fifty brethren being present, including the Active Members of the Supreme Council residing in New Brunswick, with the exception of Ill. Bro. BENJAMIN LESTER PETERS, 33°.

After the Lodge closed the brethren proceeded to the banquet hall, where the usual toasts were given, many of the brethren expressing pleasure at having been called together for the purpose of assisting in a presentation to one who they held in such high esteem.

Your committee cannot close this report without expressing their delight at seeing the handsome, commodious and well-equipped apartments which the Scottish Rite is in exclusive occupation of in the Masonic Hall. The brethren seem determined that nothing shall be wanting for the proper exemplification of the work.

APPENDIX.



FOREIGN AFFAIRS.

From notes and memoranda in his possession the Grand Secretary-General prints some matter which may prove to be of general interest.

SCOTLAND.

On 26th January, 1898, the Supreme Council received from Ill. Bro. SIR MICHAEL R. SHAW STEWART a letter, resigning his office as Sovereign Grand Commander. Bro. SHAW STEWART took this step as he is now rarely in Edinburgh, and it was impossible for him "to devote time or attention to the interests of the Supreme Council." The Illustrious Brother also stated that he had resigned his membership in Grand Lodge, which as Provincial Grand Master for Renfrewshire West, he had held for forty-five years. He sent his best wishes for the prosperity of the Supreme Council. This resignation, with the acceptance of Honorary Membership and subsequent death of Ill. Bro. WILLIAM MANN, Grand Treasurer of the Supreme Council, and for many years a very active figure in the freemasonry of Scotland, brought about important changes in the organization of the Supreme Council, which is now constituted as follows:

In connection with the Supreme Council there are six Honorary Members who were formerly active members; and thirteen Sovereign Grand Inspectors-General who represent the Supreme Council in dependencies of the Crown abroad, one of whom is in China, four are in India, three in New Zealand, three in Queensland, one in the West Indies, and one at Capetown, Africa. There are fifteen Rose Croix Chapters on the roll of the Supreme Council, two of which are in Scotland, and the

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others in the countries where their Inspectors-General live; and six Consistories of the Thirtieth Degree, only one of which is in Scotland. An interesting question arose before the Supreme Council on an appeal from a brother in Sydney, New South Wales, who complained of the ruling of an Inspector-General. This ruling was that only Christians could be admitted to the Rose Croix degree. The brother who appealed was of the Jewish faith. The Supreme Council sustained the ruling of the Inspector-General, and declared that no Rose Croix Chapter of its obedience can admit to that degree anyone who does not profess Christianity. Steps have been taken towards a concordat with the Supreme Council for Ireland similar to that which exists with the Supreme Council for England. By this concordat a brother who enters a symbolic Lodge of the English or Scottish Constitution can only be admitted to the degrees of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite in a body of the Rite of the same nationality as that which he first joined. At the sitting of the Supreme Council 13th October, 1892, the Grand Secretary submitted a letter from the English Supreme Council "As to the conferring upon certain brethren in Africa hailing from Lodges under the Scottish constitution, of the Eighteenth Degree in an English Rose Croix Chapter. The Supreme Council was quite satisfied, from the correspondence, that there had been no intention on the part of the English Rose Croix chapter to violate the concordat, and it was thought that the best way out of the difficulty would be to ascertain from the brethren so admitted if they desired to remain members of the English constitution, or if they would prefer allying themselves to that of Scotland. In the former case this Council would sanction what had been done inadvertently, as it was believed, and this would remove any difficulty." The excellent financial condition of the Supreme Council is evinced by the fact that it has undertaken the enlargement and improvement of the premises in Queen Street, Edinburgh, where its meetings are held. In the enlarged premises the bodies of the Rite in Edinburgh, the Royal Order for Scotland, the Priory K. T. of the Lothians and the Chapter General of the Temple will probably meet.

The retirement of Ill. Bro. SIR MICHAEL R. SHAW STEWART takes from active Masonic work in Scotland a brother eminent and respected. He had filled the office of Grand Master as well as of Sov. Grand Commander, and his Masonic life covers quite a half century. His resignation was accepted with the greatest regret by the Supreme Council, as "they recognized the invaluable services he had rendered to Masonry"; it was their unanimous wish that he should for a further period preside over them, but as "he had otherwise determined, it only remained for the members to tender to him their cordial and hearty thanks for his services in the past, and to convey to him their best wishes for his health and happiness."

Brother WILLIAM MANN'S death had also called forth a warm

expression of sympathy from the Supreme Council, and they said that "although for some time past they were deprived of the active services of their departed brother through failing health, yet they remember with gratitude his unwearied labors for the order while his health and strength permitted, and they will always cherish a kindly remembrance of his amiable disposition and his unselfish and useful work among them." A copy of this resolution was ordered to be sent to the surviving daughter of the late brother. Miss Mann responded in an appreciative note.

Nothing can show more clearly the conservative nature of the management of the Rite in Scotland than mention of the fact that there are upon the roll of the Supreme Council only twenty-two members of the Thirty-second Degree, and twenty-four of the Thirty-first Degree. No brother can receive these degrees until he is elected to them in the Supreme Council.

FRANCE.

The Supreme Council regularly sends us its official Bulletin. It was the good fortune of the compiler of these notes to meet Ill. Bro. RAYMOND, the Grand Chancellor and Secretary-General of France, at the Annual Session of the Supreme Council, Northern Jurisdiction of the United States, at Chicago, in 1893, to hear him respond to the address of welcome given by Ill. Bro. PALMER, to sit by his side at the banquet given by the Oriental Consistory to the visiting members of the Rite; and the pleasure of meeting this courteous and Illustrious brother will ever be a delightful memory. There was very little of particular importance in the Proceedings of the Rite in France in the past year to call for special mention. A Lodge had surrendered its warrant and passed over to the jurisdiction of the Grand Orient for France. The event was an unusual one, and some of the circumstances were of a nature to make the Supreme Council feel that the acts of the seceding Lodge were not as honorable or as fraternal as they should be. A correspondence had taken place between the two governing bodies in France on the subject, which displayed some feeling. The Supreme Council did not recognize the secession of the Lodge, but held that it had been put to sleep, and on that ground demanded from its Master the warrant, books and other property. As the Supreme Council has long made earnest and sincere effort to maintain harmony between the different governing bodies of the Rite in France, the secession of this Lodge is to be regretted, as having a tendency to undo much of the work that it has done. In the annual statements of the affairs of the Rite in France, for some years the Treasurer-General has had to report a deficit. His last statement indicates that the era of deficits is, in all probability, at an end. He expects in the current year to have a surplus. "Courage, then, and confidence, my brothers," he says, and, reviewing the situation, he expresses the belief that the

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Supreme Council will, in all its works, make a good figure and occupy an honorable place in the universal family of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite. In a report by Ill. Bro. MAGNIEN on the work of the Lodges and other bodies of the Rite for the year 1892—delivered in the Grand Lodge Central on 23rd June last—he calls upon the Active Members of the Rite to endeavor to counteract the apathetic feelings which prevail in too many of the bodies, particularly of the higher degrees. He also made some very judicious reflections on the disposition of the age to reject of the past all that had not something in it of the practical and the useful. Thus, he said, with regard to the forms and ceremonies of Freemasonry, the young initiates submitted to them because they must, but they judged them too severely, failing to distinguish in their allegories the philosophic side which they would reveal to the earnest enquirer. On the other hand, all was transformation in this world, and Freemasonry should be submitted to the law of progress. To accomplish her work for the good of humanity she should adapt herself to the exigencies of the modern spirit, not giving herself up exclusively to the expression of ancient formulas, but devoting time and study to the great social questions which are now agitating the world. This is a view worthy of consideration. On the other hand, the remark may be ventured that in the ranks of Freemasonry are to be found some of the most active workers of the day in the interests of human progress, and it may be claimed that our society has at least aided in the development of these men, and helped to equip them for the work which they are doing.

SOUTHERN SUPREME COUNCIL.

In last year's Proceedings of the Supreme Council for Canada brief reference was made to the meeting of the Supreme Council, Southern Jurisdiction, United States of America. The printed report of the transactions of that meeting (October, 1892) have since appeared, the first held for many years without the presence of Ill. Bro. ALBERT PIKE. Twenty-three Active Members several *emeriti* and many Honorary Members were present, and there was great earnestness manifested in the entire business, which occupied several days. The Honorary Thirty-third was conferred upon thirteen brethren. Financial reports submitted showed the monetary affairs of the Supreme Council to be in good condition. Publication of the official Bulletin was ordered to be discontinued as it was too expensive, a conclusion to be regretted, although quite justified. Resolutions were adopted looking to the improvement of the Supreme Council's property in Washington, to the more perfect management of the library, to the paying of mileage and *ad per diem* to members. A bronze medal was ordered to be struck in commemoration of Bro. PIKE. The Supreme Council ordered the calling in of all rituals issued by it of the degrees of the symbolic Lodges, disavowing any control over these degrees, and expressing

regret that one of its Subordinates had illustrated the work of these degrees merely for the purpose of instruction. A resolution looking to union with the Northern Supreme Council, and proposing important changes in the constitution, was referred. The Supreme Council declined to take any action upon papers sent to it by a gentlemen in New York, who claimed to be at the head of a body alleged by him to be a governing body of the Rite. The office of Sovereign Grand Commander being vacant by Bro. ALBERT PIKE's death, Ill. Bro. JAMES C. BATCHELOR was elected to succeed him. He, with the other officers, was installed by Ill. Bro. JOSIAH H. DRUMMOND, Past Sov. Grand Commander of the Northern Supreme Council, who, with Ill. Bro. RAYMOND, Secretary-General of the Supreme Council for France, were among the visitors to the Supreme Council. A departure was made from the usual practice in determining to hold the succeeding meeting at St. Louis instead of in Washington, and to hold it in 1893 instead of 1894. Before the meeting in St. Louis took place Ill. Bro. BATCHELOR, the newly-elected Sov. Grand Commander, passed to his eternal rest. This led to another election in October last, and the officers chosen (for life) are—

The flourishing condition of the treasury enabled the Supreme Council to reduce, by one half, the dues of Subordinate bodies. With the Transactions for 1892 is printed a very finely executed steel engraving of Bro. PIKE. There is a steady growth of the Rite in this jurisdiction, both in membership and in new bodies.

NORTHERN JURISDICTION U. S. A.

The Sovereign Grand Commander has referred, in his address, to the Annual Session of the Supreme Council of the Northern Jurisdiction of the United States, which was held this year at Chicago during the time of the Columbian Exposition. A report of the Proceedings has not yet been issued, but it is known that the Session was remarkable for the large number of Representatives of foreign Supreme Councils which it brought together, and for the lavish display of hospitality on the part of the Oriental Consistory and other bodies of the Rite in Chicago. Several of the foreign Councils sent important suggestions by letter upon matters connected with the aims and purposes of the Rite, but no action was taken upon any of these suggestions, for, notwithstanding the large representation, the attractions of Chicago materially interfered with close deliberations of any kind. The Session was a very harmonious one, and all the reports from the Deputies exhibited the affairs of the Supreme Council in a prosperous and flourishing condition.

SWITZERLAND.

The most important notification from this Supreme Council is in a letter dated Lausanne, 18th September, 1893, announcing the death of Ill.'. Bro.'. RUCHONNET, the Sovereign Grand Commander. By his death the Rite in Switzerland and in Europe has lost one of its foremost members. Bro.'. RUCHONNET had filled the highest position in the country, having been President of the Republic. He was devoted to the interests of Switzerland in every way, and his public career was that of an honorable and unselfish man whose greatest thoughts were for the well being of the people. The secular journals of the day have all borne tribute to his memory. The circular announcing his death truthfully and tersely says that "humanity, Switzerland and the Order have sustained an irreparable loss."

COLON.

Some changes have taken place in the organization of the Supreme Council for Colon with jurisdiction over Cuba and the Spanish Islands. A letter from Havana of 31st March, 1893, announces the election of a new set of dignitaries. The Sovereign Grand Commander is Ill.'. Bro.'. PRUDENCIO RABELL, of Pubill, and the Grand Secretary-Chancellor Ill.'. Bro.'. JOSE GARCIA PADRON. Ill.'. Bro.'. MANUEL N. OCEJO, so long Secretary-General of the Supreme Council, is, it will be seen, relieved from that duty. This Supreme Council consists of thirty-three active members, forty-seven supernumeraries, and fourteen honorary members.

MEXICO.

Under date of May 8th, 1893, this Supreme Council announces the death of Ill.'. Bro.'. MANUEL GONZALEZ, one of its active members and formerly President of the Republic. Brother GONZALEZ was one of the most eminent citizens of Mexico and, by his death, the Rite and the country has sustained a very great loss. On 28th April last, Sovereign Grand Commander, Ill.'. Bro.'. POMBO, delivered an interesting address in which he gave several statements in detail concerning the condition of the Rite in Mexico. Besides the Supreme Council there is a Grand Consistory of the Thirty-second degree; a Grand Tribunal of the Thirty-first; thirteen Councils of Kadosh; thirty-six Chapters of Rose Croix and seventy-four Lodges of Perfection. The Supreme Council is composed of thirty-three active members, and there is quite a number of honorary members. Speaking generally the Rite in Mexico is in good condition.

BRAZIL.

In our proceedings of last year it was stated that the office of Sovereign Grand Commander in the Supreme Council was vacant. This vacancy is filled by the election of the Lieutenant Grand Commander, Ill.'. Bro.'. ANTONIO JOAQUIM DE MACEDO SOARES, to the position.

There is nothing of special importance to note in the Brazilian Freemasonry. Trouble between the Supreme authority and several Lodges in the State of St. Paul caused the issue of a circular on the 31st May. These Lodges have formed a grand authority which they call the "Grand Orient of the State of St. Paul," and the hope is expressed that the Masonic powers will take the resolution to have no part in acknowledging the illegitimate body which is rebelliously constituted against the authority of the Supreme Council. The one great cause of trouble in the Masonic Constitution of Brazil is the aggregation of rites in the "Grand Orient and Supreme Council." But, of course, all regular Masonic powers will recognize the properly constituted authorities. A very excellent "Monthly Bulletin" is published at Rio Janiero as the organ of the Supreme Council. It contains addresses delivered by prominent members of the fraternity, reports of proceedings of various Masonic Bodies, and the official announcements of the Grand Orient and of the Supreme Council. At the present moment, in consequence of the political rebellion in Brazil, the issues in which are being settled by arms, the condition of affairs in that country is not conducive to the progress of Freemasonry, but, no doubt, its softening influences make themselves felt.

DOMINICA.

In the proceedings of last year reference was made to the unhappy condition of the Rite in the jurisdiction of San Domingo. In some way the old Supreme Council was split in twain. There are now two Councils, each with its official organ, each denouncing the other. This Supreme Council has thought it best to acknowledge, as the lawful authorities of the Rite in San Domingo, those brethren and their associates with whom we have held fraternal relations from the date of our formation in 1874. This was the course pursued by the Supreme Council for the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States, and this was also the course of the Supreme Council for England. The latter body has, however, questioned the wisdom of its own action. In a letter to the Supreme Council for Scotland it says: "We are now very much in doubt as to whether we have acted rightly. * * * We feel, however, not only that we cannot constitute ourselves to be judges as to the rights of a quarrel in a foreign Council, but that, if even we were to assume such a position, it would be quite impossible for us to arrive at a sound judgment; our feeling, therefore is that the best course for us to pursue, under the circumstances, will be to cease all masonic intercourse with the Dominica Republic until they can show that they have arranged their internal dissension."

A similar letter was sent to the Supreme Council for Ireland, and it was agreed that the whole matter should be discussed at a conference of the Supreme Councils for the United Kingdom. The plan of the

English Grand Secretary-General was to resign the position which he held as Representative in England for the Dominica Council, and to recall the patent held by the brother who represented England at Dominica.

There is no need whatever for the Supreme Council for Canada to recede from the position which it has taken and to withdraw our confidence from Bro. JACINTO DE CASTRO, whose long public services to his country—he has been President of the Republic, and has held other offices of distinction—and whose masonic career justifies our belief that he would not knowingly unite with or be the chief of an illegitimate body of Masons. At the same time it is well to impress upon the Masons of the Republic of Dominica that if they desire to be respected abroad they must respect themselves. In the two organizations claiming to be the Masonic government of their country there are honorable and worthy men, and they ought to be able to settle among themselves and for themselves a matter which the outside world finds somewhat difficult to understand.

Several communications have been received in the past year from Ill. Bro. EUGENIA DE MARCHENA, Grand Secretary-General; the last two are here printed in full:

Orient of SAINT DOMINGO,

June 12, 1893.

To the Supreme Council for Canada.

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN—

Since last writing you I have received the Report of your Proceedings at the Annual Session of your Supreme Council in 1892. We have read with interest the message of the Sov. Grand Commander in relation to Masonic affairs in the Republic of Dominica, and also what the Committee upon that address have to say.

We are glad to observe that you have carefully studied the subject, and are gratified with your judicious and friendly remarks relative to Brother JACINTO DE CASTRO, LUCAS GIBBES and EUGENIA DE MARCHENA, commending them as old Masons who are incapable of doing any acts unworthy of the fraternity for which and for whose benefit they have constantly labored for many years. Unfortunately Ill. Bro. GIBBES can no longer hear the friendly words in which you have spoken of him.

We regret that you have not sent us your Proceedings anterior to 1892, and do not therefore know what expressions you made concerning our officers in 1891.

You have already been informed that, in consequence of the abuse of their powers, by Lieutenant Grand Commander Bro. PIERRE A. DELGADO and four other members of the Supreme Council of the Thirty-third Degree, the Illustrious Brother MARCHENA, Grand Minister of State,

protested against the violence done by them to our laws, and the Sovereign Grand Commander, JACINTO DE CASTRO, and Bro. GIBBES, the Grand Secretary, resigned their offices, but all three retained and conserved their position as Active Members of the Supreme Council. But they would not, by their presence, sanction the unconstitutional proceedings of DELGADO and his associates.

The protest of the Minister of State being still in force, Sovereign Grand Commander Bro. JACINTO DE CASTRO on 20th September issued a manifesto to the Masonic world in which he explained the motives for his action. Meanwhile DELGADO had himself elected Grand Commander and nominated one MARTIN RODRIGUEZ as Grand Secretary. The effect of the manifesto was instantaneous—all of the remaining Active Members of the Supreme Council, and all the bodies of the jurisdiction save one Rose Croix Chapter using the powers conferred by the Sixteenth Article of the Code of Procedure, accused the violators of the Constitution, PEDRO A. DELGADO, SANTIAGO GERALDINO, RAFAEL ALARDO, FEDERICO GIRONDI and FRANCISCO OLIVA, officers and members of the Supreme Council, and demanded that they should be brought to justice. Article 40 of the Code says, "All Active Masonic functionaries are responsible, and as such are subject to trial." Article 42 says, "The penalties which are imposed are the same as those of Section 2, Title 1, of this Statute, and they include deprivation of offices and dignities, expulsion perpetual from the Masonic Association, or expulsion from the particular body of which the accused is a member. Article 53 says, "The introduction of any charge against a brother for any grave offence takes effect immediately and interdicts him in all the bodies. Article 58 says that all Masons, of every degree, are subject to the same laws

You will understand, that with legislation so close and well defined, the violations of the Constitution and of the organic law by DELGADO and his four companions laid them open to punishment, and the moment the bodies of the Jurisdiction and the remaining legal members of the Supreme Council laid accusations against them in virtue of Article 53 of the code, they were incapacitated from acting legally in Santo Domingo as a Supreme Council. Naturally they would protest against being brought to justice, and would endeavor to prevent that in the way they did, but the Masonic bodies and the Masons of Santo Domingo called upon Illustrious Brothers DE CASTRO, GIBBES and MARCHENA to put themselves at the head of the government of the Supreme Council in a provisional character in order to have Masonic justice imposed upon the recusant brethren named. There was, as you will see, no other way in which to enforce our laws against the group acting as a Supreme Council. These men having been accused under Article 53 of the Code, one of the first acts of the Supreme Council was to call upon Brother MARTIN RODRIGUEZ to deliver up the archives, and upon Brother ALARDO to surrender the funds which he held as Grand Treasurer.

Neither of the two obeyed, and this new offence was duly notified to the fraternity. Freemasonry here has no physical force to make its recalcitrant members act justly and can only rely upon its moral forces appealing to its universal association, and international fellowships to sustain its just demands, and to punish the doer of wrong. RODRIGUEZ retained the archives and ALARDO the funds, putting both at DELGADO's service to serve his ends. They have both been declared personally responsible for the property in their possession.

In October, 1892, the case against them was brought on for trial, and they were condemned for their violation of the constitutions. All the bodies in the jurisdiction applauded the act and all gave their obedience to the Supreme Council save one, the Rose Croix Chapter Redencia, No. 1, which has been declared irregular. You will see, therefore, that our Masonic authority is compact and solidified and there is a general support of the Supreme Council of the Dominican Republic.

Following up the condemnation of PEDRO A DELGADO, SANTIAGO GERALDINO, RAFAEL ALARDO, FREDERICO GERAUDI and FRANCISCO OLIVA, they were suspended from their Masonic rights, the work of Brothers DE CASTRO, GIBBES and MARCHINO was accomplished, and the first and third of these convoked an election to fill the vacancies caused by the condemnation of DELGADO, ALARDO and GERALDINO until the constitutional period in February, 1894 (the time for a general election). The result was that Brother DE CASTRO was elected Sovereign Grand Commander, FRED RAMIREZ, Lieutenant Grand Commander, NOEL HENRIQUEZ, Grand Minister of State, and EUGENIO DE MARCHENA, Grand Secretary-General, in place of Bro. GIBBES, who died in June, 1892.

This, Illustrious Sir and Brother, is the history in outline of all that has happened in the jurisdiction of this Supreme Council.

When DELGADO and MARTIN RODRIGUEZ came to this Supreme Council asking that one of them should take GIBBES' place as a Representative, declaring that he was not a member of the Supreme Council, they declared an untruth in so saying; for when GIBBES resigned the Grand Secretaryship so as not to give his official sanction to the constitutional violations committed by these men, he did not resign his membership in the Council itself.

When Bro. GIBBES died RODRIGUEZ and DELGADO did not announce his death to the Supreme Council. Nor in their paper did they speak of him as an official of the Supreme Council; they did not say a word of the death of this eminent Mason. This fact ought to arrest your attention.

There are not two Supreme Councils in Santo Domingo. The existence of the Delgado-Rodríguez group cannot be earnestly taken to justify the assertion that there is.

We have taken every possible means to win these brethren back, being willing to forgive them their faults and to overlook their errors. We have tried all ideas, schemes and plans to restore harmony and to re-establish the interrupted labors of the Supreme Council. But these men in their pride and determination prefer their evil courses to the harmony of the institution.

We possess the confidence and friendship of the old and loyal Masons, under our control and the active working bodies of the craft in Santo Domingo and we have the respect of the universal Masonry. We trust that you will speedily nominate a successor to our respected and lamented Bro. GIBBES as your representative and guarantor of amity with us, and we are glad that you have determined to maintain your ancient relations with us.

The Supreme Council for Colon have recognized the Delgado-Rodríguez body.

Perhaps it is not necessary to do more now than to remark that a wiser course for our brethren in San Domingo was to retain their positions in the Supreme Council. Brother JACINTO DE CASTRO resigned his office of Sovereign Grand Commander: to whom did he resign?

PROTESTATION.

ILL. BRETHREN—

The advice given you by our circular Number 125 of 30th May has been confirmed, and we regret to acquaint you that the Sup. Council of Colon has resolved to recognize the group of our ex-functionaries and ex-members of the Sup. Council of the Dominican Republic, declared irregular, as the legal Sup. Council of this Jurisdiction.

It has based its decision on false statements furnished by the small group of irregulars who were condemned according to our laws in October 1892, and it has lost out of sight the masonic jurisprudence, acting with the utmost unconceivable partiality.

You have already judged our affairs submitted to your impartial criterion, and notwithstanding that you are well acquainted with our laws, we want to bring forth again the articles of our Constitution, of

our Statutes and of our Penal Code, on which the Bodies of our Jurisdiction have based their impeachment asking that the functionaries and members who had violated our laws on the 5th July 1891, should be submitted to trial.

FACTS.

On the 5th of July 1891 the Lieutenant Gr.: Commander P. A. Delgado, (the Grd.: Commander Ill.: B.: Jacinto de Castro and the Mter.: of State, Eugenio de Marchena being absent,) convened the Sup.: Council for an *extraordinary* administrative Assembly, and, accompanied by *four* GG.: Insp.: GG.:, and against the provisions of the articles 22, 23, 27 & 32 (1) of our Organic Statutes, they legislated enacting a decree by which it was prohibited that there should exist more than one Chapter of R.: C.: in the Capital towns of Provinces and Districts.

By this Decree not only the Statutes were violated, because they provide that at extraordinary administrative assemblies no other affair can be treated than the stipulated head-matter, object of the convocation of the Sup.: Council, but the individual and collective liberty of the K.: of R.: C.: was trespassed upon and the Constitution of May 1891 in its 8th and 11th (2) articles which give large facility to the K.: of R.: C.: to establish or create as many Chapters as they want, was trampled.

Besides the violation of the Constitution and of the Organic Statutes, they committed a transgression giving to this Decree a retroactive effect contrary to the most elementary principles of Jurisprudence and they pretended to *extinguish* two Chapters of R.: C.: having more than a quarter of a Century of legal existence and which were in regular functions-complying with laws they have sworn to observe.

This was a transgression against the 11th article (3) of the Constitution by which it is established that only the Bodies convicted of having attempted against the laws, can be declared irregular.

All the Ill.: Brethren members of the two Chapters respectively addressed the Gr.: Commander Ill.: B.: Jacinto de Castro, requesting the revocation of the said decree, or its reconstruction, withdrawing from it the odious character of retroactivity with which the Grand Chapter had applied the same.

All the other members of the Supreme Council and functionaries, requested the same in order to avoid the probable disturbances and Schism; but, the group of B.: Delgado, usurping prerogatives not conceded by our Constitution, pressed the Sov.: Gd.: Commander Jacinto de Castro,) who was making frat.: officious efforts to conjure the Sup.: Council, fixing the date, out of epoch, violating once more the organic laws.

The Sov. Gd. Commander hurt by this want of respect and consideration presented resignation of his eminent functions, the same as previously had done Ill. B. de Marchena as Mter. of State, before said authority, protested against the violation of the law committed by B. Delgado and his group; and said B. Delgado assumed the attitude of arbitor of the destinies of Scotch Masonry trespassing upon the laws and incurring in unheard of mistakes to uphold the arbitrary, unjust and unconstitutional decree of the 5th of July 1891.

From this accumulation of unfortunate misdeeds emanated the impeachment and trial of B. P. A. Delgado, who had been named G. C.; of B. Fed. Giraudi named G. M. of State; of Br. Raf. Alardo Gr. Tr.;; Santiago Geraldino, Gr. Sword bearer, and Br. F. Iovivo Memb. of the Supr. Co. acephalous.

Ill. B. Jacinto de Castro, Lucas Gibbes and Eugenio de Marchena were called upon to take the reigns of the Masonic Power, with a provisional character, in order to initiate the Trial.

The defaulters were cited in due form in accordance with the prescriptions of the code of proceedings, and they were sentenced for non-appearance and contempt of law, condemned as irregular, being by right deposed of the charges exercised by them at the Supreme C. (4) The action of the Sup. C. of Colon is hence unconceivable and the S. C. of Santo Domingo solemnly protests before the Masonic Powers against such outrage, firmly believing that the Foreign Friendly Powers will disapprove the behaviour of the S. C. of Colon, the result of which may be the indefinite continuation of a schism, which, provoked by the Brethren condemned as irregular, was called upon to disappear shortly, had the decision of the S. C. of Colon not come to afford them its moral support.



DEAR BRETHREN,—

We had hoped that the Angel of Death would for a long season exempt this Council from his pitiless attacks, and that our small band of brothers, so recently deprived of many of its brightest and best members, would be spared to enjoy for many years the association and fellowship of those remaining; but, alas, our hopes were destroyed when the telegram was received announcing the sudden death of our dearly loved and highly valued Brother JAMES FREDERICK WALKER, 33^d, Grand Master of Ceremonies.

We had not had the least intimation that our brother had been ill when the astounding news of his death was received, and, in consequence, the shock has fallen heavier than it would if we had been prepared for the blow.

Our brother had been all his business life in the service of the Grand Trunk Railway Co., and for years prior to his death had filled the important and responsible office of General Traffic Auditor; he was well and widely known, and was universally admired and loved for his many genial qualities and manly virtues.

In our Order he was a distinguished member, and was considered by every one cognizant of his Masonic career as one of the brightest stars in the Canadian Masonic Firmament.

Bro. WALKER was initiated in Victoria Lodge No. 56, C. R., Sarnia, Ont., April 30th, 1872, receiving the M. M. degree on 25th July of that year. He was a charter member of Montarville Lodge under the Grand Lodge of Quebec, and its W. M. in 1877, D. D. G. M. Montreal District 1881, 1882 and 1883, Deputy Grand Master of that Grand Lodge 1884 and 1885, and filled, with the greatest acceptance, the highest office of M. W. Grand Master 1886 and 1887.

Bro. WALKER was exalted a Royal Arch Mason in 1881, and at the time of his decease was Grand Third Principal J of the Grand Chapter of Quebec. But it is as a member of this Rite we are more particularly interested in our deceased brother's career. He received all his degrees of the A. A. S. Rite in the Hochelaga Grand Lodge of Perfection 14°, the Hochelaga Chapter Rose Croix 18°, and the Montreal Consistory 32°, and was the able and efficient Commander-in-

Chief of this latter body. His eminent ability and his many virtues commending him to this Council, he was created an Honorary 33° on 23rd October, 1889, and was crowned an Active Member on the same occasion, and at the last Session was elected our Grand Master o Ceremonies. We mourn his loss; we are sad at the thought that we shall never again enjoy the loving smile and the genuine grasp of his manly hand. We bid him a loving and lasting farewell. May he rest in Holy Peace.

DEAR BRETHREN,—

Another of our old Active Members, the venerable Brother WILLIAM REID, P. . G. . M. . of C. ., having arrived at the allotted age, passed to his long home on Tuesday, the 3rd instant.

Our Brother, although troubled with those complaints incident to old age, had been comparatively well until a few days before his death, when he was attacked with inflammation, which soon carried him away.

Brother REID was initiated into Masonry in Texas about the year 1815, receiving the degrees of the Lodge and Chapter there, and was a delegate to the Grand Lodge of that State over forty years ago. His father's family residing here, our Brother for very many years visited his home every summer. It was during one of these visits that the writer and many of his brethren here became acquainted with him—meeting him in the Lodges in Hamilton where he was (so long as he remained) a constant visitor.

During the war he came north and has remained here ever since. Brother REID at once engaged actively in Masonic work, affiliating with Lodge and Chapter, and was created a Knight Templar in Godfrey de Bouillon Preceptory, and successfully filled the chair in each branch. He was one of the original members of the pioneer body of this Rite at its organization here in 1868 (having received the 32° in Detroit), and shortly became the M. . W. . Sov. . of Hamilton Chapter of Rose Croix, and finally, through hard and meritorious work, attained the high rank of S. . G. . I. . G. . 33°. He was afterwards elected Grand Master of Ceremonies in this Supreme Council, which office he acceptably filled for many years.

Brother REID, although an unassuming, plain man, was possessed of much information, and was an experienced, well-read Mason. He was well and favorably known in the Masonic world throughout the length and breadth of this Dominion, and all who knew him will bear testimony to his worth as a man and a Mason.

It was but six days ago when Ill.: Bro.: REID passed away as already announced, and now the telegraph flashes the dreadful, though not unexpected, news that the vital spark had fled from our much-loved Brother COL. WILLIAM H. HUTTON, 33°, Past Sov.: Grand Commander.

Brother HUTTON had been ill for several months, being afflicted with Bright's disease. Shortly after the trouble developed he was stricken with blindness and, finally, unconsciousness, and his life for some time has been but a living death. Nevertheless, although the blow was expected, it was death when it came.

Our brother was initiated into Freemasonry in St. Paul's Lodge, English Register; was arched in the Royal Arch Chapter attached to that Lodge; for some years occupied the position of District Grand Master over the three Lodges of that City, which are still of the obedience of the Grand Lodge of England. He was the leading spirit in this Rite in that City, having been identified with it from its first establishment there; was created a Sovereign Grand Inspector-General, 33°, at the formation of this Council in 1874, and rose, by eminent ability, to the highest office of Sovereign Grand Commander. He was also Deputy Provincial Grand Master for Ontario and Quebec of the Royal Order of Scotland.

Brethren, a genuine Mason has gone to his rest, beloved by his brethren. May he rest in Holy Peace.







SORROW.

DEAR BRETHREN—

“To our graves we walk,
In the thick foot-prints of departed men.”

Again we forcibly recognize the fact that

“To the past go more dead faces every year.”

Another of our Inspectors-General, and Chief among his equals, has finished his mortal course and followed his predecessor and leader over the border line that divides time from eternity.

JAMES CUNNINGHAM BATCHELOR, 33°, Grand Commander of this Supreme Council of Inspectors-General, 33°, is dead. He died in our House of the Temple in the City of Washington, D. C., July 28, 1893, C. E.

He was of English and Scottish descent; born in the City of Quebec, Canada, on the 18th day of July, A. D. 1818; removed with his parents in his childhood to Western New York; afterwards to Alabama, where he was in part educated, finishing his scholastic course at St. Louis, Missouri. In Alabama he was received into the Masonic household and became active as a Freemason. While yet not a man in years but in stature, he became a member of the “Montgomery Blues,” and was the youngest man in that military company, when in the year 1836 he marched with it to Florida and took an active part in that campaign against the Florida Indians, and returned with it to Montgomery. To him, physically, it resulted in a partial loss of hearing, which troubled him at intervals in his later life. He resided in Alabama for several years thereafter, practicing his profession as a physician and surgeon, having graduated at a medical college in Cincinnati, Ohio. Subsequently he became a citizen of New Orleans, La., which was ever after his home. It was there that in the year 1861 he organized a company for active duty in the Confederate service, of which he was elected Captain. While on duty with his company in the swamps of Louisiana rheumatism fastened its fangs upon him, in which condition he was captured by Federal authority and imprisoned as a rebel for five months at Ship Island. When discharged, for want of proper medical treatment, he was lamed for life, and from that time was forced to rely upon his crutches for aid to walk.

In Louisiana for many years he was active as a Freemason, holding high official station in local Masonic bodies at New Orleans, and in the State Grand bodies. He was Worshipful Master of a Blue Lodge, High

Priest of his Royal Arch Chapter, Grand Secretary of the M. W. the Grand Lodge of Louisiana, Grand Secretary of the Louisiana Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons; of the American system, and in this Rite served officially in its local bodies in that city, culminating as Grand Master of the Kadosh.

In this Supreme Body of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite he was honored on the 14th day of February, 1857, by being invested with the rank of Inspector-General Honorary 33'.

In the year 1859 he was crowned as Inspector General 33' and assigned to active duty as one of the Inspectors General in Louisiana, and served accordingly.

In this Supreme Council, on the 22d day of July, 1878, he was proclaimed Lieutenant Grand Commander, (Bro. JOHN ROBIN Mc-DANIEL, of Virginia, having died May 14, 1878), and on the 18th of October, 1892, was elected for life its Lieutenant Grand Commander.

On the 2d day of April, 1891, Bro. ALBERT PIKE, who had been our Grand Commander from January, A. D. 1859, died. When he realized the fact that he was physically incapacitated for official duty and that the end was near, he sent for the next dignitary in rank, Bro. BATCHELOR, 33', Lieutenant Grand Commander, informed him of the fact and requested him to at once proceed as Lieutenant Grand Commander to exercise the duties and powers of the Grand Commander. He acted accordingly as Grand Commander ad interim, in accordance with our statutes, until the 17th of October, 1892, when he was elected by the Supreme Council Grand Commander for life.

Being an invalid when elected, he, during his term of office, scarce had opportunity to do justice to himself as our Chief. Physically disabled from placing himself right upon the record in the discharge of his official duty as he desired to do, oftentimes, he was misunderstood and annoyed and his official couch was not in a garden of roses. In the discharge of official duty he was just when not mistaken in judgment. He sought to follow Bro. PIKE's official footsteps in all things, and not to deviate in principle or practice from the imprint thereof, and lined his course accordingly. If he failed in so doing it was because physical nature gave way: he did the best he could. Not one of us could do more if so situated.

In the Royal Order of Scotland he was by patent, at its organization in the United States in the year 1878, appointed the first Senior Provincial Grand Warden of the Provincial Grand Lodge of the United States, being as one of its charter members a member of the Grand Lodge of the Royal Order at Edinburgh, Scotland.

In his Masonic course he was frank and true and had the courage to maintain his own convictions as to what was lawful, regular, right and

just. That he deserved well of the order, the Rites to which he belonged (all three) responded thereto by the honors they showed him. While in active life he earned in each a Master's wages and received them from the society he loved so well.

Honored be his memory. Peace to his soul.


His body was embalmed. The funeral services at Washington, according to his wishes, were private and were celebrated by Dignitaries of the Supreme Council, after which his remains were taken to New Orleans, accompanied by a delegation of its members, where the Inspectors General, with the assistance of the Grand Consistory of Louisiana, will honor his memory by appropriate services and deposit the body in his tomb.

Every member and body of this Rite in this Jurisdiction will, on receipt hereof, display the appropriate mourning colors of the Rite for thirty days, in accordance with our usage and law, for which see page 85, Article XVI, Section 1, of our statutes. The chiefs of each organization of the Rite and the Inspectors General are charged with the duty of seeing this order properly executed.

May our Father who is in Heaven have each and all of you in his holy keeping.
