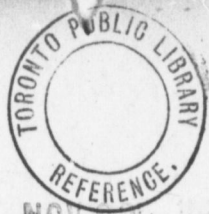

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

SOCIETY, ESTABLISHED IN THE CITY OF TORONTO, IN 1858,

FOR THE

INSTRUCTION OF THE DEAF AND DUMB,
AND OF THE BLIND.

1. The Society shall be designated "The Society for the Instruction of the Deaf and Dumb, and of the Blind," and shall consist of such members as shall pay annually to the funds the sum of \$2, or more.

2. The affairs of the Society shall be managed by a Committee of twenty-two, including the President, the Vice-President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and the Superintendent; to be annually elected by the members, at a meeting to be called for that purpose on the first Tuesday in February; five to form a quorum.

3. An annual subscription of \$40, in one sum, or in several of not less than \$4 each, shall entitle the person or persons contributing that amount, to nominate one pupil for instruction free of charge.

4. Children whose parents reside in Toronto, may be admitted as day pupils, on paying \$20 per annum, quarterly in advance.

5. Children who reside in the country will be received only as boarders, on paying \$140 per annum, quarterly, in advance.

6. The right of admitting pupils is vested in the Committee, who may delegate it to the visiting member, or otherwise.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE FOR 1861.

The close of another financial year brings with it to the Committee of the Toronto Society for the Instruction of the Deaf and Dumb, and of the Blind, the duty of rendering to the Society an account of their stewardship. They enter on their Report with feelings both of pleasure, and regret:—of pleasure that so much has been effected by the agency of the Society;—of regret that so much has been left undone.

The number of pupils resident in the school is at present twenty-one; an increase of nine over the number at the last annual meeting. The number of day pupils remains the same, namely six.

While however the Committee rejoice in the fact that the benefits of education are now being afforded to twenty-seven; they regret to have also to state that the number of applicants for assistance has increased from about sixty in February, 1861, to eighty-six at the present time,—nothing but the want of adequate funds stands in the way of these cases being provided for; and but very slight encouragement would, there can be no doubt, very largely increase the number of applicants.

Within the last few months the Superintendent has succeeded in commencing the instruction of the Blind; and has now three girls and one boy under tuition. The progress made in the short time they have been in the school, under many disadvantages, is a satisfactory proof of the diligence and capability of the teacher engaged in their instruction; and it is to be hoped that some appropriation may this year be possible which will enable the Superintendent to continue the school with increased efficiency: so far the Society has been put to no outlay; the salary of the teacher, Miss Coady, and other expenses being provided by the Superintendent.

The Committee have on several occasions during the last year memorialised the government for additional aid, and in March last they sent Dr. Morris, the Superintendent, as a deputation to Quebec, to urge several matters on the government. His mission was so far satisfactory that it secured the

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doubling of the annual grant; and would have obtained the use of the Parliament Buildings, in Toronto, had they not been subsequently required for military purposes. It is much to be regretted that this disappointment occurred; for every day shows more forcibly the desirableness of buildings, larger, and better suited to the purpose than those now occupied by the School.

During the last few months various blocks of land have been offered to your Committee at reasonable rates, in every way eligible as sites for permanent buildings for the school. Being legally unable to enter into a contract in any of these cases, they brought the subject under the notice of the Executive Council in an urgent memorial; and the matter is still under their consideration.

In connexion with this subject it may be well to mention that eight or nine years ago the Legislature voted the sum of \$80,000 for the express purpose of erecting an Asylum for the Deaf and Dumb, and for the Blind, in Upper Canada; and in March, 1856, the following appears on the minutes of the House of Assembly, "That an humble address be presented to His Excellency the Governor-General, praying that information be laid before this House, as to what steps have been taken to carry into effect the law of this Province, granting twenty thousand pounds for the erection of an Asylum for the Deaf Dumb, and Blind, to be located in Upper Canada." Thus shewing that the Parliament is not only willing but desirous that something effectual should be done for these unfortunate classes.

During the past year the Superintendent in company with the master and some of the pupils visited and held meetings in several towns and villages: much interest was excited in the efforts of the Society, and a considerable sum of money has been paid over to the Treasurer: at Whitby the sum of \$37.35 was realized; at Oshawa \$21.40; at Burwick \$7.73; at Brampton \$36.94; at Rockwood \$13.67; at Guelph (two meetings) \$90.71; at Georgetown \$32.41; at Norval \$21.03; at Lindsay \$13.86; at Peterborough \$34.97; at Stewartstown \$23.78; at Bowmanville \$18.53; at Port Hope \$24.18; at Cobourg \$11.50. Total \$388.06.

In addition to these sums, various amounts have been since collected and sent in from these or places previously visited by the deputation, in all \$324.82

Another very considerable sum has also been paid in, collected by the pupils of various Grammar, Union or Common Schools. Thus the Pupils of the Union School, Port Hope, sent in \$40.00; Norval School \$40; Newmarket Grammar School \$40; Common School \$5.60; Aurora Grammar School \$12.25; Burwick Common School \$20.10; Young Ladies of Bowmanville Grammar School \$13.60; Richmond Hill Grammar School \$8; Hamilton Central School \$97; Rockwood School \$25.40; Grimsby Grammar School \$10. Total \$311.97. The Committee regard this amount with peculiar gratification, as proving the interest taken by the young people of the province in the success of this school; and it is to be hoped the example thus given may be largely followed by the pupils of other schools.

The Committee are much gratified in stating that the following County Councils continue to evince their good will towards the school by still voting money for the support of poor children within their respective bounds, namely, York and Peel, Simcoe, Norfolk, Wellington, Peterborough and Victoria.

The Committee regret to state that in order to keep the school in as efficient a state as possible, they have been compelled to incur liabilities greater than the funds at their disposal will meet: with a view to discharge these at an early date, they have addressed an appeal to all the clergy of all denominations, asking them to bring the subject under the notice of their various congregations. What the effect of this appeal may be, it is impossible at present to conjecture, but as many of the clergy are known to feel much interest in the success of the school, it is thought that a liberal response may reasonably be expected.

In conclusion, the Committee desire to express their heartfelt gratitude to the Giver of all Good, not only for the general success and prosperity of the school under their care, but especially for its exemption from the visitation of sickness, when almost every house in the vicinity suffered severely, particularly from the recent malignant and widely spread epidemic of scarlet fever.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT FOR 1861.

At the presentation of my last report, there were thirteen resident pupils in the school. They now number twenty-one. Three pupils left us recently: one was removed by his father from inability to pay for his board and tuition: another boy I have found it necessary to decline to receive again in consequence of gross misconduct; and the third a girl whose intellect was so deficient that on my representation the County Council which paid for her replaced her by another very clever little girl, whose father had actually withdrawn her, being unable to pay even the small sum at which the Committee had agreed to receive his child. Only one other pupil has left us during the year; a young man who was removed in February, 1861, by his friends who wanted his work.

If the accommodation afforded by the present house was found insufficient last year, it has become doubly so since the pupils have increased to their present number: not only are the bed-rooms barely sufficient in size, but there is no room, isolated or otherwise, that can be appropriated as an hospital in the event of sickness occurring; this point caused me great anxiety during the recent prevalence of malignant scarlet fever in almost every house round us. Through God's mercy, and blessing on the means used, we have been spared the visitation of any epidemic.

Besides the want above named, the room used for dining in, and as a girls' sitting room, is much too small to accommodate our numbers with any thing like comfort.

The yards, and I may say the whole premises, are very imperfectly drained, and the nature of the soil, very heavy clay, causes the deficiency of the drainage to be more marked than it otherwise might be; and in wet weather the want of a dry play-ground is greatly felt, especially by the boys.

The impossibility of separating the boys and girls is a serious evil, and adds greatly to the labour and anxiety of supervision.

With a few exceptions the conduct of the pupils has been very good.

During the past year we have had no cases of serious illness: the health of the pupils has generally improved; owing probably to the regular diet, and careful attention on the first approaches of sickness.

The progress of the Deaf and Dumb pupils is comparatively satisfactory, several of them are now able to express themselves in writing very intelligibly, though of course not yet with strict grammatical accuracy. In saying that the progress has been comparatively satisfactory, I think I may venture to state that it would have been much greater than it is, had they possessed the advantage of a resident male teacher: this from the state of the finances has, I am aware, been impossible; but I do trust that some step in this direction may shortly be practicable. Not only would they be constantly under the necessity of using alphabetic language in their intercourse with one another; but there would be also a constant watch on their conduct; a matter of the greatest import, and which at present can be but very imperfectly attained.

In my last report I stated that I hoped shortly to commence the education of the Blind. I have now the gratification of announcing the fact that since September I have had four pupils, three girls and one boy under tuition. The boy and one girl were with me a little time before the summer vacation, but my arrangements were not then made, so that I may say we commenced on the 1st of September. I found that my original plan of uniting the offices of Matron and Teacher of the Blind could not be carried out, and I engaged Miss Coady to commence their instruction under my direction.

It would be impossible for me to convey a true idea of the difficulties I have found in getting the necessary apparatus made for their use; from the small demand for apparatus for the Blind, there is no depot where such things can be bought, and I have not been able in Toronto to meet with workmen competent and willing to do what I required. I have therefore in several cases been obliged to exercise my own ingenuity for the attainment of my objects. Still, with these hindrances the children have made good and solid progress, all can read the raised characters with more or less facility; all are learning arithmetic by means of a board and pegs: all can do plain

knitting; and all are learning music on a small organ I lately purchased for them. Geography I have not yet commented, having been so far unable to complete a map for their use; but I hope very shortly to have one of the Holy Land ready for them.

Circumstances have interfered to prevent my visiting as large a number of places in the country with a view to raising funds as I did last year; still a considerable sum has been paid over to the Treasurer, amounting in all to \$1024.83, of this only \$712.88 has been the direct result of past or recent meetings. The balance, \$311.95, has been collected by the pupils attending various Grammar and Common Schools, to whom I made an appeal. The particulars will appear in the annual list of subscribers. I feel much pleasure in calling special attention to the amount thus raised, as it has been by children anxious to extend the benefits of education, so liberally bestowed on themselves, to those who are not similarly favoured by Providence. The contributions have for the most part been made in small sums; often only a few cents; yet by combination it is astonishing how much may be done. I trust that some similar plan may be adopted in Toronto, which has this year fallen lamentably short of what it contributed even last year.

HEAD MASTER'S REPORT FOR 1861.

MR. PRESIDENT AND GENTLEMEN,

Whoever reflects on the condition of those whom the Almighty, in his inscrutable will, deprived of the choicest of earthly blessings—the faculties of hearing and of speech—and who, from this defect, are shut out from holding converse with their fellow men, must regard it as an object of no slight

importance, instead of that admirable medium of communication which nature has provided for us, to substitute one, less perfect it is true, yet one, adequate to the wants of an intelligent being, and as free from imperfections as the circumstances of their case will admit of.

We must acknowledge that our thoughts acquire a tinge from the medium through which they pass, and when language is obscure, and unintelligible, there must be confusion of thought, and indistinction of perception. When we reflect, too, that deaf mutes, in the exercise of their reasoning faculties, use natural and arbitrary signs, which form, as it were, the links of that intellectual process which connects the premises with the conclusion, the importance of training the mind of our pupils to attach clearly defined ideas to language, which must of necessity become their vernacular, is apparent.

That the system pursued in our school has been highly successful in developing the reflective faculties of those committed to our care, I am happy to admit, but, that the measure of their attainments in the use of language as a medium of communication with each other, has fallen short of the expectations I had formed, I cannot deny, and as you Mr. President, and gentlemen, are acquainted with, and cannot exercise control over, the hindrance which, in some degree, operates injuriously against the better advancement of the pupils in colloquial forms of speech, and have with the Superintendent done what in you lay to remedy the hindrance complained of, we must only hope for a brighter day to dawn on those "children of silence" who are the grateful recipients of your tender regard.

The number of pupils in attendance at School during the past year is 26, the average daily attendance 23.

The accompanying report of the N. Y. Institution, shewing the progress of those educated there, will, when compared with that of our pupils for the same period of time under instruction, enable you to form a correct estimate of the labours of the teachers and the progress of the pupils during the past year.

The 3rd class, under the care of Miss McGann, have learned

and reviewed 164 lessons in Dr. Peet's elementary work, and 7 sections in "Scripture History for the Deaf and Dumb," with a large vocabulary of familiar phrases compiled by Mr. J. S. Hutton, the talented principal of the Halifax Institution. Alexander Paterson and Anthony Kirkpatrick have learned "the History of Man:" the pupils of this class converse intelligently on various subjects.

The 2nd class, taught by Miss Hamilton, have learned and reviewed 105 lessons in the book referred to, with an extensive vocabulary of the names of familiar objects; the pupils of this class are smart and intelligent, and will soon be able to converse with their parents on home incidents, &c. Norman Lewis, William Cull and Archibald Cameron have learned 150 lessons and 3 sections of Scripture History.

Junior Class, taught by Master, have learned from 20 to 60 lessons, Ellen Baptie, John Hilker and John Loughhead exhibit an average capacity to comprehend the construction of phrases and sentences in the present tense, their progress is quite satisfactory. Edwin Pingle, Kezia Wheeler, Elizabeth Neely, have lately made some improvement; Matilda Hunter James Dean, and Jacob Zimmers, possess a very feeble intellect.

The conduct of the pupils is above all praise, since two refractory boys have left.
