THE GAYNOR-GREENE CASE.

Privy Council Decides in Favor of U. S. Government

John F. Gaynor and Ben J. Greene were indicted in Savannah, Ga., Dec. 8, 1899, charged with embezzlement and defrauding the United States government.

A TOKEN OF REGARD.

Magnificent Silver Tray Presented to Commodore Thomson

BY THE R. K. Y. CLUB. Rev. Lindsay Parker Was the Speaker---Club Has 312 Members--Annual Reports Show Continued Growth and Prosperity.

"Presented by the members of the Royal Kamehameha Yacht Club to Commodore Thomson, St. John, N. B., February 7th, 1905." That is the inscription on the centre of the large and very handsome sterling silver tray presented on behalf of the club to Commodore Thomson at the annual meeting of the R. K. Y. Club last evening.

The valuable piece of plate was the gift of the whole club, as an expression of their warm regard for the commodore. Rev. Lindsay Parker made the presentation speech, in his happiest vein, and Frank J. Likely at the opportune moment brought in the gift. It was a genuine surprise to the commodore, who had been kept in complete ignorance until the moment when Rev. Dr. Parker's reference to a "tangible" expression of regard, and Mr. Likely's appearance with the tray, conveyed the intelligence.

And so deeply moved was he that he could scarcely give expression to his feeling of appreciation of the good-will of the members of the club. There was a very large attendance of members, and the applause that greeted all the officers in their turn showed how strong is the bond of good-fellowship.

The various reports submitted showed that the club last year expended \$2,217.94, and has a small balance in hand. The membership is now 312, and is still increasing. The club houses in the city and Millville and the marine railway at the latter place are in fine condition. Before next summer arrangements will be completed to supply small steam craft with water for their tanks, and more of them will be kept at Millville.

The annual cruise next summer will start on Saturday, July 16th. The yachts will visit Grand Lake, Washampanak and Bellisle, returning to Carter's Point for the annual picnic on the 28th.

The report of the sailing committee advised more squadron races next season, and from the expression of opinion this will probably be arranged, as squadron races arouse much more enthusiasm than mere class races.

THE STEEL REPORT AND TRADE OUTLOOK.

Pittsburgh View of Last Week's Figures of Earnings for the December Quarter---What They Foreshadow For The Future---Can a Common Stock Dividend Be Earned Again?---The Question as to Continuance of the Expanding Profits---Some New Forecasts of the Future.

(Pittsburgh letter in N. Y. Post.) Pittsburgh, Feb. 6.--In and out of Pittsburgh, the United States Steel Corporation's quarterly report was awaited with deep interest for two reasons. One was the 16-point advance in Steel preferred shares and the 11 point rise in common stock. The other was the general view of the future of the steel trade's condition, activity, and profits, not only as reflected by the figures for the quarter ending December 31, 1904, but as they foreshadowed the course of the steel trade's condition, activity, and profits as they may be expected in the future.

HOW LONG THE COURT WILL TAKE THE LAST CHAPTER IN NORTHERN SECURITIES LITIGATION, AND WHEN IT WILL BE CLOSED.

When the United States Supreme Court on Monday granted its usual writ of certiorari to the decision of the Circuit Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit, it indicated that the litigation between the Northern Securities Company and the United States Government is not yet closed.

The hearing does not begin until February 20. The judges may reach an early conclusion, or they may not. It is probable that the case will be argued on February 23, 24, 25, 26 and 27, and that the court will render its decision on February 28.

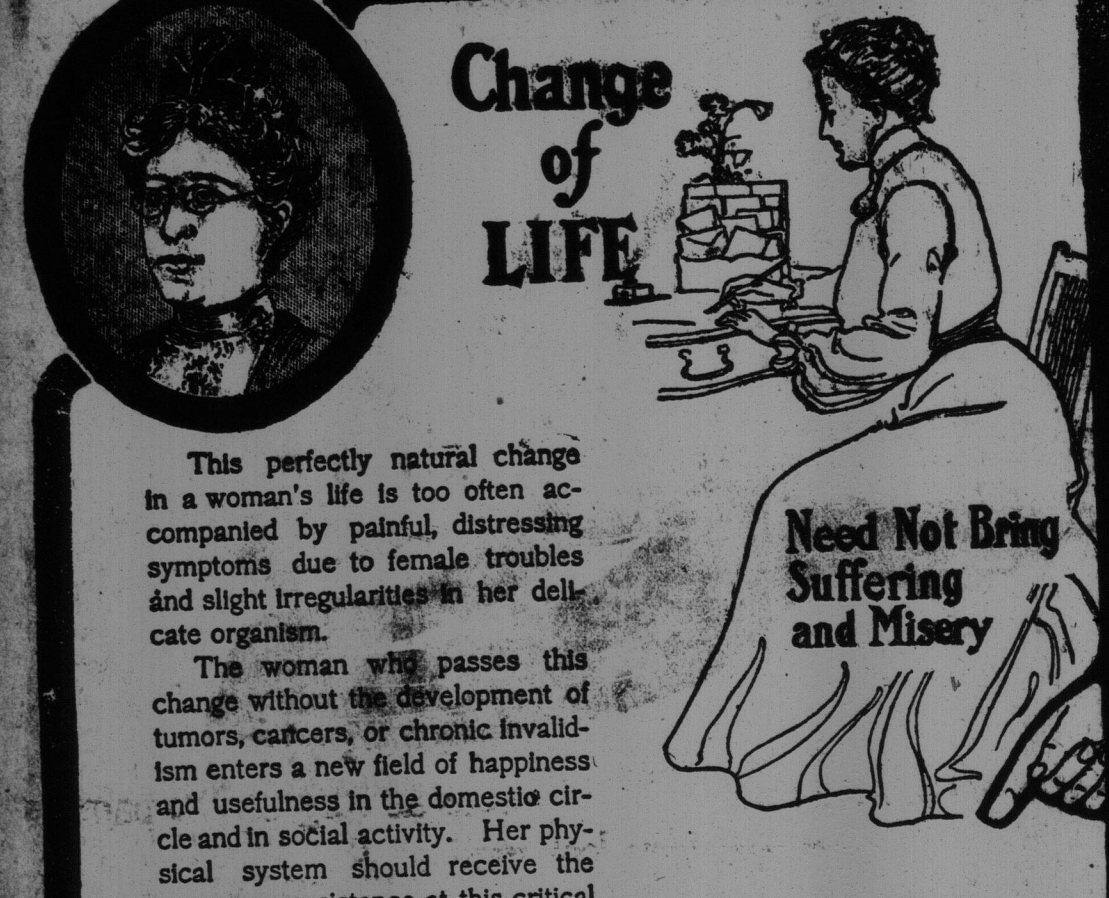
