FOURTH APRIL MAIL.

The steam ship Arrived at Halifax early last Thursday morning, in 12 days from Liverpool. The mail reaching this City on Friday night.

There had been no marked changes in the affairs of the United Kingdom, or the Continent, since the departure of the previous mail.

Business continued gradually to show some signs of improvement.

We subjoin the principal commercial and political intelligence.

LONDON MONTHLY TRADE REPORT.—The London depression in the commerce of the United Kingdom, caused by political disturbances...

The direct operation of these causes in this country has been rather to create strain in our foreign commercial relations, than in our domestic...

The influx of foreigners and of previous absentee Englishmen into London, is giving an impulse to the home trade, and benefiting generally the metropolis.

A house has been erected at St. John's Wood, in the western part of London, by Mr. Lamartine, for the reception of his family.

The air-line containing the head of St. Andrew at St. Peter's, has been robbed of jewels worth 30,000 guineas.

The Provisional Government of Milan has expelled the Jesuits. Fifteen convents of that society in Lombardy have been closed, and their property confiscated.

The total number of slaves landed from prizes taken by British ships of war, and liberated at Sierra Leone, in the fourteen years commencing with 1822 and terminating with 1847, was 36,777.

A vast impulse will, no doubt, be given to emigration by the disturbances in Europe. Certainly, everything at present tends to the aggrandisement of the United States.

The Governor-General of the Philippine Islands had started with a formidable expedition, consisting of three steamers, a frigate, and various other vessels, with a large body of troops...

Five towns in England, namely, London, Manchester, Birmingham, Liverpool, and Leeds, containing 16,000 acres, nearly the area of Rutlandshire, have been declared to be in a state of insurrection.

The Government is said to encourage the emigration of a general class of Englishmen to British North America, in order to colonise the debatable land next the United States frontier.

Both houses of Parliament met on Wednesday, the 22nd inst.—In the House of Lords the following business was given by commission to the following Bill, viz.—The Crown and Government Security Bill, the Exchange-bills Bill, the Mutiny Bill, the Bill for the better regulation of the Superannuation Bill, Public Works Completion (Ireland) Bill, Leases of Mines (Ireland) Bill, and the Kettinger Small Tenements Bill.

The declaration of Lord John Russell, that "while he had breath and life, he would oppose the repeal of the Legislative Union between Great Britain and Ireland," and the passing of the Crown and Government Security Bill, which is now in force, are the two chief events of the month.

Mr. John O'Connell appeared at the Conception-hall on Monday, and issued an address to the people of Ireland, directed chiefly against Lord John Russell's words, above quoted. It was headed "The People of Ireland," and was in the words of Lord John Russell's words, as the title which we regard not.

Mr. John O'Connell has addressed a long letter to the Lord-Lieutenant, through the Pilot, offering him his services, and proposing to him to go to the Downshire declaration, in consequence of the presentation of that document to his Excellency, and not his Majesty in person.

The parties who have been most active in drilling and rifle-shooting have had their arms, in some cases, seized by the military, and some of them having been arrested will, doubtless, be made examples of.

Mr. W. S. O'Brien and his party have proceeded to the south for the purposes of agitation. That they will be successful in their views, is a matter of great doubt, and it is to be feared that the amount of disaffection there can be little doubt, that every thing throughout the provinces seems ripe for an outbreak; but what settled scheme of organisation the parties promoting this movement have beyond our comprehension, it is difficult to say.

A letter from St. Petersburg, of the 26th ult., states the strength of the Russian army at 531,500 men, 136,720 horses, and 2152 guns.

A subscription, headed by her Majesty and Prince Albert, is about to be instituted for the purpose of some suitable memorial to the loyalty and zeal of the working classes of the metropolis in view of the late disturbances.

The Queen's bowler arrived off Portsmouth, from Malaga, on the 27th inst., in the Howe, 1200 tons, and without landing, proceeded in the yacht Fairy to Osborne, on a visit to Queen Victoria. Her Majesty returned in the evening to the Howe, and disembarked at the usual hour.

A second meeting of the Liberal members of the House of Commons was held on Saturday last, when it was determined to bring on the question of electoral reform immediately after Easter. The motion was carried, and a large number of resolutions were passed.

It is said that applications for 4500 conditional pardons for convicts in Van Diemen's Land have been recommended to the Queen by Sir William Denham, Governor of that colony.

The Duke of Berghien, who is one of the largest landowners in Scotland, has determined not to let more than one farm to one tenant, to prevent the accumulation of land in few hands.

A general election of Members of Parliament was held on the 12th inst., at the Guildhall, London, when the freedom of the city, enclosed in a gold box of the value of 100 guineas, was presented to Lord Haddington.

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Spain serious riots at Huelva, and the revolutionists, in consequence of the disbanding of the regular troops were employed against the revolutionists.

Germany.—The news from Germany is much the same as it was last week. It is far from encouraging. The violent but partial agitation produced by the first shock of the revolution subsided into a general ferment, which is lowering the foundations of social order, and carrying away, one by one, the pillars which support the edifice.

Austria.—The Austrian Government has honorably and in good faith accepted the revolution. It has treated and succeeded in the Archduke's inevitable necessity. It is to be hoped that the Emperor will be able to effect a full and amicable settlement with the people of Lombardy.
