



The request for the investigation was made by George A. Willetts, a brother, of Gloversville, N.Y., in which city the young woman was buried.

GERMAN HOPES FROM THE ROUMANIAN VENTURE

Went to War to Open Her Way To East, and There Will Fight Hard But Strategy is Bad-Foe's Danube Campaign at This Stage is Ill-Advis-

ed-The End Not Yet

(By Lovat Fraser.)

Germany did not go to war primarily to defeat France or Russia, still less Great Britain. She drew the sword to sain supreme control over all the territories stretching from the Rhine to the Persian Gulf. To effect her object it was imperative for her to crush France and Russia in turn. She never expected to fight Great Britain at all. She will fight to the last gasp to retain the land route from Berlin to Bagdad which she now controls.

Look at the Somme and rejoice over it, but do not forget to look at the Danube also. On the Somme and in the west the power of Germany is being sapped and broken, but in the meantime she still has great opportunities on the Danube and evidently means to use them. Her last desperate stroke may be made in the Danube valley. Consider the present position. Roumania began by invading Transylvania in pursuance of political rather than military objects, but meanwhile she has been driven back in the Dobrudja, the barren southern portion of the Danue.

have a considerable army in Thrace, and they can obtain large reinforcements from Asia Minor without gravely imperilling their position in those regions. Remember always that the Turk would abandon every mile between Smyrna and Bagdad in order to fight for Constantinople, the last emblem of his vanishing greatness. "The Russians have crossed the Danube" is all he needs to be told. I am not going to discuss numbers but it is also certain that the Bulgars can put very substantial forces in the Danube valley. The strength they will contribute must depend upon the degree of attention they pay to the new allied offensive from the Saloniki base, and they know full well the difficulties confronting General Sarrail. The Germans and Austrians, however, hard beset elsewhere, can probably also scrape together a respectable army by scouring their reserves.

What can Hindenburg do with these forces? I should look for an attempt to cross the lower Danube from the Bulgarian side at some point well above the deltaic area, coupled with a determined effort to enter Roumanian territory by way of Orsova and the Iron Gates. My military friends, though they daily swear that they mean to cross the Rhine, tell me that they think a Danube crossing will be difficult. Having looked at the lower Danube as an ingenuous traveler studying the scenes of the Russo-Turkish war, I still wonder why they doubt whether the Danube can be crossed.

Should this blow fall, the only power able to g b direct help to Roumania will be Russia. The allies in Macedonia are already giving the best help they can by their new and powerful offensive, but its value must be measured by the number of Bulgars they detain. The Somme battle really means help beyond price, and it may still frustrate Hindenburg's project altogether.


The possibilities here sketched are not in the least meant to suggest that by an adventure against Roumania Germany will obtain a new lease of life in the war. Her doom is irrevocably determined, and the wounds being dealt her on the Somme are mortal. A Danube campaign is not a sound military proposition at this stage, and a hotchpotch rush by a rabble of Turks and Bulgars mixed with the dregs of the Huns will not bear any resemblance to the overrunning of Serbia last year, still less to the march of Mackensen's "phalanx" through Galicia. It will be a mild attempt of the vanquished to save the route to the East.

But this Danube enterprise, if it comes, must be seriously regarded. The public must remember that while we are crushing the scorpion's head and claws on the Somme it can still sting with its tail. I wish particularly to throw a few buckets of cold water over the excited noodles who are talking as though the war is going to end tomorrow or next month, or even next spring. They forget three things:

(1) That not an inch of German soil in Europe is invaded, for Alsace was never German.



"This extract consists of protein mat-ter, converted and unconverted sugar-hop resin, and other substances of no

"This extract consists of protein materater, converted and unconverted sugar, hop resin, and other substances of no dietary value, lest as a residue after complete evaporation. In addition beer sometimes contains preservatives, such as sodium fluoride and salicylic acid, together with soda bicarbonate to neutralize the acidity and to help put the foaming head on it; also salt to overcome the disagreeable taste, and perhaps inspire a thirst for more.

"This leaves us a few grains of proteid and a small amount of sugar as the food in the beer. If the hissues are supplied with a liberal quantity of water, life can be sustained for a considerable length of time. Dr. Tanner fasted for forty days. Perhaps some expert might do better if he could rid the beer of the alcohol which it contains, which in the absence of other food to attack would prey upon the tissues like a myriad of infinitesimal teeth."

Even the brewers say in one of their leaflets, that beer would be better without alcohol if it could be made with the same taste. Thus we see that beer contains an exceedingly small quantity of nourishment and that any benefit that might come from this, is offset by the alcohol and other poisonous substances which it contains.

It is a safe conclusion that those who drink large quantities of beer do so, not for its food value, but for the dope effect of the alcohol and other narcotic drugs which it contains.

Tuberculosis Rapidly Increasing Among Children of Belgium and Northern France.

More Food Urgently Needed to Keep up Their Strength

An interview with Mr. W. L. Honnold, American Director of the Belgian Relief Commission, brings to light a new danger threatening the population of the territory occupied by Germany. Mr. Honnold reports that about 5,000,000 wholly or partially destitute people, who have been dependent on the Commission, generally show diminished vitality. The effects are most apparent among the older children, particularly those in the adolescent stage. Among these there is an alarming increase of tuberculosis, due to the lower power of resistance consequent on an inadequate dist

an inadequate diet.

To overcome this serious danger, the Commission appeals for extra contributions so that a special meal can be served every day in the schools. Efforts are also being made to provide as far as possible for children outside the schools.



A Need For a Victory

There came a time, however, when a virtual deadlock was established. Germany could advance no further in France nor in Russia. On both great fronts the allies were holding firm, and on the south Italy was making some advance. No longer could Berlin provide its ration of daily victories. In these circumstances, the assault upon Verdun was determined upon. From a military point of view the battle of Verdun could not have been decisive. From a political point of view it was vital. Germany lost that battle. Further north the allies struck along the Somme. There had to be admissions of defeat here. Not till Roumania entered the war did Germany see a chance of a victory with which to cheer the spirits of the folks at home. So it was decided that there should be a swift rush at Roumania.

Germany. The war has bared to broad daylight the secret vice of this artificial construction; the grandeur of Germany was a "fleshly grandeur," and the spirit itself over there had put itself in the service of the flesh, proclaiming an idolatry of force; material and mechanical force, indifferent to moral values, full of contempt for the superior aspirations of humanity, radically severed from what Shakespeare called "the milk of human kindness."

The long effort of the generations toward greater justice and goodness gave place to the wild cry: "Deutschland ueber allies!" Germany above pity, above the rights of nations, above justice itself! No more art or beauty! A powerful organization reduced individuals to be no more than docile pieces in a monstrous soulless machine ready to crush everything.

And we, during all this time, what were we doing France was more hungry than ever for justice, truth, universal peace. Our internal quarrels, which inspired in Germany such a mad confidence in our irremediable disunion, were caused by divergences of opinion as regards duty. Our imprudent pacifism was a noble humanitarian dream. The struggles of our artistic and literary schools were proof of an ardent seeking for beauty. We disputed among ourselves our ideas, and these ideas, whatever they may have been, held in the eyes of their defenders a universal value, useful for the common good.

Were Impenitent Idealists

Each one, believing in the virtue of his ideas, desired that France should become their champion, to his own honor and for the advantage of the world. We were impenitent idealists, and the more truly French, despite our superficial differences, as we were the more idealistic. Moreover, when the external danger appeared, each one rushed with the same heart to his urgent duty, which was to defend against brutal force the well-beloved country where so many noble dreams had flourished. To defend France was to labor both for France and for the civilization which it represents. All interior divergencies faded out as by enchantment. This was Germany's first surprise.

What then, is the essential principle of this civilization for which so many Frenchmen are heroically dying? Whether one called it Christian, Greco-Latin, revolutionary, matters little; it all comes to this, that it proclaims the dignity of man, and ends in founding all morals, between individuals as between nations, on the respect for free activity. It is the duty of the strong to aid the weak; small nations have a right to live all moral persons have their own role to play in the concert of collective life. Unity imposed from without, by the tyranny of one man or by the oppressive hegemony of a nation, impoverishes humanity by belittling the individuals who compose it. The only unity desirable is that which by reason and kindness draws together all noble and intelligent activities with a view to the general harmony.
