Sponge Cake. Beat 3 eggs, add 1 cup sugar, stir till dissolved, then sift 1 cup of good pastry flour with ½ teaspoon of crean of tartar and ¼ teaspoon of saleratus, and mix; then last of all ¼ cup of "boiling" water and stir as quickly as you can and put right into oven quickly.

Cottage Pudding. Sift together one cup sugar, two cups flour (pastry), two level teaspoons cream of tartar, one level teaspoon soda and pinch of salt. Break an egg into a meas-uring cup and fill with milk. Beat well, then add four tablespoons melted butter and your favorite flavoring. Bake about twenty-five minutes in moderate oven For the sauces Cream quarter cup butter with one cup sugar and one table-spoon (rounded) of flour. Add gradu-ally one pint boiling water and boil five minutes. Add grated nutmeg and lemon juice to flavor.

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



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

In what purports to be an unembel-lished diary record of moments spent in friendly talk with the Emperor during the days preceding and immediately, fol-lowing the outbreak of hostilities in the present war statements of the Kaiser are quoted which show him to have been hoping for such an incident as the Sara-jevo crime, to have welcomed the break between Serbia and Austria as an oppor-tunity for him to throw off the mask of peace-maker he had grown weary of wearing so that he might emulate and continue the great deeds of his grand-father, William I., strike terror to the heart of the world, and "put Germany on a pinnacle of glory and power where none other will be worthy to be men-tioned beside it."
