The report of the government committee of inquiry into the mining situation does not, as had been rumored, suggest a subsidy for the mines. It upholds the miners in their demands for a minimum wage agreement, but the committee believes that the wage should be determined by negotiations. Although the report, reading between the lines, show sympathy with the miners, it describes the crisis as a "common calamity, not primarily due to the fault of either party."
