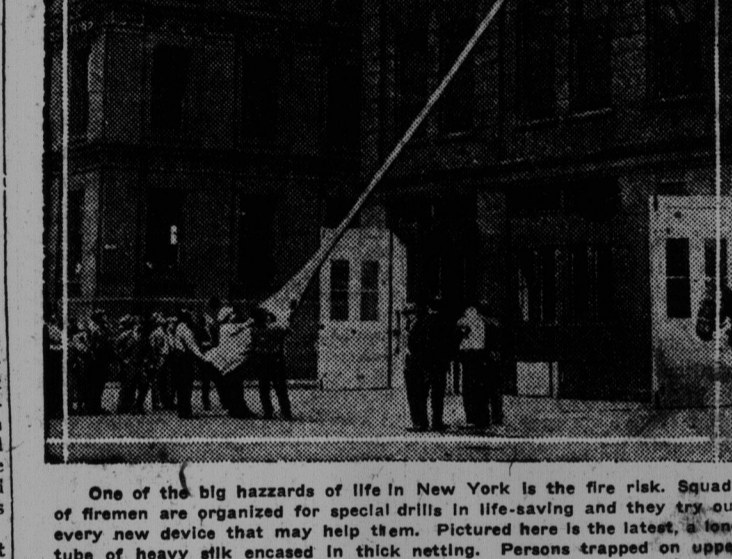

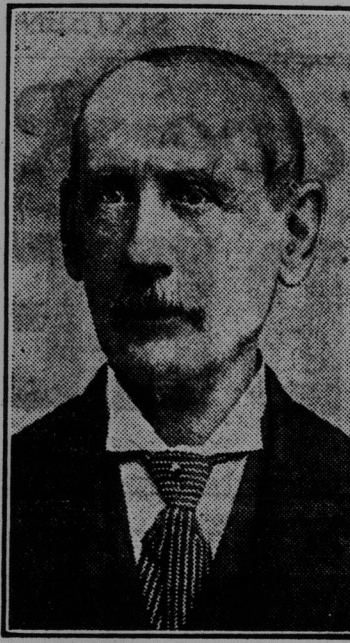

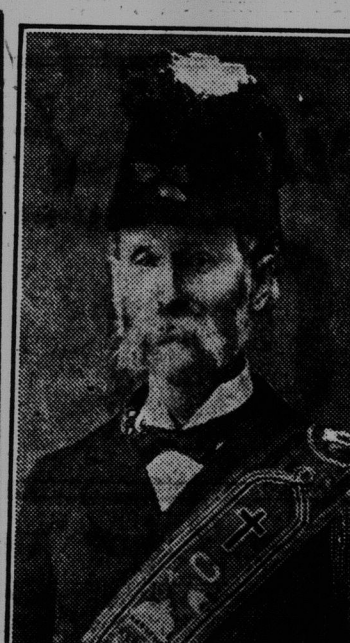

BRITISH VISITORS IN ST. JOHN TODAY

They are Motoring From Fredericton by Way of Gagetown.

Fredericton, N. B., Oct. 25.—The members of the British Overseas Settlement delegation, headed by Mrs. Harrison Bell, chairman of the Standing Joint Committee of Industrial Women's Organizations of Great Britain, and members of the Labor party executive, who are making a six weeks' tour and investigation of the migration and settlement of children in Canada from the United Kingdom, at the invitation of the Canadian Government, arrived here last evening from Woodstock.

Mrs. Bell, who has been acting as chairman of the delegation since the recall of Miss Margaret Bondfield, M. P., Parliamentary Secretary of the British Labor Ministry, is accompanied by G. F. WARSHIP OPEN TO VISITORS SUNDAY

Patriot Will Welcome Saint John Folk from 2 to 5 p. m.

H. M. C. S. Patriot will be open for public inspection tomorrow afternoon from 2 o'clock to 5 o'clock, according to an announcement this morning. The ship is expected to leave port about 9 o'clock Monday morning for Halifax where she will go into dry dock for repairs before going into winter service in the West Indies. Motion picture theatres, and other places in the city will have extended hours for the occasion. The ship will be open to visitors from 2 to 5 p. m. on Sunday. The ship is a torpedo boat destroyer of the M. class and was built by the Thornycrofts in England in 1918. She has a displacement of 980 tons and develops 26,500 horse-power. She has a complement of 400 men and is armed with three 4.7-inch guns, two 1.1-inch pounders, and four 2.1-inch torpedo tubes.

Frederick Barker of Loch Lomond was sentenced to seven days in jail by Magistrate Henderson in the police court this morning after he had pleaded guilty to operating an automobile in Thorne avenue while under the influence of liquor. There was no evidence taken in the case as the defendant pleaded guilty when the charge was read.

The arrest was the culmination of an automobile accident in Thorne avenue. Arthur Coffey of Douglas street was driving his sedan along on the right side of the road when he saw an automobile approaching and holding to the wrong side. In an effort to avert a head-on collision he swerved to one side but in time to avoid a crash. Mr. Coffey and the occupant of the other car did not fare so well. Mr. Barker sustaining a cut on one of his hands and a companion, William Crozier, was quite seriously injured and had to be taken to the hospital for treatment. BOY OF 12 TAKEN HERE AS FORGER

Is Accused of Getting Other Youth's Money at Bank.

A colored boy, 12 years old, was taken into custody this afternoon by Sergeant Detective Power on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences. He is charged with forging two checks in the name of Seely Skinner, another boy, and receiving \$5 on one occasion and \$8.94 on another from the Bank of Montreal branch in Haymarket Square.

The matter came to light when the boy, who had made the deposits, went to the bank to procure another pass book as he had lost his. He was, it is said, informed that his account had been drawn. An investigation resulted in the arrest of the colored boy.

Bombshell Thrown in Political Area in Motherland

(Continued from page 1.) He suggested to publication, but it is untrue that Macdonald drafted the note to Moscow as is claimed by Labor. The Tories are elated at the publication of some part, particularly as follows close on the heels of General Seely's revelations.

Labor is proportionately depressed by the publication of this startling document, and they are anxiously awaiting a statement from the Premier to clear away the suspicion and the charge that the Prime Minister only authorized publication when it had been made public anyhow.

What Opponents Say. London, Oct. 25.—(Canadian Press)—Publication of the letter and protest has aroused curiosity as to why the critical moment of an election campaign was chosen for their issuance.

The opposition is particularly anxious to know whether Conservative or Liberal, contented that the reason for the dramatic appearance of the correspondence was that the Government became aware that the "very secret" letter was in the hands of the opposition.

The other side. On the other hand, there is a suggestion that the Government may have intended publication of the documents as a demonstration of its independence, and as proof that it is not as its enemies alleged, under Moscow's heel.

There is a disposition in some quarters to make something out of the fact that the protest was signed by Gregory instead of Mr. Macdonald, and this disposition is aided by the statement in some of the papers that the Premier and Foreign Minister, who is conducting his electoral campaign in Wales, was in touch with the Foreign Office in connection with the publication of the Russian documents last evening.

Meanwhile, it is stated in behalf of the accused Russians that the offending document is a manifest forgery, and that M. Rakovsky was so amused by its absurdity that he burst into laughter upon reading it. The charge is quoted as saying that the forgery was evident from the heading of the letter to "Third Communist International," as such title had never been used.

One of the signatories of the letter as published is Arthur Macdonald, a British representative in the International, who had just returned from Russia. Mr. Macdonald's name never signed such a document, and that it is a clumsy forgery. Albert Imkpin, secretary of the British communist party, also claims forgery and says the party never received such a letter. (See page 8, first column.) C. N. R. Superintendent W. N. A MOMENTOUS ELECTION.

A glance at the figures showing the steady and remarkable gain in political power in Britain between 1900 and the dissolution of Parliament three weeks ago seems to throw some light upon the momentous election struggle which is to be decided at the polls a few days hence.

Table with 3 columns: Year, Seats, Vote. Rows include 1900, 1906, 1910, 1918, 1922, 1923.

Note the temporary setback in the vote cast for Labor candidates in 1910, though not in the number of seats won, and then note the jump to sixty-three members of the House, to 142, to 192.

A natural question today is: Are the Labor gains to cease now, after nine months in office?

At dissolution the party standing in a House of 615 was approximately: Conservatives 297, Labor 198, Liberals 118.

The Liberal forces were split badly before this short and sharp campaign began. Since it was a week old the Liberal forces have been further divided.

The attempt to form a Conservative-Liberal election alliance under the leadership of Mr. Baldwin has resulted in fewer three-cornered contests, and gives promise, on its face at least, of considerable benefit to the anti-Socialist forces.

To have a clear majority the Conservatives must win fifty-one seats more than they held at dissolution. That is a large order, but some of the sophists point out that Labor's road to power is still more rocky.

Lloyd's is quoted as warning ten to eleven against a MacDonald majority in a new Parliament. Perhaps that is more significant than the survey any of the party prophets; yet no conservative or Liberal journal in midday speaks as though such odds are justified.

Yet about a million voters would not turn out. Old General Apathy commands an immense army. The voter who doesn't vote, and who "yowls" about the result notwithstanding, is unpleasantly numerous.

Premier Ferguson, having looked over the figures and taken some soundings, says to-day, in effect: "The people of Ontario have voted for the O. T. A. and I'm going to enforce it. No local option."

There is an eleventh-hour sensation in British politics. After election day a cool-headed inquest will determine whether there was treason afoot, or just a horrible rookback.

The Great Wall (New York Times). The news from China announces that Chang has broken through the Great Wall. The Great Wall of China is one of the wonders of Asia.

The Great Wall is as broad on the top as an ordinary street, and is 1,500 miles long, stretching across the northern limits of the empire. Its purpose was to shut out the Tartars and other Eastern enemies who periodically poured down on the northern Chinese provinces.

The Tong.

A truce had been signed, according to hopeful reports, between the warring Chinese "Tongs", and the expectation is that this will end, for a while at least, the series of murders that began a fortnight ago.

The quarrel, according to a white lawyer who has had relations with members of both factions, started when the President of the On Leong Tong was deposed under accusation of mismanaging its funds.

Just why this should have set the members of the two organizations to the carrying and using on each other of long blue pistols and occasional cleaver is not for white folk to know, but desperate animosity between the two groups seems to be a permanent state of affairs.

The Tong, nominally, are mutual benefit societies with excellent aims, including what the Chinese think the important one of seeing to it that the bodies of members who die in foreign lands are taken home for burial.

The Chinese are generally, though with small reason, credited with being pacific natures. Individually they like peace and for its sake will endure much and make considerable sacrifices.

ROCKEFELLER, JR.,  
TAXED \$7,435,169

New York, Oct. 24.—The metropolitan newspapers today printed under large headlines details of income tax payments by the country's wealthiest citizens.

Immediate protests were made by some of those whose returns were printed on the ground that such publicity would work an injury to their businesses.

The publication of the figures followed a ruling from the Treasury Department at Washington throwing open to public inspection the income tax lists. Later a clause was discovered in the revenue act forbidding the "printing" of such statistics, and some papers withdrew the lists from their columns.

The list as carried by the papers revealed the fact that John D. Rockefeller, jr., son of the oil magnate, had made by far the largest individual return in New York state. His income tax payments in 1923 amounted to \$7,435,169.41. This reflected the announced policy of John D. Rockefeller, sr., to turn over his fortune to his son before his death. The elder Rockefeller paid a tax amounting to \$124,268.47.

Fords Pay \$19,000,000.

A despatch from Detroit showed that the Ford family had paid almost \$19,000,000 in taxes. Henry Ford himself paid \$2,467,946.10; E. B. Ford, \$1,984,244.88; Henry Ford II, \$854,501; Benson Ford, \$859,000, and the Ford Motor Company, \$14,449,678.04, making a total of \$18,902,981.80.

**CIVIC COMMISSION  
MAY EXTEND LINES**

Will Seek Legislation to Serve Residents of East St. John.

The Civic Power Commission yesterday, on the suggestion of Mayor Potts, decided to ask the City Council to promote legislation permitting the commission to extend its lines to East St. John and supply current to customers in that locality. Tenders for line materials were accepted and it was decided to notify the council that the commission was willing to allow other utilities to use its poles when such was possible.

The meeting was presided over by F. S. A. McMullin, chairman, and others present were Mayor Potts, Commissioner Harding and John N. Flood. The secretary reported that an offer had been sent to the New Brunswick Telephone Company, Ltd., to allow it to use the poles of the commission in Brunswick Place and a communication had been received from the telephone company saying it preferred to use its own poles and had received permission from the City Council to place them on this street.

It was moved by Mr. Flood that notification be sent to the council that the commission was willing to allow joint use of its poles where such was possible in order to avoid duplication of pole lines.

The engineer also reported that the contract with the N. R. had been signed and the depot and yards and elevator would be connected up on Sunday and Monday.

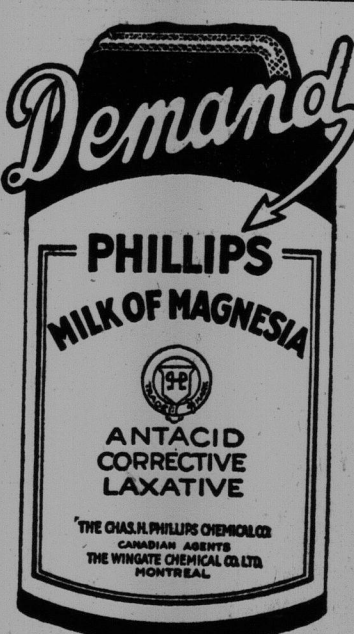
Mayor Potts moved that the City Council be asked to promote legislation enabling the commission to distribute energy in East St. John. This was seconded by Commissioner Harding and carried.

Mr. Flood called attention to the fact that in many instances two services were left on buildings, which he claimed was dangerous and suggested that the City Council be asked to take some action to have services not in use removed. The engineer said the city electrician had the power to have these removed.

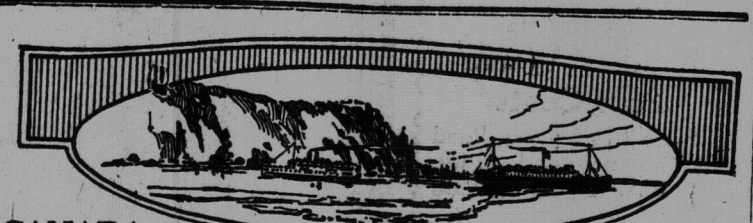

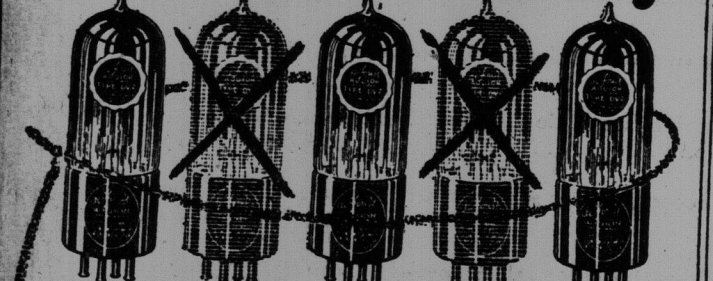

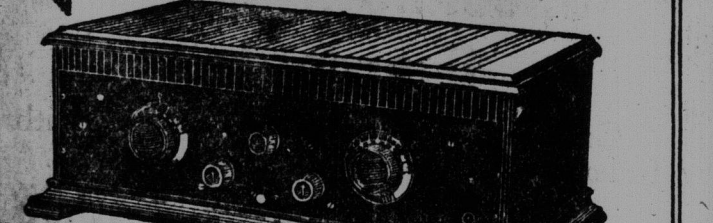

**RUSSIAN LETTER  
RAISES STORM IN  
ENGLAND TODAY**

Govt. Sends a Sharp Letter to Soviet Ambassador in London.

**WHAT LETTER SAYS**

It is Aimed at Overthrow of Existing Institutions in Great Britain.

London, Oct. 24.—The British Government is again in conflict with the Russian Soviet government on the question of propaganda, according to correspondence issued by the Foreign Office tonight for publication in tomorrow's newspapers. In a letter dated today, signed "in the absence of the Secretary of State" by one of the permanent officials of the Foreign Office, T. Gregory, and addressed to Christian Rakovsky, the Russian Ambassador in London, attention is drawn to an accompanying copy of a letter received by the Central Committee of the British Communist party from M. Zinovieff, President of the Committee

of the Communist Internationale, dated on Aug. 15. "This letter," says the communication of Mr. Gregory, "contains instructions to British subjects to work for the violent overthrow of existing institutions in this country and for the subversion of His Majesty's armed forces as a means to that end. It is my duty to inform you that His Majesty's government cannot allow this propaganda and must regard it as direct interference from the outside in British domestic affairs."

**Appeal to Communists.**

Accompanying the letter of Mr. Gregory is a copy of M. Zinovieff's letter, which is endorsed "Very secret." This communication, which contains more than 1,000 words, urges British Communists to continue to apply pressure to insure that the Bourgeoisie campaign to prevent ratification of the recently concluded Anglo-Russian treaty shall not succeed and to exercise similar pressure in British Government and Parliamentary circles in favor of ratification of the treaty.

The Zinovieff letter represents the Government of Premier MacDonald as having been compelled by the extremists of the Labor party to conclude the treaty and advocates "a campaign of disclosure of the foreign policy of MacDonald, which Zinovieff says represents 'an inferior copy of the policy of the Curzon government.'"

**OSMAN DIGNA IS  
IN NEWS AGAIN**

Once Terror of Sudan, Has Been in Prison Twenty-two Years.

There is going the rounds of the press a London story stating that Osman Digna has just been released after 22 years of solitary confinement in a cell at Wady Halfa and is now on a pilgrimage to Mecca, though nearly 100 years old.

For nearly a quarter of a century he has been kept in a cell by himself, guarded day and night by Egyptian soldiers and given occasional exercise in a compound surrounded by high mud walls.

It is added that the prisoner had been forgotten by the foreign office until the question was raised at the last session of Parliament. His release was the result of efforts on his behalf in England.

When Rudyard Kipling was writing his "Barrack Room Ballads," Fusay Wusay was one of Great Britain's most troublesome problems, and Fusay's leader, Osman Digna, emir and principal lieutenant of the Mahdi, was one of the main reasons why the Sudan had become a death trap for thousands of British soldiers and a chal-



# Judge Lashes Bond Conspirators Before Sentencing Them

## SMITH AND JARVIS JAILED AND FINED FOR CONSPIRACY

Ontario's Former Treasurer and Prominent Toronto Financier Sentenced.

### THE JUDGE SEVERE

Both Prisoners Protest Against Verdict; Judge Cuts Them Short.

(Canadian Press Despatch)

Toronto, Oct. 24.—Peter Smith, the former treasurer of the Ontario in the U. F. O. Government, and Aemilius Jarvis, Sr., who was head of the former long established and widely known Toronto bond and brokerage house of Aemilius Jarvis & Co., were late this afternoon found guilty of conspiracy to defraud the province. Smith was sentenced to serve six months in the county jail. In addition both men must remain in prison until a fine of \$600,000 is paid.

Aemilius Jarvis, Jr., son of the convicted broker, and Harry G. Peppall, vice-president and general manager respectively of the bond firm, were both found not guilty of conspiracy to defraud the province. The theft charges against all four were dismissed.

An appeal will be entered, both on behalf of Peter Smith and Aemilius Jarvis, Sr., against both the conviction and the sentence of the court.

### A Tense Moment

Jarvis the elder and Jarvis the younger clasped hands at the verdict. Peter Smith was seen to slump forward in his chair. Harry G. Peppall remained with tense expression on his face. Turning to the jury, Chief Justice Meredith said:

"I desire to express my appreciation of the care you have given in this case. It has been a prolonged trial. It has been very trying upon your comfort and very inconvenient for you in many ways. You are doing a very high duty. You are representing the people of this city and the province. You are doing justice for the people of this great community."

His Lordship then turned to W. N. Tilley K. C., Crown counsel and asked: "Have you any motion to make?" "I move for sentences," replied Mr. Tilley.

"Aemilius Jarvis, Jr., and Harry G. Peppall stand up," ordered the court. "The jury have found that you are not guilty of any of the charges laid against you," said His Lordship. "My duty is to discharge you. I am glad to say you are discharged."

### Smith's Statement

Peter Smith was next asked to stand up. "Have you anything to say against the judgment of the court now being pronounced upon you for the indictable offense of which you have been found guilty?" asked the Chief Justice. "I have only this to say," replied Mr. Smith, "which is not very much. As I said when I came into this court and was asked to plead, I pleaded not guilty. I still adhere to that statement. I am not guilty of conspiracy. I only say Aemilius Jarvis once or twice in my life, and only once in connection with this deal. At the time the deal was made, I was sick at home with the flu. The jury have found me guilty of conspiracy. I am content to abide by their decision. But I will say this, I will take it to a higher court than this where I will get forgiveness."

At this point the former treasurer of the province completely broke down. Tears came to his eyes, and he could hardly control his voice. Making a desperate effort to control his feelings he then pleaded:

"I would like to have time enough to arrange my affairs at home. I have a wife and family at home. I have not made any provision for their future. That is all I have to say."

### He Still Denies

Chief Justice Meredith: "Do you care to tell me how you got \$100,000 odd from Aemilius Jarvis? Do not answer if you do not want to." "I never got that amount," replied Mr. Smith.

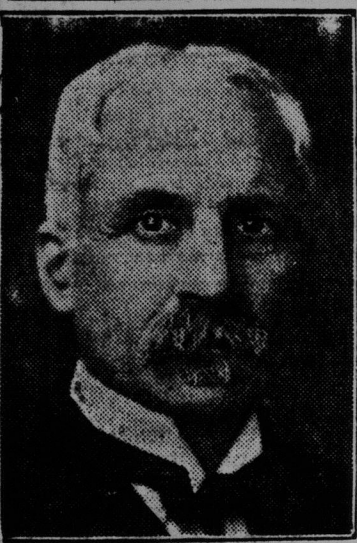
"It does not matter much now, but a very large sum over \$100,000," said His Lordship. "I did not get that money." "Nobody said you did. I was asking about the securities. Where did you get the coupons?" "I got them from Andrew Peppall," replied Mr. Smith.

"What for?" "Because he owed me some money and he asked me to get them cashed. They were not due at the time he gave me them. He was going away." "Your counsel said you got them in trade, but you need not answer any more questions."

### Jarvis Indignant

Aemilius Jarvis, Sr., was asked to stand up. "Have you anything to say against

The judgment of the court now being pronounced upon you for the indictable offense of which you have been found guilty," he was asked.

"Yes," said Mr. Jarvis, in a tone of strong indignation. "I never met Peter Smith and never had any connection with him directly or indirectly. I never gave him one dollar or sanctioned one dollar being given to him, nor discussed this thing with Peter Smith and I any conspiracy or intercourse with Andrew Peppall to distort or mislead the cabinet of Ontario. I never discussed this thing with Peter Smith only with Mr. Drury to begin with and with him in the cabinet."

Chief Justice Meredith—"May I ask why you took the half million dollars or more for the petty services you performed?" "I do not call them petty services, when a man stakes his whole fortune signing a hypothecation in London— which you do not put any evidence in— when you have become liable for eight million dollars and stake your life's fortune. As Sir John Ferguson said, I was the first person to repay him if the province failed to take up this note within thirty days. I was to borrow. As the bonds came in they were paid for at Lloyds and I had to borrow the money. You say that is a petty thing."

### He Ran No Risks

"You know, Aemilius Jarvis, that you did not run the risk of one dollar. I ran the risk of everything." "You knew that the province was in possession of my name and was paying everything."

"Of course, the province was behind me. If the British Government had to borrow, when they borrow in the United States, they put up collateral. When I borrowed from Lloyds I put up collateral. It was done in every transaction."

His Lordship turned to Mr. Tilley. "When was this money received by Mr. Jarvis?" "The 28th of April, 1920," stated Mr. Tilley.

"That was four years ago," remarked the judge, who then directed his attention to the former Provincial Treasurer.

### The Sentences

"Peter Smith," said His Lordship, "it is neither my duty nor my right to recount your misdeeds, or to say one word that will add to your punishment, but in order that you may not think there is any disproportion between the penalty passed upon you and passed upon your co-conspirator, I may say that you were chosen by the people of this municipality in which you lived to serve them and to serve this province faithfully. Aemilius Jarvis was

commonly called a watchdog of the treasury. Aemilius Jarvis was not. You made an oath which you violated, a solemn oath of office. Aemilius Jarvis did not. The judgment of the court upon you, Peter Smith, is that you be imprisoned in the penitentiary for three years."

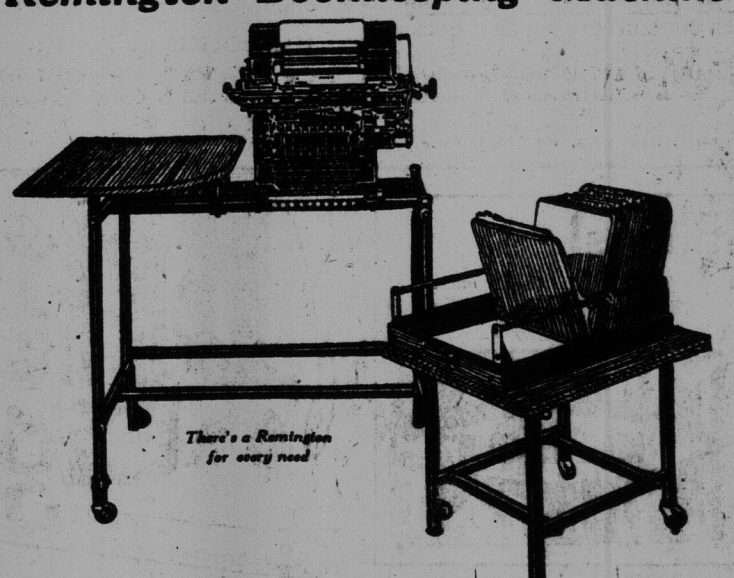
Addressing Mr. Jarvis, the Chief Justice said: "The judgment of the court upon you, Aemilius Jarvis, is that you be imprisoned in the County Jail of this county for six months."

Then, addressing both prisoners, "And further, the judgment of the court upon you, Peter Smith, and upon you, Aemilius Jarvis, is that you and each of you pay a fine of \$600,000 and that you remain in jail until it is paid."

## STONED TO DEATH BY FANATIC CROWD

### U. S. Minister to Persia Tells Story of Murder of Consul.

New York, Oct. 25.—How Robert Imbrie, United States consul at Teheran, was stoned to death by natives as he lay unconscious upon an operating table, was related today by Joseph P. Kornfeld, United States minister to Persia, just resigned, who returned on the Leviathan with a report of the tragedy which he will submit to the State Department at Washington.

"In Teheran, as in most Persian cities," Mr. Kornfeld related, "there are numerous drinking fountains, where are stationed self-constituted attendants, who, in the name of a Mohammedan saint, Abbas, solicit alms. At the time of the Imbrie affair, there had gained wide circulation the story of a miracle that was reputed to have occurred at one of these fountains only a few weeks before."

"The story was that a native approached this fountain to fill a gourd with water. 'In the name of Abbas,' asked the alms collector. 'No, in the name of Bahai,' replied the gourd bearer. Straightway he was stricken blind for the blasphemy; then, when he dropped to his knees and recanted with a prayer of apology directed to the saint, Abbas, his sight was restored."

"The fountain became the gathering place of thronged thousands, who tied themselves to it and lapped up the trickling water, or fought their way toward it and prayed. 'I'm tired of this. One day he strapped on a camera and, with his aide, named Seymour, drove in a barouché to the miracle spot. Imbrie forced his way through the crowd to take a photograph. The natives surged around him, clamoring, and he fled to the barouché and drove away."

"Behind the carriage the infuriated natives ran, shouting 'Stop him. The infidel has killed four of the faithful and poisoned the waters of the fountain.'"

Although he was not wholly informed of events that immediately followed, said Mr. Kornfeld, the gist of conflicting reports was that the natives believed Imbrie's camera to be a weapon which silently dispatched death. ## HIGH SCHOOL GIRL SEEKS ADVENTURE IN BOYS' CLOTHING

Carries Clubs for Golfers and Stays in Men's Lodging House.

### SOON GROWS TIRED

When Reduced to Twenty-five Cents She Calls Up a Detective.

New York, Oct. 25.—After having masqueraded as a boy since her disappearance from her home at 83 Division avenue, Brooklyn, Oct. 12, cadidly innumerable rounds on the public golf links at Forest Park and slept in a Y. M. C. A. and a men's lodging house, Julia Hannigan, 15-year-old Brooklyn high school girl, was found at Broadway and Rodney street Thursday by Detective George L. O'Connor of the Missing Persons Bureau only a few blocks from her home.

Julia, her last 10 cents spent for coffee and rolls and a newspaper, was leaning against a pole reading the story of her adventure when Detective O'Connor accosted her. She was dressed in brown trousers, heavy breeches, a brown sweater and a felt hat, and, according to O'Connor, easily could have avoided detection.

In fact, her disguise was so good that when the detective took the girl to her home, her mother failed to recognize her. Detective O'Connor took the girl to Manhattan police headquarters, where she told her story to Captain Ayres of the Missing Person Bureau. "I always wanted to be a boy," she said. "I wanted the freedom that boys have."

"How do you feel about it now?" asked Captain Ayres. "I'm glad you found me," she replied. "I'm glad to be a girl again. Being a boy isn't what I cracked up to be."

Tells Her Story. Julia told the captain she had read the stories of the disappearance of Frank Roshak, who left his home on the upper west side of Manhattan a few weeks ago, and was stimulated to dreams about his exploits. She decided the money her mother gave her for the "movies" and didn't spend as much as she expected. She bought the shoes, sweater, hat, trousers and underwear with this money. The sweater, shirt, collar and tie were obtained from her brother's wardrobe.

On the morning of Oct. 12 Julia made ready for her venture. She put on clothes in the cellar of her home. That night she came back and, doffing her skirts, put on the boy's clothes and plastered her hair back. Her own clothing she hid in a bin.

That night she went to the Y. M. C. A. at South Ninth street and Marcy avenue. There was no difficulty in obtaining a room. The next morning she took a room in a men's lodging house at 802 Bedford avenue, only a short distance from her home. She got a small room, for which she paid \$1.50 a week. All her funds, and caddying looked easy. So she carried clubs for golfers for nearly eight days.

The other youngsters at the links suspected nothing, nor did the golfers. The second night after her departure, Julia took a room in a men's lodging house at 802 Bedford avenue, only a short distance from her home. She got a small room, for which she paid \$1.50 a week. All her funds, and caddying looked easy. So she carried clubs for golfers for nearly eight days.

After a week the caddying proved too unremunerative for her livelihood. She was conscience-stricken over her parents' worry because of her. When she read that they feared she had been murdered she called her home on the telephone. That was Monday night. But after informing her mother that she was safe, she hung up the receiver.

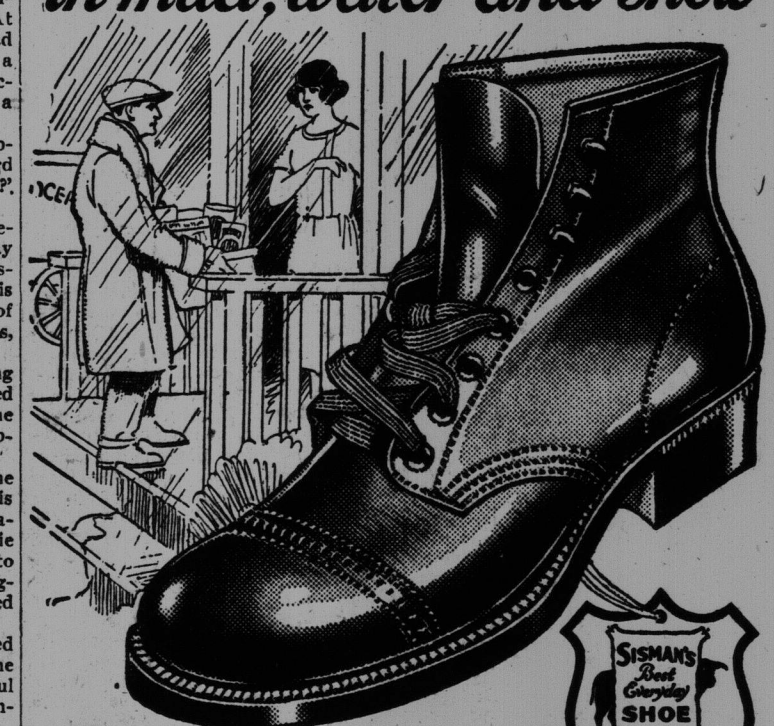
Yesterday, however, when she found herself with only 25 cents, she decided that she had had enough of being a boy. She called Detective O'Connor of the Missing Persons Bureau. "I'm tired and hungry," she told him and asked: "If I come back will you arrest me?"

O'Connor arranged to meet her at the Broadway Phonograph Shop, 232 South Fourth street. When he went there the proprietor told him no girl had been in the store, but a boy had left a note. This directed O'Connor to Broadway and Rodney street. There he found Julia.

After she had faced the camera at police headquarters, Julia put on the clothes that her sister had brought from her home. The transformation was complete. She was altogether a girl again. Then she was taken to the Brooklyn Children's Society on a charge of juvenile delinquency.

When Mr. Herzog, manager of the rooming house, heard that the young person who had lived there as Walter Emerson was a girl, he shook his head and said: "I would have sworn that was a boy." As Detective O'Connor brought her into the Missing Persons Bureau dressed in the garb of a boy he turned to the crowd and said: "I wouldn't mind having a son like this myself!"

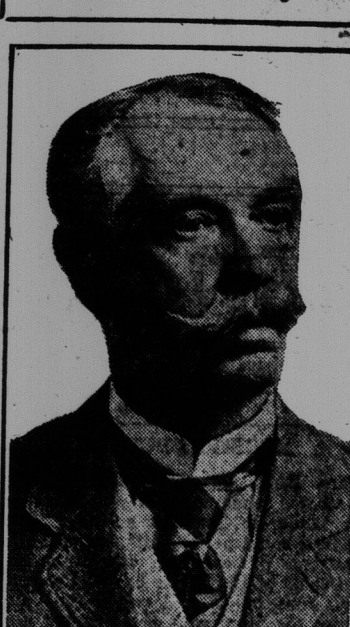

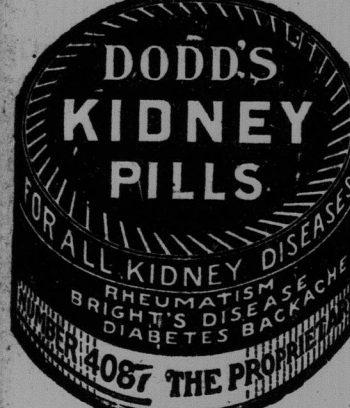

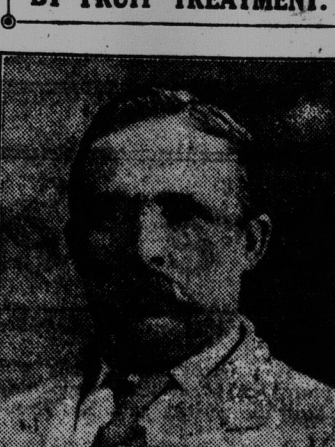

Johnson and Heydler Will be Defendants With Commissioner Landis.

New York, Oct. 25.—Not only Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis, but also Ban Johnson and John A. Heydler, American and National League Presidents, respectively, will be made defendants in the slander suit which Cosy Dolan, disgraced Giant coach, is planning to bring in the Federal courts here.

William J. Fallon, Dolan's counsel, said that the suit will be directed at the entire Advisory Council of baseball, made up of Landis and the two league heads, Leslie M. O'Connor, Secretary of the Commissioner, and also Secretary of the council, may be made defendant, Fallon said, particularly if the attorney should find that O'Connor is treasurer of the council and, in that capacity, makes payment of world's series prize money to the players.

Dolan intends to sue for damages for alleged slander, for his share of the world's series prize money and for exoneration by a jury. Fallon admitted that there was no way to force the heads of organized baseball or any one in the game to give Dolan employment, but he said that vindication of the Giant coach, who was barred for an alleged bribe offer to Heinie Sand, would be satisfaction enough.

Even though Dolan should win his suit, Fallon admitted, there is no prospect that he will ever appear in organized baseball again. It was recalled that several of the "Black Sox" of the 1919 world's series scandal were acquitted by a Chicago jury, but Commissioner Landis' ban against them has never been lifted.

**MURPHY WILL TEST  
ONE-WHEEL SULKY**

New Vehicle Designed to Reduce Number of Racing Accidents.

Syracuse, N. Y., Oct. 25.—Home after base of the most successful of his many seasons on the Grand Circuit, Thomas W. Murphy, premier light harness race horse driver of the year, is ready to experiment with a new one-wheel racing sulky, the invention of H. W. Hannan, the owner of Etta Druen and Hope Prices, two of the star horses in the Murphy stable.

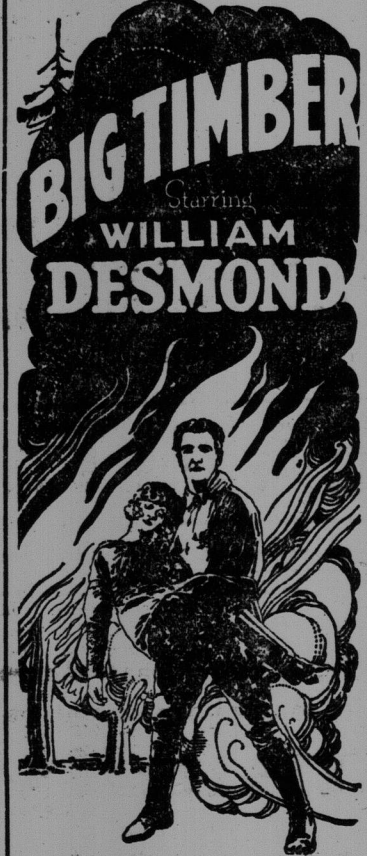
The one-wheel sulky is proposed as a remedy for the many accidents which have resulted from horses putting a hoof through a wheel of the sulky now in use and from locked wheels, a common occurrence, particularly at the turns.

The one-wheel sulky puts the driver ten inches further back from the horse than the two-wheel affair. It also does away with the high struts which in the present sulky keep the driver's feet higher in the air than his hips.

The wheel is directly under the seat, and the driver sits upright, much after the fashion of a man in a saddle, with strong supports for his feet. The girth and wheel balance the sulky perfectly, it is claimed.

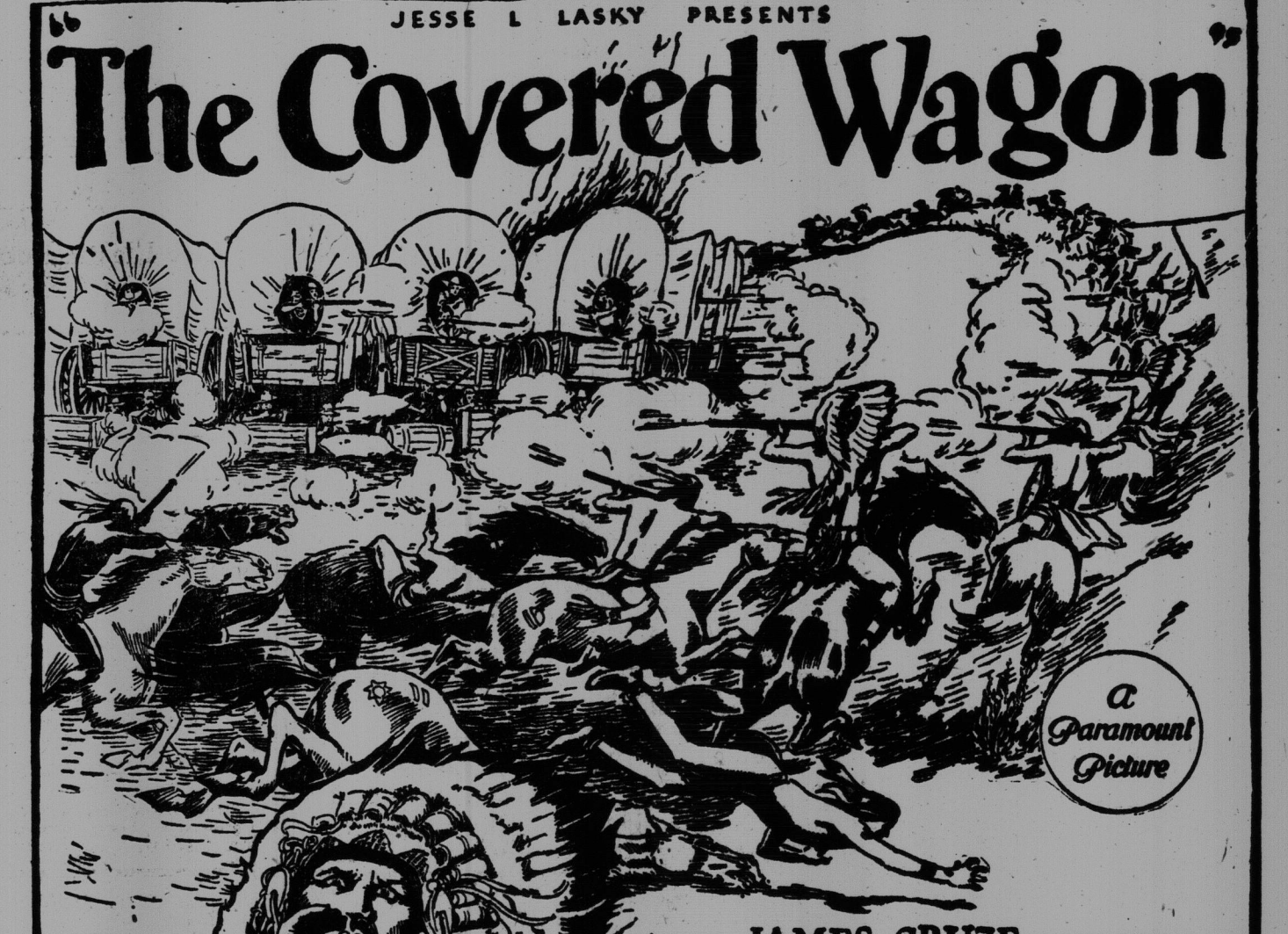

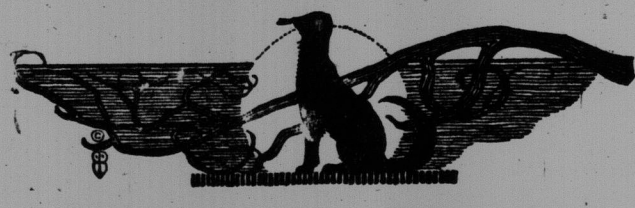

PORTLAND HAS NEW ADVANTAGE

The Maine Port This Year Profits by Recent Railroad Agreement.

A highly important matter which has not hitherto been publicly brought out in the discussion of port matters was presented to the Times-Star this morning by a prominent shipping man. It is that at present, through a recent agreement made by all the American trunk railroads, freight has not been raised in the United States can be shipped to Portland at the same rate as to New York, Boston or St. John. Previously this was not the case. It changes the whole situation in Portland and gets cargo from any city in the U. S. or Canada and the shipper does not have to pay anything extra for delivering his freight at any of those ports. The State pier at Portland is used, and there are no wharfage charges on export freight, whereas at St. John steamers have to pay side and top wharfage, so that, on the average, the steamer coming here is penalized by from \$500 to \$1,000 in port charges, besides the higher insurance cost. The Times-Star's informant suggested that this very important feature of the situation should be immediately fully considered by St. John in deciding the question of port charges and of meeting the competition of other ports.

LAWIS PATIENT; IT GETS LEGERE

He Escaped From Police Headquarters in July; Now Retaken.

A sensational escape of a prisoner from one of the cells in Central Police Station was recalled this morning when Alexander Leger was brought before Magistrate Henderson on a charge of fighting in the public streets on July 29 and later escaping from custody. He acknowledged that he had been fighting at that time, but said it was a self defence. The charge of breaching from lawful custody was not read and the prisoner was remanded to jail until the authorities are ready to go on with the case. On July 29 after being arrested the defendant was left in a cell in the basement of Central Police Station until he could be taken before Magistrate Henderson next morning. During the night he succeeded in opening the door of his cell and went to have gone up the back stairs to the court room and then continued down to the main exit and out. The following morning when the charge sheet was presented to Magistrate Henderson the word "escaped" was written after his name. An investigation disclosed that the lock on the cell door was defective and a new one was put on. Since that time the police have kept a watch on the back stairs and last night he was seen and taken into custody.

MARKET TAKES ON FALL LOOK

The country market this morning had taken on the tinge of autumn and the flowers which have made it so bright all summer were being replaced by the more sober shades of the vegetable and fruit of fall. There was an abundance of good apples, which the housewife might select the Sunday dinner and prices were about the same as they have been for the last week or two. Artichokes were on sale this morning and Brussels sprouts were quite plentiful. Chickens sold at 35 cents a pound; butter 45 cents, and eggs 85 cents for guaranteed fresh. Lamb sold at 20 to 30 cents, veal 18 to 20, and beef at 12 to 30 cents a pound.

SURVEY ROADS AT TUCKER PARK

Commissioner Frink said this morning that he and the superintendent of streets had gone over the Tucker Park area and had surveyed two routes which the road from Tucker Park to the Millidgeville Road might take. One route followed the shore and would give a view of the river practically all the way. The other came out about the junction of the Millidgeville and Bear's Head roads. The road which would have to be built would be from one half to three quarters of a mile in length. The commissioner said he had been negotiating with F. P. Starr of the Turnbull Real Estate Company and had been assured by him the company would co-operate in opening up this area.

TRADE INQUIRIES

The Board of Trade this morning received a request from the Canadian Trade Commissioner at Jamaica for literature about the city and province which he could distribute among the merchants and exporters of that place. Several publications have been sent forward. A request for the names of dealers in codfish in Newfoundland was received from a Naples, Italy, concern and names have been submitted with an explanation that St. John's, Newfoundland, is a long way from St. John, New Brunswick.

HOME TO RECUPERATE

P. J. Fitzpatrick and son, Hugh, arrived in the city at noon today from Boston. Hugh was taken ill while attending Holy Cross college at Dunkirk, New York, the result of an injury received during his holidays, and will probably remain at home for some time.

The fire department was called out this morning to answer a call from Box 14 to extinguish a blaze from a burning oil stove in a flat at 47 Prince Edward street, occupied by J. Wetmore. The chemical bucket put out the fire.
