REGISTRY WAS REFUSED SHIPS **BOUGHT FROM U.S.**

Complications at Ottawa Over Restriction Against Use of Vessels as Rum Runners.

Washington, April 12. — Shipping complications of an extended character between the U. S. and Great Britain and her dominions are regarded here as not improbable as a result of a con-troversy between the Washington and Ottawa Governments over two small vessels on the Great Lakes.

The ships were purchased from the shipping board under contracts which stipulated that they should not be used in any manner which would violate the laws of the U. S., and for that reason they were refused registry by the Canadian Government. The particular language contained in the contracts and held objectionable by the Canadian Government apparently with the dian Government, apparently with the backing of London, was drafted by the Department of Justice to prevent any The Canadian authorities notified Secretary Hughes that they could not admit to Canadian registry ships which were subject to domestic laws

of the U. S.

An answer to the Canadian note, ha uded to Sir Auckland Geddes for transmission to the Ottawa Government, contains a defence of the language employed, and clearly states that the restrictions imposed upon operators of craft bought from the board are legal and enforceable from the U. S. point of view. It is learned that the whole subject is under consideration at the London Foreign Office, and that a position similar to that of Canada may be announced soon by the British Govern-

A London Times Medical Writer Says They are the Greatest Panacea for Human Ills.

London, March 21. - (A. P., by mail.)-Sunlight and milk, says a medical writer in the Times, constitutes the greatest panacea for the ills of the human race of the present day. He declares that the next important task of public health authorities is to arouse and apply public opinion and an effective public demand for the adequate restoration of sunlight and milk to the urban population of the

world.

"These two mighty agents of nutrition," he says, are closely related and complementary. Our national supply of both, as compared to the United States, for instance, is deplorable, quantitatively and qualitatively. In some degree this may be due to inevitable gographical necessity; but in a large degree; it is due to our own negligence and ignorance."

We must driak more milk, enjoins this writer. He says the people of England are impossibly handicapped, industrially and otherwise, by the fact that the per capita consumption





The foreign secretary deplored the existence of what he termed "touts" who were engaged in peddling honors to the highest bidders. He referred to this gentry as "a deplorable, discreditable and ignoble phenomena in our public life, which I hope will soon be cradicated."



WOMEN'S SURVEY

Listed as Chief Cause of Unhappiness by Those Engaged in Occupations Outside of Their Homes.

(New York Tribune)

There is discouragement for the Lucy Stoners in the findings of the Bureau of Social Hygiene, which recently interrogated 1,000 women, chiefly college graduates, on intimate questions of love and marital happiness. It was found that "unhappiness" was most often listed where married women were engaged in occupations outside (New York Tribune)

before marriage, 24.9 per cent. continued or returned to their vocation after marriage. Of this number 26 per cent. described themselves as unhappily married. Among twenty-six women physicians who filled in the questionnaire, 92.3 per cent. practiced medicine after marriage and 20.8 per cent. were acutely unhappy, chiefly because of their inability to adjust their work to the demands of married life.

The leading reason given for unhap-

the demands of married life.

The leading reason given for unhappiness in married life was incomptability of temperament or interest. After this came the following causes: Difficulties of adjustment, economic reasons, unfaithfulness, alcoholism, lack of children, insufficient love, violent and uncontrolled temper, religious differences, disparity in age, "too much mother-in-law," ill health, cruelty, too many children and drug addiction. Many Disparities in Age.

Only three mentioned disparity in age, yet a comparison of the ages of husband and wife in individual questionnaires revealed a considerable number of cases where the difference was marked. Fourteen women said they were unhappy from economic reasons although 289 owned up to contributing to the family budget by work outside their homes. The average age of the women who said they were happy proved to be thirty-seven years and of those who were miserable forty-two. Five hundred answers have reached the burcau so far from the unmarried women, who received a slightly less searching questionnaire. The finished analysis will be published in "The Journal of Social Hygiene" when all the returns are in, but a preliminary study has been made of the first 500 to answer. Out of 500 single women, 32 confessed to being unhappy, 97 to finding their life as a whole unsatisfactory and 55 to being unsuccessful. The chief cause of unhappiness is summed up as "to much routine; no chance for complete self-expression."










