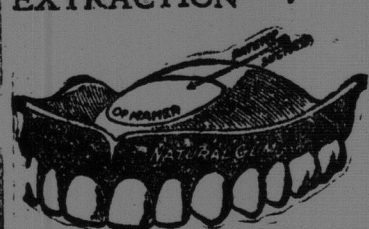

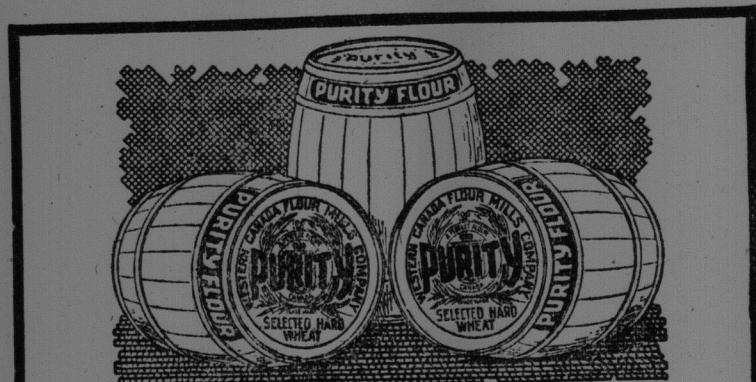

N., who has been director of child welfare in the city under the board of health since last January, told of the conditions which she had found. She said that the infant mortality rate had been 157 out of 1,000 children last year, but an excellent foundation for health work had been laid, and the child welfare exhibit at the fall exhibition had accomplished great things. She appealed for the establishment of a milk fund for needy mothers and children. A vote of thanks was extended to Miss Haslam.

Mrs. W. E. Raymond, who was elected first vice-president in place of Mrs. W. B. Tennant, resigned, was in the chair, and Mrs. Tennant was elected second vice-president.

The common council sent a letter of thanks for the return of the \$500 grant for the entertainment of the National Council. Miss Etta Milligan, corresponding secretary, submitted a report. Mrs. Paterson wrote to the council to explain that the sanitary drinking fountain had never been formally handed over to the city. Mrs. A. W. Eatey gave a report of the Easter treat for the Boys' Industrial Home.

A TINY 'PLANE

With Wing Spread of Only Twenty Feet and Weighing 581 Pounds, It Covers 95 Miles An Hour.

Washington, March 29.—An airplane so small that the pilot might almost tumble over it has been perfected by the engineering division of the United States Army Air Service. Having been designed to take the place of the motor cycle in performing certain messenger service, it has been officially dubbed "the messenger."

With a wing spread of only twenty feet and weighing only 581 pounds, the "Messenger" develops a speed of ninety-five miles an hour and can climb ten thousand feet in ten minutes. Its most remarkable feature though is that it takes twenty-five miles to the gallon of gas—a better record than nearly any automobile.

Equipped with a three-cylinder air-cooled Laefer motor of sixty horsepower, the "Messenger" was given a try-out recently by Lieutenant Corliss C. Mosley, winner of the Pulitzer Trophy. He flew from Washington to Langley Field, Va.

MONTREAL TO HAVE GREAT NEW ARENA

Montreal, March 29.—Construction of the new hockey arena will be proceeded with within sixty days. It will be located in the west end of the city, in the neighborhood of Atwater avenue, will accommodate over 5,000 people, and will cost half a million dollars.

There will be an artificial ice sheet which will make it possible for hockey to be played from December to April. The building will be fireproof, constructed of concrete and steel, and will provide ample accommodation in the way of dressing-rooms and shower baths for the use of players.

The building will supply an urgent need in the city, as hockey is rapidly increasing in favor, and teams have been unable to get accommodation. There are hockey leagues in the city, with thirty teams. It is intended to extend to amateur hockey.

March 29.—(By mail, Canadian Press.)—Up to January 1st, 1921, the number of ex-service men and their dependents who have been approved settlers under the Settlement Scheme, and free passage vouchers, was 16,778; Australia, 1,891; South Africa, 48; Rhodesia, 1; Kenya Colony and Protectorate, and other parts of the empire, 1. A majority have already progressed, except in the case of the island, where the shipping situation is difficult.

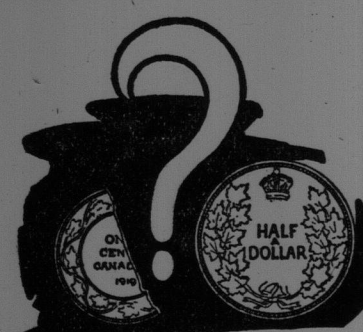

REMEDIES FOR SMOKE NUISANCE

Ottawa, March 29.—One suggestion to remedy the smoke nuisance and a means of overcoming the loss of by-products of raw bituminous coal is contained in the latest bulletin of the Conservation Commission. It quotes Joseph E. Progue as saying that the waste occasioned by the firing of raw bituminous coal in the U. S., including the loss of by-products and the damage by smoke, might be represented by an assessment of \$150 on every family.

The suggestion is the establishment of central cooking plants near cities. The value of benzol, tar, ammonia, and gas lost through the burning of raw coal is enormous. Coke is said to be equal to anthracite coal and holds heat as well, while its smokelessness renders it equal to bituminous coal and requires no special appliances.

The minority report favored acceptance, and this element may secede from the party.

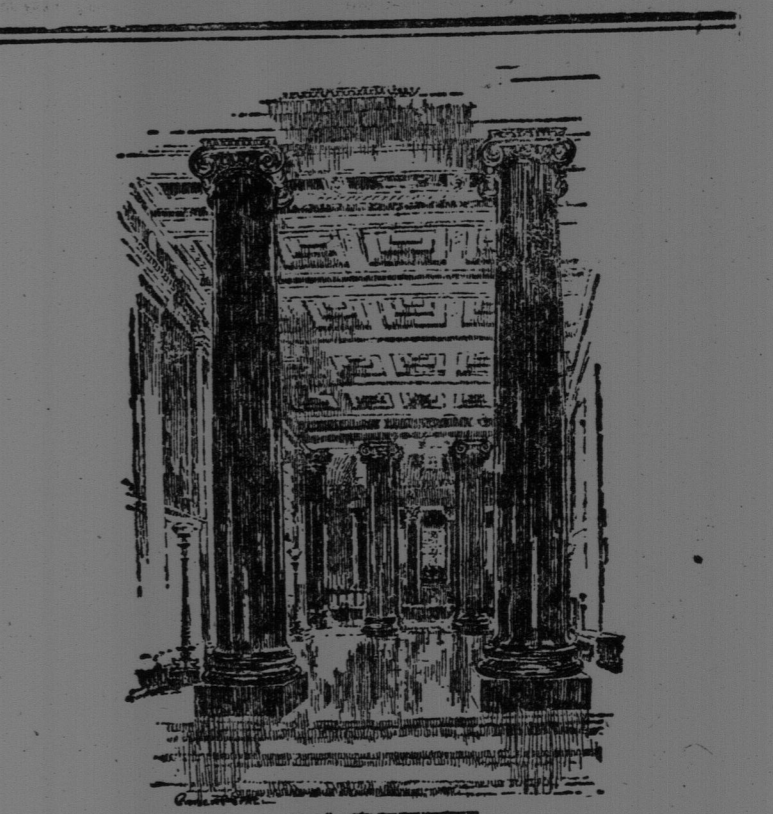

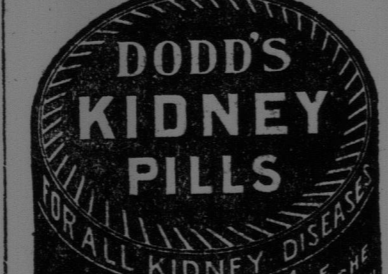

J. F. Gregory, Home From Europe, Speaks of Conditions.
That Canada is three months ahead of England in reconstruction work, was the opinion expressed by J. Fraser Gregory who arrived home this morning on the C. P. O. S. liner Minnedosa after a trip to Nice, Monte Carlo, Paris, London, Edinburgh and Glasgow. He was accompanied by his wife and daughter Olivia. Mr. Gregory said they had a most enjoyable tour, but his impressions on getting home were that "old St. John is good enough for him and as lively and as up-to-date as any place he had visited." Regarding conditions he said that in Great Britain they are worse than here. In England there was a great deal of unemployment, but it was not so noticeable in other places visited.
Asked about lumber conditions, he said the lumber market was absolutely dead. He looked carefully into conditions on his tour and confessed that the outlook is not very bright for the present at least.
