



It was necessary for him to attend the session of the Kings county municipal council to explain the public health act, but more important still was the need of organization of the province to cope with a possible outbreak of influenza. Dr. Melvin, provincial health officer, only returned yest-rday from Philadelphia, where his daughter was ill, and Dr. Roberts gave all the more of his own time to the work. Martin and many other men of note.

A measure of this kind would do something to restrain rent profiteering.



In the butchers' stalls round roasts of beef were to be found at 20 to 30 cents a pound; round steak, 32 cents; sirloin, 35 cents, and porter-house, 40 cents. Sausages were to be found as low as 20 cents a pound, and bacon for 49 cents. Legs of lamb were 35 cents. Chickens were 35 cents a pound to 45 cents.

The fish stalls had frozen herring at 9 cents a pound; haddock, 12 cents; whitefish, 14 cents; cod and pickerel, 15 cents; haddie, 17 cents; trout, 20 cents; fillet of haddie, salmon and halibut, 23 cents.

New-laid eggs ran all the way from 86 cents to \$1.10, but 85 cents was the prevailing price. Butter was 65 to 70 cents a pound, but mostly 70 cents.

Apples were 75 to 85 cents a basket, and pineapples were 15 cents each and 2 for 25 cents. Rhubarb was 16 and 20 cents a bunch.

The reports of the captain were that the ship proved to be a splendid seagoing vessel and everything worked very smoothly in the passage across. On arrival in England the "War Moncton" was sold to Italian buyers.


