DIPLOMATS ARE WATCHING KEELY

Renewal of Peace Negotiations is Not Unlikely

OTHER TROUBLES IN AIR The Bulgarian-Romanian Situation Menacing and Russia and Austria Carry Shoulder Chips—Enver Bay Cables Denial of Attempt to Kill Him

(Canadian Press) New York, Feb. 18.—A cable from Constantinople says: Diplomatic circles are keenly discussing the probable resumption of peace negotiations between Turkey and the allies, the restoring of relations of Romania and Bulgaria, with their menace, and the situation existing between Russia and Austria. The operations at Thessalonika and all other points since the beginning of the war have been inactive. Men have died by hundreds on both sides, but the possibility of the belligerents remains unaffected. After the late coup d'etat by the young king, Kiamel Pasha was quoted as predicting that when shepherds came face to face with the situation he would want to see just as badly as the ousted government wanted it. This prediction has now been verified, although the position of the Turks is not such as to require immediate overtures for peace, the growing tension between Romania and Bulgaria causing a rift between Turkey and the allies.

(Canadian Press) London, Feb. 18.—A cable from London to the Tribune says:— One of the most sensational incidents that has occurred in racing circles for many years, took place yesterday when the stewards of the National Hunt Committee, (the body which controls steeplechasing in England), warned off "Tom" Coullivatte, of Hereford, who is probably the best known and the ablest trainer of jumpers in the United Kingdom, and R. Chadwick, a steeple chase jockey, who has been associated with Coullivatte's stable for some years.

(Canadian Press) London, Feb. 18.—News of the operations of the Balkan war is extremely vague as the Turkish Government has refused to allow any delay owing to the strict censorship of the Turkish Government. A fire which broke out in the district containing the Mosque of St. Sophia, in Constantinople yesterday, was extinguished in the night after 20 houses and a school had been burned to the ground.

ARCHITECTS BUSY; PROMISE OF MUCH SPRING BUILDING

Architects are all getting busier as the winter approaches, and preparations for spring operations are commencing. From work they already have in hand, and what is talked of by their clients, it appears that the amount of construction to be undertaken here this year will be a larger scale than in very many years.

Miss Zelie Emerson, a millinerette of Jackson, Mich., who is engaged on a campaign of window smashing in the East End of London with Miss Pankhurst, was again arrested today sentenced to a term of two months' hard labor. Miss Emerson and her comrade Sylvia Pankhurst was also sentenced to the same term of two months' hard labor. Miss Emerson had already been sentenced to jail for six weeks in default of paying a fine of \$100 indicated for a similar charge. A fine was paid by a friend and she released.

"Human life is nothing," he said, "if by going forth we can add one iota to the sum of human knowledge."

PAVING PROGRAMME FOR THE CITY ADOPTED

Cost Estimated at \$125,000—Men Making Too Free Use of Ladies' Cabin in Ferry

The permanent pavement programme for 1913 was adopted at the meeting of the Council yesterday afternoon. The Commissioners deferred action on civic grants until all were received. Several matters relating to harbor improvements were dealt with, and it was decided to enforce more strictly the regulations regarding the use of the ladies' cabin on the ferry boat, by men.

The Commissioner of finance recommended the renewal of grants to the Victorian Order of Nurses, \$500; Horticultural Society, \$6,000; Riverside Park, \$200; Free Kindergarten Association, \$800; Natural History Society, \$500; N. B. Tourist Association, \$600; band concert, \$700; and Arboriculture Society, \$200. Grants have been asked for the Art Club and the Home of the Good Shepherd and as other applications are expected, the whole list will be fought for later.

The Commissioner of public lands was authorized to sell at auction half a dozen lots in houses and lots in Lancaster.

The report of the Public Library was submitted.

The Trades and Labor Council wrote approving of the plan for an ambulance service along the water front and Commissioner Schofield reported that he was taking steps to put this plan into effect.

A letter from a Lewin physician in England offering the services of one of his experts was referred to Commissioner Agar.

The resolution embodying the request of the council that the plan for deep water wharves in Logyriety Bay be altered to allow more room for railway facilities at their base was adopted and will be conveyed to Ottawa by the city delegation.

Commissioner Schofield drew attention to the fact that men had been crowding the ladies' cabin on the ferry boat while women were forced to stand. It was decided to enforce the by-law limiting its use by men to those accompanying ladies, with a \$2 penalty for violations.

Commissioner Agar introduced the programme for permanent pavements and it was decided to proceed with work under the Local Improvements Act, which provides that half the cost will be paid by the owners of the properties benefited.

The expenditure involved will amount to about \$125,000. The programme includes: British street—Between Charlotte street and Reed's Point, granite block paving, total cost, \$23,850; cost per lineal foot to abutting property, \$3.27.

Union street—Waterloo street to Brunel street, granite block paving; total cost, \$8,800; cost per lineal foot to abutting property, \$4.65.

North side—King Square—Bituminous macadam, vitrified brick and concrete; total cost, \$9,894.95; cost per lineal foot to abutting property, \$3.90.

Union street—Chipman Hill to Waterloo street, asphalt; total cost, \$17,455; cost per lineal foot to abutting property, \$3.77.

Charlotte street—Dufferin hotel to Queen street, bituminous macadam and vitrified brick; total cost, \$29,400; cost per lineal foot to property, \$3.00.

Princes street—Germain street to Charlotte street, asphalt; total cost, \$4,127.50; cost per lineal foot to abutting property, \$2.90.

Germain street—Princes to King street, bituminous concrete; total cost, \$8,028.75; cost per lineal foot to abutting property, \$3.70.

Germain street—King street to Union street, granite block paving; total cost, \$9,922.50; cost per lineal foot to abutting property, \$4.82.

South side of King Square—Asphalt; total cost, \$6,800; cost per lineal foot to property owners, \$3.50.

Sydney street—West side of King Square to Union street, sheet asphalt and granite blocks; total cost, \$8,700; cost per lineal foot, \$0.65.

In addition to the foregoing Paradise Row from Mill street to Foundry Lane is to be paved with granite blocks at an estimated cost of \$7,000 which would cost per lineal foot of frontage \$5.90. It is expected that arrangements will be made for the paving of other streets.

Daily Hints For the Cook

MY BROWN BREAD. One cup flour, one cup corn meal, one cup Graham flour, teaspoon of salt, two teaspoons baking powder, one cup milk, one cup water, half cup molasses, one cup of raisins floured. Mix all together, grease brown bread tin. Fill two-thirds full and cover tight. Place in a kettle of boiling water, cover kettle and boil for four hours. Then place in oven and bake one-half hour.

WEBSTER PUDDING. One cup of molasses, one cup of milk, half cup melted butter, half cup of brandy or wine, one teaspoon of soda, one teaspoon of cinnamon, cloves and a little nutmeg, one pound currants and a little salt. Mix as soft as pound cake and steam or boil two hours. Hard or wine sauce. What is left can be steamed over and over. This receipt may be reduced by one-half.

PLAYGROUNDS MATTERS ARE PLACED BEFORE COMMISSIONERS

A committee from the St. John Playgrounds Association met with the city commissioners yesterday afternoon and discussed matters in connection with the grant of \$1,000 for which the association has applied in order to open up new neighborhood playgrounds in different parts of the city. Another grant of \$2,000 was asked for in order to improve the Rockwood playground.

The committee explained the programme of the association and also urged the need of an athletic field. The commissioners seemed to favor the plans, but it was pointed out that the proposal to construct an athletic field at Rockwood Park would be an expensive undertaking. In the first place the drainage must be provided and it was thought that a great amount of expense would be necessary before the work could be completed. It was finally decided that the services of an expert in the building of playgrounds should be secured before any expenditure is made on the grounds.

The committee which met the commissioners was made up as follows: Walter C. Allison, Magistrate Ritchie, R. H. Bruce, Miss Grace Leavitt and A. M. Belling.



THE PROVINCIAL FARMERS

There was a cheerful tone to all the addresses delivered at the meeting of the Farmers' and Dairywomen's Association at Fredericton yesterday. There were good returns to the farmers, and during the year a forward step was taken in connection with the experimental farm, the agricultural schools, and the appointment of experts in connection with some of the departments. The Women's Institutes have developed to a point where they are able to hold a convention.

This week's meeting at Fredericton brings together representatives of all branches of agriculture, and the meetings of this year may fairly be described as the most important that have ever been held in Fredericton. The organization of Women's Institutes ought to be of great value. The Seed Growers' Association should be able to do much to encourage farmers to provide their own seed and import smaller quantities. The Fruit Growers' Association is now well established and doing splendid work. The more general interest that is being taken by farmers in the various organizations, and in the matter of experimental and demonstration farms and orchards, and in agricultural education, affords ground for confidence that the next few years will witness such a forward movement in agriculture and all its branches as will not only make farm life more attractive for the young, but make this province very attractive for farmers from the old country who are seeking new homes.

It is worth while, however, to take note of one or two statements made in Fredericton last night and suggest that farmers should seriously consider them. One speaker pointed out that at the Fredericton Exhibition last year most of the prizes were captured by exhibitors from Nova Scotia. Another dwelt upon the importance of the teaching of elementary agriculture in the common schools. There were references to the need of better roads. Bishop Richardson made a pointed reference to the practice of some farmers of going to the lumber woods in the winter, instead of devoting their whole attention to the work of the farm; and his lordship also made a wise suggestion when he advocated the investment of money instead of merely hoarding it. A good farmer with a good farm can find profitable investment for his money in directions which would steadily increase the value of his property and his products.

No doubt during this session of the Association some consideration will be given to the question of co-operation, and also to the great need for such action as would reduce the difference between what the farmer gets for his product and what the ultimate consumer is compelled to pay for it. These are two of the most important questions before the farmers of the country at the present time.

JOAQUIN MILLER

One of the most picturesque figures in American literature passed away yesterday when Joaquín Miller, Poet of the Sierras, died at his home in the Piedmont foothills in California. Going with his father to Oregon when he was ten years old, and three years later to California, he led a wandering life as boy and youth. Later he studied law, but the lust of adventure was in his blood. Twice he was wounded in Indian wars and once led an unsuccessful expedition against the Indians. He was an express messenger in the gold mining districts of Idaho when the duties of that office were attended by great risk. All his life until recent years he was more or less a wanderer, and the spirit of adventure took him to the Klondike in 1897, and to the Orient two years later. He visited Europe many times, and out of the wealth of his experience, and with his vivid imagination, he produced poems and novels, a history of successfully produced on the American stage. Some of his writings rank with the best productions in American literature. He endeavored to establish a social community on his California estate, in harmony with certain theories of social development which he upheld, but it does not appear to have been a success. A strange, stormy and adventurous life has closed, and there will be many to pay tribute to the memory of the Poet of the Sierras.

TAX REFORM

The Ottawa Journal has a cartoon showing Sir James Whitney followed by a black cat labelled tax reform, which is making a great deal of noise. Sir James scratches his head and says: "There is that blamed cat following me all over." The Journal itself, which is a Conservative paper, is certainly following Sir Whitney to some purpose. Taking up the charge made by somebody in the Ontario legislature that the land tax is socialist, it says: "Vancouver has the land tax—the single tax. So has New Westminster. So has Edmonton. So has Saskatoon. Calgary assesses buildings at only 15 per cent of their value. Regina assesses buildings at a lower rate than land. These are the six largest cities of the west, barring Victoria. What the practice is in Victoria we do not know—perhaps some reader can say. Many of the smaller towns of the west follow the example of the cities in assessing buildings at a lower rate than land. In brief, it is true to say that throughout the dominion west of Winnipeg the principle

of the land tax rules. If the land tax is Socialism, Socialism is exhibiting the most prosperous communities on the earth today. But the land tax is not Socialism. Socialism is a principle which seeks to make people divide up. The land tax is a principle which seeks to encourage individual effort and gain. The land tax is the opposite of Socialism.

PRODUCER AND CONSUMER

The United States congress has before it a bill which, it is said, has a fair prospect of becoming law at this session. The object of the bill is to effect a saving in the unnecessary expense of marketing farm products, and to make it possible to prevent waste by getting all the products to market. It is estimated that the value of the crop of the United States last year was \$6,000,000,000, but that the cost to the consumer was \$12,000,000,000. Thus the distributor or the various distributors actually get more than the producer. The bill before congress proposes to establish in the department of agriculture what will be known as a market division, whose task would be to circulate news concerning markets and prices and to bring the producer and consumer into closer contact, encouraging them to co-operate. The bill is based upon the report of a committee which submitted the following among other reasons for a change in the present conditions of marketing products.

"For instance, it is said that in the year farmers sold \$17,000,000 worth of eggs in New York and the consumers paid for the same eggs more than \$28,000,000. Cabbage worth \$1,250,000 to the producer was sold in the New York market for \$9,125,000. Milk for which farmers received \$23,000,000 was sold in New York for nearly \$40,000,000. Potatoes valued at \$8,457,000 to the producer were sold to consumers for \$9,000,000. Onions sold to the New York market for \$821,000 went into the hands of consumers at a cost of \$8,212,000.

The committee further points out that millions of dollars' worth of farm products go to waste because the farmer does not know where to find a profitable market. The committee's report says this striking tribute to the value of co-operation:—"Among the greatest agencies in this country today in aid of improvement of market conditions are co-operative organizations organized for the purpose of finding a market for their products."

The assassination of Enver Bey is another tragic incident which marks the decline of the Turkish power and the growing weakness of the Turks themselves.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer holds views regarding assessment quite similar to those expressed lately by Commissioner Schindler. He believes properties should be assessed up to their full value. This would make the tax rate lower, and improve the financial standing of the municipality in the event of its seeking a loan.

Mr. Emerson elicited the information at Ottawa yesterday that the railway board is considering the question of railway and express rates, especially with regard to the Intercolonial Railway, and Hon. Mr. Cochrane said he believed a government express system on this railway would be a source of profit. The conclusions arrived at touching this matter will be awaited with great interest in these provinces.

In parliament yesterday Mr. W. F. MacLean moved that an investigation be made by the railway commission before the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company was requested to increase its capital by \$5,000,000. There was an interesting debate on the subject, but all the Conservatives except Mr. MacLean rallied to the support of the company. The "interests" must get what they want from this government.

BIRTHDAYS OF NOTABILITIES

FEBRUARY EIGHTEENTH.
The Right Reverend Alexander Macdonald, Bishop of Victoria, celebrates his fifty-fifth birthday. A native of Scotland, he was educated at St. Francis Xavier University and the propaganda at Rome. He was for some time professor on the faculty of his alma mater and rector of St. Andrew's, N. S. He was appointed to the bishopric of Victoria in 1898. He is a man of scholarly attainments and has written several theological treatises.

Lieut. Col. Farewell, prominent citizen of the town of Whitley and a man who has taken an active interest in the military life of the country, owns February 18 as his natal day. Born in 1840, he became a barrister in 1864 and practised his profession in his native town for many years. As a young man he joined the 34th Regiment, rising to be its commanding officer and retiring with the rank of lieutenant-colonel in 1890. He holds the Kenan Reid medal and the long service decoration.

Professor J. F. McCurdy, widely known as professor of Oriental literature in the University of Toronto, is sixty-six years old today. He is a native of Chatham, N. B., and a graduate of the University of New Brunswick, Princeton Theological Seminary and the Universities of Göttingen and Leipzig. He held professional positions in New Brunswick and at Princeton, prior to coming to Toronto. He is regarded as one of the first Oriental scholars of the day and was elected to take charge of the School of Oriental Research at Jerusalem in 1911-12.

THE MONTFORT LIMPS INTO PORT

C. P. Liner Damaged on Very Stormy Voyage

CAPTAIN SAYS "THE WORST"

Propeller Snapped and Other Breakage Caused by Rough Weather — Other Steamers Reached Sand Point Last Night and Today

With part of the bridge broken and one of her propellers missing, the big C. P. liner Montfort, Captain Davidson, limped into port this morning disabled, and crawled up to her berth at Sand Point. The steamer left Antwerp on January 28 and had been at sea ever since that time, taking twenty days to make the trip which ordinarily would have been made in two weeks at the outside. Misfortune followed the steamer all the way across.

Rough weather was encountered soon after she put to sea and the big ship was buffeted about by the waves like a toy. On February 3, while steaming along at a fairly good rate, one of the propellers broke off, and from that time on slow sense was in order.

Head winds and gales were encountered daily and considerable damage was done to the ship. Captain Davidson told a reporter this morning that it was one of the roughest trips he has had across. "One continuous gale, and every day it seemed to get worse. The climax came when the propeller went but although the adverse weather did not abate by any means. It was about the roughest trip that I have ever encountered."

The captain reported having passed a derelict when off Cape Sable. There was practically no trace of anything to show what it was, with the exception of a mast which was sticking up in the water. There was no wreckage floating around. Captain Davidson said this morning that he had seen practically no ice on the trip across.

As soon as the boat docked at Sand Point, one of the passengers, David Kolow, who was taken ill on the voyage, was removed and taken to the hospital in the ambulance. The Montfort had on board 233 average passengers. Despite the rough weather there was little or no sickness among the passengers.

It is likely that the Montfort will be repaired here before proceeding on her return trip. If repairs cannot be effected here she will be taken to the Halifax dock.

The Allan liner Granpian, Captain Williams, also arrived in port this morning from Liverpool. She had on board 295 passengers and more than 4,000 tons of cargo. Captain Williams reports having had a fairly good trip across.

The S. S. Manchester Importer arrived in port last night from Montreal. Captain Linton reports having had quite a rough trip. The Importer had 2,000 tons of freight on board.

MUNICIPAL HOME PROPERTY
