

Situated in the Gulf of the St. Lawrence, and cut off from the mainland by sixty miles of sea, Anticosti is admrably placed for the purpose of carrying out an experiment along the Utopian lines. The island is about 140 miles long and 36 wide at the centre. That is to say, it is longer than from Montreal to Quebec, larger than Corsica, the birthplace of Napoleon, and almost as large as Porto Rico. Of its 2,700,000 acres more than 2,000,000 acres are covered with valuable forests.

In 1886 the Government of Quebec conceded the island to an English company, which introduced a few settlers and some cattle, both of doubtful quality, but made no adequate effort to develop the resources of its domain.
