ANNUAL ADDRESS TO MANUFACTURERS

President Gourlay's Explanation Of The Financial Stringency

THE SOLELY TO EXCESS OF THE IMPORTS OVER THE EXPORTS

His Remedy is Greater Encouragement to Manufacturers—A Good Word For The Banks—Demands For Higher Tariff For Wool and Iron Products—London Hears of Revision, But Not Upward

Halifax, Sept. 17.—In the presence of over two hundred delegates from all parts of the Dominion the annual meeting of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association was opened here this morning.

Discontent of Workers May Involve Many Unions

ONLY LARGE CITIES AFFECTED SO FAR

But Rumblings Are Heard From All Points of British Isles—Three Great Railways Already Crippled—Dublin Situation is Serious—London Worrying Over Threatened Motor Bus Strike

(Canadian Press) London, Sept. 17.—A great national strike, as it was described this morning by one of the trades union leaders, threatens the United Kingdom.

At Liverpool seven of the great freight depots were idle this morning and others are likely soon to be closed for want of fuel.

Peace too, seems to be a long way off between the workers and employers in Ireland, as all attempts have hitherto failed to settle the Dublin trouble which was the direct cause of the stoppage of work at Liverpool and Birmingham.

The difficulty of getting provisions into the Irish capital today has become so great that it is believed the markets there will have to close today.

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ROYAL YEAST

Two eggs beaten till light with 2 tablespoons of sugar. Add 1 large spoon of maple syrup, 3 of sifted squash and 1 pint of hot milk. Season with nutmeg.

On cup molasses, 1/2 cup lard, 1/2 teaspoon of ginger and cloves, pinch of salt, 1 teaspoon of soda dissolved in boiling water, 1/2 cup of cold water, flour to roll.

One cup butter, 1 1/2 cups sugar, white 6 eggs, 1 1/2 pints flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup milk. Flavor with extract peach and a few drops extract rose.

BORDEN IN HALIFAX

Premier Borden delivered a speech in Halifax yesterday before the Conservative Association of Nova Scotia. We are told that he began with an attack upon Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Liberal party, and then discussed the record of the Conservative government since it came into power. So far as can be gathered from the report, Mr. Borden did not mention the emergency. He made some promises, however, concerning the West India trade and the parcel post system, and asserted that his government was dealing generously in the matter of equipment of national ports.

The report informs us that Mr. Borden declared it would be impossible to have Dreadnoughts built in Canada. If he really entertains such a belief, he is not fit to be the premier of Canada. Nobody contends that a Dreadnought could be built in Canada this year or next year, but the company which built the Canadian Pacific Railway, the canal system and the other great public works scattered all over the country are quite as able to construct Dreadnoughts within a reasonable period as they were to accomplish those other great works. Before Dreadnoughts or vessels of any other kind can be built in Canada, shipyards must be established. But for the action of the Borden government in handing back to Cammell, Laird & Company their deposit of \$100,000, St. John would now have the beginnings of a shipyard, and it would be possible within a very few years to build Dreadnoughts if they were needed. At all events the Canadian people will not consent to the expenditure of \$28,000,000 of Canadian money to build Dreadnoughts in the old country shipyards while no effort is made to provide this country with shipyards of its own. Sir Wilfrid Laurier will be quite willing to accept any responsibility Mr. Borden may be disposed to thrust upon him for having prevented the carrying out of a policy which would place the brand of inferiority upon the people of this Dominion.

Mr. Borden is alleged to have said that the Liberals of every Imperial conference steadfastly refused to take a part in the naval defence of the Empire. This cannot be a correct report of what Mr. Borden said. When he came into power the Liberal government was carrying out an imperial naval policy to which Canada had agreed at the last Imperial conference, and which was also agreed to by Australia, and moreover was suggested by the admiralty. The Toronto Globe says: "There is only one safe and sure way of making the land speculator pay his fair share of taxation. Were the vacant land already within the city limits assessed at its full value, and were the buildings assessed at a lower rate or not at all, the withholding of land from use would become unprofitable, and speculators would be glad to make way for builders."

THE CHEAPNESS OF LIFE "A member of the Brotherhood of Trainmen is killed every seven hours and fifteen minutes, and every nine minutes a man is maimed."

When his statement was challenged, he referred the committee to the statistics of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

A Canadian Journal, seeking a cause for the remarkable increase of crime in this country, wonders if the explanation may not be found in part in the cheapness of human life, as generally regarded. On this point it says:—"Fatal industrial accidents are of much more frequent occurrence in America than in Europe; our railways kill a far greater number than do theirs, our street accidents are far more frequent and fatal, our construction works take a higher toll of human life, and where the state, the corporation and the company hold human life at a low value it is not unreasonable to suppose that their attitude is unconsciously reflected upon the individual."

The same Journal says it will not do to offer the "foreign element" as an explanation of the alarming growth of crime, since the criminal statistics show

USE ADVERTISING TO GET RECRUITS FOR BRITISH ARMY

London, Sept. 17.—The army is wanting men badly, and in order to obtain them, the Army Council is following the lines of other enterprising people and adopting new methods of advertising. Twenty years ago young men who wished to "adopt the military life" were invited to do so simply by means of colored placards posted in post office windows or on the notice boards of other public institutions. But now the death of recruits has become so serious that newer methods have had to be brought into play. The death of recruits is attributed largely to soldiers on furlough wearing plain clothes and being seldom seen in uniform in the large towns. It has been decided to pay soldiers proceeding on pass or furlough to Birmingham at the rate of 1s. per diem for three hours' work to walk about in their uniform in such localities as the recruiting staff desire, and use their best endeavors to get young men to join the colors. Both non-commissioned officers and privates are to be employed and they are to wear their attractive regimental clothing, the khaki being discarded for the time being. When the army exercises end on September 26 the towns and villages in the Midlands are to be invaded by officers and privates, who are to carry out recruiting marches in Derby, Nottingham, and Northampton.

SCOTLAND YARD LOSES GIGANTIC POLICEMAN London, Sept. 17.—Scotland Yard lost its most gigantic and picturesque figure when Inspector William B. Kemp retired this week. Kemp was the biggest man physically in the Metropolitan police force. He weighed over 300 pounds, and this, too, without an ounce of fat. He was over six and a half feet tall, and built generally on a titanic scale. For many years he had charge of some of the toughest districts in London. He had the credit of the arrest of Chapman, one of the famous prisoners of England years ago. He was afterwards one of Superintendent Frost's right-hand men in solving the mystery of the murder of Belle Elmore by her husband, Dr. Crippen. In recent years Kemp has been Inspector Secretary to the Superintendent of Scotland Yard, and also of the committee for the reception of foreign police officials.

CANADIAN SURVEYORS KILLED BY LANDSLIDE IN THEIR ALASKAN CAMP Ketchikan, Alaska, Sept. 17.—Two surveyors attached to the Canadian boundary survey were killed last Saturday when a landslide destroyed their camp at Cape Musson, Dall Island, according to word received here today. The names of the men were given as Robertson and Bade. The party had been working on the boundary survey up Portland Canal and Dixon entrance all summer, maintaining camps at Cape Musson and Cape Chacon. A prospector who went to investigate found an immense slide had started from the top of the mountain, tearing down the mountain and cut into the bay 100 feet and in several places for a width of more than 100 feet. No trace could be seen of the former camp.

THE CLOSURE

Early Threat in Ottawa Against The Liberals WHEREIN IT IS WRONG

Important Matters of Redistribution, Tariff and the Navy Demand That Members Have Free Opportunity to Discuss Them

(Carlton Sentinel) We have the semi-official assurance that the dominion parliament will not be called to meet till early in 1914. We have it hinted that the session will be a short one, and it is also hinted that a mere party instrument to limit necessary discussion in the interests of party legislation, it is to be swung through. Parliament is to be run like a railway restaurant. One can buy tickets to eat, but he must bolt it, for the time is limited by the inexorable closure represented by the departure of the train.

And yet there is most important legislation which, in the interests of the country, should receive ample discussion. We shall have, or should have, a redistribution bill introduced and that especially should be well talked over, maturely considered. The government will be tempted in such a bill to load the dice against the opposition; and if we are to judge by the past the temptation will not be strenuously resisted.

This bill was due in the session of 1912, the first after the decennial census, when as the confederation act prescribes, the seats should be readjusted. The government will not be anxious to introduce this legislation. It is mortally afraid of an appeal to the country at a general election. As a matter of fact, it can't consistently go to the country without a redistribution of seats. If it does between fifteen and twenty constituencies in possession, will not be allowed to have the representation to which the population entitles them. While redistribution is neglected, the government will have that as an excuse for not holding a general election.

Then there is tariff revision. Surely the dominion government is not willing to continuously endorse the Fielding tariff. Good as it was in its day, it doubtless needs some measure of adjustment to changed conditions. The rate of customs and other taxation raise an unnecessarily large revenue; and the high cost of living is held to have some vital relation to high tariff. The United States is amending its tariff, and though we may resolve theoretically and at election time to have "no truck nor trade with the Yankees," our largely increasing exports to, and imports from that country make the changes which the tariff revision will produce in industrial conditions, a matter of direct concern to Canada. While we do business, as we are doing increasingly every year, with the United States, the tariff which in-

fluences our business relations cannot be a matter of indifference to us. Then the next question is bound to come into some sort of prominence at the next session. Mr. Borden is committed to Canada taking the larger share in imperial defence; as Australia and New Zealand have done. He certainly is not going to stop with his inadequate contribution policy. If Mr. Borden will introduce, as he seems worthy of the dignity of Canada as the most important of the overseas dominions, a bill that the Liberal party, and even the senate, will not stand in the way. With three such important measures

on the programme and others that will doubtless arise, there should be an opportunity for the free and full discussion their importance demands. But if the government, in the pride and arrogance of power represented by a large and pliant majority, sees fit to choke off discussion, to apply the closure, the opposition must protect the interests it is bound to serve, and invoke the senate which can and should be depended upon to express its opinion of legislation forced through the popular chamber without adequate consideration, and therefore crude and imperfectly digested. The government may seek to apply the closure and force through the measures that may not be in the public

COURT ORDER IS A BLOW TO THEOSOPHICAL SOCIETY

Indian Boys Must Be Given - Thirty-First Time For One on Earth in Contention

(London Daily News)

According to a judgment of Mr. Justice Bakewell in the Madras High Court on April 15, Mrs. Besant has to deliver up to their father the two boys, Krishnamurti and Nityananda, for whom she claimed extraordinary powers. She brought them to England two years ago.

Mr. Justice Bakewell has made them wards of court until they reach the age of 21, and he expressed the view that the English would assist the Madras court in securing the return of the boys, who are in England.

In a report of the judgment the "Hindu" states that a Theosophic sub-organization, called the Order of the Star of the East, was formed with Krishnamurti, under the name of Alcyone, as its head. The boy was initiated into the mysteries of occultism by Mr. Leadbeater, whose principles, openly

admitted as a "disciple," and a few days later advanced to the third stage, which made him a son of the master, Koc Hoomi. At that time it was reported "He attained that first of the great initiations which not only makes man safe for ever, but also admit him as a member of the Great White Brotherhood that rules the world."

"His recollections" - he remembers all his incarnations - appeared in a theosophical publication.

In the natural course of events it could only be a matter of time till our credit abroad would approach its limit, and this past year the inevitable happened. Supplies were in part shut off, carrying charges had still to be met and the result was light money.

Since the commencement of this stringency a good deal of criticism has been levelled against our banks for their alleged failure to provide the funds necessary for the business of the country. I am sure I am right in crediting you all with a desire to see our country possessed of such equipment at the earliest practicable date.

London Views

Neither is the iron and steel schedule satisfactory. As at present constituted it is, to some extent, encouraging the establishment and expansion of what may be called "secondary industries," but it is far from adequate in the protection it affords to certain of the more basic branches of the iron and steel trade, where the investment in plant must necessarily be heavy and where volume of output counts for much. I cite only these two cases to support my contention that the tariff needs revision and needs it badly.

Paris, Sept. 17.—A new automobile head-lamp which represents a radical departure from present designs has made its appearance in France. The lamp has the shape of a human eyeball and turns in its socket in exactly the same manner as the eye. Two small lamps controlled by thumb screws from the interior of the car hold the lamp in position in any desired direction, while the handle itself is used in turning the light rays to the side they are needed.

CANADA CANNOT, SAYS THE PREMIER

Impossible to Have Dreadnoughts Built Here—Hon. Mr. Borden's Speech at Halifax

Halifax, Sept. 16.—For an hour and a half this afternoon The Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden addressed his followers attending the annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Conservative Association. The premier placed the responsibility for the defeated naval bill upon the shoulders of Sir Wilfrid and said that he had assumed an enormous responsibility. Speaking of the national ports the premier stated that the government was dealing generously with the needs of commerce. The proposed terminal at Halifax would be adequate to the necessities of the port for years to come, and he said that St. John, Quebec, Montreal and Vancouver would be similarly equipped.

Mr. Borden announced that the government would establish a parcel post system early in 1914. He spoke of the West Indies trade agreement and stated that the government had arranged with the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company to inaugurate a bi-weekly steamship service to the West Indies from Canada.

To acquire the full status of British citizenship, said Mr. Borden, it is necessary that Canada should do her part in maintaining the navy. He stated that while it was the desire of the government to advance shipbuilding in Canada, it would be impossible to have Dreadnoughts built here.

Stevadoro Swanton, who was reported yesterday to have had some trouble with the men employed by him unloading a schooner, said today that there had been no strike. There had simply been a difference concerning certain matters, and the discharge of some of the men had followed.

RURAL MAIL ROUTES INCREASED BY 1,000
Postal Department Now Carries Mail to Doors of 90,000 Farm Houses—Business Increases

Ottawa, Sept. 17.—There were 1,075 rural mail routes in operation in Canada on September 1, serving nearly 70,000 boxes. In addition 411 new routes were under advertisement so that there are nearly 2,400 routes either already established or about to be set up, and nearly 90,000 farm houses are receiving mail at their doors. When the present government came into power, in October 1911, only 416 routes serving 15,000 boxes were in existence.

In addition, Hon. Mr. Pelletier since taking office has opened 1,890 new post offices, as well as 675 new money order offices, and 899 postal note offices. From October 1, 1911, to the present time the amount remitted by money orders shows an increase of \$88,880,000 as compared with the previous eighteen months, or 88 per cent.

The number of money orders in this period increased by \$2,709,000 or 28 per cent. The amount remitted by postal note during the same period shows an increase over the previous eighteen months of \$1,800,000 or 19 per cent.

A HOME STUDY COURSE IN THE COUNTY JAIL, REWARD OF IGNORANCE

Jerome Gillis not being able to give a good account of himself, Policeman Ross, who found him sitting on the street near the depot last night, awarded him a bed in jail. This morning he was brought before Judge Ritchie.

"I don't know, y' honor."

Sportsmen are at the hotels from Maine, Quebec, New York, and a scattering from more remote places on the continent. One of them told the Times that it had been noted abroad that New Brunswick offered the greatest chances of good sport anywhere in the dominion of Canada.

"Moose hunting is recognized as the king of all sports," he said, "and New Brunswick is said to have more moose than any other section of Canada. Therefore all the sportsmen who can afford it are coming here."

THEY GOT A MOOSE

Capt. Ed. Nettleton and his friend, Col. Jennings, of New Hampshire, have just returned to the city from a moose hunt, bringing in a fine specimen, one of the first of the season. Capt. Nettleton is a veteran of the civil war and remarked that his friends call him "an old sport." Since he was born in 1837, perhaps, he is, but he has the spirit of a youngster. Much of his time is spent in fishing and hunting, and the doctor tells him that to the outdoor life he owes his present vigor.

ST. JOHN INSTITUTION RECEIVES GENEROUS BEQUEST FROM LATE CHARLES E. PERKS

Houlton, Sept. 17.—The \$40,000 estate of Charles E. Perks of Houlton, who died last month, will be divided among several Catholic institutions in Maine and New Brunswick. St. Dunstan's parish of Fredericton, N. B., will receive \$4,000; Fredericton hospital, \$1,000; St. Vincent's De Paul of Fredericton, \$2,000; Misericordia Home, St. John, \$1,000; St. Mary's convent, Houlton, \$3,000; and the Ecclesiastical Students fund of the Catholic diocese of Portland, \$1,000.

The remainder will be divided between St. Mary's church of Houlton and St. Dunstan's parish of Fredericton, which are made residuary legatees.

ST. JOHN MEN IN CAMP AT ALDERSHOT

Winning Praise From Officers in Charge—Medical Corps Members Defeated Halifax in Baseball Game

The members of the No. 8 Field Ambulance who, under command of Lieut-Colonel T. D. Walker are encamped at Aldershot, N. S., for their annual training are having a fine time besides securing some valuable practice in first aid and general hospital work on the field. The weather has been fairly good, except that there has been considerable rainfall. The St. John boys have thus far made an excellent showing in every way and have won expressions of commendation from those in charge of the camp for their general appearance, efficiency, and conduct.
