Beauty is the Ballyhoo That Attracts Men, But More is Needed to Hold Them— If the Homely Girl Culti-vates Charm of Mind and Heart, She Can Snap Her Fingers in the Face of Dull, Vain Beauty.

als beauty the only thing that attracts men to a woman? Had a girl, who wasn't around when good looks were handed out better abandon hope of getting a husband and reserve her accommodation in the Spinsters' Retreat?"

By no means. The homely girl's case is far from being as desperate as either she, or men, esteem it to be.



IT IS true that beauty is woman's one best bet, and that if every daughter of Eve were given her choice between the inside furnishing of her head and the outward adornment of it, she would unhesitatingly choose naturally wavy hair, a peaches and cream complexion and a willowy figure in preference to brains and a noble Christian character.

Never does he inquire if she is intelligent; if she is well educated; if she is interesting; if she is good and kind. Furthermore, any hostess will tell you that it is no trick to get beaux and dance partners for a Dumb Dora who has the sort of skin you love to touch and large cowlike eyes, while she has to browbeat, bribe and conscript men into paying the slightest attention to a girl guest who has half a dozen college degrees, combined with a saleratus-biscuit complexion and stringy hair.

Thus it would seem that the beauty had a walkover, while the plain sister didn't even have a show-in, but in reality this is far from being the case. To begin with, beauty is in the eye of the beholder, and every woman is just as good looking as she looks good to a man. The contours and coloring that make a hit with one man make no hit with another. The irregular features that one man finds hideous appeals to another as piquant, and so it goes.

SOME men adore women of the goddess type. Others prefer the pocket Venus. There are men who admire plump women with gracious curves to their figures, while others fall only for the anatomical specimens now in vogue. And inasmuch as there are no standardized points by which to judge a woman, as there are for pointer dogs, every woman has a chance to find some man who admires just her particular type.

The homely girl may also be comforted by the fact that while men are convinced that they are beauty worshipers and that nothing in the world could induce one of them to marry a lady who could not take a blue ribbon prize in a beauty show, yet they seldom carry their theory into practice, as you can prove by observing any group of wives of your acquaintance.

It is an axiom, which our experience confirms, that great beauties are often old maids and seldom make good marriages, and this shows that while men admire a beautiful woman as they do a beautiful picture, they have no especial desire to possess her for their own. They are willing to let some other man hang the living picture on his parlor walls, while they acquire a nice, comfortable, cheerful chromo with which to live.

AFTER all, old Dame Nature isn't quite such a cruel stepmother nor so unjust as the plain girl charges her with being, for when she bestows an extraordinary amount of good looks on a woman she almost invariably withholds other qualities that are just as potent to conjure with as are violet eyes, a Cupid's bow mouth and a Greek nose.

One of these is brains. Once in a blue moon you meet a woman who has both gray matter and pink cheeks, but the great majority of the beautiful are dumb.

And there is nothing of which you can get more deadly weary than you can of a pretty face that has nothing behind it but inane prettiness. Better far the homeliest countenance, lit with wit and wisdom, sparkling with humor and understanding, than the most beautiful face that masks an empty mind and soul.

Likewise "pretty is as pretty does," as the old proverb says, and the beauty loses out with men because she is almost invariably vain and self-sentered.

FROM her babyhood she has been the spoiled one of the family, the one to whom all the other children were sacrificed, the one who was given the most clothes and the most advantages, who has been a little queen by divine right of her birthright of good looks.

This had made her feel that she has a right to take all and give nothing in return, and this does not make a hit with men who want something warmer, more appreciative, more human in women.

This is where the homely girl has her innings. Having to spend no time admiring herself, she has leisure to burn incense before men.

KNOWING that she has no good looks upon which to depend, she has cultivated her head and her heart and her sympathies so that she is an interesting companion, able to enter into a man's hopes and plans and give him the understanding and appreciation and admiration which he craves.

Undoubtedly beauty is a great asset to a woman. It is the ballyhoo that attracts men's attentions to her, but she has to have something more than good looks to hold them. She must have charms of the mind and heart as well, and if the homely girl has these she can snap her fingers in the face of any dull and selfish beauty. For an ugly woman who is fascinating is the most popular woman on earth.
