## OBITUARIES:

## THOMAS CLEWORTH

Was born at Bedford, in Lancashire, England, November 24th, 1827. In early life he was savingly converted to God, and under the constraining influence of the love of Christ; at the age of nineteen he began to call sinners to repentance; and his name appeared on the plan of the Leigh Circuit, where, for eight years, he exercised his gifts as a local preacher with great approval and success. In the year 1855 he was induced to cross the Atlantic and offer himself as a candidate for our work in this country, where he was accepted and received on trial in 1856, and where he continued to exercise his ministry until the Oonference of 1894, when he requested a superannuated relation, and took up his abode in the town of Napanee. During his ten months' residence in that place he greatly endeared himself to the people at large, and numerous were the expressions of regard for his memory, and sympathy with his sorrowing widow and children. Our departed brother was a man of strict integrity and of unblemished reputation. He never compromised principle, and no one could ever see anything in him that savored of duplicity. His general intelligence, his uniform piety, his godly simplicity and his peaceable disposition recommended him to the respect of all who were closely acquainted with him. He had an ardent thirst for knowledge, and by the diligent cultivation of his mind became a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth. He had a mind capable of embracing the whole analogy of fath, and at the same time of accutately analyzing it. He readily discerned where truth, pushed beyond its proper limits, verged on error ; and hence his expositions of Scripture were clear, distinct and full. His ministry was soundly evangelical, not metaphysically subtle nor modishly sentimental. He never substituted the chaff for the wheat, the tinsel for the gold, the miserable trappings of an empty and artificial oratory for that scriptural truth which is, "when unadorned, adorned the most." In one sentence his ministry was instructive, orthodox and useful. In the gift and grace of intercesssion he greatly excelled, and his public prayers were nearly always remarkable for their richness, fervency and variety. His last illness was of short duration, and much of the time he was unconscious, but when gleams of consciousness came, he Wesley -

> "By death and hell pursued in vain, To thee the ransomed seed shall come ; Shouting, their heavenly Zion gain, And pass through death triumphant home."

He died in great peace, April 23rd, 1895, in the sixty-eighth year of his * age, and the thirty-ninth of his ministry.

To the comforting and strengthening influence of the Holy Spirit we commend his sorrowing friends, trusting that they will prove the fulness of the Divine provision for the children of affiction.

## REPORT OF THE SUSTENT゙ATION FUND COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to make the following report:
First, that the Fund known as the Sustentation Fund of the Bay of Quinte Conference be continued, the constitution of the Fund to be the same as last year, which is as follows:

1. The object of, this Fund shall be to augment the salaries of all ministers and probationers in the active work in the Conference who
receive less than the following amounts: Ordained married men, $\$ 600$; ordained unmarried men, $\$ 350$; probationers, $\$ 300$. These amounts in every case to include salary, board, fuel and horse keep.
2. The income of the Fund shall be the amounts received from offerings and special collections taken on all our Circuits and Missions.
3. The general management of this Fund shall be entrusted to a Committee composed of one minister and one layman elected to the Annual Conference by each Annual District Meeting when the laymen are present, and a ministerial secretary-treasurer elected by the Annual Conference on the nomination of the Committee. This Committee shall transact all necessary business in accordance with the following regulations:
(a) In making grants from the Fund the Commiftee shall have strict regard to the aforementioned scale of allowances. No claim shall be entertained which has not been recommended by the Annual District Meeting, and all Quarterly Boards presenting claims for recommendation shall declare their inability to meet their net deficiencies.
(b) Should the income of the Fund in any year prove insufficient to meet the claims thereon, then the grants shall be so distributed as to make up the allowances of claimants to the same percentage according to the aforementioned scale. Should there be a surplus over the said craims, it shall be carried forward and included in the total income for the ensuing year.
(c) A report shall be presented by the Committee to the Conference annually while in session, including a summary of the business transacted, and an audited statement of receipts and disbursements, and any suggestions deemed necessary to the interests of the Fund, said report as adopted by the Conference to be printed in the Minutes.
Your Committee recommend that the Sustentation Fund be duly considered at the financial district meetings, and an effort be made to inerease the contributions to this Fund. We also recommend the reappointment of Rev. W. B. Seccombe as Secretary-Treasurer of the Fund for the ensuing year. The sum of five hundred and forty-one dollars was placed at the disposal of your Committee, which was distributed as follows:

That we are further of the opinion that much good will result from the establishment by the Dominion Government of their proposed reformatory for young men-first offenders,--but would advise the establishmient of such an institution near some centre of population so that the inmates would come in touch with the practical sympathy and helpfulness of large bodies of lay and clerical Christian workers.

That it is further resolved,-That we hereby recommend the appointment by this Conference of a standing committee on prison reforn, composed of the Revs. Roger Allin, S. C. Philp and J. L. Hughes, Esq. All of which is respectfully submitted.

## SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

The Sabbath School Committee beg to report:
That on examination of the statistics we find a decrease in the number of our schools of thirteen. This may have arisen from the change of districts. We cannot say, with the report of last year, that there are gratifying increases in every department. Several of the columns show a decrease, yet, on the whole, our Sabbath School work presents many encouraging features. There is a considerable increase in the number of members of the Church, there being at the present time 10,780 of our Sabbath School scholars who are enrolled with us in Church fellowship.

The introduction of home classes during the past year is a step in the right direction. We desire to emphasize the importance of this new departure in Sabbath School work, and hope that these classes will soon be established in connection with all our Sabbath Schools, as we believe this will bring about what is so desirable, viz., a greater interest in our homes in Sabbath School work.

We would also urge the importance of the organization of Sabbath Schools at all our preaching appointments, and as far as possible the keeping of them open the whole of the year.

We are glad to note that more attention is being given to the Normal study of the lessons. This will be of great benefit to Sabbath School teachers.

We would call attention to the fact that some of our schools largely patronize foreign publishing houses to the exclusion of our own Sabbath School publications. We are satisfied that no better class of supplies is
published than those issuing from our own Book Room, and earnestly hope that not only this fact, but also our obligations to support our own institutions, will lead our people to be loyal to home interests.

Your Committee would call attention to the new regulations in the Discipline concerring the Educational and Superannuation Fund collections, and recommend that these collections be taken up in our Sabbath Schools on the same day as taken up in the public congregations.

We also call attention to the recommendation that the last day in December be observed as Missionary Sunday, and hope that as far as practicable our schools will follow this suggestion.

We would repeat the recommendation of last year for a Children's Day about the first or segond Sunday in September.

We hail with pleasure the appointment of a Genferal Sabbath School Secretary, and hope his visits will give an impetus to this work.

In conclusion, we would nominate Rev. Jas. Thom, M.A., as Secretary. Treasurer for the coming year, and that he be appointed Conference delegate to the Provincial Sabbath School Association.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.
Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to report as follows:
That whereas we believe that the legalized liquor traffic is contrary to the laws of God and harmful to the best interests of our land ; and whereas we feel that we, as true patriots, cannot sufficiently deplore the influence of this traffic, which raises the greatest barrier to the advancement of this country, and we feel, as true Christians, that this same influence raises the greatest barrier to the progress of the Gospel ; and whereas we believe that the liquor traffic cannot be successfully resisted, or its blighting influence successfully checked, until we have had Prohibition enacted and enforced by the Goverment of the Dominion ; therefore we once more declare our unswerving loyalty to the great cause of Prohibition, and declare this Church to be, as ever, strongly in favor of a prohibitory law. We deplore the fact that neither of our great political parties has taken this matter up as a live plank in its platform, and we urge our membership to exert themselves in the caucuses of the parties, so that both will adopt Prohibition as one of their vital principles. In the meantime, and to this end, we urge upon our people the importance of voting only for such candidates for Parliament as will publicly pledge themselves to vote for Prohibition, even against the call of the party whip; and to support only such candidates for municipal offices as will vote for the cause of Temperance by reduction of licenses, and in every other legitimate way.

Further, believing, as we do, that education in the principles of total abstinence and Prohibition cannot be commenced at too early an age, we respectfully urge upon our members the urgent necessity of ever keeping before their children such teaching and consistent example as shall ensure their early enlistment in the cause of Temperance Reform.

We also impress upon our Sabbath School superintendents and super-

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intendents of Junior Leagues the desirability of a more general use of the Total Abstinence Pledge (in relation to both tobacco and strong drink) among the children and youth, and hope that our Senior Epworth Leagues and other young people's societies will more thoroughly work the Temperance Committees in their several organizations, especially by the use of the local press, for we rejoice in the growing attention given to the Temperance cause by the secular press:
We would urge the attention of our ministers to the cause of Temperance Reform by a more frequent reference thereto in their regular sermons, that strength may be retained and that a more rapid growth of favor in the cause will hasten the day of a total prohibitory law.

With this we are impressed that a more kindly spirit of united effort among Temperance workers will tend to sustain the help needed and to promote the great cause of Prohibition.

We deplore the ownership by any of our church members of hotels, and also their association with such property as may be used for liquor dealing.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Within the bounds of the Bay of Quinte Conference, during the last year, about 87,000 attended the gospel ministrations of 179 ministers and probationers.

The number in full membership has been augmented by 982 , the total membership being now 39,328 .

The people have paid for their preaching services during the year \$99,516.00.

They contributed for missionary purposes, $\$ 26,591.81$, of which sum the Woman's Missionary Societies gave $\$ 5,281.05$.

Thirty-seven thousand, eight hundred and twenty-eight young people came under the weekly oversight and instruction of 4,638 officers and teachers, in 482 Sunday Schools.

There have been at work 208 young people's societies, with a membership of 9,077 .

In our Sunday Schools, of the 37,828 scholars only 3,119 are learning the Catechism. Will all our ministers call the attention of Sunday School superintendents to this very important matter.
The number of copies of the Christian Guardian going into the homes within the Conference is greater than a year ago by 2,211 , yet only 3,541 subscribers receive our excellent paper. Let the somewhat brightening financial outlook be utilized as an occasion of special effort on the part of all our ministers to multiply the spread of this great power for good among the families of our people.

It seems to us that the widely prevailing practice of Sabbath funerals calls for teaching the people the duty of reversing the order of ruling influences, and making holiness to the Lord and supreme regard to God's glory, His will and general edification, take decisive precedence over selfconvenience and personal honor and display.

We think it would afford a very valuable and helpful gauge of the spiritual life of our people if there were inserted in the annual circuit schedule a column showing the number of families observing the important duty of household Bible reading, prayer and praise.

We think it well to call the attention of Quarterly Official Meetings to the great probable helpfulness and usefulness of giving a distinct and large place in all four yearly meetings of the Board to inquiry, conversation and prayer regarding the spiritual life on the Circuit, and how advancement may be most secured.

## SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMYTTEE.

Your Committee would draw attention to the constant need of watchfulness and of earnest effort in resisting the encroachments of ungodly men who, caring nothing for the sanctity and obligation of keeping sacred the Lord's Day, would weaken and even destroy all the safeguards that have hitherto preserved to us the priceless boon of a duly observed Sabbath day. Your Committee would earnestly recommend this Conference that by their votes, by their voice and through the press, they encourage and sustain the efforts of such men as John Charlton, who, by improving and making more stringent the laws affecting the keeping of the Lord's Day, are trying to place and keep the Holy Sabbath day where God intended it should be placed and kept, and which it is the duty of the Christian Church to do.

Once again we would ask the members of this Conference to discountenance, as far as possible, Sabbath funerals. There may be times when they are a necessity but necessity alone should be the excuse for a Sunday funeral. We rejoice in the expression of opinion given by this Conference with regard to the excursion to this town on the Conference Sabbath of this year. Let it be known all through this country that we regard all such Sunday excursions, whether by rail or boat, as worthy only of the severest condemnation-and even excursions that are timed to start so immediately at the close of the Sabbath as practically lead to the violation and desecration of the Lord's Day. It is recommended that no member of this Conference be a party to any such business.

We would also draw your attention to the growing evil of Sabbath desecration by those who indulge in the newer and more modern way of travelling, viz, the bicycle. As a matter of necessity it finds justification, but in the case of the increasing numbers who for pleasure, and pleasure alone, are to be seen going long distances on the Sabbath day, it cannot but lead to that laxity and dissipation which will be ruinous to body and soul. Let the members of this Conference deliver their souls on this matter.

We need hardly remind you of the necessity of discouraging the hiring of livery rigs on the Lord's Day for pleasure and Sunday visiting, the curse of our country circuits.

Concerning Sunday parades, it is recommended that while we do not wish to put ourselves in antagonism to societies and orders attending religious services in our churches, we do earnestly urge all our ministers, when requested to preach for any organization, to make such arrangements as shall not interfere with our Sabbath services and Sabbath Schools.

Let it be repeated again and again, from every pulpit of our Church, from every Sunday School platform, in every Methodist home, "Keep holy the Sabbath day."

## WESLEYAN LADIES' COLLEGE, HAMILTON.

Dear Fathers and Brethren,-The first entry in the Minutes of the Wesleyan Ladies' College, of Hamilton, is dated July 6th, 1860, hence we are just closing our thirty-fifth year. That entry was signed by S. D. Rice, Secretary, and Edward Jackson, Chairman. Since then our halls have been visited by thousands of young ladies, and our graduates number almost four hundred. They are found in positions of honor, trust and usefulness all over the Dominion and many of them in the United States, and several in the mission field. We have furnished lady principals and teachers to several colleges, and rejoice in the success that has attended their labors in these institutions. We have followed the course of our graduates and students with great satisfaction, and have had the rare pleasure of receiving as students, for several years past, the daughters of women who graduated from the old Wesleyan in the earlier days of the, College. No stronger endorsation could be desired by the Institution.

We need not waste your time by any financial exhibit, as the Church
of the is in no way responsible for our finances. Suffice it to say that the college labors under no embarrassment. Like all other institutions we have felt the pressure of the times, but the year just closing is in advance of the year before, and the prospects for next year are better still.

An examination of our course of study will show that it embraces everything found in a first-class institution. As the oldest ladies' college in the Province we cannot afford to employ any teachers except those of the highest grade. In addition to our very extensive work in Literature, Music, Art, Elocution, Book-keeping, etc., we have daily work on the English Bible and Christian Evidences. No lady can graduate from our college without an intelligent conception of the origin of our Scriptures and of the Christian religion. These subjects do not involve any sectarian colorings, and we believe they ought to form an essential study in all our higher institutions.
We are closing a very prosperous year. Excellent work has been done in all departments, and we have a fine graduating class. The year has been pleasant and harmonious throughout, the health of all, both teachers and pupils, has been invariably good, and serious sickness is almost unknown in the College. The discipline of the Institution and the care that has been exercised over our pupils may be inferred from the fact that no mishap of any kind has ever befallen an inmate of the College.

## ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE, WHITBY.

## DIRECTORS' REPORT.

The Board of Directors of the Ontario Ladies' College take pleasure in presenting to the Conference this their twenty-first annual report.

It is with feelings of profound gratitude that the Directors are able to report that, while decreasing attendance and consequent falling revenues have been the experience of nearly all similar institutions in this Dominion during the past year, attributable in part to the depressed condition of the country, the college year just closing has, in regard to attendance, income and the value of the educational work done, been highly satisfactory to the Board.
The total enrolment of pupils has been upwards of 130, and the revenue has exceeded the sum of $\$ 20,000$.

The Directors are pleased to be able to bear testimony to the excellence
of the management of the Institution by the Rev. Dr. Hare and his corps of accomplished professors and teachers. The large attendance of boarders, the gratifying health record, the character of the advanced educational work accomplished, the varied courses of study and the modern methods employed, are evidences that the cause of sound learning is faithfully championed in this institution.

Since the foundation of the College upwards of 2,000 pupils have received the benefits of a thorough training which the Faculty have been careful to impart, no less in the primary than in the collegiate department.

The college curriculum embraces a full course in all the departments of English, Classics, Modern Languages, ${ }^{\sim}$ Mathematics, .Natıral Science, up to third year of university work; a full conservatory course in Music and Elocution; the full Art School course in Fine Art ; a complete Commercial course, including Stenography, Typewriting and Telegraphy ; also the most improved training in Physical Culture.

It is gratifying to the Board to state that the literary advantages afforded by the College are something more than merely superficial in their character. This year the College has prepared pupils for third, second, tirst-class C and first-class B certificates, junior and senior university matriculation, and first and second years in Toronto University.

For a long period the Directors have recognized the fact that the yearly increase in the attendance of pupils, the want of sufficient accommodation and equipment, and the steady advance made by the College to the foremost rank among the ladies' colleges in this country, have rendered it essential, if the College is to maintain its splendid position, that a comprehensive plan of enlargement should be undertaken. Accordingly, after careful consideration, the Board have submitted to the shareholders, who have ratified it, the proposition to erect a science and concert hall to the south of the main building, $130 \times 50$ feet, and three stories high. This addition will include a new science hall, a concert hall with new pipeorgan, a large, airy and attractive dining-hall, and a large number of tirst-class rooms for pupils in residence. There will also be erected a new three-story kitchen; provided with the most approved appliances, bath, etc. Complete steam-heating, electric-lighting, and best modern sanitary arrangements are to be provided, and no expense will be spared to secure ample provision for the home comforts and health of the pupils.
The estimated cost of the proposed enlargement and the sum necessary to discharge the present obligations of the Board amount to upwards of $\$ 60,000$, the greater part of which amount has already been secured. Many friends of the higher education of young women have manifested a practical interest in the undertaking, and the Board take pleasure in making special mention of the munificent gift of Hart A. Massey, Esq., whose interest in Christian education has been so generously exhibited by him on many occasions. In consideration of Mr. Massey's very liberal donation, the Board have designated the new hall "The Lilian Massey Hall," in honor of the donor's daughter. It is proposed to lay the corner-stone of the new structure on the 19th of June, instant, during the Commencement exercises.

This important addition to our present magnificent, palatial building, with its massive walls, turreted towers, spacious halls, magnificent
drawing-rooms with their rich decorations, broad carved oak stairways, elegant stained glass windows, all combine to render the College buildings, when completed, the most perfect, the best equipped and the best adapted to their educational purposes in the country.

The Directors desire to tender to the members of the Conference their grateful thanks for the confidence and the hearty co-operation in the college work in the past, and cordially commend the College to the most favorable consideration and the continued patronage of the Church.

## ALBERT COLLEGE, BELLEVILLE.

## To the members of the Bay of Quinte Conference of the Methodist Church.

Dear Brethren,-The past ten years, under the blessing of God, have been years of wonderful prosperity in the history of Albert College. The enrolment has steadily increased from 125 to over 200. There has been an unbroken record of successes in every department of the college work.

Students have been prepared for the different grades of teachers' certificates and for junior and senior matriculation into the universities with a degree of success unsurpassed by any High School or Collegiate Institute in Ontario. In June, 1894, a class of six wrote on Senior Matriculation and all were successful, two of the number securing First Class Honors. This year 210 students have been enrolled; of this number twelve will write on Senior Matriculation. Arrangenents have now been perfected with the University so that Albert College prepares students for the tirst year's work in Arts, with Honors in all departments.

The long college year, extending from September to the end of June with the class-room grind which the students receive, enables the College to do this work with eminent success. The classes for Junior Matriculation, Rrimary, Junior and Senior Leaving examinations are usually well filled;tand we are hopeful of success. Of eight candidates for teachers' cerdificates in 1894, six were successful. This is a very high percentage, and proves the college work to be well organized and thoroughly efficient. This class of students in attendance ought to be largely increased. In April last, twenty-nine wrote on the Conference preliminary examination. The College offers just the advantages which these young men require. Special classes are formed in the English and theological subjects to meet their requirements. It is expected that the recent legislation of the General Conference in raising the standard
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for Conference Preliminary to Matriculation or its equivalent college certificate will still further increase the number in attendance, as the College has been doing exactly that work for several years in connection with Victoria University.

The Department of Elocution, under the direction for the past ten years of Prof. Shepard, has won a high place in the estimation of the public on account of the prizes won year after year in Elocution by ex-students of Albert in attendance at Victoria and other universities.

The Department of Music has made very marked advancement under the direction of Prof. Dingle, a teacher of large and successful experience, who is also organist of Bridge Street Methodist Church. The department is now thoroughly equipped as a college of music, and the professor with his assistants can offer superior advantages in both instrumental and vocal music.

Miss Emma Clarke has had charge of the Department of Fine Art for the past seven years. Her pupils have won medals in provincial competition with other ladies' colleges, and have frequently received spepial recognition from the Ontario School of Art.

The Commercial Department will be greatly enlarged and improved during the ensuing year, so that the sons and daughters of our ministers and laymen can secure the highest advantages in book-keeping, shorthand, typewriting, etc., with every moral safeguard.

We are profoundly thankful to God for the deep moral and religious influence that has pervaded the life of the College. Each year witnesses among the students a renewed zeal and improved methods of work in both the Y. P. C. A. and the missionary societies of the College. In seven years they have raised by their individual effort considerably over $\$ 1,200$ for missionary purposes. - Their long-expected purpose, for which they have earnestly labored, of sending Rev. F. J. Livingstone, now a Bachelor of Arts and a Doctor of Medicine, as their representative to Africa, seems about to be realized.

Whilst we are pleased with the success that has attended the work of the College in the past, we are just now rejoicing in the wider sphere and even brighter future which opens up before the College. For some years the attendance has quite outgrown the capacities of the building. A few weeks ago Mr. H. A. Massey, of Toronto, offered $\$ 10,000$ to the College for new buildings, provided an additional $\$ 10,000$ could be secured. The city of Belleville has already subscribed nearly $\$ 14,000$, and it is hoped by a complete canvass of the city and by an appeal to influential friends of the College to still further increase the amount, so that from twenty-five to thirty thousand dollars will be expended during the present summer on improvements. A new and commodious building will be erected for class-rooms and chapel, costing over $\$ 20,000$. A gymnasium will be built and additional land will be secured. The present building will be fitted up with every modern convenience and devoted entirely to dormitories, so that the accommodation will be greatly increased.
It will thus be seen that this year will mark a distinct epoch in the history of the College. We shall hereafter be able to offer the highest and best advantages in Literary Courses, Music, Fine Art, Elocution and Commercial Science, associated with every convenience and comfort.

Our friends of the ministry and laity can best serve our interests and
their own by sending to their own Church schools their sons and daughters, and by making our facilities known to all who may be interested therein.

We solicit your active co-operation in making the coming year one of increasing prosperity.

## ALMA COLLEGE, ST. THOMAS.

To the Bay of Quinte Conference of the Methodist Church.
Dear Fathers and Brethren,-The enrolment of students in Alma College this year has reached 150 , representing, as in former years, all parts of Canada, and including 21 from the neighboring republic. The results of examinations under non-resident examiners and the Education Department of Ontario show faithful and successful work on the part of students and teachers. The health of the school has been excellent and the spiritual interests distinctly marked. All the voluntary religious services, such as prayer and class-meetings, Bible Classes, Y. W. C. Association and Missionary services, have shown deep religious interest, about twenty students have professed conversion and united with various Christian churches.

The Graduating Class, if successful in their examinations, will be as follows : M.E.L., 7 ; M.L.A., 1 ; Elocution, 7 ; Music, 6 ; Fine Art, 3 ; Commercial, 1 ; total of 25 .

The College Relief Fund has now reached about $\$ 20,000$, about $\$ 6,000$ being added this year.

The Board of Management and College Council are much encouraged that in this year of great financial stringency the attendance has reached so large a number, and that after payment of all expenditures on school account, of the heavy bill of interest and all costs of agency, etc., the year will show a substantial reduction in the debt.

We ask the brethren of this Conference to help us by their sympathy and prayers, and by their active co-operation in increasing the patronage of the school. We also respectfully ask you to appoint a Conference representative on our Board of Management and Trust.

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## THE ADDRESS OF THE PASTORAL SESSION OF THE BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

"Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers; remembering without ceasing your work of faith, and labor of love, and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, in the sight of God and our Father."

We gratefully acknowledge the vital relationship existing between us as pastors and people of the body of Christ. We have been chosen by you and the Holy Ghost "to feed the Church of God which He hath purchased with His own blood." The scriptural and honorable distinctions pertaining to the Christian ministry involve the gravest responsibilities. When you consider the vital and far-reaching importance of the divine commission to preach Christ, "warning every man, and teaching every man in all wisdom, that we may present every man perfect in Christ Jesus," and what is implied in being "our example of the believers in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity," the great wisdom of delaying the ordination of the candidates for our ministry until they have given full proof of their high calling must be very evident to you. And inasmuch as the first steps towards the holy office taken by our young men, are permitted and endorsed by our official boards, a large share of the responsibility for the character of our ministry rests with you. There is great need of care in recommending to the courts of our Church candidates for its ministry. The one supreme question you are expected to answer is, "Has the candidate given sufficient evidence that he is called of God to preach the Gospel ?" The duty of thes Church is to endorse and give effect to the call of God. To allow any considerations of personal friendship or worldly circumstances to take precedence of the voice of the Holy Spirit is a very serious wrong. We therefore exhort you to guard sacredly the door to the ministry of our Church.
Next in importance to the character of the ministry of our Church is the religious life of its membership. On the principle, "like people, like priest," it is evident that to secure a godly ministry there must be a godly membership. The early training of the heart and mind will reappear in mature life. If the young people, who are to fill the most sacred and influential offices of our Church, grow up with uncertain views of our cardinal doctrines and with little sympathy for our distinctive means of grace or respect for the rules of our societies, the decline of our Church may be predicted with certainty. We exhort you to encourage by all wise means the teaching and acceptance of the scriptural, time-honored and eminently fruitful doctrines of Methodism. Our social means of grace have been handed down to us endorsed by an ancestry of intelligent,
sanctified and successful men and women. To these saints of God we are indebted for the high character of Methodism to day. Give to these means of grace a most loyal support. As in olden times let all our people lead in prayer, speak in our class-meetings, work in our evangelistic services and observe the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.
In addition to our social and public means of grace valuable facilities for Christian work and growth are provided in our Sunday School, Epwortis League and missionary organizations. We commend these institutions of our Church to your Christian sympathy and fostering care.
It is with feelings of earnest solicitude for the growth of the kingdom of Christ that we remind you of the claims of Christian citizenship. The Methodist Church has not given too much attention to personal conversion, but perhaps too little interest has been taken in social reformation. It has been said that "the supreme curse of modern history is the fatal divorce between personal Christianity and social Christianity." This divorce could not have taken place if the Church had fultilled the command, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor, as thyself." It is not only our duty to seek the conversion of souls and the prosperity of our Church, but in loyalty to Christ and His kingdom let us seek to make Canada, in its laws and institutions, in its customs and sentiments, a Christian country. This condition of national and social righteousness cannot be secured if Christian men neglect their civic duty.

Keep in mind that it is your duty to remove the causes, as well as the effects, of poverty, vice and crime. There must be no truce with the powers of evil, no compromise with the ungodly world, but a war of extermination of all that is un-Christian in the commercial and political, the educational and social life of our country.
The Temperance question has assumed great moral and political magni tude in our country. The suppression of the liquor traffic has been called by one of the greatest statesmen of the age, "the question of the age." On this great movement we recommend to you the resolutions passed by our late General Conference: "l. That the liquor traffic cannot be legalized without sin. 2. That it is the duty of the civil government to prohibit the trade in intoxicating drinks. 3. That no political candidate should have the support of Christian electors who refuses to commit himself publicly to the destruction of the liquor tratfic at the earliest possible moment."
It is with pleasure we commend to you our great and successful connexional interests. The missionary and educational, social and economic enterprises of our Church have been eminently successful, largely so because of your sympathy, advocacy and liberality. In addition to the direct results of our connexional departments there are reflex benefits of great value. They tend to enlarge our hearts, to cultivate self-denial, to increase loyalty and to provide most wholesome Christian toil and training for a large number of our people, both young and old. This age has been aptly described as "the age of preparations." This judgment of the course of events has a strong confirmation in our own Church. In view of a great and dawning future let us lay broad foundations, let us build wisely. This cannot be done without preserving a strong and healthy connexional bond. Through our connexional departments the hearts and hands of our numerous Methodist fraternity are closely joined.

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The Missionary Department of our Church has an equipment and record unsurpassed in this country. The outlook is hopeful. The missionary sentiment amongst our young people is largely in the ascendant. Unoccupied fields are waiting and perishing for the Gospel of Christ. Scores of well-trained young men and young women have volunteered for the mission tield. How can they preach unless they be sent? The reponsibility of sending them rests with the Church. We exhort you to take the cause of missions home to your hearts; pray fervently and importunately for the success of this great Gospel scheme. The Word of God and the - history of the Church teach us that the whole basis of successful missionary work is to be found in believing, importunate prayer.

Almost all that has been said respecting our Missionary Department might be repeated of our Educational Work. Our educational institutions are evangelizing agencies. Here our young people are being trained to leaven the political and professional, social and religious life of the world with a pure and intelligent Christianity. From these institutions are being sent forth men and women qualified to govern and mould society after the pattern of true godliness. If possible, send your sons and daughters to our own institutions of learning. We commend to your sympathy and practical support our College and University.
Scarcely less essential to the integrity of our Church is the Superannution Fund. The honorable provision made for the support of worn-out ministers and their families in the Methodist Church has for many years commended itself to our people and the public in general. The principle of assessment has been adopted as a means of distributing with equity the amount of income from our circuits necessary to meet the annual claims of our superannuates. We commend to you the interests of this fund as being a just claim on your liberality.

Of all our connexional departments, probably none is so familiar to our people as our Book and Publishing House, Through our weekly and monthly periodicals, and other forms of Christian literature, a strong and constant stream of Methodist doctyine and sentiment is being poured into our homes. The press has always been a most important ally of Methodism ; never was it employed to better advantage than to day. For the very best and cheapest literature for the library, the Sunday School, the Church and the home we commend to you our Methodist Book and Pub. lishing House.

The first form of society in the world was the family. In no dispensation has it been merged in the congregation and forgotten or lost. The family altar was the first altar on earth ; the father acted as prophet, priest and king. No matter how well equipped and effective are our church services, they cannot countervail the necessity for family religious instruction and exercises. As Methodists, we are in a special sense indebted to domestic piety. In tracing Methodism to its fountainhead, it will appear that we are more indebted to Susannah Wesley than to Peter Böhler for the religious character of our founder. John Wesley was so remarkable "for the seriousness of his spirit and the general propriety of his behavior," that "at the age of eight years he was admitted to the Sacrament of the Lord's Table." The first religious duty of parents towards their children is their baptism; following this is the important work of preparing them to accept of Christ as their personal

Saviour. To ensure their early submission to God, the highest type of home piety is necessary.

We exhort you to keep a cheerful fire burning on the family altar. Cultivate a happy style of Christian conversation. Procure a supply of good Methodist literature, and be hopeful of your children's salvation through Christ. "The just man walketh in "his integrity, and his children are blest after him."

The question of raising money for religious purposes is one that compels attention in every society. In the Lord's providential arrangements for the extension of His kingdom provision is made to supply every need of the Church. The difficulty in defraying the expenses of the Lord's work has arisen through a departure from the scriptural prin ciples and methods of giving. The doctrine of systematic beneficence is plainly taught in the Bible. It is becoming more and more manifest that our Church cis suffering great spiritual as well as financial loss through neglect of the Lord's will in the matter of giving. We believe the resolution passed by the General Conference on this subject is worthy of your adoption: "Let our people give at least one-tenth of their income, and let the use of all unscriptural methods of raising money for religious purposes be discountenanced as unworthy of a Christian people."

In conclusion, we invite you to join with us in praise to God for the goodness and mercy of the past year. "The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad." Our connexional departments have received from you an intelligent and liberal support. The local interests of our societies have been well sustained. The Holy Spirit has bsen with us; souls have been converted and believers perfected. At the late General Conference the report of our Methodist membership showed an increase since the union of 55.88 per cent., more than four times as rapid as the increase of the population of our country. The activity and enthusiasm to be seen in all departments of our Church, but more especially amongst our young people, is significant of a bright future for Methodism.

Let us renew our covenant to serve the Lord, to spread scriptural holiness throughout the land, and increase the aggressive force of our beloved Church. A loyal support and advocacy of our doctrines and usages will result in a repetition of the brightest pages of our past history.
