Moscow, June 14 .- Michaelmin, the vorkman who murdered Nicholas Bauman, the revolutionist, whose funeral November 2nd, 1905, was the occasion of a great liberal demonstration, was to-day sentenced to imprisonment for a year and a half.

About 300,000 persons took part in Bauman's funeral with red flag and banners flying. A choir of 300 trained singers chanted a requiem, while thousands in the procession sang the "Marsellaise." 

His idea was to form an additional class to be located in the assembly room of the High school. It might be drawn from students of the senior grades of the different low schools, who were preparing to take the entrance examinations within a year.

> Apart from the benefits mentioned the superintendent contended that the pupils taking advantage of such an opportunity would find themselves advanced a year or so towards matriculation when entering upon their High school course. Of course it would not be compulsory to attend this class. It would be purely optional. In other words it would assist the progress of those really anxious to help themselves forward. The plan was by no means a new one. It had been experimented with upon a small scale in connection with the Central school last year. Some pupils had taken Latin and French. and now were a year ahead in their High school work. As it had been found to work well upon a small scale there was no reason why it shouldn't be just as successfully conducted when the privilege was extended to all the schools. He believed the contemplated class when formed would number some sixty or seventy pupils, and the work of instruction would necessarily have to be divided between two teachers. But this would not mean any addition to the teaching staff. The reduction of the attendance at the low schools would allow a corresponding decrease in the number of teachers. If it was the intention to adopt the scheme outlined he advised that no time be lost. It was important that the pupils should be notified and the course commenced with the beginning of the new term.

Some discussion followed, during unqualified approval of the project, and Trustee Lewis gave it his endorsement upon the understanding that no discrimination should be shown in the distribution of favors.


