NEW YORK, April 19.—The Tribune this morning says: Mrs. Frank Russell Dale, 20 years old, has been taken to a hospital from an uptown hotel suffering from neurasthenia. She came to the city two months ago with her husband from London, Ont. Several days later her husband disappeared.

POPE WON'T RECEIVE LOUBET President of France May Not Enter the Vatican and Interfere With Pope's Plans.

PARIS, April 19.—The Rome correspondent of the Echo de Paris affirms positively, despite all denials that the French government has made strenuous efforts to arrange a reception for President Loubet at the Vatican, during his visit to Rome, first through the French ambassador to Italy with the pope's consent.

NEW SCHEME FOR CHICAGO VARSITY. CHICAGO, April 19.—It is announced that the University of Chicago idea of teaching and will abandon the university system. Plans for a complete system of colleges, both for men and women, involving the erection of two on the blocks of buildings have been announced in the report of the university building commission. It is said that the change will be made at an expense of between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000.

SKIRMISHING ON THE YALU. Japanese Have Full Possession of Korea. And Have Now Two Armies Marching on Manchuria—Makarov's Successor Greeted.

LIAO YANG, April 19.—A number of unimportant skirmishes are reported along the Yalu river. Six Japanese soldiers were killed by Russian snipers on April 18. Firing was heard on April 18, but the result of the engagement is unknown.

SHANGHAI, April 19, noon.—Authentic advice from Seoul, dated 18th inst, declare that the Japanese are in complete control of Korea and that the Russian scouting parties have retired across the Yalu, interrupting communication. It is impossible to furnish their supplies. There is also a scarcity of money. Many inhabitants, particularly women and children are leaving the city, abandoning their property which they are unable to sell.

MAKAROFF'S SUCCESSOR. ST. PETERSBURG, April 19.—Vice-Admiral Skrydloff arrived here on his way to the Far East, which he will command of the Russian fleet at Port Arthur. The admiral was accorded an enthusiastic reception by the people who thronged the streets.

FRERERICHTON, N. B., April 19.—The house met at 10 o'clock. Hon. Mr. Tweedie introduced a bill to authorize a grant in aid of the Champlain Tercentenary celebration.

A JAPANESE NOTICE. (New York Sun). The best mail from Yokohama, Japan, brought a revised price list of the Union Laundry of that place, and, while it shows that the war between Russia and Japan has increased the cost of one's washing at Yokohama, it also shows "brightly" as she is written in the leaflet served by the proprietor on his customers.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 19.—St. Petersburg is flooded with rumors from the directions regarding the Russian fleet at Port Arthur is unable to menace their troop transports.

GREAT STRIKE IN MONTREAL. Laborers Demand Recognition of their Unions. About 900 Painters Out—Carpenters, Plumbers, Marble Workers and Brick Layers May Join Them.

MONTREAL, April 19.—Nine hundred painters, decorators and paper hangers are on strike here for the recognition of their union. Seventeen employers have signed the new scale of wages and their employees, numbering 250, are at work.

STRAW THAT TELL.

While the report that Cartwright, Sifton and Fisher will leave the dominion cabinet together may prove not entirely true, there is no doubt that a considerable reorganization of the ministry will be necessary in the near future. The disintegration of the government, which began with Mr. Tarte's retirement has by no means stopped. The disagreement and dissension which are rending the Liberal rank and file are growing in the present government to whom a matter of personal conviction is of any importance beside an \$8,000 salary. The recent willingness of so many ministers and private members to retire from active parliamentary life and grab fat jobs, the occupancy of which does not depend upon public favor, looks remarkably like the traditional exodus of the cautious rodents whose acquaintance with a ship's bottom tell them when the vessel has become unseaworthy.

No rumor is more significant than that of the departure of Mr. Sifton. That gentleman has made and is making too much out of politics to quit unless he is absolutely certain that his day of profit, in that business, has passed.

THE ATTORNEY GENERAL IS A PARTY MAN.

The attorney general has made one more explanation—the fourth during this session—of his political position eight years ago. He now observes that when he left the conservative party it was enjoying power and patronage. This is not a complete statement. Dr. Fugley assumed a neutral attitude between parties during the last month before the election of 1896. Perceiving that the issue was doubtful, he made his own position doubtful to correspond. Had the Tupper government retained power and patronage Dr. Fugley could have dropped back into the ranks, as he had done after previous elections. But the Laurier government won and before midnight of election day Dr. Fugley had ceased to be an independent conservative and was a confirmed and convinced Liberal. So he will probably remain while the Laurier government is safe. The attorney general has spoken of himself as a man of resolute character. That is true. It is doubtful whether any influence exists strong enough to separate him from a party in power and office. Only the strongest and most conscientious conviction that the party is on the verge of defeat is likely to shake his confidence.—Sun.

The Moncton Transcript, confronted by a statement in the Moncton Times, that the Dominion government printing account has doubled since the Liberals reached power, admits the charge, but counters with the accusation that its contemporary when the Conservatives were in power once charged \$500 for an advertisement which the Dominion government afterwards determined was worth only \$100.

If the statement is true—the Star has no information on the matter—it explains why, under the economical and honest rule of the Conservatives, the bills for public printing were so much less than they are now.

The Moncton Transcript crows because the government of which Mr. Emmerson is a member has already had to reverse a decision of the railway commission of which Mr. Blair is chairman. Had the government appointed capable men to assist and advise Mr. Blair instead of a couple of respectable nonentities there would have been no need of reversed decisions.

The St. John Street Railway Company during their last financial year made over forty thousand dollars clear profit. Much of this was made at the expense of the comfort and convenience of the people of St. John. If the people owned the road this forty thousand dollars—it will probably be more this year—would go toward greater provision for their comfort and convenience instead of into the pockets of the company.

Admiral Makaroff's death is a great loss to Russia; the death of Vassili Verestobinski, the painter and author, who went down with him is a great loss to the world.

GRAND STAND COLLAPSED.
Opening of Baseball Season Marred by Serious Accident—Sixty People Were Injured.

NEW YORK, April 18.—A despatch to the World from Paterson, N. J., says:—The opening game of the baseball season here between the Washingtons of the American league, and the Patersons of the Hudson River league, was marred by the fall of the grand stand. Five hundred men were thrown to the ground and more than 40 were hurt. Richard Thomas had his leg broken, Mrs. James Booker, a colored woman, was cut about the head and had her right arm broken. They were taken to the hospital. The Washingtons won by a score of 9 to 4.

DANGEROUS OPERATIONS PERFORMED ON WILD BEASTS.

Surgical operations upon wild animals are frequently performed in this country without ever being heard of. The danger attending such an operation is usually greater to the operator than to the patient. To sew up a rent in a lion's paw; to pull an elephant's tooth; to saw off a horn of a rhinoceros, or to lance an abscess on the head of a venomous snake is rather a delicate and dangerous task, and one which not every veterinary surgeon cares to attempt.

Not long ago there was a performing circus elephant which had a bad tooth. It was 12 inches long, four inches in diameter at the root, and evidently acted in proportion to its size, for the elephant would not eat nor take its part in the show.

When the circus got to New Orleans a surgeon was called in. He examined the tooth as carefully as he could with safety and decided that it must come out. But how?

It was a molar and firmly embedded in the colossal jaw of the pachyderm. Half a dozen dentists could not have budged it.

The surgeon was equal to the occasion. He first desiccated the nerve by pouring a bottle of cocaine into the cavity. Then, with an auger, he made a large hole in the tooth close to the gum. A heavy iron bar was inserted in this traverse hole, and when the elephant had been securely chained four horses were hitched to the bar.

"Gea 'ep!" said the driver. There was a tug on the traces, a mighty bellow from the elephant, a crackling and snapping, and out came the tooth. After it was all over the elephant seemed to be pleased about it. He ate voraciously, and that night he went through his tricks with rare good humor.

A somewhat similar operation was performed on a rhinoceros in Memphis. The snout horn of the animal grew so peculiarly that it threatened to destroy one of the eyes. Needless to say, the task of securing an animal so gigantic was attended with considerable risk, but it was accomplished.

The forefoot was firmly chained to the ground, and the leg was drawn back and chained so that the rhinoceros was lying flat on its stomach. Then a chain was thrown over its head to hold it steady, and, despite the deep-throated protests of the animal, the horn was trimmed.

A big male lion got into a quarrel with his mate in New York last year and his right paw was badly torn. A veterinarian and a hunter were by for a formidable weapon. He soaked a sponge in chloroform, tied it to a pole and held it to the lion's paw. The lion was still travelling with the circus and he right is perfect. There is no indication of a recurrence of the malady.

In a Nebraska town this year Dr. Martin lanced an abscess on the head of a King-bobbit. It was expected that the abscess would disappear when the snake shed its skin, but as the skin evinced no tendency toward sloughing, it became necessary to lance the swelling. In order to save the snake's life. A small whipsnake was put into the cobra's cage and the big snake immediately seized it. While it was engaged in swallowing its prey one of Dr. Martin's attendants caught hold of the cobra and held the tail out. The cobra was duly lanced and treated, and as a reward the cobra was permitted to eat the rest of the whipsnake.—North American.

SHIPPING DISPUTE.

HALIFAX, April 18.—Captain John H. Killam of Yarmouth is in the city in the interest of the barkentine Nora Higgins, now at Richmond loaded and ready for sea. There is a dispute about demurrage, the value of claiming the sum of \$1,000. Captain Killam's ship was arrested in connection with the matter yesterday. As both the buyer and seller of the cargo, it is said, decline to pay, and as the owners are determined it shall be paid either before the vessel sails or before the cargo is delivered, the situation will likely become interesting.

MAY REJECT TREATY.





THE MISSOURI EXPLOSION.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Rear Admiral Capps, chief constructor of the navy, who while in Pensacola, made an investigation of the damages to the Missouri, has made a verbal report to the secretary of the navy which indicates that the damage to the vessel is a result of the recent explosion in confined almost wholly to the electric motors in the vicinity of the explosion. The rammer of the left hand gun is seriously damaged, likewise the left hand ammunition car and fittings. The hull structure itself suffered no material damage whatever. It is estimated that the cost of repairs will be about \$10,000.


