

LUMBER SHIPPERS MEET WITH HEAVY LOSSES

Slump in the English Market Seriously Felt.

It is Stated That One Man Has Already Lost Not Less Than \$60,000 and the End is Not Yet

The lumber industry in New Brunswick is now experiencing the best manufacturing and worst selling season in a number of years. Conditions have arisen during the past few months which have resulted in heavy losses to some of the largest shippers, and from present indications the depression will continue during the remainder of the summer at least. The English market has dropped two dollars and a half per thousand feet and as a result it is estimated that one shipper has lost not less than \$60,000 this season, another in the vicinity of \$20,060, while the rest stand to drop all the profits made on early cargoes or

SHIP STOPPED BY BATTLING WHALES

Four Monsters Attacked by Two Sharks, Force the Amelia to Alter

NEW YORK, Aug. 6-Obliged to al-

JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER IS A GAY OLD SPORT

HIS Doctor Says He Will Live to be at Least 94 Years Old-Is in

Fair Training

NEW YORK, That John D. Rocke-feller will live to be more than ninetyfour years of age is the prediction of Dr. H. F. Biggar, his family physician, according to a Cleveland despatch

cian, according to a Cleveland despatch to the American.

"He is the best trained athlete in the sixty year old class in world today, and he is sixty-eight at that," says the doctor, "I tell you, Mr. Rockefeller has been born twice physically, and he is only fourteen years old now. He is growing up again, and is growing up scientifically, adding to his muscle, to his lungs, to his heartpower with every breath of fresh air he takes on Forest Hill." The doctor says it cost Mr. Rockefeller came to Cleveland in 1893 in the middle of the panic period, completely broken in health and spirit, too. "Doctor I'm a sick man. I'm afraid I'm going to die. But, it is not on account of the financial situation that I am sick," he told the doctor, "it is through disappointment of my friends."

Dr. Biggar put him on a diet, forced him to take exercise and drop business for a month. The oil king complied and regained his health.

Insurance Companies Threatened to Cancel Policies; Council Asked That Company Get Expert. Manager


