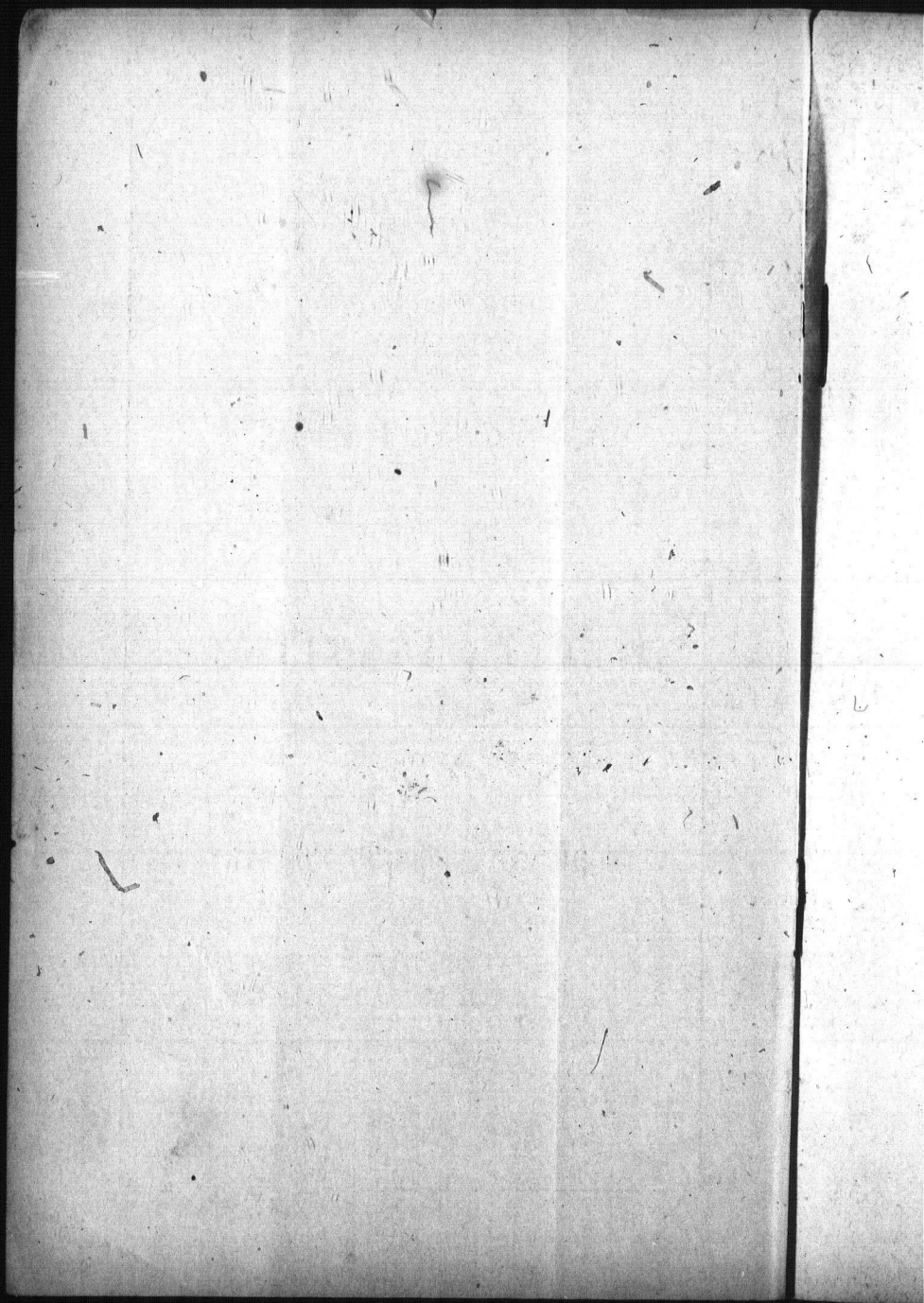

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING.

The Forty-second Annual Meeting of the Hervey Institute and Home and School of Industry was held in the building, 215 Mountain Street, on Tuesday, October 8th, 1889, at three o'clock p.m.

J. L. Morris, Esq., Q.C., occupied the chair, and there were present The Very Rev. Dean Carmichael, Rev. James Fleck, Rev. S. P. Rose, Rev. James Patterson, Rev. R. Lindsay, Mr. David Morrice, Dr. Andres, Mr. Robert Anderson, Mr. Geo. Childs, Dr. Blackader, Dr. Kelly, Mr. Walter Paul, and several ladies.

The Chairman having read the advertisement calling the Meeting, Rev. R. Lindsay opened the proceedings with prayer, after which notes of apology were read from the Rev. J. Edgar Hill and Mr. Geo. Hague.

The Recording Secretary's Annual Report was read by the Very Rev. Dean Carmichael, who, in moving the adoption, referred to the noble work the Institute is carrying on—the more one considered the object of the Home the more clearly must be seen the Christian basis on which it stood. When we think of the terrible temptations which beset girlish life, he thought this Home one of the greatest blessings, where such defenceless girls, who may have lost a mother, and have a most depraved father, are taken and taught to fight their own way in life, and do their duty in whatever sphere they were called to fill.

Dr. Andres, in seconding the adoption of Report, which was agreed to, referred in feeling terms to the clause therein bearing reference to the removal by death of Mr. Alexander Murray.

Mr. David Morrice read the Treasurer's Annual Report, and remarked that he thought the financial statement most satisfactory, the amount of work done on the moderate outlay gave evidence of great economy and good management on the part of the Committee. In reference to the amount still due on the building, viz. \$1,500, he proposed that a committee of gentlemen be appointed to collect said amount; which suggestion was seconded by Mr. J. L. Morris, who named the "Advisory Board" as said Committee,—all which was unanimously agreed to.

The Rev. Jas. Patterson, in seconding the adoption of Treasurer's Report, which was concurred in, paid a glowing tribute to the management of the Home, and referred to the "home element" pervading the Institution, and expressed the hope that the Committee would never be in want of sufficient funds to carry on their good work.

Mr. J. L. Morris here paid a most affectionate tribute to the memory of the late Mr. Alexander Murray, whose "kindly presence" was indeed missed both here and in many other meetings, where the absence of his valued counsel is still much felt: his memory must ever live with us, and emulate us in carrying on this good work in which he had so often, in the days that are gone, expressed his interest.

The Rev. James Fleck, in speaking on the subject of the "Training Class," remarked that he considered there was no Institution that commended itself more to the sympathy of the public than the "Her-

vey Institute:" that one of the original, and in fact one of the principal objects of the Institution was the training of girls for domestic service, and he was glad to see that it was returning to this original intention, determined to carry it out more thoroughly. An Institution which would turn out thoroughly trained domestic servants would indeed be a great blessing to the housekeeping public of the city.

Mr. Geo. Childs followed on the same subject, and pointed out that in every branch of life training was necessary to efficiency; it was a praiseworthy effort on the part of the Committee, and he wished them every success.

Dr. Kelly, in speaking on the subject of the need of increased accommodation for boys of tender years, made an eloquent appeal on their behalf saying, if we are to build up this great English country we must take up the little boys who are presently to be our young men. As a child's character was mostly formed before reaching the age of ten years, it was necessary that there should be some place where motherless or fatherless boys bereft of "home influence" could have a woman's kind care exercised over them. Boys should be early trained in manual labor, and he would suggest the Kinder Garten to that end.

The Rev. S. P. Rose followed, expressing his unqualified pleasure in being present as representing the Methodist Board. Was much impressed by what Dr. Kelly had said, and in perfect sympathy with his remarks, and only wished that he (Dr. Kelly) could have been heard on this subject by a larger audience, could be brought in touch with some of the wealthy men of this city, when no doubt there would be some material response.

Mr. Walter Paul then read the "Reserve Fund Circular," and in a few remarks commended the suggestion therein contained—the idea as presented was a good one in interesting the different Sunday Schools as, by giving in the way proposed, they would undoubtedly take more interest in the Home.

The Rev. R. Lindsay followed, advocating unity among the Charities.

Dr. H. H. Blackader read the "Physician's Report," which was most encouraging.

Mr. David Morrice moved a vote of thanks to the Physicians for their great care and kind attendance during the year. Seconded by Rev. James Fleck and carried.

Mr. J. L. Morris made kindly reference to the Honorary President, Miss Hervey, whose failing health prevents her attending the meetings, and added that he thought the Ladies of the Committee should be strong and of good courage: the public had never failed them for the good of the Institute, and never will.

Mr. Robert Anderson handed \$100 to the Chairman, and received the thanks of the Meeting.

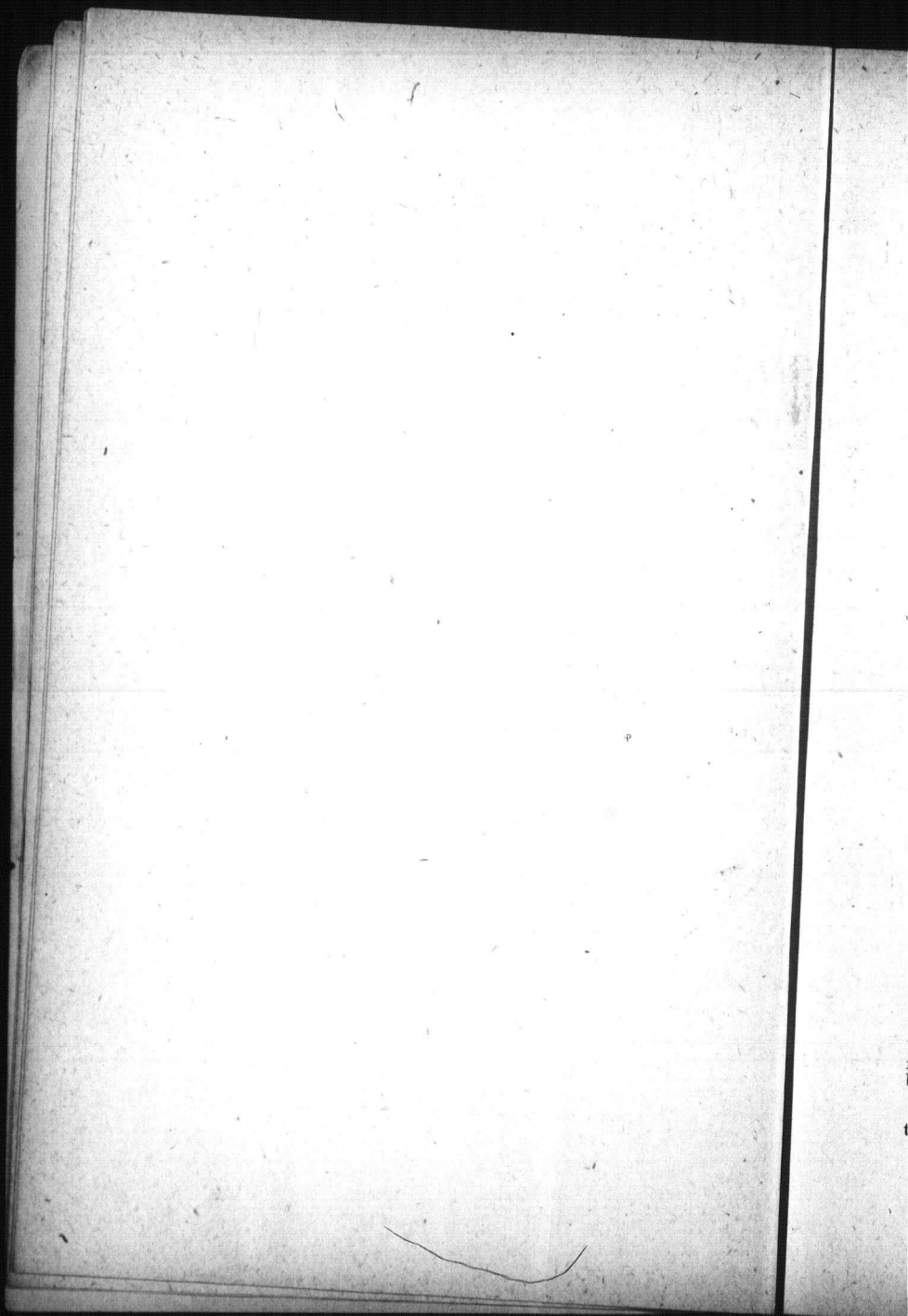

- FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT -

The Hervey Institute

HOME & SCHOOL OF INDUSTRY.

In presenting this, the Forty-second Annual Report, to the many kind friends of the Hervey Institute, this Committee desires to gratefully acknowledge the blessing of health enjoyed by the inmates, and the complete restoration of the only two cases of serious illness occurring during the year.

Much encouragement has been received in the carrying on of the work and in the efforts made to lessen the balance of debt still remaining on the building, the sum of three thousand dollars having been paid off during the year, part of which amount (namely, \$1,324.25) was raised at the "Fancy Fair" held last November, at which the Episcopalian, Presbyterian, Methodist, Congregational and Unitarian churches were represented by their different tables. To the generous assistance of these churches, as well as to outside individual effort, are due the success of that undertaking, and to each and all who assisted at that time, this Committee feel most gratefully indebted.

In the several Reports presented from this Institution the urgent need of a Home for little boys has been brought forward. That need is still unsupplied, the demand is, if anything on the increase; within the past month at least six boys have had to be refused admission, four of whom were motherless. The present Management have signified their willingness to undertake the additional work which would be entailed in the caring for such cases as mentioned, but, in order to meet the necessary requirements, additional room would be an imperative necessity, and, while the ground necessary for an extension of this present building is available for the purpose, the all important matter of funds for building such needful addition is wanting, and the Management are unable to see their way to incur an increased burden of debt. This matter has been so often brought forward that it is with regret for the necessity this Committee again refers to it, with the earnest hope that some one, whom God has blessed with means sufficient, may honor Him by furnishing the funds necessary to provide a Home for the little motherless, homeless boys.

The Special Training Class continues in satisfactory progress, there are at present thirteen (13) girls in the class, and every effort is

being made to train them in a systematic and thorough method of housework. The Reward of Merit, referred to in last year's Report, was awarded to Isabella Gordon, a silver medal, and an Honorable Mention badge to Ida Bulmer, both being the gift of Mrs. Alexander Murray. It is earnestly hoped that some arrangement may be made to give the older girls in this class the benefit of a course of lessons in the "School of Cookery" before sending them out to service.

Seventy-eight children have enjoyed the benefits of the Institute during the year; 13 have been admitted, 17 having been removed by parents or otherwise provided for, 61 remain. There are in all 67 inmates in the Home. Two little girls have been adopted into comfortable homes; the Committee receive good reports of them from time to time, and still continue to take an interest in their welfare.

It is a matter of congratulation that the building debt has been so greatly lessened during the year, thereby reducing the interest to be paid. In the year 1879 the debt amounted to \$10,500 at 8 per cent. interest: the rate of interest has varied from 6½ p.c. in 1880, to 5 p.c. in 1887, and to 6 p.c. in 1888. In the past ten years this debt has been reduced to \$2,000, towards which the Treasurer reports a balance on hand of \$261, and a promise of \$250, when the full amount is raised, thus \$1,499 is all that is required to relieve the Committee of this burden which has hampered to so great an extent their efforts in carrying on the work. There is this year a deficit of \$200 for current expenses, but it is earnestly hoped that, with the generous assistance of the friends of the Institute, this may be made up, and the debt still remaining on the Building wholly paid off before another Annual Meeting. It may be mentioned that the amount necessary to meet current expenses averages annually \$3,000 with the most economical management; to meet this expenditure calls for unwearied effort on the part of the Committee, and especially of those ladies who undertake the collecting. Although the purpose of this Institute is meant to be a help to those parents "who will help themselves," still in very many cases the Institute is obliged to do *all* the providing, the parents being either totally neglectful, or unable from force of circumstances to do anything towards it. There are at present 25 children in the Home for whom no payment is received.

The Rev. Geo. Wells, D.D., presided at the Annual Examination and Distribution of Prizes, which was held this year in May instead of June as formerly, in the presence of the Rev. J. C. Antliffe, D.D., the Rev. James Patterson, and Ladies of the Committee. The exercises were particularly interesting, the children acquitting themselves most creditably, giving evidence of careful training on the part of their teacher, Miss Charge, who continues faithful and unwearied in her efforts on their behalf.

The interior management of the Institute under the matron, Mrs. Miller, continues satisfactory, the general cleanliness of the Home, and the healthful, happy appearance of the children manifesting a conscientious discharge of the duties and responsibilities devolving upon her. With the consent of the Committee, Mrs. Miller undertook to collect for a new stove which is greatly needed in the Institute, and she has handed to the Treasurer \$70 as the result of her effort.

It might be mentioned that the household work is mostly done by girls who have been brought up and trained in the Home, there being only two employes from outside—namely laundress and seamstress—and also that the children knit all the stockings required for winter use, being thus kept profitably employed and taught to be industrious.

It has been decided to add to the Membership of this Institution an Honorary List, to include retired members who still continue their subscriptions and kind interest in the work, and also such members of the present Board who do not find it convenient to attend the regular meetings, but who continue their subscriptions and whose kindly interest the Committee of Management feel anxious to retain: it being understood, however, that all meetings of the Board of Management are open to such members who, it is hoped, will attend, whenever occasion permits

In the consideration of all legal matters this Committee owes a debt of gratitude to J. L. Morris, Esq., Q.C., for valuable advice most kindly given, and responsibilities undertaken in the interest of the Institute whenever called upon.

This Committee is deeply indebted to the Visiting Physicians who have so kindly and gratuitously given their time and skill during the past year, Dr. E. H. Blackader having regularly visited the Institute twice a week, and oftener when necessity required. Dr. A. D. Blackader has also been in frequent attendance, and for many years has been indefatigable in his kind attention. This close supervision on the part of the Medical Board relieves the Committee of much responsibility.

To Dr. Andres for valuable professional services generously rendered; also to Dr. Stirling, oculist, for the same.

To the Rev. J. C. Antliffe, D.D., Rev. L. N. Tucker, and Rev. James Patterson, for ministerial visits regularly paid.

To Mr. James Tasker for much time and attention given to the sanitary arrangements of the Institute.

And to *All* whose various and liberal contributions at the Xmas season and throughout the year have afforded the inmates of the Home much pleasure and comfort, and have rendered valuable aid in carrying on the work, this Committee would here extend most grateful acknowledgement and sincere thanks. A detailed list of donations is appended to this Report.

This Committee sincerely deplores the removal by death, during the past year, of Mr. Alexander Murray, whose kindly presence for many years has been met at the Annual Meeting, at which he always took a prominent part, either as chairman or speaking to one or other of the resolutions, and who also for a very long period kindly audited the Treasurer's Annual Statement. A valued member of the Advisory Board, a wise counsellor, and a generous donor, his loss will long be felt and his memory ever cherished as having been one of the Institute's best friends. In giving this tribute of regret at the loss to the Institute of so warm a friend, this Committee would again give expression to their deep sympathy with their beloved President, Mrs. Murray, and the Misses Murray (members of this Committee) in their sad bereavement.

This brief retrospect of the year conveys but a slight idea of the daily routine of work, and the many discouragements encountered, in providing a Home for girls having but one parent, (and who from force of circumstances would otherwise be homeless,) educating and thoroughly training them in household work, which is the aim and object of this Institution.

With an earnest prayer for guidance to the "Father of the fatherless" that this Committee may be enabled to do justly and act wisely in all that pertains to the welfare of this Institution.

This Forty-second Annual Report of the Hervey Institute is respectfully submitted to the many subscribers and friends.

CIRCULAR ON "RESERVE FUND."

The Management of the Hervey Institute in order to meet a need which is both urgent and a very considerable drain on their resources, namely, the providing for those children in the Home for whom no one seems responsible, and for whom no payment is made, (the annual cost per head averaging thirty-five dollars,) have decided to submit to the different Protestant churches of this city, the following proposal, namely, that each Church or Sunday School subscribing annually thirty dollars shall have the right to place a girl in the Institute, said child to have all the privileges of the Home, a good education, and general training in domestic work,—each case, however, to conform to the existing rules of the Institute regarding admission. Any moneys received from the churches for the purpose named, to be kept as a separate fund known as the "Reserve Fund" (Church or Sunday School) and to be used strictly for the child or children thus specified. The Institute has already met with much assistance from the churches and Sunday schools of the city, and the Sunday School of Knox Church at their last Annual Meeting voted a yearly sum of thirty dollars (\$30) to the Institute for the purpose above named, placing said amount in the list of subscriptions side by side with those to Foreign Missions, etc. It is hoped that this suggestion may meet with favor, and that in the voting away annually the different amounts, this Home Mission for the "little needy ones" may be remembered.

VISITING PHYSICIANS' REPORT.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:—

The physicians in attendance have pleasure in reporting that during the greater part of the year just passed the health of the inmates of this Institution has been good. No death has occurred, although several contagious diseases, so rife in the city in the early part of the year, have threatened us with an epidemic. Fortunately, the disease of the scalp, which for several years past has been so much trouble and annoyance, affecting so many of the children, and at one time seriously crippling our usefulness, is now quite a thing of the past, every case has been cured; the last, after complete recovery, was adopted this spring by a family in the country, and reports regarding her continue to be received by the matron. Our severe experience with this disease should impress upon us the necessity of exercising at all times the strictest quarantine in reference to it. Shortly after Christmas, a recently admitted child, Grace Franklyn, developed symptoms of diphtheria. She was isolated, and sent to the General Hospital, prompt measures of disinfection were employed, and no other case developed. Shortly after her return from the hospital she was again taken ill with the measles. This disease, unfortunately, spread to others of the inmates. Owing to the crowded state of the infectious wards in the General Hospital, we were unable to obtain admission for the cases, and isolation in our present building is extremely difficult. Twenty in all contracted the disease, but all made good recovery, although two (Matilda Anderson and Rose Osborne) their illness was complicated by inflammation of the lungs. In the beginning of May a child (Lucy Sherlock) was admitted with a slight cold, and a week later developed whooping cough. Three others contracted the disease from her, and were promptly isolated. Two of these made good recoveries, but one (Matilda Anderson) had a serious attack of inflammation of the lungs. At present the general health of the inmates is good, with but slight exceptions.

During the past year the physician's visits have averaged over two a week, and during some outbreaks daily visits have been made. All of which is respectfully submitted.
