

Ketchel and Langford Both Predict a Knockout --- Fans Agog Over First Meeting of

New York, N.Y., April 25.—Sam Langford and Stanley Ketchel will meet at the National A. C., of Philadelphia next Wednesday night in a six round fight that is attracting the attention of sporting men all over the country. Langford says he will win by a kneckout in two rounds, while Ketchel declares he will land a sleep wallop before three rounds have elapsed. If these terrific punchers mean what they say the fight will be one of the most sensational in ring history. There is no bitter feeling on the part of either pugliist, but there is plenty of genuine rivalry and not a little professional jealousy. A knockout means the windup of one or the other as a firstclass fighter at middlewight. A victory secured in this way will clearly define which has the better claim on the middleweight championship of the world, even though they do not make the 158 pound limit.

Ketchel is recognized as the middleweight champion at present, but in Langford he will meet the most dangerous puglist of his weight and inches in the world.
