# THE AUSTRIANS ALREADY FEEL ROUMANIA'S POWER; GREECE MAY SOON JOIN THE ENTENTE

Strong Encircling Movement by Roumanians Forces Austrians to Withdraw-Unofficial Reports Say New Ally Has Joined Forces With Russians-Ferdinand Calls for General Mobilization and Goes to Front to Personally Take Command of His Army.

Copenhagen, via London, Aug. 30
—The Ritaus News Agency publishes a despatch from Berlin giving the official announcement of Gen. Von Falkenhayn's dismissal by the Emperor as chief of the general staff, and the appointment of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg to that position. Gen. Von Ludendorff, Von Hindenburg's other of staff, the despatch adds, has been appointed first quartermaster-general.

To meet the exigencies created by Roumania's entrance into the war on the side of the Entente Allies, King Ferdinand has ordered a general mobilization of his forces and is reported to have proceeded to the front personally to take command of his army.

## GREEK KING WARNED UNDER THREAT OF UPRISING TO HEED THE VOICE OF HIS PEOPLE

ON THE SOMME Fifty Thousand at Pre-Entente Meeting Addressed by Former Premier Venizelos Endorse Resolutions Denouncing King's Attitude and Declaring Him the Dupe of Sinister Advisors Whom They Call on Monarch to Dismiss.

Athens, Sunday, Aug. 27, via London, Aug. 29—After the pro-Entente demonstration before the residence of former Premier Venizelos today, in which 50,000 persons took part, a committee was appointed to present to King Constantine the resolutions outlined by M. Venizelos in his address. These resolutions, as framed by M. Venizelos, concluded with these words:

"If we, the people, are not heard in these our resolutions we must take counsel as to what is to be done to minimize the ruin which awaits us." The scene before the residence of the former premier was one of wild enthusiasm. All the surrounding streets were crowded with people when M. Venizelos appeared on the balcony. News of the Bulgarian occupation of the Greek port of Kavalia intensified the feelings, and those in the throng apparently were ready to follow the former premier in whatever he might advise. Unusual precautions were taken by the authorities, in view of the fact that the celebration occurred on the anniversary of the revolution of 1909. A large body of troops was brought in from Chalkis to reinforce the Athens garrison. Soldiers with fixed bayonets lined the streets in the vicinity of the residence of M. Venizelos.



As Mr. Brodie had arrived with the plans for the new power house at the hospital it was decided to take up that matter and Dr. Walker was called on to present the case of the commissioners of the general public hospital. Dr. Walker said they had appeared before the finance committee of the municipal council and asked for money and authority to build a new power house cutside and independent of the presauthority to build a new power house outside and independent of the pres-ent building in order that the fire risk which now existed there might be eliminated. It was intimated to them that if they came with plans showing what they proposed to do the neces-sary money and authority would be forthcoming hence their visit.

Replies to Criticism.

He would like to say a few words in regard to private patients in the hospital and certain statements which had appeared in one of the newspapers in regard to the doctors wanting a new hospital in order to care for their private patients. He thought that this was a small and niggardly thing to say in view of the fact that the doctors of the city were giving their time to the hospital free and caring for those who could not afford to care for themselves as was the case with a large number of those who came to the hospital. He then asked Mr. Brodie to present the sketches which he had made of the proposed power house. Mr. Brodie explained that it had first been intended to locate the power house in the rear of the hospital facing City Road but as this would interfere with extension of the epidemic hospital and also darken the operating room it had been decided to buy some land at the northeast corner of the building facing Richey street and erect the power house there. # FRANK B. CARVELL'S ALLEGED EXPERIENCE OF **NEW POLITICAL BIRTH WAS BARE-FACED JOKE**

When we met Mr. Carvell upon his return from Ontario, we had

him and he came back in the spirit of gentleness and kindness to all men, especially to those whom he had looked upon as his enemies.

When we met Mr. Carvell upon his return from Ontario, we had hoped to see a new light in his eye a gentler tone in his voice and the hand of steel changed to velvet. We opened the Sentinel, his personal organ, upon its first issue after his return, fully expecting to find that the paper, too, had passed through th regenerating process, that "old things had passed away and a.! things had become new;" but we were sadly disappointed. If anything it was more vindictive, malicious and vicious than in the past, and, to our great sorrow, we found that there was no perceptible change in Mr. Carvell. His voice was just as metallic, the light of his eye was the same old light, and his countenance had lost none of its grimness.

One of the strongest evidences of the new birth and of the true experience is the spirit of restoration. You will recall that a certain man who had evidently been a great sinner heard that the Man of Nazareth was passing by. He cilmbed into a sycomore tree. He was bidden by the Master to come down. Zacchaeus, in those moments, passed through the great experience of the new birth. It was instantaneous and complete, as was made evident by the testimony that he bore, "iff I have taken anything wrongly or by false accusation from any man I will restore him fourfold." Through all the years since then restitution has been recognized as one of the strong evidences of the new life.

If Mr. Carvell had passed through the sacred and noty experience to which he testified while away from home, we fully expected that immediately upon his return he would resign his seat in Parliament, which he has improperly held, a seat which was won by the expenditure of a campaign fund, at the hands of his friends, such as this county never knew, aided by dishonest and crooked Deputy Returning Officers. He has received an indemnity of \$2,800 per annum since 1911, to which he knows he is not justly entitled. Every man, woman and child in this county who has come to the years of understanding, knows these facts. I have never heard a single supporter of Mr. Carvell contradict them, or even offer a word of apology. When the acts are put up to them, they stand slient or hang their heads in

The seat and the indmnity for these years, by every moral law known to the universe, belongs to S. F. Smith, and if Mr. Carvell had passed through the experience which he professed to have passed through, imediately upon his return he would have resigned the seat, and handed it to the man to whom it belonged, and who justly won it,

and with it the \$2,500 per annum Indemnity which he has drawn.

We have waited through weeks and months. We have offered no word of criticism, allowing Mr. Carvell ample time in which to make the restitution, and thus prove the truth of his experience; but he has failed. There is only one conclusion to which we can come, that, in that famous interview which was telegraphed from the Atlantic to the Pacific and published in every Liberal newspaper in the province, Mr. Carvell was insincere, that he was making play of one of the holiest and most sacred experiences known to the human life. We speak reverently and with bated breath when we say that they must have terrible blasphemy.

We note that in Mr. Carvell's personal organs, the Sentinel and

Observer, he is hurling volumes of abuse upon his political opponents and, especially attacking men who profess to be Christians. B. F. church. J. B. Daggett, the secretary for agriculture, is being twitted about his years of active ministry in the church in the most offensive and obnoxious manner. These newspapers huri "Reverend" at Mr. Daggett and "Deacon" at Mr. Gmith. We are told over and over again that they are hypocrites. After Mr. Carvell's Toronto interview, with his subsequent actions, he certainly has no right to say "hypocrisy"

to any man.

As for Mr. Daggett, he came to this county when a very young man and spent the best years of his life here among us. During those years he made a large place for himself in the hearts of the people of this county. He made some enemies, bitter and vindictive enemies, but we want it understood that he has hosts of friends. His years here were years of sacrifice and devotion to duty and his enemies were made because he did not straddle or wobble upon public questions. It is a comcause he did not straddle or wobble upon public questions. It is a common saying in Carleton county that "everybody knows where Daggett stands; he never tried to ride two horses." While a paster he drew large congregations. He was a frequent visitor to this town. In the days of the late Dr. Phillips, in the old Free Baptist church before the union, there were frequent exchanges between these two men and no man was received to the pulpit with greater respect or pleasure than Mr. Daggett. In the discharge of his duties he was so unfortunate as to contract a tubercular affection, which required a long treatment in a sanatorium. His health in a large measure was restored but, by the best specialists in America, he was forbidden to go back to the ministry, and was later called to the office of secretary for agriculture. As econ as he entered this office, Mr. Carvell and his cohorts began to abuse him. That stream of abuse has never stopped. We want to say today that scores of Liberals in this county are resenting it vigorously. We understand that Mr. Daggett has been invited to speak in the present campaign in this county but has declined. We believe he is making a mistake. The vilest stories are being insinuated through the present will be represently in the ear concerning him, in which we do not believe there is one word of truth. We feel that it is his duty to himself and his friends to come to this county and, from the public platform, denounce his traducers and defend himself against the vile attacke that are being made upon him. If he should be persuaded to come, there will be no place in the county where he will receive a warmer reception than in the town of Woodstock and, unless he has lost his power of saying things, we venture that his enemies will get a handling that they will not relish.

As for Mr. Smith, it is a well-known fact that for many years he did not make any profession to a religious life, but some four or five years age he identified himself intimately with the Baptist church and eince that t mon saying in Carleton county that "everybody knows where Dagget

daily walk and conversation. It is one of the shames and crimes of the warfare that Mr. Carvell is waging in this county, that there is nothing sacred and nothing hely to him and his crowd. He covers his own iniquity with a cowardly cloak and the meanest of arguments that he does not profess anything; as though his lack of profession gave ilcense to do as he pleased and act as he may desire. At the judgment bar of God and man he would argue "I did not profess anything better." We have no use for the hypocrite, but we do say ten thousand times better the man who is endeavoring to walk and live the life he ought to live and who sometimes fails, than the man who never tries and who is satisfied with his own sin and wrongdoing.

If Mr. Carvell was born again in Toronto all we have to say is that "he has returned as a sow washed to her wallowing and a dog to his vomit."
