# WITH THE RUSSIANS President Wilson Sends Special Message to Congress of Soviets at Moscow Which Is to Pass

Judgment on German-Made Peace Accepted by the Bolsheviki at Brest-Litovsk.

Republic Extends Sympathy at Moment When German Power Has Been Thrust in to Turn Back Whole Struggle for Freedom-New Uprising Probable.

Washington, Mar. 11-On the eve of the gathering at Moscow the Russian congress of Soviets, which is to pass judgment on the German-made peace accepted by the Bolsheviki at Brest-Litovsk, President Wilson has sent a message of sympathy to the Russian people through the congress with a pledge that the United States will avail itself of every possibility to aid them in driving out autocracy and restore Russia to her place in the world with complete sovereignty and independence. The United States now recognizes no government in Rus

but the president cabled his message to the American consul at Moscow for delivery tomorrow to the congress which is made up of IN A THEATRE soldiers' and workmen's representatives and speaks for at least a onsiderable part of the Russian people.

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Bolsheviki, Headed by German Officer, Fighting Cossacks in Siberia.

London, Mar. 11.—Leon Trotzky was dismissed as Bolshevik foreign mini-ter by Premfer Lenine owing to a quar-rel over the German peace terms, ac-ording to a despatch to the Morning Post, dated Saturday in Petrograd. Trotzky held that the peace had been extorted by force and that no law re-cognized promises made under duress as obligatory. Therefore, he is reported to have said it was Russia's duty to fight, if only guerilla warfare, and the German treaty should not be ratified. ratified.

Harbin, Thursday, Mar. 7.—After a preliminary clash with Red Guards, resulting in a few casualties on both sides, General Semenoff, leader of the Cossacks, has formed a new front along the Siberian railway, where he is rendeavoring to broak the Bolshevik control. The Bolshevik are using heavy guns under the direction of a German officer.
