SPARTACANS OFFER **TO SURRENDER**

London, March 12.—The behav-for of the Spartacans in Lichten-berg was worse than the Bolshevik crueities in Russia, Berlin advices received in Copenhagen and trans-mitted by the Exchange Telegraph Company say. All well-dressed citizens appearing in the streets were robbed and many were killed. Several persons were decapitated and the heads were carried through the streets by female Spartacans. The government troops, it is ad-ded, continue to kill every prisoner they take. Industrial League of Germany Organized a Fund to Fight the Bolsheviki Propaganda.

Berlin, March 10, Monday.-(By The Associated Press).-The progress of the government troops against the Spartacans, necessarily, is slow owing to the need of thoroughly cleaning up the reconquered parts of the city. This means that Lichtenberg prob-ably cannot be reached inside of two days. The populace of Lichtenberg is suffering severely from hunger and as a result of looting. The second important Spartacan stronghold is Weissensee, a subjeto of Berlin. The Spartacans also are strongly entrenched in Copenick, Neukoeln and Rummelsberg. The correspondent today talked with a colonel of the government forces who estimated the Spartacans about three thousand. He admitted, however, that his figures were merely guess-work.
