DEATH OF THE APPLE KING.

David Henning's Rise from Poverty to Affluence.

Chicago, Ill., Apirl 3-David Henning, known as "the apple king," is dead at his former home in Battle Creek, Mich., from the rupture of a blood vessel.

Mr. Henning was born at Newry, Armagh county, Ireland, November 25, 1821. Coming to America when he was 12 years of age, he learned the cooper's trade in Detroit, and started a shop in Ann Arbor. Finding himself overstocked with unsalable barrels, he filled them with apples, and this venture started him on the road to wealth. He became so extensively engaged in the apple trade that, on Georgian Bay, cutting across Manitoli.

after removing his headquarters to Chrcago in 1873, he gained the title of "Henning, the apple king."

Mr. Henning controlled the gas plants at Leavenworth, Kan.; Springfield, Mo., and Battle Creek and Ann Arbor, Mich.

Jones, secretary and valet to the late William Marshal Rice, today confessed under oath that he had ended the life of his employer and benefactor with chloroform.

The confession was the climax of a remarkable recital, in which were laid bare the details of an alleged subtle conspiracy which had for its object the seizure of \$3, 000,000 in cash and negotiable securities and the conversion of \$3,000,000 in realty to the uses of the alleged chief conspira-

He described his approach to the bed with the saturated napkin in his hand; of the placing it over the face of the sleeping old man; of the flight from the room; of the weary wait of 30 minutes in accordance with Patrick's alleged instructions; of the call for the physician, who came with Patrick, to find the old man dead.
