## FATHER GIVES SON THE HAND OF FELLOWSHIP

Bathurst, April 14.—On Tuesday afternoon, April 14, E. A. Kinley, who for the past year has had charge of the Baptist cause in Bathurst, was ordained to the ministry of that body.

The services, which were of a most interesting and impressive character, were held in the Orange Hall where the church is meeting pending the erection of a more suitable building.

At the afternoon session the candidate was publicly examined as to his conversion and call to the ministry and doctrinal views. The Rev. Wellington Campbell, of Campbellton, acted as moderator, and other members of the council present were Rev. J. E. Wilson of Frederickton, M. S. Richardson of New-Castle, H. R. Boyer of St. John, B. E. Kinley, father of the candidate, J. L. Love of Bathurst, and Messrs. Angus McLean and P. S. Andrews of Bathurst.

Mr. Kinley's statement as to his conversion was unanimously accepted as most satisfactory, and the council proceeded to examine the candidate as to his doctrinal position. The frankness and sincerity of Mr. Kinley's responses greatly impressed his examiners. On the motion of the Rev. H. R. Boyer, seconded by Rev. M. S. Richardson, the statement was accepted as highly satisfactory.

The following resolution was also unanimously agreed to: "That having heard the statements made by Brother E. A. Kinley in regard to his conversion, call to the ministry, and his views on Christian doctrine, we, as a council, recommend that the United Baptist church of Bathurst (N. IN PARLIAMENT

Hon. Mr. Pugsley's Plea For Ship Building

Small Navy Vessels

Not Yet Too Late, He Says—Other Matters of Interest at the Commons Session Yesterday

Ottawa, April 14.—Shipbuilding came for further discussion in the house tonight. Hon. Mr. Pugsley made a strong plea while the debate continued under discussion for the adoption of a plan for the construction of small destroyers and torpedo boats to be built in Canada and used for the defence of the Canadian coast.

He pointed out that British authorities were beginning to feel the loss of shipping and the cost of the war was increasing. He said that it would take a year to build a 7000 ton steamship and in that time the enemy might be over and the dropping of freight would make shipbuilding unprofitable.

Senator Choquette answered. Hon. A. R. Kemp, acting minister of militia, replied with vigor in the commons today to Senator Choquette's allegations in the senate Wednesday regarding the cost of the war.

Mr. Kemp read a telegram from Brigadier W. A. Loggie and memoranda of the militia department indicating that 20,280 soldiers had been enlisted in Toronto and that there was no truth in the assertion that "any substantial proportion of the men offering themselves for enlistment were 'discased, deprived or deformed'."

Mr. Kemp concluded: "The city of Toronto has enlisted 20,280 soldiers. The men are as fit as specimens of manhood as any country can produce. The blood of many of them has already been in the plains of France to assist in crushing Prussian militarism which seeks to dominate the whole world, including Canada."

Mr. Kemp said that the fighting side by side with the soldiers of France who speak the same language as the honorable senator. These men who have been so fully trained are offering their lives with the soldiers of France to protect the women and children of that nation from suffering horrors, tortures and cruelties similar to those which have been inflicted upon the women and children of poor hearted Belgium. More than 300,000 men in Canada have offered their lives for the cause of the world's peace.

He stated it is a fair question for the senator to ask: "Does Senator Choquette represent the opinion of any one in Canada but himself?"
