**Colonial and Indian Exhibition.**  
 Canadian Guests.  
 The Prince of Wales, has, it is an-  
 nounced, decided that the present Ex-  
 hibition shall close on the evening of  
 Wednesday, November 10.

The number of visitors at the exhibi-  
 tion for last week was 222,795, making a  
 total since the opening of 4,129,932. On  
 Monday as many as 112,280 passed the  
 turnstiles; on Tuesday, 52,770; while on  
 Wednesday, the half-crown day, the at-  
 tendance was no less than 20,560.

A firm of furniture manufacturers at  
 High Wycombe, who have supplied some  
 of the furniture now in use at the exhibi-  
 tion, have also made recent investiga-  
 tions concerning the hardwoods of the  
 Dominion. The inquiries elicited the  
 fact that the very same woods—the  
 beech, maple, and elm—which Canadians  
 are now burning for firewood, are well  
 suited to the purposes of the firm, and  
 can be obtained from Canada in almost  
 unlimited quantities. Communications  
 have been opened up direct with Cana-  
 dian dealers, who will supply the woods  
 in the raw state. Considerable develop-  
 ment is anticipated in the same direc-  
 tion.

The proposal of the Prince of Wales  
 that the Queen's Jubilee should be cele-  
 brated by the establishment of an Im-  
 perial Institute as the outcome of the  
 present Exhibition has naturally con-  
 tinued to attract much attention during  
 the week. There would seem to be a  
 belief among exhibition and others  
 interested in the possibility of the  
 Exhibition being re-opened next spring  
 in somewhat of its present shape, and  
 continued through the year, whilst ar-  
 rangements of a more permanent nature  
 are being completed. In other words,  
 the belief would seem to be that the  
 present exhibition and its Royal Com-  
 mission will cease early in November,  
 and that the display of next year will be  
 under the auspices of the permanent  
 institution.

At a meeting of the Exhibition Com-  
 mercial Exchange, held in Old London  
 on Friday last, the following resolution  
 was moved:—"That, seeing the great and  
 increasing interest manifested in the  
 present Exhibition, it would be an  
 Imperial misfortune if the Exhibi-  
 tion were finally closed at the end of  
 the present season. The Exchange,  
 therefore, earnestly presses on the  
 Royal Commission the expediency of  
 re-opening the Exhibition next year,  
 giving to the exhibitors during the in-  
 terval before re-opening the opportunity  
 of changing their exhibits, and making  
 such other arrangements as may be  
 deemed expedient." An amendment  
 was moved to the effect that in view of  
 the letter of the Prince of Wales as to  
 an Imperial Institute, a committee of  
 the Exchange be appointed to confer  
 with the Royal Commission regarding the  
 re-opening of the Exhibition next year. It  
 was then suggested that the whole of  
 the resolution after the words "next year"  
 be omitted, and the following be sub-  
 stituted:—"And of conferring, with a  
 committee appointed by the exhibitors,  
 as to the best means of insuring its  
 future success." The mover of the  
 resolution having assented to this altera-  
 tion, his motion was—after the rejection  
 of the amendment by a large  
 majority—carried, and the meeting  
 separated.

**The Shortening Days.**  
 The amateur astronomer will find a  
 source of unfailing interest in observing  
 the apparent movements of the sun.  
 During October the days continue to  
 lessen rapidly. On the 1st the sun rises  
 at 5:41 a. m. and sets at 5:23 p. m., making  
 the length of the day 11 hours 45 min-  
 utes. On the 15th the sun rises at 5:17  
 a. m. and sets at 4:58 p. m., making the  
 length of the day 10 hours 40 minutes.  
 The amount of the day's decrease in  
 length is therefore 1 hour 25 minutes.  
 Thus on the last day of the month the  
 days are nearly an hour and a half shorter  
 than they were at its commencement.  
 It is not strange that the remark is often  
 made, "flow short the days are!" The  
 sun's position in the heavens gives  
 another indication of the season's  
 advance. Observers will readily note  
 that the sunrise and sunset points seem  
 to move rapidly southward. On the 1st  
 the sun's declination is 31 degrees 21  
 minutes south; on the 15th it is 34  
 degrees 16 minutes. The sun therefore  
 advances 19 minutes 55 seconds on his  
 southern course during the month. The  
 further the sun moves to the south the  
 shorter is the circuit he makes in the  
 heavens and the less is his meridian  
 altitude. The days will decrease, the  
 sunrise and sunset points move south,  
 and the sun will each day be lower in  
 the heavens until the winter solstice,  
 when the sun reaches his extreme south-  
 ern declination and turns his face slowly  
 northward. Those who watch closely  
 the movements of the great luminary, so  
 complex in appearance, so simply in  
 reality, will more fully comprehend his  
 sovereign sway over the brotherhood  
 of planets, who shine in his borrowed  
 light, held unswervingly to all powerful influ-  
 ence, and reflect every pulsation of his  
 huge mass.

**Anchor's Safe.**  
 St. Johns, N. F., Oct. 10.—The mining  
 steamer *Anchor*, with her cabin shut  
 broken, lies under canvas about 70 miles  
 off Cape Spear, bearing east-southeast.  
 The passengers and crew are all well. A  
 life boat under command of the first  
 officer arrived here at noon announcing  
 the disaster. The *Miranda* was de-  
 spatched immediately to her assistance.
