CULLIGAN SPEAKS IN MADAWASKA

Conservative Candidate In Present at Beginning of Triduum in Honor of St. John Edyes.

Edmundston, Oct. 19.—In the Star Theatre Friday evening a big meeting was held when Arthur Culligan, of Jacques River, Conservative candidate for Restigouche-Madawaska, addressed the audience. He had previously held a meeting in St. Joseph in the parish of St. Jacques. Among the other speakers of the evening were J. M. Stevens, K. C., Mr. Shannon, W. S. Montgomery, of Dalhousie, and Max D. Cormier, who was chairman of the meeting. Speeches were made in French by Mr. Shannon and Mr. Cormier.

During the week Mr. Culligan held meetings at St. Leonards, St. Anne, Baker Brook and Clair and en route to his home on Saturday held a meeting at St. Quentin.

Here and There

In the last fiscal year 3,843 home-stead entries were granted in the Prairie Provinces, aggregating an approximate area of 614,880 acres, while, in addition, 710 soldier grants of 113,000 acres, make up a grand total of 728,480 acres so settled.

In 1915 Canada exported no wheat to China. In 1918 she sent only eight bushels to Japan. In 1924 China imported over 5,000,000 bushels of Canadian wheat and over 1,500,000 barrels of flour, while Japan took 7,000,000 bushels of wheat and 110,000 barrels of flour. It is predicted these figures will be well beaten for the current year.

The Grand Challenge Cup, emblematic of the First Aid Championship of the entire system of the Canadian Pacific Railway, will be competed for at the Place Viger Hotel, Montreal, November 15. The champions in a knock-out competition among Eastern and Western teams respectively, will fight it out for the trophy.

Plans are already being laid to make the 1925 Eastern International Dogged Derby an even greater success than in any previous year, and it is reported that the prize money will be considerably increased next winter, with the object of attracting more teams and members from the West and the United States.

Fire Prevention Week, October 4-10, was observed throughout the Dominion, and to mark the sense of the importance of the occasion Mr. Grant Hall, vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, broadcast an appeal by wire to every officer and employee of the system "to co-operate as in the past and set a good example by thoroughly cleaning up all premises."

Canada's great outlook, says a recent issue of the London Outlook, is that she wants more people, but of the right type, namely, steady agricultural workers with enterprise, initiative and endurance. Enthusiastic letters from emigrants under the joint scheme of settling 3,000 families in Canada are bound to have their healthy effect on relatives and friends dissatisfied with their lot in England.

E. F. L. Sturdee, general Passenger Agent for the Orient of the C.P.R., with headquarters at Hong Kong, has been appointed Assistant General Passenger Agent of the system at Montreal. His duties commenced here in October. He was relieved of his other work owing to ill-health, but the climate of Canada soon restored him to physical well-being. He has a long record of service with the C.P.R., dating back to his first appointment at Saint John in 1894.

Sixty bushels of wheat at every tick of the clock is the rate at which the Canadian Pacific Railway have carried the grain into the elevators this season. To keep up this unprecedented rush, it has been necessary to move one car-load of grain out of Winnipeg at every one minute and twenty-three seconds of the twenty-four hour day. Grain delivered at the head of the lakes by the Canadian Pacific in September alone would fill a fleet of 200 ships, each with a cargo of 200,000 bushels.

Back from an extended tour of inspection over the company's western lines, E. W. Beatty, chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, found a very marked improvement in the West as compared with that which had existed when he last went across the country. He thought the spirit of the people was much more optimistic and with very good reason since he considered it safe to say that 380,000,000 bushels was not too high an estimate for the total Canadian wheat yield this year. He noticed throughout the country a sustained interest in immigration and a more general realization that therein lay the soundest remedy for most of Canada's difficulties.

BISHOPS TAKE PART IN CEREMONY.

Present at Beginning of Triduum in Honor of St. John Edyes.

Bathurst, Oct. 19.—A triduum in honor of the canonization of St. John was begun today at the Church of The Holy Family, West Bathurst. His Lordship Bishop Leonard, of Rimouski, Que., celebrated pontifical high mass, and his Lordship Bishop Chasson, of Chatham, preached an eloquent sermon on the Life and Works of the Saint with special reference to his piety, eloquence and scholarship.

The faculty and students of the Sacred Heart College at Bathurst attended in a body. Sixty students from the college, which is conducted by the Eudist Fathers, made up a special choir.

HERMITS

Mr. McCafferty was in the back yard at the time. On hearing his wife scream he hurried into the house. On learning a robber had been in the house he ran out the door and tried to find the robber, but was not successful.

**CANADIAN PARTY
IN THE FAR NORTH**

Sergt. Joy of Mounted Police
on Journey to Axel
Heiberg.

Ottawa, Oct. 19.—Further stories of this year's trip north of the Canadian exploration ship Arctic as told with the return of members of the expedition to Ottawa state that information received at Godhavn caused the Arctic to change her course and go directly north to Etah, where the MacMillan expedition of the United States had established its headquarters.

The nature of the information or the exact relationship between the Canadian official party on the Arctic and the MacMillan expedition are not being made public at the present time. From members of the Arctic party it has been learned that the MacMillan party had been flying over Greenland and also over Ellesmere Land in Canadian territory. On Ellesmere Land two oil and gasoline depots had been established along the route leading to Axel Heiberg Island, which is within the areas claimed by Canada. Soon after the arrival of the Arctic at Etah, the MacMillan expedition left for the south. The relationship between the official Canadian party and the party from the United States will be dealt with in the report to be made to the Minister of Interior by G. P. MacKenzie, who was in charge of the Joy, of the Royal Canadian Mounted party on the Arctic.

During the coming winter Sergt. Joy whose exploits in the north have formed the basis of several stirring narratives will make a personal patrol from the Craig Harbor detachment across Ellesmere Island and circle Axel Heiberg. By this means Canada's claim will be strengthened. Sergt. Joy will be the first white man, so far as known, to reach Axel Heiberg Island.

**TWIN SISTERS ARE
MOTHERS SAME DAY**
All Four Reported to Be Doing Well.

New York, Oct. 20.—Mrs. Charles DeRobertis is the wife of a contractor, and Mrs. Jack Roth the wife of a salesman—and that is about the only difference there is between them. They were born together, went to school together, grew up together and were courted at the same time. Last year both were married. Mrs. DeRobertis made her home at No. 1437 Boston Road, the Bronx, and Mrs. Roth settled on the same street, at No. 1461.

Bronx Hospital stands at Fulton Avenue and 159th street. A few days ago Mrs. DeRobertis and Mrs. Roth went there together as patients. Both were under care of Dr. J. H. Epstein. Yesterday two babies were born there, each weighing exactly eight and one-half pounds. One is the daughter of Mrs. DeRobertis, the other the son of Mrs. Roth. All four are doing well.

**\$70,000 REVENUE
FROM BEER SALES**
The Amount the Ontario Government Will Gather From Licenses.

Toronto, Oct. 25.—Statistics which have just been compiled for the Attorney General of Ontario relative to the number of 44 beer permits issued, indicate that the Ferguson Government will receive approximately \$70,000 revenue from the various classes of licenses. According to the figures now in the hands of Hon. Mr. Nickle, there were 1,230 shop licenses issued in the first year of 44 beer sales, 676 restaurant licenses, 1,481 hotel licenses, 247 brewery houses, 27 breweries, 2 breweries, (extra-provincial) 182 clubs and 10 steamships.

**CANADIAN COLLEGE
GRADUATES IN U. S.**

At Least 600 Canadians Holding Academic Positions in U. S. United States, like a siren, lures the graduates of Canadian universities, declared Sir Robert Falconer, president of the University of Toronto, addressing delegates to the Vanderbilt University semi-centennial here last night.

Some of Canada's best have been taken by the United States, he said. At least 600 college graduates from there are holding academic positions in this country.

**548 CANDIDATES
ARE IN THE FIELD**
Conservatives Have 229 to 208 for the Liberals—59 Progressive.

Toronto, Oct. 13.—Up to last night, the eleven days remaining before nomination day, 548 candidates had been selected by party conventions and had announced their candidature for the 345 seats in the House of Commons. This number includes 229 Conservatives, 208 Liberals, 69 Progressives, 21 Laborites and 21 Independents.

**IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY MARKS
LAYING OF CORNER-STONE OF
NEW HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING**

**Lieut.-Governor Todd Here For The Occasion—
Hon. D. A. Stewart, A. W. Crawford, Dominion
Director of Technical Education, Pius Michaud
And Other Prominent Men Present—Large
Crowd Hear Several Fine Addresses.**

On Thursday afternoon of last week, before a large audience of citizens and scholars, Lieut.-Governor W. P. Todd laid the cornerstone of the new Composite High School now under construction at the corner of Adam and Arran streets.

Impressive Ceremony

The occasion was marked by an impressive ceremony. Following the severe weather of the past week, a beautiful autumn day made the opening meeting a pleasant one and the function was, in consequence, very largely attended.

The ceremonies started at 3.30 with M. A. Kelly, chairman of the town school board, taking the chair. On the platform were Governor Todd, the members of the school board, Fletcher Peacock, provincial director of vocational education, A. W. Crawford, Dominion director of technical education, Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, Hon. Pius Michaud, M. P., and members of the local clergy.

Invitations were sent Premier Baxter and Dr. W. S. Carter, superintendent of education, but they were unable to attend.

Give Addresses.

The program opened with the pupils of the Grammar School singing "O Canada." Mr. Kelly next gave a few remarks regarding the new building, its cost and dimensions. He then introduced His Worship Mayor MacKay. Mr. MacKay said the laying of the cornerstone of this building was another milestone on the road of better education. He next spoke on the cost and maintenance of school buildings and gave figures to the effect that in 1911 the amount appropriated by the school board was \$6,200, in 1915 the amount was \$8,000 and in 1920 it was \$45,000 and this year the amount grew to \$60,000, or 40 per cent. of the taxes of the town. At present, he said, there were 1,500 children attending school and there were between 400 and 500 running around the streets not attending that should. The teaching staff of the town schools now numbered 39. The schools were at present crowded, additional rooms having been erected in the assembly hall of the Grammar School.

Governor Todd.

The Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, the next speaker, said he had enjoyed his trip over from Fredericton, having come by motor accompanied by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works. He praised the children and teachers for their work in the schools and said that education was the most important factor to the children of today in becoming future good citizens.

He then addressed the school children, reminding them of the importance and usefulness of education in every walk of life and said he was with them body, heart and soul, upon which he received loud applause. The Lieutenant-Governor then laid the cornerstone.

Hon. D. A. Stewart.

Mr. Kelly next introduced the Hon. D. A. Stewart saying that as a member of the House was influential in obtaining the grant to build the new school. He said that after the fire of 1910 there were no schools and the Grammar School was erected. When that could not accommodate the number of children another school had been built in Roseberry street and after a few years the town was compelled to take over the L'Assomption Academy building to make room for the scholars and now the growth of scholars warranted another building.

Hon. Pius Michaud.

Hon. Pius Michaud, member for Restigouche-Madawaska in the last parliament, was next introduced by Mr. Kelly. Mr. Michaud said he had spoken in town before, but until this last trip he had never really known the town. He said the first things he noticed about a town were churches, tall buildings, hospitals, schools and children. He said that this town has all the qualities of a good centre. He said that he was a teacher once himself and felt happy when he had a crowd around him. He praised the citizens for helping the children along to a better education by the building

A. W. Crawford

Following D. Pinault's address Mr. Kelly introduced H. W. Crawford, Dominion director of technical education. He said he had just completed a tour of vocational and technical schools throughout the Dominion and was glad to be present at the laying of the cornerstone of this building. He said that three years ago Edmundston only had about a dozen High School students but now it has between 50 and 60. He gave these figures to show the increase of pupils taking High School work. The chairman then thanked the citizens for their attention and attendance and with the singing of the national anthem the ceremonies were brought to a close.

Dimensions of Building

The building will be of solid brick with stone and concrete trimmings. The dimensions are 135 feet by 86 feet and when completed will have fourteen classrooms, auditorium and gymnas-

**WOULD CHECK
NICKEL EXPORT**

Plan Advocated By Liberal
Candidate To Control
Great Industry.

Toronto, Oct. 19.—Declaring that the control of Canadian nickel has passed completely out of Canada, Norman McEachern, President of the Central Liberal Association here and one of two Liberal candidates contesting the riding of Toronto South, last night urged an embargo on nickel and other mineral products in order to stimulate their conversion into finished articles in Canada.

Prefacing a recital of figures relative to Canada's nickel export before, during and since the war, with the statement that this country supplies practically all the nickel the world uses, he said the directorate of the International Nickel Company, interlocked with the United States Steel Corporation, which latter controlled the bulk of the steel industry on this continent. The International Nickel Company, he declared, controlled the greater part of the nickel lands of Canada and was capitalized at \$275,000,000.

He believed, he said, that with such a natural resource as nickel Canada could command a power over other nations which would enable her to bargain with them practically on her own terms.

SPEAKING OF POTATOES

The Aroostook, Me., potato grower is neither a farmer nor a business man, but a "gambler" according to Willard De Lue in "The Boston Globe," who recently visited Caribou, the center of the Aroostook potato-growing industry. With potatoes a light crop this year, the Aroostook growers are hoping to recoup their losses during recent low-price seasons.

Last year was another bad year, says the "Globe" man. The average price paid to the growers for their potatoes was about 90 cents a barrel, and a barrel contains nearly three bushels. They couldn't grow them for that.

The reason for the slump was a general overproduction in all of the potato-growing areas of the United States. With an annual average production of 390,000,000 bushels, last year it ran up to 450,000,000, of which Maine produced 30,000,000. The yield per acre was phenomenal, even for Maine, the state which commonly leads all others in that respect. One hundred barrels an acre is considered a good yield. Last fall some growers in Aroostook took out 150.

Last winter the leaders in the street were offering only 60 cents a barrel for fine table stock, and it was the starch mills that were actually keeping the price up. Their capacious maws consumed tons of tubers all last winter and spring at about 40 cents a barrel. When the potato grower can't find any other market he carts his stuff to the mill in desperation and thanks his lucky stars for weather he gets out of it.

The starch market is a branch of the potato business of which the average city dweller knows nothing. Yet he is in very close contact with it. Every time he licks a postage stamp or a government envelope he likely as not get a sample taste of Maine potatoes, for, although potato starch can be used for laundry purposes, it

usually is not. It is employed in the manufacture of glucose-dextrine, which is the "sticker" on the back of postage stamps. Large amounts of this adhesive, by the way, are made in Wollaston, Mass.

JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

Having looked everywhere else for a reason for the increase in juvenile delinquency, the blame is now being placed at the door of the parents—the decay of parental example and control being adjudged as among the chief contributory causes for the general laxity in the conduct of young people the world over.

Speaking before the recent Child Welfare Council in Ottawa, Judge Emily Murphy gave statistics showing the increase in juvenile delinquency in Canada and, in the course of her address, she said that too often nowadays the child brought up the parents instead of the parents being the controlling and final arbiter in the home life; that in homes of luxury the chief use of father was to supply a motor car or to get up at midnight and bail out the child.

This agrees with testimony given by Police Commissioner Enright of New York City, who also said that juvenile delinquency was on the increase. The figures used in both cases are national and show that, generally speaking, thirty years ago 70 per cent. of the crime was committed by persons over thirty years of age. Today seventy per cent is by persons under thirty years of age and a large part of that 70 per cent. by persons under twenty-one, frequently well under twenty-one. The reason given by

both the Commissioner of the American city and the Canadian judge is the same; the morale of the home has been destroyed.

In days past the children were raised in a home atmosphere. They went to school on week days; to Sunday School on Sunday, and they stayed at home at night. "Now," to quote Commissioner Enright, "there is no longer religious training, no longer any home training and the child instead of being raised with proper ideas and ideals, sees an example of laxity in the life and habits of the parents that soon leads him to a life of crime."

This is rather terrible, and while it is remembered that this is a general statement, made without reference to attending circumstances, there is in it more than a grain of truth. Of course in the thirty years all life has moved forward seventy per cent. Today younger men and women are occupying positions that thirty years ago neither would have been physically or mentally fit to occupy. The war plunged youth into the forefront of strife of all kinds.

For years the tendency of the times has been to call upon the young and to laud them altogether out of proportion to their achievements. Short cuts rather than slow development has been the slogan to success, success that builded on some one accomplishment did not call for character making.

In Campbellton and towns of similar size juvenile delinquency is not so apparent as in the larger centres of population. However, there are incidents which frequently bring disturbing conditions to light. Is it not possible that social and welfare organizations might do much good work in this connection.

OBITUARY

Mrs. Angus Firth

The death of Mrs. Angus Firth took place on Friday afternoon Oct. 16th, at the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital, where the deceased had been an inmate for the past three months.

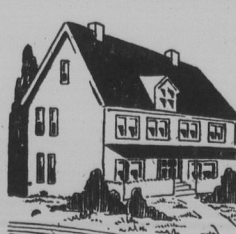

The total landings at the new internal government elevator in Edmundston, Alta., since its opening last fall, amount to 2,350,000 bushels. Of this quantity of grain handled, more than 2,000,000 bushels was wheat.

With the completion of the 1925 assessment for Toronto, the Chief Assessor announced that the city's population is now 549,429, or 7,012 greater than last year. The total assessment for 1925 is \$891,673,797, which is \$10,259,443 higher than for 1924.

A new high-water mark for the 1925 season of navigation in regard to number of passengers landed at Quebec over a week-end, was established during the week-end of September 6th when six boats docked with nearly 5,000 passengers. The three Canadian Pacific steamers, the Montreal, Marloch and Melita, brought 2,624 of the total passengers landed.

Between four and five hundred travelling passenger agents, representing railway throughout the United States and Mexico, united with representatives of the Canadian railways and steamship companies in Montreal during the week ending September 19th, for the fifth annual convention of the American Association of Travelling Passenger Agents.

In succession to Captain James Gillies, who was recently appointed general manager Canadian Pacific steamships in London, Captain R. G. Latta has been appointed to the command of the Empress of Scotland, flagship of the Canadian Pacific fleet. Captain Latta was previously on the bridge of the "Montreal" and other vessels of the same line.

Arrangements are being made for the holding of the western annual meeting in Winnipeg from November 3rd to 5th of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy. The meetings will be held in the Royal Alexander Hotel. Delegates from all points in the West, as well as from Eastern Canada, are expected to attend.

A memorial known as "The Altar of Peace" has recently been unveiled in Stanley Park, Vancouver, to symbolize the spirit of international good-will existing between the United States and Canada. The memorial was raised by joint subscription of United States and Canadian Kiwanis Clubs, and stands on the spot where the late President Harding delivered the last speech of his life while visiting Canada, in July, 1923.



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ELABORATE TOMB FOR DEAD LEADER

Moscow, Oct. 14.—Nikolai Lenin, father of Bolshevism, is to be given one of the most elaborate tombs in the world.

Plans for the erection of a marble mausoleum to replace the temporary wooden structure in which his body now rests have been announced by the Soviet government.

The plans provide for a great central hall, where the casket will be placed, with a number of auxiliary halls of museum character. The top of the tomb will take the form of a tribune from which revolutionary speakers will address the crowds in Red Square on Bolshevik feast days.

A Wholesome Baked Dinner

Most housewives do not realize that even dishes require really less attention than those prepared on top of the stove. But those who are fortunate enough to have self-basting enameled ware roasters, know from experience that this is a fact. The old-fashioned way of basting the meat every ten minutes or so did keep one almost constantly on the job if the meat was to be well-flavored and browned.

The enameled ware roaster, which not only roasts but bastes as well, has eliminated all the attention and thought that the old method involved. Roasts are said to be much better for one than fried foods and an additional advantage is that potatoes and vegetables can be roasted with the meat, which saves considerable time. White and Bermuda onions are on the market now and for a change from the usual boiled and creamed style of preparing them, try roasting them with the beef and potatoes.

Select a six-pound roast, wipe with a damp cloth, sprinkle with salt, pepper and flour and cook in a very hot oven for twenty minutes. Then place around the meat six or eight large peeled potatoes and the same number of medium sized onions. Season the potatoes and onions, cover and cook at the same temperature for forty-five minutes.

For The Kiddies' Supper

Children who take cold luncheons to school need hot and hearty food at night. Care, however, should be taken to see that the food is digestible as well as substantial in its nature. One mother, whose three thriving children show her good care, contributes this hint.

Try a vegetable soup made with milk. Cook carrots, potatoes, a little onion and a little turnip all together in an enameled ware saucepan until all are very soft. Rub through a colander. Put milk into an enameled ware double boiler. Heat just short of the boiling point and then stir in the pureed vegetables. Cook slowly in the milk until all is smooth. The soup will not be discolored if it is cooked in enameled ware.

Served with toast or oyster crackers, this soup makes a meal in itself. It is very nourishing and will never give even a delicate child the nightmare, which can be so easily acquired from food too rich or heavy.

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GREENLAND IS STORM CAUSE

Scientist Says Cyclones And Other Phenomena Originate There.

Copenhagen, Oct. 14.—If a meteorological wireless station were established in the interior of Greenland, it would be possible to warn Europe of coming storms with absolute certainty, in the opinion of Prof. W. H. Hobbs of Michigan University. Prof. Hobbs is here assisting in the scientific program for the expedition of Laugel Koch across the inland ice of Greenland next year.

A similar phenomenon is only to be found on the Antarctic continent, where Sir Douglas Mawson, by wireless from the inland ice, warned the south coast of Australia of a terrible cyclone that reached Australia 48 hours later, said Prof. Hobbs.

Greenland is Centre.

Most of the weather affecting Europe comes from Greenland's icy mountains, Prof. Hobbs believes.

"The results of the long series of expeditions in the inland ice, which were commenced by Dalager some 150 years ago, clearly show that the storms of Northern and Western Europe originate as cyclones in the cold air of the interior of Greenland and from there rage over and beyond the coasts with a violence which surpasses that of a tropical hurricane," he said.

"In the interior of Greenland it is, according to my theory, practically calm. The clouds there descend on the mountain tops, which is the cause of the thick fog with frost rim, which is always mentioned in reports from there. From the interior the winds are then blown to all sides out beyond the coasts."

The new Koch expedition across Greenland will have an opportunity of testing Prof. Hobbs' theories. Koch will carry self-registering apparatus for measuring meteorological conditions and newly invented appliances, able to stand the shaking of sledge travels.

CLIFFORD MURPHY SENT UP FOR TRIAL

N. S. Government Official is Charged With \$3,500 Shortages.

Halifax, N. S., 16.—Clifford G. Murphy, former accountant at the Nova Scotia Government Sanatorium at Kentville, N. S., was committed for trial this morning on a charge of theft arising out of alleged shortages discovered in his department by the auditors at present engaged by the Provincial government. His committal took place in Kentville this morning, but he was released on bail, fixed at \$6,000 in the Supreme Court Chambers, here this morning by Mr. Justice McIlraith.

Shortages totalling approximately \$3,500, discovered in his department during the progress of the audit recently completed in Kentville have all been repaid, it was stated in court this morning by J. S. Roper, his solicitor, who moved for Murphy's release on bail.
