A "Bailoon" Bank Gone Up.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Feb. 10. — The
Mechanics' Co-operative Bank, capital
\$200,000,000," which announced its organization in a highly colored prospectus here
last summer, has collapsed. The officers
last summer explained that the institution
was a natienal building association, organized under the building association, organized under the building association law
of 1851. They said there was not actually
\$200,000,000 behind the concern, but there
would be by and by when all the stock was
subscribed for. Stock was issued at \$200 a
share, payable at the rate of \$1 per month.

Jan. 20 the bank "filed" a report with the bank department, signed by Isaac B. The liabilities were placed at \$5,109, and total assets at \$2,689. Mr. Potter claims to know but little about the concern. 

Can a man be a traitor to his country when he favors its interests and is trying honestly to pull it out from commercial and financial difficulties? I see treason in a statesman who wants to keep his countrymen starving, but not in those who wish to give them riches.—[Premier Mercier at Montreal.





Therefore do not be deceived because the tax collector does not call on you in person, for he gets into your pocket in some way, and gets nearly all the taxes collected.

TAXATION GONE MAD.

In order to swell the revenue returns by small as well as large contributions, collectors of customs are instructed to nose among all foreign mails and grab everything on which duty, however small in amount, can be charged on any excuse. About ten days ago a Miltonian had to pay 5 cents each for duty on several English magazines which had been sent to him by mail and were taken from the bags at Hamilton, and last week we paid 6 cents for duty on Vick's seed annual before we could get it forwarded to Milton from Burlington, where it was held. It was then that the young soldier, with the permission of the officer of the guard, strode quickly over to the northwest gate, 100 yards away.
