The Masonic Temple at Napa Shattered —San Francisco Feels the Shock.

NAPA, Cal., Oct. 12.—The heaviest earthquake shock ever felt here was experienced at 10:34 last night. People rushed into the streets in their night clothes in great excitement. Chimneys were toppled over, and several buildings were shattered and badly shaken up. Drug store fixtures suffered greatly, bottles being thrown from the shelves to the floor, and other damage was done. The Masonic Temple, a fine building, was shattered. At the State Insane Asylum great excitement prevailed, the patients being almost uncontrollable. It is reported the building cracked and that other damage was done.

SAN FRANCISCO FELLS IT.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 12.—A severe earthquake shock occurred here at 10:27 last night. It lasted fully half a minute and was the most severe experienced in this city for a long time. As far as known, however, no serious damage was done.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 13.—The effects of the earthquake which visited some portions of North California Sunday night appear to have been greatest in Napa and Sonoma Valley, where the shock is described as being the heaviest experienced since the great quake of 1868. At Napa and Sonoma the walls cracked, chimneys were demolished, and in some instances falling through the roofs. Window glass was broken, people were roused from their beds, and many passed the night in the streets. The heaviest shock occurred at 10:30 last night and lasted from 10 to 45 seconds, according to localities where noted. The general direction seemed to be from northeast to southeast. On Popula ranch, near Sonoma, the earthquake caused water to gush forth in great quantities.

"Our Board of Health has been saleep," said a resident whose family had recently got rid of scarlet fever, "and it's not entirely awake yet. Beyond putting up placards when the necessity was pressed upon some of the members hardly anything has been done. The Beech street house should be quarantined, but no attempt has been made at isolation, and the inmates are in communication with outside friends."

EVERGREEN SHELTER.

As an economic policy and for other reasons the ADVERTISER has advocated the re-foresting of this Province at the same rate that its timber trees are laid low by farmers and lumbermen. While keeping in mind this important matter there is a minor one of a like nature that no farmer should forget, and that is the planting of evergreen windbreaks of spruce cedar, etc., especially to the north and west of farm house, garden and barn-yards. Such trees should be planted thick enough so that when a few years old they will effectually break the rough, keen force o winter blasts. Such a protection will add wonderfully to the comfort of the farmer and his family and of the live stock besides adding much to the beauty of the place. These considerations should never be lost sight of even though no direct cash return can be seen from the outlay and trouble requisite in making the improvement. An incidental benefit is the shelter afforded orchards and gardens which in a single season may amount in actual prevention of loss of ten times the cost of the windbreak.

THE ART OF BUTTER-MAKING. The Traveling Dairy at the Leamington

Exhibition.

Leamington, Oct. 12.—The traveling dairy sent out by the Ontario Agricultural College held very successful meetings at this fair. Getting On in the World.

In the September number of the Artist Printer, published by A. C. Cameron & Co., Chicago, is an interesting article, referring to William J. Jefferson, a former London printer. The article includes a description of the handsome six-story building on Monroe street, Chicago, which bears Mr. Jeiferson's name, with a lithograph of the edifice, and a well executed portrait of its proprietor. To some of the older residents of this city who remember when London newspapers were only issued once a week, and who also knew the genial Jefferson, the following extract will be interesting: "W. J. Jefferson, the owner of the building and occupant of the third floor, was born in 1839. Although the frosts of winter have not yet silveted his hair, he has nevertheless spent 40 years in a printing office. He turned over a type-box to stand upon at 13 years of age, and has followed the business of his choice without intermission ever since. He is a Canadian by birth, and has been a member of the Chicago Typographical Union since 1858. In 1861 he held 'cases' on the new morning paper, the Morning Post. He was also connected with the Press and Tribune job office and Long John's Daily Democrat. In 1870, in connection with Thomas J. Wroe, he established the Chicago Mercantile Journal. The fire of 1871 swept away everything except some indebte iness, which was paid in full with interest during the next three years.
