I am sure you will believe me when I say

the theme for long discussions in Parliament and for frequent speeches upon the
piatform during the past fifteen years. I
dare eay it is a theme of which you have at
times grown weary, and, when this is the
case, speeches dealing with tariff reform are
made to little profit; but the magnificent
victory won in this direction by the supporters of a revenue tariff among our
neighbors leads me to hope that the success of sound, economic views by them is cess of sound, economic views by them in not likely to be without its effect upo coss of sound, economic views by them is not likely to be without its eiect upon us. There are, too, indications here that the public mind is in a receptive mood, and that the people of Canada are prepared to consider seriously the propriety of tariff reform and of limiting the expense of government to the current resources of the country. I need not say to you that our expenditure has long been far beyond what the wealth and resources of this country warrant. Canada has reaped what it has sown, and the crop, however disappointing, is what thoughful men expected. When I look over this great country, for which Providence has done so much that is good, and those entrusted with authority have done so much that is evil, I am again impressed with the conviction that the path of public duty is a plain path, from which those entrusted with authority cannot deviate without detriment to the country. It is more than ever incumbent upon us to insist upon

wrongs have been done which must be re-dressed, it is necessary to revert to the con-sideration of first principles, and to profit by the aid which they may give us in the solution of the problems with which we are called upon to deal. The present political situation imposes this duty upon us. Public evils of a very grave character must be dealt with. Public unrest, which may grow into dangerous discontent be dealt with. No one who does not recognize the ffact is likely to exercise that care or give to the situation that consideration which it requires. It does not, however, need very long or very minute observation to discover that our whole individual civilization over its origin to the security which to discover that our whole individual civilization owes its origin to the security which the law gives to each individual that he shall enjoy the fruit of his own industry. (Applause.) BOTH IMPOVERISHED AND WERONGED.
No doubt, if those who profited by his labors, and the Government which had become their instrument could conceal the consequences from his sight by an appeal to party prejudices, these results would not immediately follow. But experience and time would make the fact plain to him that while his labor was great his recompense was little, and then he would begin, if he did not before, to slacken in his exertions and to produce a great deal less than if his recompense were greater. And this would be all the more certain to happen because he would be impoverished both from diminished rewards and from weakened exertions. What is true of the individual must be true of the masses in the aggregate, and so we see what enormous loss the country annually sustains by the weakening of its energies when such a fiscal policy as that which obtains here is allowed to prevail. (Cheers.) The imposition of a very high tariff, not to secure the payment of revenue to the State upon foreign goods, but the payment of a revenue to the favored few upon goods produced at home, has been the practice of Parliament since the autumn of 1878, and the result has been as disastrous to Canada as the experience of mankind elsewhere led as to expect. Unfortunately for the country the Franchise Act, the Redistribution Act and the power usurped by Ministers in as the experience of managing ensured size us to expect. Unfortunately for the country the Franchise Act, the Redistribution Act and the power usurped by Ministers in the appointment of returning officers has in a large degree prevented a fair expression of public opinion. I have no doubt whatever that the public opinion, if it had been fairly obtained in 1887 and 1891, would on each occasion have been adverse to the Administration. I shall not, however, divert your attention from what I have mainly before me by a discussion of these matters. A "BIG THING FOR LONDON." On Friday the ADVERTISER gave a sum

naly of the agreement entered into between the city and C. R. Jones, Frank S. Miller, Lorenzo D. Dodge, M. S. Pettingill and Thomas W. Larwood, jun., a Cleveland syndicate, for the lease of the London and Port Stanley Railway. To-day we publish complete summary of the terms and conditions agreed upon by the finance com mittee of the City Council and the capitalists, to be submitted this evening to the aldermen for ratification and the completion of the bargain. The great importance of this deal to the city is our warrant for again reverting to the terms of the bargain.

The lease is for twenty years, from March next, and the syndicate agrees to put the line in good repair within 24 months after that date, and to keep it in good ondition during the period of the lease. For the first two years as much of the rents received as are required are to be applied to the putting of the road, its bridges and buildings into proper repair. If there are any differences as to the amounts to be expended, the question is to be submitted to arbitration. The present lessees are to be called upon to leave the road in good condition, and no money shall be expended in the next two years except such as is absolutely necessary to place the road in ondition for safe running.

The syndicate stipulates that it will build a new passenger station at St. Thomas on the lands belonging to the London and Port Stanley Railway Company.

As cent, the syndicate will pay \$28,000 a year, in quarterly payments of \$7,000 each. After the first two years the rent must be paid quarterly in advance.

The first-named rate shall include handling from the boat to cars and from the cars to boat at Port Stanley. In all other classes of freight the actual cost of transference from boat to cars and from cars to boat must be paid by the shippers. In case of dispute arbitrators shall decide.

A provision of special interest to our industrial community is conceded by the eyndicate. It will carry from London to Port Stanley and vice versa warss and merchandise manufactured by any manufacturer in the counties of Middlesex and Elgin, or ordered by him for such manuton in car lots, with the additional cost of unloading and reloading at Port Stanley if performed by the syndicate. Summer residents at Port Stanley will rejoice to read the following paragraph: For their special benefit the syndicate contracts, during the summer months for twenty years to come, to put on a daily train (Sundays excepted) to leave Port Stanly for London at about 8 o'clock in the morning, and to leave London for Port Stanley at about 5 o'clock in the afternoon, for the convenience of summer residents. Between May 15 and Sept. 15 commutation tickets, good for 26 single trips, will be issued at a cost not to exceed 19 cents each way.

If for 30 days the rent is unpaid, after ten days notice the city can enter on possession of the line.

The head offices of the syndicate are to be in this city, the treasurer of whom contracts to put up \$25,000 cash, to be retained as security for the due execution of the agreement until the slip dock at Port Stanley is sub stantially completed by it, and until at least \$100,000 of the capital stock of the company proposed to be incorporated by the syndicate is paid in cash to the company.

This agreement, which seems to be in all respects fair to all parties to the covenant, will, in all probability, be agreed to by the council, and ratified by the new London and Port Stanley board, which will be elected by the new council.

SARNIA EXPRESS ROBBERY.

James McMahon, the Agent of the Company, Tells All About the Crime.

Sarnia, Jan. 7.—James McMahon and Mr. Murray, traveling agent of the western division for the Canadian Express Company, have arrived at Montreal, where James McMahon confessed to Mr. Bryce, manager of the express company, that he had taken the money from the safe himself and gave it to Clove Lacroix, a grocer. He confessed that Lacroix had induced him to commit the deed. McMahon, being closely watched by the detectives, found it better to return the money. McMahon next met Lacroix at the shipyard by appointment and there McMahon asked Lacroix for the money, and he said it was in Detroit and could not get it. McMahon told Lacroix if he did not get the money he would confess the whole thing and have him arrested. Lacroix, on getting the money, handed it over to McMahon, and he took it to Thomas H. Cook's house, where it was counted and found to be short \$275. The brass key that was left in the safe was traced by the detectives to Mackenzie's hardware store, where the brass was purchased by McMahon last June from D. Milne, a partner of the business. The robbery had been planned for some time back McMahon, on arrival of the \$250 p.m. train, in company with Mr. Sparling and Mr. Hickey, express officials, was arrested and put in the station. Before Mayor Lesseur and Crown Attorney J. P. Ducke he was charged with having a hand in the robbery of the express company. The hearing was private, the doors being closed to the public McMahon was remanded for eight days without bail. 

I write in the thriving city of London, the chief place of business in Western Ontario, and the leading mart for cheese in tended for export from Canada. Few citizens of Great Britain who find it profitable to buy Canadian cheese know how great a dairy country Canada has become in recent years, or know how the revolution from old individual methods to co-operative cheese-making was brought about; and fewer still are aware of the opportunities presented to progressive old world farmers in the fine agricultural center of which this city is the business capital.

Y., walked into the country on foot from far-off New England, little over 100 years ago, possessed only of the virtues of health and strength. He built a log house, borrowed a cow, and married a Cheshire girl, who made the first cheese in the dairy State. The man's name was Arnold, and he died deservedly rich, honored and respected.

It was not till 1851, however, that the sys

The discovery of another Gospel is an event of no ordinary significance. Yet this is what is claimed in archaeological circles. There is now in the museum at Gizeh, a Egypt, a parchment of 33 pages, bound in old leather, which purports to be the Gospel of St. Peter. The document is pronounced by experts to be not older than the eighth nor younger than the twelfth century. It was found lately in an old Christian cemetery in the "City of the Dead," Akhmim, a town on the Nile of 10,000 population. The document appears to be but a fregment of the complete Gospel, and begins at the scene before Pilate, the first words being translated as follows: "But of the Jews no one washed his hands, noither Herod, nor any of the Judges, nor of the Senate washed their hands. Pilate arose, and Herod the King commanded that the Lord should be brought." A vivid description is said to be given of the sufferings of Christ on the cross. The portents of nature during the cruclifixion are also realistically described, as also the burial of Christ, the rolling away of the stone by angels and the resurrection, the description being in general harmony with the other Gospels. 

Rational Rations.

Grain is economized in the winter keep of horses as though the feeding of it were a waste, when the contrary is true. The feeding of hay alone is the most expensive that least satisfactory way in which horses can be wintered. Fed alone, hay is constipating, and that condition is always bad for the animals. Hay without accompanying grain causes horses' coats to be long, rough and wiry. It is a badly unbalanced ration. Rations of timothy hay and wheat bran, half and half by weight, will average a cost not greater than timothy alone. Whis will keep the bowels in healthy condition, the coat short, smooth and glossy, and the animal can labor on the feed. The hay should be cut moistened, and the bran nized with it. The resulting manure is of greater value than that of hay. But there is a cheaper way to winter horses, and they will do equally well. Good straw and two quarts of oats night and morning will carry a horse through admirably. If one will compare the expense of hay feeding alone and that of straw and oats, he will be likely to step out of the old rut immediately.

Water For Stock.

Water For Stock.






