





Knowing the direction the men should have taken to reach the village and the route by which they were marching, he at length overtook the maching column in the dark.

Headed For Destruction.

When discovered, the missing Canadians were headed directly for the German lines and were within a short half-mile of the enemies' trenches when halted by Captain Ware. The officers and men were hopelessly lost and knew nothing of their position or the maw of death into which they were steadily marching.

Not only were they within range of the German artillery, but within rifle range as well and nothing but the opportune arrival of the London officer saved them from walking directly to their death, for in such country and within such range it would have meant the wiping out of practically the whole command, once it was discovered, before suitable cover could have been reach-

Brought Command Back.

Captain Ware halted the command and managed to bring it back to the appointed village without the loss of a single man or the discovery of its exposed position by the Germans.

Those officers who learned July of the Londoner's exploit are loud in their praises of his daring and efficiency and have written home about it, and it is predicted that official recognition of his act will be accorded by the British war office as well as the commandants of the Canadian forces.







Under date of March 10, Ald. Wilson received the following inclosure con-cerning subways from Mr. Gray. It gave the desired information which the alderman had sought. The letter is: "March 10, 1915.

"Dear Sir-I am in receipt of your letter of vesterday's date, inclosing letter from the Honorable the Minster of Public Works and from Mr.

Wilson of London.

"The provision that Mr. Wilson refers to is still in existence. Section 239 (a) of the act makes an rossing fund, and under this section the board is authorized to make an appropriation from this fund towards the cost of construction of works of protection, safety and convenience for the public in respect of highway crossings at rail level which were in existence on the 1st of April, 1909. Under the act, appropriations may be made either towards the construction of gates or subways or bridges.

The contribution that the board is allowed to make must, in no instance, exceed 20 per cent of the cost of the actual construction, and not, in any event, exceed the sum of \$5,000 for any one crossing. Appropriations cannot be made to more than three crossings in any one municipality in any one year. return the letters you inclose
