One dollar wheat is again in vogue Yesterday there was a sensational advance of ten cents a bushel for Ontario wheat, the magic figure now being paid. The price has been keeping around 90 cents lately, but there was very little wheat coming in. Smaller towns around had been raising the price a little and Thursday the millers of the city determined to shove the price up to the dollar to see if the farmers could not be induced to market their wheat. So far there has not been sufficient time to test the move, but it is anticipated that local wheat receipts will increase.

## How Coal Is Delivered.

"I, Joseph Hyde, of the City of London, teamster, do solemnly declare:

"(1) That in the month of August, 1907, I was employed by W. Buchanan, of London, coal merchant, to team coal to the London schools, and worked in said employment for parts of several weeks;

"(2) In such employment I delivered four loads a day of about 2 tons to 21/2 tons each load-about 44 loads in all -and during all said employment I neither gave nor received vouchers of any sort in respect of such coal;

"(3) All the coal was taken direct from the cars, and

"(4) Several other teamsters were working with me, and I helped unload in all about ten cars, and so far as I am aware none of such car lots were weighed, nor do I know of any vouchers having been given or received for same;

"(5) While I was helping to unload one car of coal for Lorne avenue school at the Adelaide street siding of the C. P. R. a teamster, called Bob, took from it a load which he told me he delivered to the Tecumseh House. I told him I thought that a queer piece of business, and he replied that it was none of his business; he was obeying instructions. "(Signed), JOSEPH HYDE."


