He defined adulteration from a legal standpoint as the addition of an inferior product, misnaming or misbranding, coloring illegally, or the addition of poisonous



The great treasure hunt-salvaging of the gold sunk with the Lusitania and Arabic-begins when the steamship Blakeley sails from here May 25 for the spot, eight miles off Kinsale Point, Ireland, where the Lusitania went down in 1915.
